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# LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

## UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

*As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the third day of August, 1855; and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April, 1880, and 18th day of November, 1887.*

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depôt of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The five clerical and five lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election, except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the country, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be *ex officio* such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs

and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or Officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alteration has been given to the Board.

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RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE  
TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday-schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

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REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO  
SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS,  
18TH JUNE, 1888.

That the forms of application for grants, already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September, 1878, regarding Sunday-schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any extent.

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools, under denominational auspices, are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of the Society; but missions among Indians, Jews, French-Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule.

# RULES

## RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

(Revised May 17th, 1887.)

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I. That a Society be formed in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society, and through it with the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE ————— BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually shall be members of the Branch Society; and those subscribing twenty dollars at one time shall be life members of the same.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than ——— other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who are subscribers to the Society shall be members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Branch Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted yearly to the Upper Canada Bible Society, or through it to the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the various languages, and for supplying the whole world, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God.

IX. That a depository for the sale of the Holy Scriptures be opened in a suitable central locality, and that the books be placed in a conspicuous position, the necessary supply being obtained from the Upper Canada Bible Society *on sale*. Remittances on purchase account to be made from *proceeds of sales only*.

X. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the ——— day of ———, in each year, at ———, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; moneys voted, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required, and a copy forwarded to the Secretary at Toronto.

XI. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT  
OF THE  
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

SUBMITTED AT THE ANNIVERSARY MEETING, HELD AT  
TORONTO, TUESDAY, 19TH MAY, 1891.

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With the recurring events of the times and seasons, in the providence of God, we are permitted to celebrate another Anniversary of the Upper Canada Bible Society.

As Directors and Officers of this important organization we recognize the responsibility which rests upon us, and with gratitude we acknowledge the goodness of God, in the large measure of success and encouragement which has attended our efforts.

The work of this Society is two-fold—namely, that of placing the Word of God in the hands of thousands of our fellow countrymen, who otherwise would be without it; and in assisting the British and Foreign Bible Society in translating the Scriptures, and giving the "bread of life" to the people of every land, in their own tongue.

Thousands of copies of the Bible, or portions of it, have been circulated during the past year through our Society; many families who were destitute of the Scriptures in their homes were supplied by our Colporteurs, and millions of copies have been distributed, in many languages, throughout the world by the great British and Foreign Bible Society, and other kindred societies. Yet, millions of the human race have never seen God's Word, or heard His message of love, which is more precious "than gold, yea, much fine gold."

Christ and the Bible are inseparable. He is the Alpha and Omega of inspiration. The record of the redemptive work of the Son of God is contained in the Scriptures, and if the last command of the blessed Master—to disciple all nations—is obeyed, we must give the Holy Scriptures to "every kindred and tongue, and people, and nation."

"The entrance of thy words giveth light." In these times God has set before us an open door. The whole wide world is open to the Gospel message. The Colporteur with the Book of books can visit all lands, and we who have received the Truth, in all its fulness, cannot, if we are the true followers of Jesus, ignore or neglect the claims of those who are less favoured than ourselves. We are debtors "both to the Greeks and to the Barbarians; both to the wise and to the unwise."

That an increasing number of the children of God realize this, and consider it not only a duty but a privilege to send the Word to the dark places of the earth is evidenced by the increased liberality of the friends of this Society, as shown in the returns from the various branches. The citizens of Toronto have

urgent claims upon them for assistance in the maintenance of many and worthy schemes of benevolent and Christian work, not only within this city, but all over the Dominion, consequently the contributions to this Society—though in some cases generous—have not been commensurate with the ability of our people, or with the magnitude of the work, and the pressing need of the world. However, it has been decided to establish Branch Societies in different parts of the city and vicinity, under control of a Committee of the Board, with the object of stimulating the interest of the community in the work of this Society.

It is with gratification that we are enabled to report a continued advance in the revenue of the Society. This increase is partly owing to an advance in the revenue of the "Ketchum Trust"—for distribution in Bibles to the Sunday Schools in the City of Toronto.

For the fiscal year which closed on 31st March, the ordinary revenue amounts to \$35,054.52 which is \$1,610.11 beyond that of any former year.

In addition to this we have received \$5,000, being one-half of the "William Gooderham Bequest," which has been placed as a separate investment, the interest of which is to be used annually for specific purposes in connection with the work of this Society. Thus the grand total of our revenue for the past year amounts to \$40,054.52.

We desire to acknowledge the continued interest and valuable assistance rendered by hundreds of active Officers, Collectors, etc., etc., many of whom have performed noble and faithful services to this Society for periods extending from twenty-five to fifty years, in connection with our local branches.

Invitations having been received and accepted to send representatives to take part in the Anniversary Meetings of other Bible societies, by appointment of the Board the Rev. B. D. Thomas, D.D., visited the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society, and the Rev. John Burton, M.A., B.D., was sent as our representative to attend the 75th Anniversary of the American Bible Society, at New York.

While the work of the Society has been enlarged and extended, there is nothing unusual or eventful to record.

Since our last Annual Meeting four of the members of the Board have been called from time to eternity, thus reminding us who remain of the uncertainty of human life. The names of the deceased are as follows:—Rev. John M. Castle, D.D., a Vice-President since 1882, died on 11th June, 1890, at Rochester, N.Y.; Rev. Samuel Rose, D.D., a Vice-President since 1881, and Chairman of the Committee on the "Ketchum Trusts" for many years, died 16th July, 1890, in the 84th year of his age; Rev. John Gemley, a Vice-President, and formerly the Permanent Secretary of this Society (Sept., '69 to July, '74) died on the 6th January, 1891; Mr. Alderman George E. Gillespie, an active member of the Board since 1884, was suddenly cut down in the full vigour of strength, while on a visit at Pasadena, California, on 11th April, 1891.

#### AGENCY AND VISITATION OF THE BRANCHES.

The responsibility of visiting the Branches devolved upon the Permanent Agent, and Provisional Agents, each of whom visited the several districts assigned to them respectively. In order to save expenses the officers of a number of the Branches conducted their annual meetings, and performed all the necessary

work with much success. Many other Branches might be induced to follow this example, and thus husband the resources of the Society. Although the meetings are not always largely attended, the agents, generally speaking, report that much sympathy and interest in the work is manifested by the friends of the Society. Occasionally the Agents meet with disappointment, perhaps through the oversight or neglect of the official with whom he has been in correspondence, and in a few instances the proposed meetings were failures. We are glad to say that those cases were not numerous, and we trust that such will not require to be again referred to.

New Branches have been organized during the past year in Ontario, viz.:—Blake, Flesherton, Maxwell, Priceville, Shannonville and Toronto Junction.

We have now a total of 513 Branches in connection with this Society, but there are several weak Branches which may require to be reduced to the status of Depositories.

#### MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

Six agents were appointed to continue and extend our work in Manitoba and the North-West. Four of the agents have reported, but the full returns of the other two agents have not yet been received. So far as we have heard, the reports are very encouraging, and remittances have come to hand from many of the Branches. New Branches have been established at Crystal City, Killarney, Pilot Mound, Gretna, High Bluff, Newdale, Shoal Lake, Cypress River, Griswold and Canmore (instead of Anthracite, which has been closed). This makes 52 Branches and Depositories now established by this Society in that country of so much promise.

#### WINNIPEG.

The Annual Meeting of this vigorous Branch was held on Sunday afternoon, March 22, conducted by the local clergymen and the officers of the Society.

Remittances of \$199.88 on purchase account, and \$145.75 as free contributions have been received, with the prospect of a further donation.

#### COLPORTAGE.

Our Colportage work has been carried on during the year by our six devoted and faithful Colporteurs:—Mr. Cromar, in the Counties of Bruce and Grey; Mr. Lockhart, in Frontenac, Lennox and Addington; Mr. Dean, in Essex, Kent and Lambton; Mr. Sinclair, in Muskoka and Parry Sound Districts; Mr. Armstrong, in the Counties of Simcoe and Victoria; and Mr. White, in Algoma District.

In addition to this, Mr. Paton (formerly an agent for the British and Foreign Bible Society in China) was engaged by this Society for four months as Colporteur in the North-West Territory and British Columbia. Mr. Paton did excellent service in visiting many of the settlers in their isolated cabins, cattle ranches, railway shops, and trains, in the Territories, also fisheries, canneries, etc., etc., along the rivers in British Columbia, selling and distributing gratuitously large quantities of the Scriptures, and portions thereof, in English, Chinese, and other languages. Having continued our arrangements with the U. C. Religious Tract and Book Society, their Colporteurs will carry and circulate our Bibles, Testaments and portions in Manitoba and the North-West Territories for another year.

FINANCES.

These amounts were remitted to London, Quebec and Montreal respectively without any deduction whatever.

The Board also made the usual annual grant of \$500 to the Quebec Society, in further aid of Colportage in that Province, making a total remittance of \$1,680.18 for Bible work in Quebec. Nearly \$12,000 was also remitted to London on purchase account. Full details of income and expenditure will be found elsewhere in this report.

#### MONTREAL AUXILIARY.

The donations from our Branches to that Society were duly transmitted, in acknowledgment of which we have received the following letter, dated May 5, from the Rev. Dr. Cornish, Secretary for the Society, viz. :

MY DEAR SIR,—Yours with enclosed cheque came duly to hand yesterday, for which please to accept the best thanks of this Auxiliary. We are glad to hear of your growing prosperity, and pray that it may continue. One of our Colporteurs writes: “ Not only will the people (French) not buy the Scriptures but will not accept them when offered gratis.” What a contrast to the conditions of your work.

