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Address of the Session.

NOTHER year has passed over St. James Square Congregation, and we have first of all to express our thankfulness to the Head of the Church that the long vacant pastorate of the Church has been filled, and that notwithstanding the disadvantage of so long a

vacancy, the Church has suffered so little.

In the present condition and prospects of the congregation we can all see that there is much reason for thankfulness and encouragement. The Session have noted with great satisfaction the large and increasing attendance upon the regular services of the Church upon the Sabbath Day; and have been especially gratified with the increase of the number found at the weekly prayer meeting. Only let us all remember in this, as in all else, not to imagine that we have attained all that we may and should attain; and let us each one in the coming year, more carefully than ever, see to it that no slight reason shall cause us to be absent from a service so important for the maintenance of the spiritual life of

We find much reason for encouragement also in the the Church. Sabbath School work of the Church. In the first place there has been a material increase in the attendance upon the Sabbath School held in the Church. addition to this, the two new Sabbath Schools which have been opened, the one on Wilton Avenue, the other on the east side of the Don, have begun with every encouragement that could reasonably be expected. The total number of scholars under instruction has thus increased, through the growth of the Central School, and the addition of the new schools, from a little over three hundred a year ago to over four hundred and sixty at the present time, with every prospect of a considerable addition to this number in the coming months.

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The ready response that has been given from the congregation to the calls for workers and means in connection with this extension of our work, has been exceedingly gratifying to the pastor and Session, and we take this opportunity to thank all those who, whether as teachers, visitors, or by material contributions, have done so much to put the work on its present excellent foundation.

With a single exception, there has been a decided advance in the contributions of the congregation to the Schemes of the Church. In all those tabulated below 1886 shows a marked improvement on 1885.

These figures, it will be seen, show an increase during the past year for the Schemes named, of \$763.00, or about 23 per cent. on the sums given for the same objects in 1885.

In the contributions to the Special College Funds, however, there is a diminution in 1886, as compared with 1885, of \$954; \$1,208 appearing under this head in 1886 as against \$2,162 in 1885. The total contributions reported to the Assembly for the Schemes of the Church are thus: \$5,416 against \$5,607 for the previous year, a sum less by \$191. For various congregational purposes the contributions for the past year show a large poses the contributions for the past year show a large advance; \$7,897 in 1886 against \$5,163 in 1885, an increase of \$2,734.

Not to analyze the financial reports more in detail, we find in them matter for encouragement as indications of increasing interest in the great work of the Church of Christ; while also we must acknowledge that we have not yet nearly reached the limit of ability to give for Jesus' sake. We need to pray that to this end we may all receive, during the year before us, such new revelations of the love and power of our blessed Lord and Saviour as shall constrain us all to self-denials and sacrifices for His sake far beyond what, as a Church, we have yet attempted. "Let us remember the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, who, although He was rich, yet for our sakes became poor!"

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The Young People's Association reopened this fall with a large increase of numbers and interest, and so long as it continues to keep in mind the religious and spiritual interests of the Church as the ultimate object of everything done in connection with the Church, it must be a valuable aid in gathering together the young people of the congregation, and promoting among them an acquaintance, at once pleasant and helpful for good in many ways. We need to remember the Association, as every other organization connected with the Church, faithfully in our prayers, that the blessing of the Master may rest abundantly upon all those who are seeking in all these various ways to do something for the cause of

During the year past there were received to the Church on certificate from other Churches, 69, and on profession of faith, 23, making a total addition of 92. On the other hand, during the same period, we have lost 28 communicants, 5 by death and 23 by dismissal to other Churches. The Session have recently passed a regulation to the effect that in all cases where communicants shall be absent from our bounds for more than two years without giving notice to the Session of their intention without giving notice to the Session of their intention to return to our congregation, their names shall be removed from the roll. The importance and propriety of this will be apparent, when it is remembered that each year we have to report to the General Assembly

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our numerical strength. It is plain that persons who have gone, perhaps, to a distant part of the country, and have neglected to send for their certificates, cannot, on that account, be justly reckoned members of our Church, and the Session in this connection desire to urge it upon all who may be led by Providence to remove to the bounds of other congregations, that they should procure a certificate of their membership from the pastor before leaving, to avoid the uncertainty and irregularity which is otherwise inevitable. So also, in the interest of a proper administration not only of our own Church, but of the proper administration of the government of the Church in general, it is of importance that those who, having come from other Churches of which they are members, have cast their lot with us, should not delay the formal assumption of the place and responsibilities of Church members, but procure and present their letters to the Session.

