





### **INCREASED SUBSIDIES**

INCREASED SUBSIDIES

(Toronto Mail and Empire.)

The provinces are growing in population and their expenses are becoming larger. But their income does not increase. At the same time the revenue of the Dominion has grown enormously. In 1867 the Dominion receipts from customs and inland revenue amounted to \$11,000,000; now they are more like \$70,000,000. If the people pay so much more to the Dominion exchequer, they are surely entitled to draw more from that source.

The 'proposed additional subsidy will be but fair play to the provinces. It will not be money granted as a favor, but to which the provinces are entitled because of the changed position in which they are found. The taxes taken from the people will be in part returned to them for their own use in their provincial capacity. There can be no doubt that the provinces, which have so much to do in the way of development, will be able to use their revenue wisely and well. In fact the local distribution of money on progressive work is bound to be more advantageous than that which is directed from a central and perhaps distant point.

**ADVANCING PRICES** IN DRY GOODS LINES

Placed to Ensure Delivery---**Demand Exceeds Supply.** 

Not only in woollens but in nearly all other lines, the tendency of prices is higher. The violent advance in the raw cotton market has affected cotton goods. Merchants have been hoping that speculators might be shut out of the dry goods market this year, for dry goods merchants are more disturbed at the size of the demand for goods and the continued short production of them than they are by the fluctuations in the prices of raw materials. 