#### QUEBEC AUXILIARY.

In accordance with the recommendation of this Board, as per circular issued some time ago, our Branches continue to contribute liberally to the support of our brethren in the work in Quebec. The total amount donated by the Branches has been forwarded, and the following letter has been received in reply, dated May 6, 1891, from the Rev. E. J. Stobo, Secretary and General Agent, viz. :

“ Your letter announcing a remittance of \$990.18 as the contribution of several of your Branch Societies, and also the likelihood of your Committee at next meeting, *voting* the usual annual donation of \$500 for the work done by this Auxiliary, was laid before our Committee, at its meeting last evening, and the following resolution unanimously passed : ‘ That this Committee does now express its heartfelt gratitude for the continued generous aid afforded to this Auxiliary by the Upper Canada Bible Society and its Branches to carry on in this division of our Province the work of French Colportage, and would beg to assure our Ontario friends that the best possible use will be made of the funds placed at the disposal of this Auxiliary for the work of French Evangelization, and would ask earnest prayer for its success.’ ”

#### BRITISH COLUMBIA.

We have nine Branches and Depositories in British Columbia, the principal ones being New Westminster and Victoria, both of which have sent us handsome remittances as free contributions, and for sales in their Depositories. The

officers of the Branch at Victoria are taking a special interest in work among the Chinese, and have imported a quantity of the Scriptures, and portions thereof, in Chinese, direct from Hong Kong, China, for circulation among the Chinese population located there. A new Branch has been opened at Revelstoke.

#### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Seventy-fifth Anniversary of the American Bible Society was held in the City of New York, on Wednesday last, May 13, when the Rev. J. Burton, as representative of the Upper Canada Bible Society, took part in the proceedings.

We learn from an abstract of the Report that the total receipts for the year for general purposes amounted to \$512,388.18. The sum of \$6,484.75 was also received for permanent investment.

Issues for the year: Bibles, Testaments and portions, 1,497,637, of which 524,096 copies were circulated in foreign lands.

#### BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

Our parent Society has closed another year of its successful and extensive operations. We give herewith portions of letter received lately from Mr. Charles Finch, Assistant Foreign and Financial Secretary, dated April 30, 1891, viz.:

"We rejoice with you over the very satisfactory account you have to give of the statistics of the year of the Upper Canada Auxiliary, and cordially thank you for the handsome remittance on Purchase Account, as well as for the substantial contribution you forwarded in the above mentioned letter."

"We are happy now to tell you in advance the result of our year of labour as regards figures. Our total receipts on account of the General Fund amounted to £217,022 17s. 1d., as against £211,963 5s. 10d. last year. The entire *Free Income* of the Society has amounted to £115,845 8s. 4d., against £113,773 6s. 0d. last year. Included in the above sum of £115,845 8s. 4d. are Legacies, £30,153 11s. 5d., and Free Contributions, £62,010 5s. 5d. The former show an increase of £4,807 5s. 5d., and the latter of £4,128 7s. 8d., while Donations show a falling off of £4,140 17s. 7d. The returns for Scriptures sold are £2,987 8s. 11d. in excess of the previous year. The total payments amounted to £231,513 16s. 9d. The total Issues have been 3,926,535 copies."

The Annual Meeting was announced to take place at Exeter Hall, London, on the 6th inst. Unfortunately the anticipated advance copy of report has not reached us in time to be presented at this meeting.

# BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

## ABSTRACT OF REPORT FOR 1890-91.

The story of the Society's latest year is, like that of so many previous periods, one of advance. Gradual in some directions, rapid in others, the progress is general, and, it is believed, equally safe and sure. In the months of earlier spring there are alternations of shade with sun, and even periods which seem to show that the motion is less in the direction of summer than towards last winter's frost. But in that sphere of visible things no one doubts the issue; nor do wiser and calmer minds in the affairs of the Kingdom of God. Yet even there, and so far as the outward signs and the calculations of its growth are concerned, few chapters of the Christian year are more remarkable than that which includes the account of the last twelve months of the Bible Society.

The ISSUES have continued to widen their volume, and during the year 1890-91 almost FOUR MILLIONS of copies of the Scriptures, in part or whole, have been put into circulation. This is an increase on the issues of last year of more than a hundred and thirty thousand copies. In purely Bible distribution no returns equal to this have ever been made except in the records of the Society itself, and owing to a special and temporary cause.\*

The INCOME for the year has also increased, but slightly. So slightly, indeed, that neither has the deficit of last year been removed nor has a new one been prevented. The item of Legacies and of Donations is always very variable: a more important source of income is that of Free Contributions, and it is also most significant of the amount of interest generally felt in the Society's work. It is one of the most pleasant facts of the financial year that in this section—that of Free Contributions—there is an increase of some £2,000. This is a continuation of the advance reported for two years past, and the beginning, it is hoped, of a still more signal progress in the future. But it is most evident—and this is the moral of the financial report—that there must be a very large addition made to the Society's income if its beneficent work is to be developed; and that the devoted helpers and friends, who are everywhere showing so much self-denying zeal, must fully continue and even increase their efforts.†

Showing a total of 3,026,535, and, compared with the issues of 1889-90, an increase of 134,272 copies. The issues of 1881 were 2,846,029. It will be remembered that many of the London issues are for use abroad.

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The OBITUARY of the year has always a painful interest. From the list of Vice-Presidents six names have been removed. The Earl of Carnarvon died in June, 1890; in December His Grace the Archbishop of York (Dr. Thomson) and the Right Hon. Sir Thomas F. Fremantle, first Baron Cottesloe, and Sir Augustus Rivers Thompson, K.C.S.I.; the Rev. George Osborne, D.D., twice President of the Wesleyan Conference, has also passed away, and, while these pages are being revised, the death of the Archbishop of York (Dr. Magee) is announced. From the list of Hon. Life Governors three names have been removed:—those of the Rev. Dr. Charles Hebert, the Rev. Patrick Fenn, and the Rev. John Venn. It need not be said how grave is the loss to the Society through the death of men so distinguished and so devoted as those whose decease is deplored.

The lists from which these names have been removed have been during the year largely strengthened. To that of Vice-Presidents have been added the names of the Earl of Winchilsea and Nottingham; the Lord Kinnaird; Sir Geo. G. Stokes, Bart., M.P., F.R.S.; the Dean of Westminster; the Dean of Windsor; R. N. Cust, Esq., LL.D.; and Rev. A. M. Fairbairn, D.D., Principal of Mansfield College, Oxford. Among the names of Hon. Life Governors have been enrolled those of T. Fowell Buxton, Esq., the Rev. Dr. Chalmers, of Canton; J. Storrs Fry, Esq., the Ven. John Richardson, Archdeacon of Southwark, and Robert Ingram Stevens, Esq.

Two important meetings signalize the year just closed. One took place in the Guildhall, when over two thousand young people celebrated the Society's Birthday. The other was held in the Mansion House, and the speech of His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, in which he bore warm testimony to the usefulness of the Society's work will be long remembered. The Archbishop of Canterbury added a copious and hearty statement, and the courtesy of the Lord Mayor, who presided at both gatherings, deserves cordial acknowledgment.

The survey of the work of the year begins with France, and writes its first chapter under the shadow of the vineyards and among the romantic villages of Brittany. It then passes—following the broad pathways of its work—from country to country of Europe, till it finds itself led—across the Eastern frontier of Russia—into the immense prairies of Siberia and the steppes of Central Asia. From these it turns westward through the Turkish Empire and Greece into Africa: from Africa eastwards again, by Palestine and Arabia, to Persia to India, the island-world of Malaysia, to China, to Australia; thence, across the Atlantic, to South America and Canada, until, taking leave of the Dominion at Newfoundland, it comes to an end among the cities and villages of England. In all this review of the countries and the peoples of the globe there is nothing more impressive than the evidences of the gradual establishment of a kingdom which is destined to include them all. When the century which is now closing began its course the area of Christian knowledge was a very limited one, and but few of the many languages had become familiar with the Story of the Cross. But it is different now. Four new versions, begun during the year, and making the Gospel vernacular in as many tongues, have brought up the total of the Society's translations to almost three hundred. This number includes all the greater languages of the globe, and the large majority of those which are of secondary compass and importance. As the eye passes from land to land it sees everywhere the scholar at work upon the Word of God, moulding with patient care some new version into shape, or giving an earlier one more perfect form. Nor is it in productive work alone that so liberal energy is being expended, for the accounts of the year report that some 330 Bible-women are busy in the Zenanas of the East; that over 600 colporteurs are, in almost every country, familiarizing the people with the Bible; and that more than 230 depots, like centres of light, are diffusing among many races the knowledge which not only refines and elevates, but saves. The workers in this great enterprise are of every nationality—of every grade of natural character and education. What is it that unites them in a brotherhood so cordial, and supports them in the face of the dangers and

depression which so many of them have to endure? There is only one competent answer, and it has boundless meaning. It is the love of Christ that constrains them, and His Spirit that animates their own.