In pursuance of the rule above-mentioned, thirty-three names have been dropped from the roll at the close of this year. It should be said, however, in justice, that of these, seven were students, who, having finished their divinity course, have entered the office of the ministry.

The roll of communicants in actual connection with our Church after all these deductions, stands at the

close of the year at 504.

As already remarked, to six of our number the past year has brought the end of earthly work. Mr. A. McClelland, Miss Agnes Christie, Miss Marlie Thompson, Mrs. James Stanbury and Mrs. Robert Christie, in the course of the year were called into the heavenly rest. They are missed in the Church, and especially in the homes which their presence blessed; but as for them we rejoice to remember that to depart was to be with Christ, which is very far better than to be here. It is fitting that in this connection special reference should be made to the bereavement which the Church and the Session have sustained in the past year, in the loss of our venerated brother, Mr. George Smith, who, almost since the foundation of the Church, had sustained in 0

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an eminently worthy manner the office of ruling elder. Filled with the fruits of grace, and of a ripe old age, it was not to be expected that he should much longer be spared to us. Encouraged and comforted by the remembrance of his happy departure, we must now look the more with prayer and hope to the younger men of the congregation for those who shall take the place of the aged, as one after another they reach the end of life and work in the flesh.

With this brief review of the past year, the Session, at the beginning of a new year, desire to commit the Church and congregation "to the Lord and the Word of His grace, which is able to build us up, and give us an inheritance among them that are sanctified." And they would most earnestly ask that one and all may more and more abound in prayer for that presence and power of the Holy Spirit upon all pulpit and pastoral work by the minister and his many faithful helpers, without which, let us never forget, the greatest external prosperity and outward growth can only prove how true it is that "unblest good is ill."

ABSTRACT OF

Minutes of Congregational Meeting.

TORONTO, January 18, 1887.

THE thirty-third annual meeting of the congregation was held this evening, according to announcement from the pulpit on the two preceding Sabbaths.

After devotional exercises, conducted by the Rev. Dr. Kellogg, Mr. Henry W. Darling was appointed Chairman, and Mr. W. E. Long, Secretary. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. The Managers' Report was then read by the Secretary, and the Treasurer presented his statement.

It was then moved by Mr. R. Kilgour, seconded by Mr. R. Mills, "That the Report and Treasurer's statement be received and adopted, and that the thanks of the congregation are due, and are hereby tendered, to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer, for the manner in which they have discharged their duties."

Moved by Mr. W. Kerr, seconded by Mr. R. Carrie, "That the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. Douglas, the leader of the choir, and as a token of the appreciation of his valuable services the Managers are hereby authorized to pay him the sum of three hundred dollars." Carried.

Moved by Mr. S. F. McKinnon, seconded by Mr. W. P. Rodgers, "That thanks are due and are hereby tendered to Miss Douglas and the members of the choir for their valuable assistance rendered throughout the year." Carried.

Moved by Mr. H. W. Nelson, seconded by Mr. R. Darling, "That in recognition of the kindness of Miss Douglas in presiding at the organ since its introduction, the Treasurer be and is hereby instructed to hand her the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars." Carried.

Moved by Mr. C. Blackett Robinson, seconded by Mr. R. Kilgour, "That Messrs. W. Kerr, Thos. Kirkland, and Rev. Dr. Kellogg be a committee to prepare and print the annual reports of the Church." Carried.

Nominations for Managers were then received, the retiring Managers being Messrs. McDonald, Reed, Darling, Robinson, Lowden, and Peattie. having been taken the following were declared elected, viz., McDonald, Reid, Darling, Lowden, Peattie, and A. Jeffrey.

