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

On Nov. 11 last Mr. Proctor refused to uphold the plea of counsel for the city, who contended that even if there was damage to the value of the property the corporation could not be held legally responsible.



I can give you chapter and verse of a dozen cases where I have had experience of too sharp practices on the part of the Canadian manufacturer. Even to-day my partner is leaving for New York with the object of arranging for the manufacture of some goods there which we have been getting from Canada, but which the Canadian manufacturers, tho they have not filled even the half of our large order, have refused to supply us goods as they are trying to sell their own goods direct to the retailer. A Canadian firm manufacturing show cases sent their representative to us, and we gave him a large order, believing, his representations that the show case was patented, but it proved not to be so, and we lost heavily, as the goods were manufactured here. I could cite many more cases where the Canadian manufacturers have not acted fairly, not only not sending goods according to sample, but on seeling that business can be done, fall to fill orders, endeavoring rather to secure trade direct." in this country regarding Canadian