In the annual letter from FRANCE, the sentences which will be generally most welcome are those in which M. Monod expresses his belief that a spiritual change for the better has begun to show itself in the land of his heart. It is not merely that the lower classes seem to have laid aside some of their hostility to Christianity, but that those who, as literary men, express and mould the mind of the nation, are beginning to speak in a tone as hopeful as it is unusual. "It seems," writes Jules le Maitre, "as if a spiritual sensibility—*un attendrissement de l'âme humaine*—is about to lay hold of us in this close of the century, and as if we were to be witnesses of—who knows?—an awakening of the spirit of the Gospel. Our heart is empty, our soul without ideal or hope. Oh that at last a Messiah would come down and restore to us hope and love!" M. Monod is careful not to lay too great importance on the suggestive sentences of which this is one, but his trained eye and ear seem to detect here and elsewhere signs of approaching improvement. Nor is it in the literary world alone. The Abbé Garnier, one of the clergy of Normandy, has, with the approval of the Bishop of Bayeux, issued the Gospels and Acts in the expressive version of de Carrières, and embellished, if not illustrated, by a profusion of early engravings. But the most significant part of the edition is the preface. "France," writes the Abbé, "must return to the Gospel. It is a deplorable fact that the Gospel is no more read in France . . . Let the book be circulated *à profusion*. The Gospel has made the civilized world: it shall make it over again. Recollect that the book must ever be read with deep reverence: it is the word of God, the source of life—the Christian's strength." On words like these a very impressive commentary is furnished by the journals of the colporteurs: a series of frank and graphic communications which express, as perhaps nothing else can, the actual mind and temper of the people. Too plainly it is on the whole anything but a contented temper: sometimes conservative and intolerant, but more generally sceptical or atheistic, it is everywhere full of unrest. "Do you really believe nothing?" said one of the colporteurs, sorrowfully to a group of women who, standing round a well one summer day, had suggested to him the woman of Samaria, and to whom he had read her touching story. "Yes, something," was the half brusque, half pathetic reply, "but what that is we cannot tell!" He pleaded with them, apparently in vain, and they turned away: but when they had gone one stole back and asked for the book of which the divine words had touched her heart. It is in an incident like this one seems to see expressed the spirit of the whole nation. Meantime it is pleasant to learn that the purely colportage circulation for the year has exceeded that of 1889 by nine thousand copies; \* and that the spirit of the band of fifty-three colporteurs, tested by M. Monod on a special tour of investigation, and evidenced in their copious journals, is exceptionally animated and excellent.

In this review Italy, Spain, and Belgium may be associated with France; community of religious faith, and, to a large extent, of race, unite these prevalently Latin and Catholic countries with each other, and sufficiently separate them from their Teutonic neighbours. There is, unhappily, another common characteristic, and the morose materialism so prevalent in France reappears with startling similarity of feature, and with equal prevalence in the others. Of ITALY, Sig. Meille sends an account which, as regards social and economic affairs, will be to her many friends painfully depressing: with an ever-increasing expenditure and taxation, and an ever-lessening trade, the spirit of the people seems embittered, and the latest statistics of crime are alarmingly high. But there is even a sadder side to the story of the year, and unless the veteran statesman, Sig. Bonghi, is mistaken, the life of Italy is pervaded by a more general

ungodliness than can, even in a sceptical age, be easily paralleled elsewhere. Nor is it among the governing classes only—though there the evil is doubly mischievous—it is in schools, from the lowest to the highest, where the race of the future is receiving the impress which it may keep to the end. But the heart is everywhere the same; and a recently republished sentence of Prof. Villari, the biographer of Savonarola, and the new Minister of Public Instruction, recalls the confession of the French peasant-woman which the colporteur heard beside the well. "We are thirsting," writes Sig. Villari, "to believe, but what to believe we know not"—*siamo avidi di credere, ma non sappiamo che cosa credere*. Let it be hoped that the half-despairing cry may soon be forgotten, and that in a second and nobler Renaissance Italy may recover again a system of truth diviner than Platonism, and a literature as much more inspiring as it is holier than the classics of Greece. It is surely prophetic of good that the circulation of the Scriptures has never been so high in Italy as during the past year, and that over 153,000 copies of the Gospel have passed into the people's hands.\* If there be no country, as Sig. Meille believes, which needs the Gospel so much, let it be remembered that in none has it more free entrance or more hopeful course; and that it is but a few decades since superstition lay secure in the fortress from which it had ruled for centuries, and since the Bible was a book proscribed and practically unknown.

From SPAIN and from BELGIUM the accounts of the year are almost as grave as from Italy. Yet in each there are also signs of progress which cannot be overlooked. In the northern country, where life to the masses of its miners and artisans is so largely "labour and sorrow," the only hope which seems to lighten the murky prospect of so many is the dream of a socialistic new heaven and a new earth, wherein dwells no God; but in which, with an eight hours' day and equal property and universal suffrage, the evils which vex this weary age shall have passed away. Yet here also the prevalent liberalism allows free passage to the colporteur in his rounds, and during the past twelve months over sixteen thousand copies of the Scriptures have been circulated—a total which exceeds that of 1889 by a thousand copies, and the purely colportage issues by twelve hundred.† In Spain, life is less driven than in the great workshops of the north, and, as he rests in the shaded balcony, or leans in the sun against the vine-covered wall, the peasant of Leon or Andalusia may trouble himself little with new socialistic theories: but if the Gospel is unopposed by one difficulty it is resisted by another, and the hostility of the average mind to everything that looks like clericalism is perhaps as bitter here as elsewhere. From all that he can see it is M. Jameson's impression that whatever influences came with the Revolution of 1868 against the popular religion, there is no movement of mind or of heart in Spain wide enough to be called national. But, in spite of all, there is progress: the colporteur work has been thoroughly done within its own limits; new sub-inspectors have been appointed, and depôts are being opened in the principal towns. That in Seville lifts up its appealing placards, and looks down on the central square of the city; it is the square in which, in darker days, the stakes used to be planted, and the fires of the Inquisition set ablaze, but from which are now despatched the messengers of liberty wherewith Christ makes the nations free, and of the love which renders persecution an impossibility.‡

TO GERMANY—and the group across the Rhine of Protestant and Teutonic peoples of which Germany is the centre—the transition from Spain may seem complete, but modern society is cosmopolitan, and the same general aspects meet us as those noticed beyond the Pyrenees. Less impulsive than his Italian or

Spanish, or even than his Belgian brother, the German artizan is as deeply stirred by social problems and materialistic teachings as they are, and he expresses himself with almost equal intensity. It thus comes to pass that, in Mr. Watt's words, "The world's drama of the working out of social problems is seen in miniature in Germany; it is a struggle between organized government and anarchy, Christianity and atheism, morality and libertinism." But if one seems to see in all this a reproduction of the atheistic mood of France or Italy, a great difference must also be observed, and facts for which one looks to these countries in vain. In the Fatherland, if the enemy come in like a flood, there is a power resolute and ready to lift up a standard against him; and Mr. Watt can add that, if the working classes are passing through the period of "strain and stress"—of *sturm und drang*—which their associates feel elsewhere, "the State is endeavouring by benevolent and protective legislation to ameliorate their condition; and the Church—aroused as it never was before to the urgent need of a practical application of Christian truth in elevating the sunken masses—is year by year displaying an ever-increasing amount of zeal and energy." There is something perhaps even more important than this: it is that every year is also seeing a larger circulation of the Scriptures in Germany, and this by the strong and rapid development of German Bible Societies themselves. In 1889 the annual issues of all the Societies were 603,000, the largest ever known till then; but last year they rose to 644,000, of which 32,000 were distributed among the army and navy.\* In the spring of 1890 a Conference of Bible Societies—itsself an event of great significance—was held at Halle, and when among other questions that of an abridged or "School Bible" was suggested, it was with almost complete unanimity rejected, the Reformation instinct and principle of "the whole Bible, and nothing but the Bible," asserting and emphasizing itself again. At the same Conference the revision of Luther's version—the great national Bible—was announced as complete; and with its issue, possibly in the present year, a new era may with some confidence be expected. All this with the advance which has been made in organizing, in popular circulation, in deepening and elevating the spirit of the work everywhere, shows that the report is justified in describing the year as one of solid progress. It adds to the impression made by these accounts that in HOLLAND, that old home of Reformation learning and piety, the issues of the Netherlands Society are higher by ten thousand copies than in 1889; that in DENMARK the circulation of the Danish Society has advanced from 4,000 copies in 1887 to 22,000 in 1890; that in SWITZERLAND, if the year's issues are somewhat reduced, the average circulation is yet exceptionally high; that in NORWAY the Bible is everywhere welcomed and the colporteur treated as a friend; and that—to close the enumeration with the old land of Gustavus Adolphus—the fact that this Society has for years ceased all direct work in SWEDEN, indicates only that its task there, as elsewhere, is practically complete, and that the diffusion of the Scriptures is safely left in the people's own hands.

From the Vienna agency—the dual empire of AUSTRIA-HUNGARY—the accounts are of a quiet year; sunshine and shadow, as in some day of opening summer, have followed each other across its plains; but the good work has gone forward, and Mr. Millard's pages are everywhere illuminated with a glow of thanksgiving. The general circulation is, by a slight proportion, lower than that of last year,† but here and there occur instances of remarkable advance. Among these none, in telling its story, stirs Mr. Millard's pulses more than Bohemia. And just as some old garden, though long thrown open to ruder cultivation and overgrown with common plants, still here and there renews its bloom and recalls

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its fragrant past, so the ancient home of Jerome and of Huss, and the Bohemian Brethren, reminds a colder age of its evangelical fervour. Never has the circulation been so high as last year, nor have the colporteurs anywhere been so impressed by the desire of the people to become acquainted with the Word of God. And the same accounts, if in a somewhat less degree, apply to other districts of the empire. But the central event of the year—the story which will linger longest and most pleasantly in the recollection, and the fact of deepest promise and significance—is the celebration of the tercentenary of Gáspár Károli—the Tyndale of Hungary—and the erection of a statue to his memory. It was in September of last year that the town of Göncz was thronged by a brilliant company, such as the quiet little place had never seen before, and the celebration duly inaugurated. On the day previous to the central ceremony the company of Revisers, under the presidency of the venerable poet-Bishop Szász, assembled at Sáros-Patak, and at this, as at the latter festival, the Society was represented by Dr. Theodore Duka and Mr. Millard himself. No welcome could be warmer than that which Dr. Duka received from his enthusiastic countrymen; nor could any memories be more cherished than those which were left behind. In the face of the hostility of the Church of Rome to a popular Bible—a hostility which seems everywhere in Austria to become more bitter, and of the fatal influence of socialistic atheism—an influence which seems ever to grow more deep—it is delightful to witness in this tercentenary of Károli the recognition, by the devout Protestantism of Hungary, of the great translator's services, and the revival and continuance of his work.