On motion of Mr. Robinson, Messrs. J. Paton and R. M. Gray were appointed Auditors for the ensuing

Dr. McPhedran introduced the question of altering some of the rooms downstairs for the purpose of affording more room for the meetings of the Young People's Association, and then moved a resolution, seconded by Mr. Wm. Douglas, "That the Managers be instructed to consider the rearrangement of the parlours so as to give better facilities for the various organizations in connection with the congregation, and effect any changes advisable as soon as they see their way to do so." Carried.

There being no further business, the meeting was brought to a close, and was followed by a social

gathering of the congregation.





Revenue.

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"Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him."—I Cor. xvi. 2.

"God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work."—2 Cor. ix. 8.

Contributions for the Support of Ordinances are made in three ways: (1) Weekly Offerings, in envelopes placed on the collection plate each Sabbath; (2) Quarterly Subscriptions; (3) Contributions placed on the collection plate. The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation, and the Managers greatly prefer that it should be adopted by all. The sittings are all free, no pew rents being charged to any one.

ENVELOPES are given at the beginning of each quarter, and on the allocation of sittings; and any one not now receiving envelopes, and desiring to contribute in this way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers, who will attend to the matter. Those occupying sittings are expected to contribute according to their means.



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Managers' Report, 1886.

IN again presenting their Annual Report, the Managers desire to express their deep gratitude to God for the abundant evidence of His presence and guiding hand in all the matters pertaining to what has been an eventful year in the history of the Church.

The pulpit vacancy of two years and a half, that seemed to our dim vision a misfortune and cause for regret, has been shown to be the working of a kind Providence, and the prayers so often and so earnestly offered up have been fully answered by Him in whose hands all things are ordered aright. Though but a few months since the Rev. Dr. Kellogg entered upon the pastorate of the Church, he has already endeared himself to the congregation, and under his ministrations new life and activity have been instilled into every department of Church work, as is evidenced by the largely increased attendance at both the Sabbath services and Wednesday evening meetings, and the marked and growing interest taken in all religious matters. The Managers feel that this year marks the commencement of a new era of prosperity for the Church, both spiritual and temporal, and they trust that while the past has given many and frequent occasions for great thankfulness, we may yet look forward and hope for even greater blessings in the future.

In connection with the Financial Statement, the Managers have to report the negotiation of a new loan on the Church property of \$15,000, bearing interest at five per cent. per annum; with the proceeds of this loan, and by

creating a small floating debt, they were enabled to pay off the old mortgage of \$17,000, bearing six per cent. interest, thus reducing the interest account to an amount which will not be a very heavy charge on the revenue. The Comparative Statement herewith shows a very satisfactory increase in the weekly collections and offerings, which has enabled the Treasurer to meet all the ordinary expenditure, excepting a small debit balance of \$41.95, which is carried forward; the balance of \$1,375, due on account of Building Fund, should be paid off without much trouble before the close of another year.

There are still some members of the Congregation who are not contributing to the support of ordinances by the envelope or quarterly offering systems, and while they may be contributing through the open collection, their names do not appear in the Treasurer's books. It is very desirable that such persons should adopt either of the above mentioned plans, that their contributions

may be duly credited to them.

The Managers retiring by rotation are Messrs. McDonald, Reid, Darling, Robinson, Lowden, and Peattie.

N the good providence of God we have been brought to the close of another year; it has been a year fraught with blessing not only to the congregation at large, but very specially to the Sabbath School.

At our last annual meeting we looked forward to the early settlement of our esteemed pastor, Dr. Kellogg,

amongst us with prayerful interest, and hoped that in his settlement there would follow much good, and in this we have not been disappointed. Not only have our numbers been increased but the number which have had their names added to the communion roll, who are attending, or have been lately attending, the school, was larger than in any previous year, indicating thereby such an interest in spiritual things as can only be secured through the faithful teaching or preaching of, and belief in, the Word of God?

It is matter for devout gratitude that such a state of

things exists, and to God be all the glory.