Across the eastern frontier of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy we enter at once the RUSSIAN AGENCY and Empire, a section of the Bible Society's field which, thus limited towards the west, stretches over Europe and Asia till, along its eastern boundary, it meets the frontier of China, and the waters of the Yellow Sea. Along the southern stretches of this immense realm Mr. Morrison, with his centre at Odessa, surveys and organizes the Society's work, while Mr. Nicolson from St. Petersburg directs its operations in the north. During the year a readjustment of the dividing lines has better proportioned the compass of the two Agencies; and the development of the work at the new sub-agency for Siberia is indicating how soon and how usefully a third centre must be formed. But even more impressive than the geographical spaciousness of the Empire is the resource and potential development of this home at once of the races of the past and of the new peoples of the future. There is another fact, as ample and significant in its own way as either of the others—it is the proved goodwill of the Russian people generally to the Bible; and the ready courtesy of the authorities to the agents and messengers of the Society, whose aim is, apart from every political or theological complication, to make the Word of God as familiar among the villages of Russia as it is among those of England.

In this great field the circulation amounted last year to nearly half a million copies. This includes an increase in the northern agency of nearly seventeen thousand;\* and in other regards Mr. Nicolson can report encouraging progress. "A sense of thankfulness to God is the ruling feeling on the mind as the accounts of the year are surveyed. From the frontier of Germany to the coasts of Kamtschatka, from Archangel to the Caspian, the colporteur is at work, and though he faces many a snowstorm and braves many an icy blast as he passes from village to village, yet, taken altogether, his success has been very real." The details of this outlined picture are supplied by the journals of the men. They are seen conversing with artizans and peasants—now in Finland, where, if the weather is wintry, the spiritual atmosphere is correspondingly warm; then in the central provinces around Moscow; then in Livonia and Courland; then in Samara and Saratov towards the south, and on the crowded decks of the steamers on the Volga. But the interest of the year centres in Siberia. During the summer the

sub-agent, Mr. Davidson, undertook a journey as far as Irkutsk, and, as he skirted the endless unexplored forests, or passed through miles of the wild forget-me-not and field ranunculus, he found that the home of his work was as wide and attractive as it is vast; and that the only obstacles he had to overcome were the barriers of space and time. In the western section of Siberia twenty-five thousand copies of the Scriptures have been circulated, instead of the eleven thousand of last year, and no limit can be placed on the future. During part of his journey Mr. Davidson was accompanied by Dr. Baedeker, who, like a messenger of hope, passed from prison to prison, distributing among the exiles the words of divine forgiveness and redemption. The central and eastern sections of the sub-agency are scarcely less interesting than the western, and this huge territory—as large, Mr. Davidson reminds us, as the whole of Australia and the half of Africa put together—must attract, as it will reward, increased attention with every year that is added to its expanding history.

From the southern agency the accounts of the year are no less favourable. The issues, in thirty-five languages, have been over 166,000,\* and several new districts unvisited before have been opened up. From the Odessa centre the free grants of the year have been unusually high, and the Scriptures distributed among these convicts and emigrants who received them will "find their way to remote and inaccessible regions of the Amur and the Assuri, to the island of Saghalien, to the black settlements around the Gulf of Okhotsk, to Kamtschatka, and to quarters where for the present our colporteurs cannot hope to penetrate." Even in less inaccessible regions it is only in the exercise of no common resolution that the men make their way. When, in the Kalmuck steppes, the travellers meet round the camp fires their usual conversation is on the deadly perils of the road; and the colporteur, when he joins the company, listens evening by evening to the story of the latest robbery or murder. But for all the dangers, no one has fallen in the field or turned aside from his appointed task. Along the swamps and dank forests of Mingrelia; across the heights of Ararat, where the Kurdish tribes are "unruly people given to disorder and violence"; in the Crimea, where "unhospitable weather is bad, but an unhospitable population worse"; in Turkestan, where for seven months of the year "the sun is a fire, water is scant and bad, and the people semi-barbarous"; in these and many equally trying regions the colporteurs have nevertheless struggled bravely forward and been successful all along the line. Mr. Morrison's survey, picturesque on every page, closes in Transcaucasia, where among cities like Samarkand, and Bokhara "the Noble," and Merv and Penjeh the men ply their work, and the last sentence will be to many the most memorable: "The general in charge of the Russian garrison at Kerki near the Afghan frontier encourages our good colporteur to work among his soldiers, and expresses his thankfulness, and the thankfulness of his officers, to the British and Foreign Bible Society." "This," adds Mr. Morrison, "is good news—as good as the ratification of disputed boundary, and an omen of goodwill and peace."

At this point the course of review turns again to Europe, and leads us into the centre of the dominions of Islam. From Constantinople in the north, and Alexandria in the south, two Agents of the Society direct its work in one of the most testing yet most hopeful fields. Nowhere indeed does a more obstinately lingering shadow lie than across the old realms of Constantine, and the country of the Seven Churches, and the sacred scenes of Palestine; yet it is just here that Christian faith is assured it will not lie for ever. And there are few chapters of the year more sure to interest than that which records the Bible work done since 1889 in these and the adjacent countries.

It is, on the whole, a story of decided progress; and if somewhat imperceptible, perhaps for that reason all the more sure. Turning first to the **TURKISH AGENCY**, Dr. Thomson reports that in spite of the obstinate hostility of the

Government to the Christian advance—not to reckon the poverty and suffering of a severe season—the issues of the year have been fully sustained, and the operation of his colporteur force extended.\* During the twelve months close upon thirty-six thousand copies have been diffused. Of these Constantinople itself has had five thousand four hundred; Bulgaria, three thousand; Albania, with part of Macedonia, three thousand three hundred; Bithynia, nine hundred; Ionia and the Islands, three thousand eight hundred; Cyprus and Crete, three thousand three hundred; and GREECE, which is included in the agency, seven thousand. These have been in thirty-nine languages. Nor has all this been the result of routine operation. "All the centres of circulation have," writes Dr. Thomson, "been visited during the year; careful and persevering efforts have been made to penetrate districts hitherto untouched, and with some success. An island of the Ægean has been visited for the first time with the Word of God, as well as another of which the scanty population and difficult access led to its being often passed by; more especially the western shores of Asia Minor have been traversed by our men as never before, for they have not only visited the towns at which the coasting steamers touch, but, going by land, have entered many villages and localities where a colporteur has never till now gone; and where in several instances they found a thirst for the Holy Scriptures. A similar account may be given of several districts in Central and Southern Albania, and even Bulgaria and Greece." Nor is Mr. Weakley's summary less hopeful than this. The circulation in the EGYPTIAN agency, which includes Egypt, Syria and Arabia, has been over twenty thousand; and an examination of this total shows that while free grants have been for good reasons reduced, the sales have been about four thousand in excess of 1889.† Of the whole Egypt has had seven thousand copies, and it is pleasant to read accounts of steadily growing prosperity of the people in every direction; the vessels which pass through the Suez Canal, five thousand five hundred; and the pilgrims bound for Mecca have received a hundred copies. This last item may seem an insignificant one, but a sentence of Mr. Weakley's redeems it from commonplace: "It has long been our prayer that God would make the way open for the Gospel to enter the fortress of Islam, Mecca, and it is to us a fact of deep and touching interest that ninety-five Arabic and five Turkish Scriptures were sold on the pilgrim-ships to Muslims going thither. Many on the ships were to see their native land no more. Cholera broke out among the crowds, and the mortality was great. Who can tell on what an errand of mercy these few volumes may have been sent."

These accounts have already led us us into AFRICA, and they are happily but the first sections of a chapter occupied with the great continent, which, if less full than some, cannot be less interesting or regarded as less important than any other. Passing along the northern coast we enter Tripoli, then Tunis and Algeria; and find that, according to the statistics of Mr. Lowitz, over eight thousand copies have been distributed to the mixed races of these regions—a substantial advance of five hundred in actual sales. In the MOROCCO agency—"poor dark Morocco," as Mr. Mackintosh sorrowfully calls it—the issues have doubled those of last year and risen to seven thousand copies. Not a few of these have gone to the Canary Islands. Southward from Morocco stretches the Sahara, but beyond its wastes of sandhills and its scattered oases lie Senegambia and the vast sea-board of Guinea, to the mouths of the Niger, and—still further south, beyond the Congo—Angola and Demaraland. Already many of the names along this western coast, unknown or unfamiliar half a century since, have a pleasant home-sound to Christian ears. More than twenty versions of the Scriptures are perpetually being supplied to the new churches by the Society;

and a special mission of inquiry despatched during the past year has been charged to inquire how the number may be increased. Passing still further south we begin to catch again the sound of the English tongue, and find in Cape Colony a Bible organization as expansive and vigorous as any at home, with its hundred Branches, its Colportage Mission, its Ladies' Association, and, lying before them all, the limitless fields and ever-emerging races of the great continent in which they live and work. Still following the coast line, the Evangelical succession of Bible agencies is continued in the Transvaal, at Port Elizabeth, at King William's Town, at East London, Natal, in Basutoland, till the eye, noting the Universities Mission at work on the Great Lakes, and looking across the Galla country, sees the frontier of the Egyptian agency at which the circuit of the continent began. From all these, and many other places, messages month by month arrive, and to them are despatched continuous supplies, and in the fifty versions which now, each in its own vernacular, are so many rays of light across the darkness of Africa.

To pass immediately from one great continent to another—from Africa to INDIA—is to overlook many an attractive subject on the way. But there is a certain impressiveness in turning the eye from every object of lesser interest in order to catch the emphasis of the contrast and comparison. It will be a day of fatal omen when the Christianity of England can ever turn to India but with heightened hope, and with a solemnized feeling of responsibility. Happily if the sense of the vast volume of the population—the signs of the rapid awakening of their subtle intellect to the problems of the civilization of the west;—the signals in earth and sky of the approach of one of the spiritual revolutions which changes the aspect of history; if these and other warning indications deepen the conscientiousness of Christian duty, there are other truths which must move the most unimaginative, if only a believing mind, with the highest anticipation. To many who still live it seems but yesterday since Carey sheltered himself in the Sunderbunds, and Marshman and Ward prepared in silence, and amid the unbroken gloom of heathenism around them, the version which they hoped one day the people might read. The reports from the six Indian auxiliaries of the Bible Society lay beside the story of these beginnings of Christianity in Bengal, and in startling contrast with it, the statistics of the circulation of last year. From the Calcutta centre the issues have been one hundred and seven thousand copies; this is the highest yet known, and six thousand beyond that of the year before. In the Madras district never were the opportunities of Bible work so prosperous or so promising; the issues, unequalled by any previous year, have been one hundred and thirty thousand. Bangalore, with its Kanarese version, has also passed all earlier returns in a circulation of fourteen thousand; Bombay has risen from thirty-six thousand in 1889 to fifty-seven thousand in 1890; Allahabad, the centre of the Hindi supplies, from twenty-three thousand to fifty-eight thousand; and, finally, in a list in which there is no exception to the records of a progress which passes beyond any point gained in the past, Lahore, which in 1871 circulated one thousand two hundred copies, distributed last year forty-seven thousand. On these significant statistics a commentary of equal significance and exhaustive interest is furnished by the reports and journals which accompany them. Not that these reports are all favourable; for there are everywhere signs, perhaps in this very diffusion of Scriptural truth, that a shattering struggle is near. But there is also everywhere that which to hearts of true courage is itself prelude of victory—the eagerness for the battle because the end is already assured. "As regards India," the Calcutta report writes, "it seems certain that there will be a time of fierce, stern conflict; yet alike the veteran of fifty years and the recruit of yesterday are confident of triumph." This spirit reveals itself with more or less expression in all the returns. It is under its influence that the agents strengthen their organization, and chronicle the records of every success. Even the native mind is beginning to be alarmed, and the native societies for the diffusion of anti-Christian literature is but another form

of the confession, reported from some educated Hindus at Madras, that "the Scriptures are destroying more temples than ever the Moguls did." How large a share in this progress belongs to direct Bible circulation no one who reads the journals can doubt. "I have noticed," writes one of the missionaries, "that during the twenty-one years of my career in N. India most of my inquirers and converts have been men and women who have been brought to Christ by the quiet and steady perusal at home of the Word of God." It is one of the most delightful facts in the history of the year that such opportunities of home study are more and more possible, for since the Biblewomen, now so welcome in many Zenanas, began their work, the Indian home has been indeed opened to the Gospel, and its deep fountain of sympathies and many influences touched as it never has been before.

Opposite Madras, across the Bay of Bengal, lies BURMAH, and from its capital the year has brought the first report, brief but satisfactory, of the Society's new Agency there. And, crossing the limits of Burmah to the south-east, we enter that "island world of the Pacific," the central home of the Malaysian race, where six European and nineteen native colporteurs are at work, and where during the year they assisted in the distribution of forty-eight thousand copies of the Scriptures. Hard by are AUSTRALIA and NEW ZEALAND, where nearly fifty auxiliaries are lending their strength to the work of the parent society, and caring for the wants of their own expanding populations. Beyond these new homes of our race, and beyond the ocean which, to the east, washes their shores, stretch the coasts of South America; there also—in CHILI and PERU, in the ARGENTINE REPUBLIC, in BRAZIL, in BRITISH GUIANA, as well as in the WEST INDIES and far north in the DOMINION OF CANADA—the Society's organization is established, and its work is being done. To Canada alone many pages might be given, and the account of its sixteen auxiliaries—that of Upper Canada with four hundred and sixty-one branches, and that of Montreal with two hundred and eighty-one—the summaries of their labours, the journals of their colporteurs, would render every page as attractive as it would be full of suggestion to others. But to all these fields no fuller reference can be made now.

To this closing page—itsself a position of advantage, for it is often the latest words, the most recent facts, which linger longest in the memory—there has been reserved the references which must be made to CHINA and to JAPAN. In the year's history of Japan the leading fact is the reorganization of Bible work by the formation of a united Committee representing the societies at work there; and the first report, while it announces the absorption of the mind of the people in political affairs, and an unwelcome recrudescence of antipathy to everything foreign, is yet decisive in its tone, and encouraging in its outlook. The CHINA reports are, like those of last year, shadowed by the accounts of inundations, with their haunting famines and plagues which so often drive a morose fatalism into the people's soul, and hinder the freer spread of the Word of divine comfort and peace. At the same time the pages are brightened by many an illustration of the way in which light is rising on the great Mongolian races; and the total issues for the year, over two hundred and eleven thousand, is itself a result about which we cannot be too glad.\*

But in the Christian history of China the interest of the year 1890 centres at Shanghai, and in the Missionary Conference which was held there in May. At this great convention more than four hundred delegates represented over forty separate organizations; and the presence among them of this Society's Editorial Superintendent indicated how deeply was felt the Biblical importance of the event. The history of the Conference has already been written in many forms, but from none of them is absent that expression of thankfulness which is never so genuine as when it comes after fear. But whatever natural fears may have preceded the Assembly few have survived it; and the magnanimous unanimity

with which the delegates, subduing every contending interest, agreed to undertake the production of a standard version of the Bible which, in various editions, may suit alike the scholar and the peasant, and, superseding imperfect renderings, become for a third of the human race what the Authorised Version is for England and Luther's for Germany—this is not only the inauguration of a monumental work, but the expression of a Christian spirit which is itself greater than any task it may accomplish. Is it not also a symbol full of beauty and an earnest full of hope of the issue of that higher enterprise which, not limited to one nation, but including them all, cannot be crowned with the accomplishment of its desire until the Word of God is familiar to all His children, and the Bible has been given to the WORLD!

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## EXTRACTS FROM AGENTS' REPORTS.

REV. ALFRED ANDREWS—*Virden*.—On Wednesday evening, March 4th, 1891, we held our Bible Society meeting here in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. A. Currie assisted me with a short address. The President, Mr. C. McLaren, occupied the chair. We took up subscriptions of \$23—\$3 paid—and appointed collectors to canvass and report in one week, when we shall get in balance and more.

*Glenboro'*, March 11th.—Held a meeting last night in the Methodist Church. Ten persons present. The President occupied the chair till I spoke; then, to help the audience, sat in front of me. I spoke forty minutes. Collection \$2.65. They had recently sent off contributions. Gave \$25.25 on purchase account. Stock in good condition.

*Holland*, March 12th.—Held our meeting here in the Methodist Church. Audience thirty-two. Collection on plate, \$4.60. For other finances, see schedule. Mr. Holland is a capital depository—books neat, clean and well placed. The Committee paid him for stock taken over from him last year, and gave subscriptions and collection to the U.C.B.S. They paid me what money they had on hand, and will require more books shortly.

*Treherne*, March 13th.—Had a pleasant drive to this town, ten miles from Holland. Called on the depository and found stock extremely low. Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. The president occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Doolittle, Baptist minister from Rathwell, assisted at the meeting. Congregation thirty-two. Officers were appointed; also collectors, who are to report two weeks from this evening.

*Stockton* meeting was small. They resolved to move the branch depot to the new station, four miles distant. *North Stockton*, it is called. A new church is being erected there and a promising town is commencing.

*Douglas*.—We had a capital meeting. The Presbyterian minister, Rev. Mr. Bowman, and Rev. F. J. Oaten (Methodist) rendered me fine aid.

*Griswold*.—Here the Rev. Mr. Quinney (Church of England) opened his church and led the service. Rev. W. W. Colpits also aided well. A branch was started under hopeful circumstances, and they propose to order stock at once. At *Alexandria* they had not been able to get a suitable place for stock. But they resolved to try to get a depository started this year.

*Oak Lake*.—I wrote you *re* this meeting and the work proposed among the French. *Douglas* branch also decided to give their money to aid in the *Oak Lake* movement. I believe it will put life into our work up here if it be judiciously carried on.

*Brandon*.—The meeting was well represented by the clergy. Rev. Messrs. Urquhart, Pickett and Mason were present and cheerfully assisted the agent and officers of the Society. Congregation small. Dr. Fleming was elected to the office of depository.

REV. DR. BEAUMONT—*Dresden*, Oct. 21st, 1890.—An excellent meeting; gratifying results: able officers and collectors. The branch is in good working order. Rev. Mr. Connor, Rev. Mr. McAlpine and Rev. Mr. Croll were present. The audience was exceedingly attentive and evidently fully interested.

*Wallaceburgh*, Oct. 22nd.—A fairly good meeting in the Church of England; the principal part of the audience consisting of ladies. About \$45 was remitted last year. This branch is in fairly good working order. Rev. C. Miles, M.A., presided. Rev. D. Curry and Rev. A. Vining were also present.

*Dover* (Baldoon P.O.), Oct. 23rd.—The very unfavourable state of the weather was the drawback here. Rev. Wm. Farquharson was present and is thoroughly earnest in your work. Under his encouraging example and presidency, this branch has every prospect of further success.

*Chatham Township* (Ebers P.O.), Oct. 24th.—The meeting was not particularly large, but good results were achieved by the collectors last year and the branch is in a hopeful state. On Sunday, Oct. 26th, I preached at the Church of England services in *Thamesville*, preparatory to the meeting on Monday. My subject was "The Distinctive Characteristic of the Word of God, as the Message of Salvation."

*Thamesville*, Oct. 27th.—We had a large and earnest-looking audience. Prospects here are very encouraging. The amount collected last year was said to be nearly double that collected the year before. Rev. W. Hinde and Rev. J. Becket and the Baptist minister were all present. About \$48 was remitted last year.

*Botany*, Oct. 28th.—This branch is in a thriving and satisfactory state. The meeting was fully as good as could be expected. Mr. Weeks is a very good and earnest secretary. The stock is a valuable one and is well kept.