They are most conscious of blessing who are most conscious of their need of it, and whilst, during these past months, we have sought to labour for the Master as best we could it has been at best but imperfect service—none realize this more than those who know that the eyes of the Lord are upon them as He walks amid the Churches and knows their works, and our cry continually would be "Unto thee lift I up mine eyes, O Thou that dwelleth in the heavens. Behold as the eyes of servants look unto the hand of their masters, and as the eyes of a maiden unto the hand of her mistress, so our eyes wait upon the Lord our God until that He have mercy on us."

Showing an increase of 19 over the number on the rolls last year.

The number of male teachers on the roll is 15, and female, 16; total, 31-an increase of one.

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The attendance of the scholars has been uniformly good during the year, and their deportment, on the

whole, very satisfactory.

During the months of July and August the attendance is necessarily greatly reduced, owing partly to the absence of so many from the city, and partly to the hot weather common at that season. It is a matter not unworthy of our consideration whether some improvement could not be made in this respect, whether it might not be arranged that the school should meet in the morning, instead of the afternoon, during these two months of the year.

Whilst sickness has prevailed to some extent among teachers and scholars alike, there have not been many The scholars serious cases of illness during the year. who it was feared might not recover from sickness, have, we are thankful to say, been restored to health

and strength, and are with us once more.

On the 18th of July last our beloved sister in Christ, Miss Thompson, passed away to join that white-robed throng, "and to her was granted that she should be arrayed in fine linen, clean and white, for the fine linen is the righteousness of saints." She sought to live in and for Christ. Brought up in a Christian home, and surrounded all the time by Christian influences, it was no wonder that she delighted in Sabbath School work. In her early days she was a most regular attendant at the Sabbath School, and latterly for several years a most devoted and loving teacher, and when laid aside from her class and lying on a bed of weakness, and often times of great pain, nothing seemed to give her more joy than to know that her class attended faithfully, and that their interest in the Saviour, as she desired, was increasing. It was her continual prayer that to each one of them also, He might be found as precious as He had been to her, alike in the days of health as in the day of sickness.

In September Mr. Houston took charge of the young

men of Mr. Kirkland's Bible Class, Mr. Kirkland con-

tinuing the instruction of the young women.

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These two advanced classes now meet in the Bible Class Room and Ladies' Parlour respectively, and at the same hour on the Sabbath as the other classes in the school.

One very gratifying fact in connection with the school has been the large number of scholars, who are still connected, or were but lately connected with the school, and who have become members of the Church during the year. How true it is the Sabbath School may be very fittingly termed the nursery of the Church.

And while these things give us much cause for thankfulness, they should also serve as an encouragement to be more earnest than ever in seeking to advance that kingdom which is so dear to the Saviour, in seeking to lead one and another—even the little children—in penitence and love to the Lord who loves the sinner, who waits to be gracious, who to every one says "Come."

The Rev. Dr. James, who occupied the pulpit in our church for over four months in the early part of the year, and until the settlement of our pastor, was present nearly every Sabbath, and conducted the closing exercises of the school. His presence and voice were always a source of pleasure and edification to all present, and our earnest prayers follow him to his present field of labour that the Lord may be with him, and cause him to abound more and more in the word and work of the Master he so faithfully serves.

Instead of the usual quarterly review of the lessons on the last Sabbath in March, the school was addressed by Messrs, McKenzie, Gordon, and Campbell, students of Knox College, on their labours in different parts of the North-West. Their addresses were listened to with great interest, and also, we trust, with profit. Kellogg reviewed the lessons of the second and third quarters of the year, and the result was eminently satisfactory to all present. It certainly is the opinion of all that, if we cannot have our Pastor oftener with us in the school, we should have him there at least once a quarter.

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None of us who listened to the sermon preached by Dr. Kellogg to the Sabbath School and young people of the congregation on the last Sabbath of the year could have felt otherwise than highly delighted and greatly profited. It will be a day and service to be remembered, we trust, by not a few, not only throughout life here but in the life to come. What a blessed word to the sinner when it comes from the lips of the Saviour, that word "Come to Me!"

Business meetings of the teachers have been held during the year as they were required, to consider matters affecting the interests of the school. These

have been well attended.