*Windsor*, Oct. 29th.—We had a fairly large and encouraging meeting. The contribution of about \$100 as a free gift to the Society last year, is sufficient evidence of the effective state of the Branch. The gentlemen do the collecting. Rev. Canon Hincks occupied the chair, and your able agent, the Rev. John Gray, was present. The officers are all to be congratulated on the good and efficient work they are doing in the interests of the Bible Society.

REV. J. R. BLACK—*Painswick*.—A fair audience present in the Methodist Church. The Bible Society has two excellent friends here in the Secretary and President. The Rev. Mr. Wellwood was present and earnestly advocated the cause. Hitherto there has been no depositary, but it was resolved to appoint one.

*Churchill*.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The audience was interested in your agent's address, and this Branch will do its part in 1891.

*Lefroy*.—A good branch in every way. At the annual meeting no minister was present, but the active Secretary, Treasurer and President were on hand, and contributed to the interest by their words, written and spoken. The attendance was good, likewise the collection.

*Stagner*.—The work here does not seem to occupy the place in the hearts of the people it once did. The officers are desirous of securing a union meeting, on Sunday evening after the New Year, in order to awaken the interest.

*Collingwood*.—The meeting was held in the school-room of the Presbyterian Church. The number present was encouraging. The Society has loyal friends in this town, and among the many claims upon the people those of the Bible Society will not be lost sight of.

*Thomasburg and Clarksburg*.—Mr. Stevenson, our late President made your agent comfortable in his home. At the meeting were the Presbyterian and Methodist ministers, both of whom spoke briefly in behalf of the Society. There was a good audience and collection. This field has lost in the decease of Mr. W. Hunter (its secretary and depositary for many years) one of its best friends.

*Angus*.—About a dozen, chiefly young people, were present at the meeting in the Presbyterian Church; two young men agreed to act as collectors, and a young lady to perform the duties of Secretary.

*Evening and Creemore*.—Avening has done nothing, leaving all the work to Creemore. Hence a resolution was passed separating them, and a desire expressed that Avening and Banda should have a branch of their own. The meeting in Creemore was small, and only one clergyman—Rev. Mr. Owen (Episcopal) was present, but he rendered excellent service and proved himself a warm friend of the Society. I believe that more will be done here this year.

*Singhampton*.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. We are favoured in having in this district, Rev. Mr. Trollope, who is devoted to our work. And with him are the Secretary, Mr. D. Grant and others, who will see that collections are made, and the interest generally increased.

REV. ROBERT BURNS, PH. B.—*Lakeside*, Dec. 18th, 1890.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, which was very comfortable. The evening was bright, and the meeting was largely attended. The choir of the church gave life to the service by well-rendered music. Some of the ex-presidents addressed words of cheer and gave good counsel; they were added to the Executive Committee. Mr. E. J. Showers was elected president; Mr. William Mills was appointed vice-president; the secretary-treasurer was re-elected, and proves a very excellent officer. The collection was in advance of last year.

*Kintore*, Dec. 8th.—Notwithstanding many difficulties which had been in the way of this branch for over a year, the meeting was pretty well attended. It was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was presided over by the pastor of the church. D. M. McKay was appointed treasurer in the place of Mr. Morrison, deceased. The other officers were re-elected. New blood was put on the committee. The collection was good.

*Harrington*, Dec. 10th.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was quite large, and the meeting was enthusiastic and cheering. Collection in advance of last year. The leader of the choir, Mr. Martin, helped to make the service interesting by good lively singing. Mr. John C. Ross gave a short address. Mr. Geo. Manson was elected president and will make an excellent officer. The other officers and committee were re-elected. Rev. Mr. Sanderson, of Embro, gave your agent valuable assistance. The secretary-treasurer, Mr. McComb, kindly entertained me. I hope this branch will give a good report.

*Innerkip*, Oct. 13th.—This branch we found in a good, live, healthy condition. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The choir gave a number of very fine selections. The long-trying and faithful secretary, who was re-elected for the thirty-second term, gave a very encouraging report. The president, who occupied the chair, gave a short address. Rev. B. Lang (Methodist), Rev. Mr. Franklin (English Church), and Rev. Mr. Straith (Presbyterian), gave suitable and profitable addresses. Your agent addressed the meeting on the general work of the Society and the claims of the Bible. The meeting was alive, active one, and no doubt Innerkip will give a good account.

*Corinth*, Jan. 14th, 1891.—The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Officers were re-appointed. The choir assisted by rendering choice selections. The attendance was only fair, as the minister forgot to announce the meeting on the previous Sabbath; still we had a good meeting. D. C. Connors, Esq., the president, occupied the chair, and gave us wise counsel. Richard Evans, the depository, entertained the agent.

*Tilsonburg*, Jan. 15th.—This branch was dormant during the past year. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, but the attendance was very small, on account of a free lecture given in the Town Hall in behalf of the Local Option law. We held a business meeting, and your agent promised to return and give an address. Rev. E. Bosworth was elected president. The collectors were appointed, and the secretary promised to send out the books at once. The adjourned meeting was announced for the Y. M. C. A. Hall, but the meeting was small again, this time on account of a heavy rain storm; but the officers and most of the collectors braved the storm along with a few other friends of the Society. *Beachville*, Jan. 12th.—Here the meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The president, Mr. Alfred Shann, was in the chair. The agent conducted the devotional services. Mr. Dickey read the report of the last year, which was most gratifying. The choir gave us splendid selections of music. Mr. M. S. Canfield was elected secretary. The collectors were appointed, and your agent urged a prompt and thorough canvass on the part of these willing workers. I was kindly entertained at the home of Mr. Reynolds. Beachville will do its duty.

REV. JOHN BURTON, B. D.—*Oshawa*.—By request I visited Oshawa last evening. The branch here has been practically extinct for two or three years. The meeting was small, but very hearty and business-like, nearly everyone present having had something to do in the reorganization of the Society. A division has been made of the district, and collectors appointed for each division, with the warm consent of all parties. My impression is that this branch is thoroughly resuscitated.

REV. SAMUEL CARRUTHERS.—*Lynden*.—Annual meeting held on Monday evening, Oct. 20th, 1890, in the Presbyterian Church, with a fair attendance. The resident minister, Rev. H. M. Hall, was unable to be present. The meeting moved your agent into the chair; so we conducted devotional exercises, after which the reports were read, officers elected, and collectors appointed. I then addressed the meeting at length, and have no doubt that this revived branch will do well during the year now entered upon.

*Jerseyville*.—On Tuesday, Oct. 21st, the annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church, the Rev. R. Bridgman, president, in the chair. Here we had beautiful moonlight, good roads, and good attendance. The chairman, Rev. Mr. Gee, Methodist minister, spoke briefly on behalf of the Bible Society, and the choir enlivened the meeting with appropriate music. After the collectors had been appointed, and the officers had been elected, your agent spoke for an hour, and we hope for good results.

*Burlington*, Oct. 27th.—After a long drive we met the committee of this branch in the vestry of the Methodist Church. The public meeting was commenced in the school-room of the church, with the president, Mr. Gray, in the chair. Rev. Dr. Hart (returned missionary) led the devotions. Rev. Messrs. Wakefield, Abraham, and Histon, spoke briefly, giving the most of the time to the agent's address, after which officers were elected and collectors appointed.

*Waterdown*, Oct. 28th.—The annual meeting of this branch was held this evening in the school-room of the Methodist Church. The aged president Dr. McLaren, was present and occupied the chair. Devotional exercises were conducted by Revs. Ferguson (Methodist) and Thomson (Presbyterian), both of whom said a few words in the interest of the work. The choir of the church rendered appropriate music. Officers were elected, collectors appointed, and after a few remarks by the chairman, the agent addressed the meeting for nearly an hour, and we hope the facts and information presented will help to evoke the liberality of the friends around Kilbride.

*Glenmorris*.—The annual meeting of the Glenmorris branch was held in the Presbyterian Church, on the evening of Monday, Nov. 24th. Since the last annual meeting Mr. Fleming, president, has passed to the home above. Mr. Fleming was rich in good works, and the Bible Society had a large place in his heart. The Rev. Mr.

Pettigrew occupied the chair. The Glenmorris branch is blessed with a most efficient and earnest secretary, and a good deal of the success is due to Mr. McDonald. Your agent was kindly entertained by the Rev. M. Pettigrew.

*Coptown.*—We met in the Methodist Church, Tuesday evening, Nov. 25th, with the Rev. C. C. Cookman in the chair. Mr. Fry, secretary, read a detailed statement of the work for the past year and the state of the branch up to date. Although the audience was not so large as could have been desired we had a good meeting. The officers were duly elected, collectors appointed, and ample time afforded the agent to present the work and claims of the Society. Your agent was made to feel perfectly at home in the beautiful Methodist parsonage.

*Alberton.*—Good sleighing and beautiful moonlight helped to bring together a good audience in Trinity Methodist Church, on Monday evening, Jan. 26th, 1891. In the absence of the venerable president, Mr. Taylor, the Rev. Mr. Duff, pastor of the church, occupied the chair. The annual report was read by Mr. Brown. Officers were elected, and the district mapped out for the duly appointed collectors. Alberton is an old and strong branch and ought to do well for the Society.

*West Flamboro'.*—Tuesday evening, Jan. 27th, the annual meeting of this branch was convened under the presidency of Rev. S. W. Fisher. After devotional exercises the efficient secretary, Mr. Jones, read a very full statement, giving exact and full details as to contributions, allocation of moneys, sales, and present state of depositary. The officers were all re-elected and collectors appointed for the large district covered by this branch. Your agent then gave a comprehensive view of the Society's work to one of the best meetings he has been privileged to address.

REV. J. B. CHARLTON—*Millbank.*—Held public meeting, Nov. 18th, in the Methodist Church, president Thomas Magwood in the chair, also pastor of Presbyterian Church. Your agent addressed the meeting pressing the claims of the Society. Collection taken up. Officers and collectors appointed.

*Shakespeare,* Dec. 15th.—By the request of the officers of this branch a meeting was held in Stewart's Church, four miles from Shakespeare, Rev. Mr. Stewart, vice-president, in the chair. Your agent addressed the meeting urging the claims of the Society. In the evening at 7.30 the annual meeting of the branch was held in the G. T. Hall, Rev. R. Pyke, president, in the chair. We were assisted by a good choir and large congregation. Your agent addressed the meeting and was encouraged by the interest manifested. Officers and collectors appointed.

*Kirkton.*—The public meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Rev. Mr. Steel in the chair. Also present, Rev. J. Kenner (Methodist) and Rev. Mr. Bowden (Baptist). Good congregation, large collection at the meeting. Collectors' work to be done immediately.

*Elimville.*—Meeting was held, Dec. 17th, in Methodist Church, Rev. C. Fletcher, president, in the chair, also Rev. J. Russell (Methodist). The congregation was small, yet there was interest manifested in the work, and when the collectors have been round we expect good results. Your agent presented the claims of the Society.

*Hibbert.*—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, Cromarty. A very interesting address was given by Rev. P. Scott, the president, who occupied the chair; also by Rev. C. V. Lake, Methodist, of Staffa. Good attendance and large collection. Your agent presented the Society's claims.

REV. R. M. CROLL—*Alton.*—Met in Presbyterian Church. A somewhat heavy snow-fall may have affected the attendance, which was, however, very fair. Mr. D. McDonald occupied the chair. A union choir lent attractions to our meeting. The officers of this branch are earnest men, who have the interests of your Society at heart. The people respond liberally.

*Camilla.*—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. George Ballantyne, M.A., pastor of the church, occupied the chair. On account of the melting snow, the audience was smaller than was anticipated. Here, also, the choir of the church favoured the audience with suitable selections. This is a purely rural field with many warm friends doing good work.

*Mono Centre.*—Drove with Rev. George Ballantyne from *Camilla* to *Mono Centre*, and shared the hospitality of his comfortable manse. Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. This is a good district and the people are much interested in the world-wide circulation of the Bible. The depository needs replenishing, which is a good sign.

*Shelburne.*—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Large attendance and good choir present. J. Barr, M.D., president, in the chair. Rev. E. J. McClelland, pastor of the congregation—since passed to his reward—and Rev. W. H. McTavish (Methodist) were on the platform and made practical and pointed addresses in the best spirit. Here is a fine field for noble work. The collectors will be out in good time. I expect Shelburne will make decided progress and secure a good record by next annual meeting.

*Horning's Mills.*—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. This branch was organized last year, but, on account of the removal of the president, the work was not pushed as vigorously as it would otherwise have been. There was a good attendance, which manifested its interest in the work by giving a good collection. Rev. A. Stewart, M.A., pastor of the church, and Rev. J. R. S. Boyd (Episcopalian), gave your agent valuable assistance. The officers of this branch are hopeful and are determined to prosecute the work vigorously.

*Whitfield.*—Here Mr. George Laking presided over a large meeting held in the Methodist Church. Rev. J. T. Caldwell, pastor, and Rev. J. R. S. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. There was a large audience, which displayed a fine spirit and manifested a high degree of interest in the work. The president, Mr. A. McPherson, a faithful friend of Bible work, Rev. J. Morrison, the pastor, and Rev. T. J. Smith (Methodist) lent their valuable aid.

*Markdale.*—With a view to preparing the way for the formation of a branch in Flesherton, your agent preached there, holding morning service in the Presbyterian Church, where he preached to a large and influential audience. In the evening he preached to a packed house in the Methodist Church. In the afternoon he preached in the Presbyterian Church, Markdale. The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church on Thursday, November 27th. On that evening the large and beautiful church was lit up, and we had a grand audience and a fine meeting. Rev. Horace E. Bray (Episcopalian) and Rev. Mr. Davey (Methodist) took a prominent part in the work of the evening. The officers of the branch deserve much credit, and the depository, Mr. Brown, is an old and valued friend of the Society. You may cherish high hopes of Markdale.

*Holland Centre.*—This is a small village on the C.P.R., six miles north of Markdale. The meeting was in Price's Hall, which was well filled. The officers were all present and reports were read. Rev. John Pepper (Methodist) lent valuable assistance. This branch, formed last year, did well; it has gained more confidence in its powers, and is determined to do better. The officers are worthy of all praise.

*Kilsyth.*—Your agent found a splendid audience convened here in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Elias Mullan, pastor of the congregation, occupied the chair. This branch was formed last year, but for some time nothing was done. At last the friends decided to test their abilities, and were astonished at their success—\$40 being given by the people as a free contribution. Much praise is due to the officers, and especially to Miss Mullan, the treasurer, and her lady co-workers. There is no fear of Kilsyth.

*Walter's Falls.*—By several untoward circumstances your agent was prevented from visiting Walter's Falls. By communication received, your agent learned that there was a good meeting, which, after waiting half an hour beyond the appointed time, proceeded with the work. Reports were read, officers elected, and stirring and appropriate addresses were delivered by Rev. J. W. Sanderson (Methodist) and Rev. J. McInnis, M.A. (Presbyterian). There was a good collection and a liberal free contribution. This branch is vigorous and hopeful.

*Desboro'.*—The Rev. T. L. Armstrong (Episcopalian), president of this branch, kindly drove your agent from Chatsworth to the Desboro' Town Hall, in which the meeting was held. Addresses were delivered by the chairman, Rev. James Hamilton, of Keady (Presbyterian), and Rev. F. W. Thompson (Methodist). A good choir lent its valuable aid. The work of the branch is efficiently carried on. The depository is well kept, and the people show their interest in the cause by their work and liberality.

*Chatsworth.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and, though fairly attended, the audience seemed small in so large an edifice. Rev. T. L. Armstrong, president, occupied the chair. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. John McAlpin, M.A., pastor of the church, and Rev. A. M. McCullough (Methodist). After the usual reports were read, your agent occupied the remaining time. This branch is well officered, well worked and shows good results.

*Flesherton, Maxwell and Priceville.*—In Flesherton, a place of about 900 inhabitants; at Maxwell, a smaller village about ten miles east of Flesherton, and at Priceville, a village having a population of about 400, and situated four miles west of Flesherton, your agent formed new branches under the most favourable auspices.

REV. CHARLES DUFF—*New Hamburg*, Saturday, October 25th.—Arrangements were made for me to occupy the pulpit of the English Methodists here on the following Sabbath evening. I did so to a very respectable audience, both for size and undoubted intelligence. On Monday I inspected the depository, and in the evening spoke at the annual meeting, in the English Methodist Church. The attendance was very fair. The pastor of the German Evangelical Church, and the Rev. Mr. Roy, pastor of the English Methodist Church, were both present, and spoke kind words in behalf of the Society and its work. The results, I think, will be in a financial way in advance of last year.

*Linwood*, Oct. 28th.—In the unavoidable absence of our efficient president, A. Boomer, Esq., I found a good helper in the person of the Rev. J. C. Pomeroy, now the resident Methodist minister of this place. The secretary, Mr. H. C. Barlett, also afforded valuable aid. During the afternoon the depository was inspected, and in the evening the annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. We had with us the Rev. W. C. Armstrong, pastor in charge, Rev. Mr. Pomeroy, Methodist minister, and his young colleague, all of whom gave hearty countenance by their speech and presence to the good work.

*Hawksville*, Oct. 29th.—I was again ably assisted by the three ministers whose efficiency aided me at Linwood. The meeting was again held in the Presbyterian Church, and the interest was very good. The Rev. J. C. Pomeroy having removed to Linwood, the Rev. W. C. Armstrong was elected president in his stead. We look for better fruits from both these branches than last year.

*Elmira.*—We had a good meeting at this place, though the friends are at times discouraged. The Rev. Mr. Wass, the Methodist minister, and also the Rev. Mr. Armstrong, who was induced to remain for the evening meeting, rendered good service.

*Hespeler.*—Oct. 31st found me at Hespeler, where we had a very pleasant meeting, both for numbers and also results. It was held in the Presbyterian Church, the pastor,

the Evangelical German minister also, and one of the superannuated brethren of the Methodist Church were present, the Rev. Dr. Cornish, pastor of the English Methodist Church at Hespeler, the president of the branch, occupied the chair.

*Breslau.*—The meeting was held that evening in the new Mennonite Church; a not large but an appreciative audience were present, and the Lord helped me to speak to them. The Rev. P. Geiger is enthusiastic, and I doubt not here good work will be done, and a blessing rest upon the work.

Next day the president accompanied me to *Bloomington*, about four miles distant. The meeting here was held in the United Brethren Church, and Mr. S. Erb was chosen secretary in the place of Mr. Ward, the former secretary, who leaves the place at New Year. Our meeting was enthusiastic, and I trust it will be attended with good results.

The next day I went on to *Winterbourne*. Here the Rev. Mr. Hamilton, pastor of the Presbyterian Church has charge, and aided by the efficient secretary, Mr. M. Durrant, the branch is one of the best managed with which we have had to do. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and though I was somewhat indisposed, I trust, was not altogether unfruitful.

My next point was *New Dundee*. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church and the attendance was reasonably good. Our friends, though somewhat discouraged by what seemed for some years to be a retrograde movement, are determined to go forward. They have a well kept depository and an efficient secretary, and a determination to keep the work before the minds of the people cannot but result in good. There was as much subscribed and contributed on the spot, as was gathered last year altogether.

*Preston.*—The meeting was held in the Lutheran Church, where its gifted and able minister the Rev. Thos. Snider, Ph. D., gave us all the assistance possible, as did also the Rev. Mr. Kingsmill (Episcopalian), as well as the junior pastor in charge of the English Methodist Church. The President, Mr. W. B. Hepburn occupied the chair, and was re-elected, as were also the other officers and the members of the committee.