The meeting usually held for devotional exercises, immediately after the closing of the school, has been observed regularly every Sabbath, and a very blessed season it has proved to many of us, as with one another and with one heart we breathed our sense of need and gratitude to God in praise and prayer, supplicating the divine blessing on the good seed of the Word, the gifts offered, and the work done in the name of the Master.

On the 30th December last the usual anniversary of the Sabbath School was held; a large number of the young people were present. Very many of the parents and friends connected with the congregation were also present. The meeting was a very enjoyable and profitable one. Suitable addresses were given by the Rev. Dr. James and the Rev. Wm. Inglis. A choir formed from amongst the scholars sang very sweetly some pieces of sacred song, under the leadership of our good friend, Mr. Douglas, who is ever ready to help us in this good work.

The summer gathering of the school this year was held at the Humber on the 26th of June, and was without doubt one of the most successful meetings of the kind we have had-the day was delightful, the company

large, and the enjoyment all that we could wish.

The International Scheme of Lessons has been made the course for study during the year in all except the advanced and infant classes. Mr. Kirkland's class, during the early part of the year, took for consideration the kings and prophets of the Old Testament, and in the latter part of the year, the life of Christ, which, also, Mr. Houston made the theme of study with the young men.

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The scholars have been supplied once a month with illustrated papers, and to many of them these silent visitors bring much joy, as they bring before them, in one way and another, the old story of good and evil, of man's sin and God's mercy. To the Library have been added, during the year, some 75 new books, and it now contains over 600 volumes. Over 100 volumes, which have been well read by our scholars, have been laid aside with the purpose of making them over as the nucleus of a library for each of the two Mission Schools.

We have, as a school, good cause to express our thanks to Miss Douglas, who, for another year—as for so many years—has filled so faithfully the place of organist and leader of the singing in the school.

Let us see to it, my dear fellow-teachers and fellowlabourers all in the kingdom, that by God's grace, and through the aid of the Holy Ghost, sin shall no longer prevail, or, at least, prevail less than hitherto. Let us run the race that is set before us, ever looking unto Jesus. Let us, every one, with the new year, on the threshold of which we now stand, adopt, with the whole heart, the motto suggested to us by our Pastor, last Sabbath, "For me to live is Christ." Then, daily, our cry will be, "O God, whom we should never have known hadst Thou not deigned to discover Thyself to us in the light of the Gospel, complete the great work Thou hast begun! Give us a heart to understand the truth Thou hast revealed! Let the light of love, shed in our hearts by Thee, disperse all the obscurities of Thy word! Let Thy goodness, let Thy marvellous wisdom, keep from us no other secrets than those which are useless for us to know; teach us, by love, the most perfect of all wisdom; render the most simple wise in the science of Thy salvation! Thy spirit, O Lord, is love, as Thou Thyself art love. Diffuse it through the whole earth; spread in every place that holy flame; attract all hearts to Thyself; make of all souls one single soul, in a common sentiment of adoration and devotion! Lord! we shall know all when we know how to love; we shall then rejoice in a light which is not the product of mere laborious study, a light which sanctifies and consoles! Then truly Thou shalt have spoken to us in the Gospel. Then shall it be seen that Thou hast given to us a message of love and peace; and our intellectual conviction, in itself cold, sterile, useless, shall be changed into a living faith, full of hope, full of good fruits."

T is gratifying to be able to state that during the past year the operations of the Young People's Association have been attended with a good measure of prosperity and success; and we believe a marked improvement has been made in many respects as compared with former years. The membership exceeds that of any past year, being about eighty. The attendance has been such as at times to make the meetings uncomfortably crowded, the parlours being too small for the accommodation of the Association. We are glad, however, to state that the managers have the interests of the Association at heart, and that by next season we are likely to have ample accommodation. The interest taken in the work of the Association has

become more general, and the members cheerfully

respond to all calls.

During the first part of the year nine meetings were held. Since work was resumed seven meetings have been held, two of these being open meetings. Of these one was the closing meeting of the first half of the year; the other was the formal opening of the second half. The opening meeting was held in the form of a reception, refreshments being served, and a social evening spent. The students worshipping with the congregation were especially invited to be present at this meeting. The programme has consisted chiefly of instrumental and vocal music, readings, essays, and the reading of the Magazine, which under the able editorship of Miss Smith, has become a prominent feature of the Association, and adds much to the entertainment of each meeting.

The object of the Association is the extension of social intercourse among the younger people of the congregation, the encouragement of their intellectual improvement, all with the view of promoting in this way the highest interests of the Church. Strangers are especially invited to the meetings, and are assured of a hearty welcome, as an introduction committee has been appointed for that purpose. By a vote at a recent meeting the Association resolved during the present season to raise the sum of \$50, in aid of the Mission Sabbath School work undertaken this winter by the

Church.

The financial position of the Association is satisfactory. At the close of the year there remained in the treasury the sum of \$14.49, as shown by the annexed statement :-

THE Mission Band have to report, for the past year, a membership of seventy-five, including sixty-one active and fourteen honorary members. Three ladies have become life members of the Woman's Foreign

Missionary Society through the Band.

There has been handed into the General Society \$466, being an increase of \$116 over any preceding year. Of this sum a considerable part was raised by means of a parlour meeting, garden party and lecture. Since July, a collection, averaging \$10, has been taken up at the monthly missionary prayer meeting, and has been handed to our Treasurer.

During the summer, a box of clothing valued at \$50 was prepared for the North-West Indians, and the opportunity is taken of thanking those members of the

congregation who gave donations towards this.

A large number of articles, useful for the girls' school connected with our missions in India, were sent with Dr.

Oliver to Indore and Neemuch.

Meetings of the Society have been held monthly during the year on different occasions. These were addressed by the President of the General Society, the President of the Presbyterial Society and our Pastor.

Meetings have also been held fortnightly, under the supervision of the Mission Band, for the younger children of the congregation. Besides receiving missionary intelligence, the children made scrap-books, etc., which were sent to India.

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We omitted to say in last year's report that an organ was sent to Mrs. Wilson, Neemuch, from members of the congregation through the Mission Band. Mrs. Wilson writes: "We give our little organ quite a prominent place in the service, it is so great an attraction to the crowd. The organ was not taken to the bazaar last Sabbath evening, and one man came forward, and asked whether the 'baja' had come. When he saw that it was not there he went away; so that evening, for want of it, we lost at least one hearer."

It is only just to make reference to the great service rendered to the Band by our President, whose illness, so much regretted by us all, has prevented her taking

charge of our meetings since September.

We cannot close without referring to the death of Mrs King, who twelve years ago formed the "Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band," and who, while she remained in Toronto, continued to take the warmest and most helpful interest in its success.

IN presenting their annual report the Missionary Committee have much cause for thankfulness.

The coming of Dr. Kellogg amongst us, with his wide experience in the mission field, has already had its effect, and manifests itself substantially, as shall be seen by the increased amount subscribed for the Mission work of the Church.

In addition to the five Schemes which have been before the Congregation this year, we have been asked to add another, viz., Jewish Missions, for which a special collection was made.

The monthly sums handed to the lady collectors amount to \$1,887.65. The amount handed to the Treasurer direct includes special collections and (\$33.91) interest on deposits, \$1,066.84, and the special collection for Home Missions on Sabbath, \$75; making a total of \$3,029.59, this amount being the revenue of the Association for the year, an increase of more than

ten per cent. over the previous year.

The amounts contributed for special objects are as follows, viz.:—Jewish Missions, \$45.50; Home Missions, \$7; special collection for Home Missions, \$75; French Evangelization, \$29.53; Foreign Missions, \$128; McAll Mission, Paris, \$30; Knox College, \$5; Augmentation of Stipends, \$460.65. Total \$780.68, which amount, with \$47.75 paid for Records, leaves a balance of \$2,201.16 to be allocated amongst the six

Mission Schemes of the Church.

The following allocations of amounts are respectfully submitted by your Committee for adoption:—Home Missions, \$860; Foreign, \$300; French Evangelization, \$100; Collegiate Education, \$450; Manitoba College, \$125; Augmentation of Stipends, \$366.16; Total, \$2,201.16.