*East Puslinch.*—The Rev. Mr. Robertson, the newly installed Presbyterian Minister, gave us great aid, and though the meeting was not large it was indeed a good one. The East Puslinch people are true friends of the Bible Society, and we expect that one of the best meetings we attended will be rewarded with happy results, both financial and otherwise.

REV. J. DYKE—*Emerson.*—The meeting at this point was held in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. S. E. Colwell (Methodist) presided, and in an admirable speech commended the interests of the Society to the audience; at the close of the agent's address a collection of \$8.93 was taken up.

*Morris.*—The audience was a very small one; owing chiefly to the stormy, cold night. A collection of \$2.20 was taken up, and officers elected for the ensuing year.

*Morden.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The President, Rev. Mr. McKenzie (Presbyterian) conducted devotional exercises, Rev. Mr. Walton (Episcopalian) and Rev. W. Bridgman (Methodist) gave short addresses. The agent impressed the audience with the importance of Bible work. Collectors and officers were appointed, and there is a good prospect of excellent work being done in this rising town.

*Manitou.*—The agent arrived on Saturday, and preached to an interested congregation, in the Methodist Church, on Sabbath morning. By previous arrangement all the evening services merged into a Bible Society meeting in the Presbyterian Church, which was densely crowded with a very appreciative audience. The Rev. Mr. Cavan, president of the branch, presided. The resident ministers, with the agent, gave addresses; and the people responded with a collection of \$19.68.

*Crystal City.*—The first meeting of the Bible Society was held in this place, in the Methodist Church, the Rev. T. C. Buchanan presiding. The audience was large and deeply interested. The collection was \$4.60. The outlook for good work here is very bright.

*Killarney.*—The Revs. Johnson (Episcopalian) and Whyte (Presbyterian) met the agent at the station. An excellent meeting was held in the Episcopalian Church, and a complete staff of officers appointed.

*Boissevain.*—On arrival the agent visited the depository and found cash sales amounted to \$51.61. Stock on hand, \$31.21. A business meeting of the officers was held in the afternoon, and the work of the branch very thoroughly looked into. A blessed revival was in progress in the town. The attendance at the meeting was so large that some persons could not get in, and many who gained admittance had to stand up. The collection amounted to \$15.

*Deloraine.*—The agent met the officers in the W. C. T. U. Reading Room, in the afternoon. The secretary's report showed that last year the ladies collected \$74.55. All the books had been sold in the depository except three expensive ones, and there were several orders in for more. The officers are very energetic, and hopeful of the work. An interesting annual meeting was held in the Town Hall, and a collection of \$6.65 was taken up. The Revs. Munro, Lawrie and Ferrier assisted largely in the success of the meeting.

*Pilot Mound.*—Although the night was cold and stormy, a good meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, Rev. J. Farquharson, presided, and the Revs. Lawson and Auvache, with the agent, took part in the service. The full complement of officers was appointed, and a collection of \$4.50 given by the audience.

*Gretna.*—The agent reached this point on Saturday, and attended a German Service on Sabbath morning, English Sabbath School in the afternoon, and held a Bible Society Service in the evening. The audience was large, and very desirous of having a branch of the Bible Society formed. This town occupies almost a central position in the Mennonite Reserve, which has a population of 10,000 persons. The people are greatly in need of the Word of God, and are glad that a depository will be established in their town.

*Whitemouth.*—Owing to the fact that most of the male population of this village were in the woods engaged with the lumber camps, the attendance was very small. However, those present seemed deeply interested in the work of the Society and expressed the hope that there would be a larger meeting next year.

*Rat Portage.*—The first annual meeting was held in St. Alban's Church (Episcopalian). The rector, Rev. A. L. Fortier, presided. Brief addresses were given by the president, the agent, Mr. Foy and the Revs. Stevens and Jameson. A strong desire was expressed that a colporteur should spend some time in the Rainy River district. The collection was \$7.35.

*Port Arthur.*—The agent met the officers of this branch in the Mechanics' Institute, when the business of the Society was entered upon and thoroughly arranged. The public meeting was held in the evening in the Methodist Church. Mr. James Meek, the president, occupied the chair. Addresses were given by the agent and the Revs. Pringle and Ross. The necessary officers were elected and a collection given of \$10.10.

REV. J. B. FRASER, M.D.—*Atwood.*—A growing, promising village. Meeting in Presbyterian Church, attendance good; business in good shape, quickly disposed of. The president, Rev. Mr. Henderson (Presbyterian), Rev. Mr. Yates (Episcopal), Rev. Mr. Dack (Baptist), and Rev. Mr. Carey (Baptist), added to the interest of the meeting by brief but very appropriate addresses.

*Molsworth.*—Good meeting in Presbyterian Church; Mr. C. W. Watson, a most efficient secretary and enthusiastic friend of the society, had the business in good shape. He deserves special mention for exceptional efficiency and liberality. The president, Rev. A. Stevenson (Presbyterian), is also a warm friend of the cause.

*Trowbridge.*—A fair meeting in the Methodist Church. Devotional exercises led by Rev. Mr. Caswell, the pastor, who also very hospitably accommodated the agent during his visit. Meeting much enlivened by appropriate music. Mr. J. R. Code elected president, in place of Mr. R. Halpenny, deceased. Room for and promise of improvement in contributions.

*Brussels.*—Rather small meeting. Said to be due to multiplicity of other meetings and untimely snow-flurries. Mr. Strachan, president, in the chair—an efficient

officer. The secretary's report a model, and business well arranged. Local ministers all present and in hearty sympathy. It was decided to arrange for holding district meetings in the suburbs of the town, by which the interest will be extended. Brussels is in the honour roll of especially liberal branches, and likely to maintain its record.

*Bluevale.*—Meeting in the Methodist Church; attendance below the average. Resident ministers, Rev. J. B. Walwin (Methodist), president and Rev. A. J. Hartley (Presbyterian), secretary, were both present and took part in the meeting. The difficulty experienced in some places of selecting congenial companions for collecting is got over in Bluevale by appointing a single collector for each district and asking her to choose her own companion.

*Listowel.*—The branch in this thriving town was allowed last year to become defunct. Part of a Saturday was spent in interviewing individuals with a view to a movement for re-organization. The general impression seems to be that the various churches have all they can do to maintain their denominational work, local and general. The claims of the Society were earnestly pressed upon the attention of a large congregation in the Presbyterian Church on Sabbath forenoon. It is confidently hoped that the good people of Listowel will see their way to re-consider their action and resolve to stand loyally by so highly honoured an institution as the Bible Society.

*Belgrave.*—Fair meeting in Episcopal Church. Excellent music by choir of the church. Interesting report and address by the secretary, Mr. W. Bengough, a veteran and enthusiastic Bible Society officer. Resident ministers Revs. Messrs. Racey (Episcopalian), Law (Presbyterian), and Godfrey (Methodist), all present. The branch promises to give a good account of itself, and it is hoped will make up the falling-off of last year.

*St. Helen's.*—A good meeting in the Episcopal Church. In the absence of Rev. Mr. Anderson, president, the chair was taken by Rev. Mr. Goldberg, pastor of the church, who told of his own conversion through the gift of a Bible Society New Testament. Mr. Goldberg's address was most eloquent and impressive. He is an enthusiastic friend of the Society. The depository is specially well kept. A contribution of \$6.20 from the union Sabbath School on the 6th Concession West Wawanosh was a gratifying surprise and is worthy of note and commendation.

*Kinlough.*—Meeting well attended. Some delay in getting under way kept the meeting rather late. This will be remedied in another year. Resident ministers Rev. Mr. Hall (Episcopalian) and Rev. Mr. Gray (Presbyterian) both present and took part in the meeting. Mr. Henderson, the specially efficient secretary of Bervie branch—the next north of Kinlough—was also present, greatly to the delight and encouragement of the agent. The prospects of a prosperous year are good.

*Langside.*—An average meeting. The president, Rev. D. Davidson, in the chair. The business disposed of promptly. The address of the agent listened to intently. The officers engage to see that the collectors do their work without delay, and to encourage them in it. Larger returns may be looked for than last year.

*Lucknow.*—Notwithstanding strong competing attractions, a fair and earnest meeting. Resident ministers of the town, Revs. A. McKay (Presbyterian) president, J. B. McKinnon (Baptist) president-elect, Drs. Strongman and Calling (Methodists), and Goldberg (Episcopalian), all present and in sympathy with the work. The officers of the branch are exceptionally efficient, and the sales are encouraging. The collecting partly done promises an advance on previous years. Prospects of the branch excellent.

REV. W. J. GARTON—*High Bluff*, Wednesday, Jan. 28th, 1891.—This was my first meeting-place, and the meeting was for the purpose of establishing a branch. The Rev. Mark C. Rumball, B.A. (Presbyterian), presided. At the close of the address the president asked for a show of hands for and against a branch being established—result in the affirmative. Officers were elected, and it is hoped that a successful work is before this newly-formed branch. Collection \$2 60, which was left in the hands of Rev. M. C. Rumball to pass over to treasurer to meet expenses of inauguration.

*Portage la Prairie*, Jan. 29th.—A fairly well-attended meeting was held in the Baptist Church, the president, W. W. Miller, Esq., in the chair. Rev. P. Wright

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(Presbyterian), S. MacMorine (Episcopalian) and McDonald, were present. Rev. P. Wright led the devotional exercises. The different reports were read, and officers and collectors appointed for the ensuing year. The report of the depositary showed a slight decrease in the sales compared with the previous year. The meeting listened with great attention to the address, and at its close a collection was taken up which amounted to \$7.45.

*Minnedosa*, Feb. 3rd.—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church, Rev. E. A. W. Gill, B.A. (Episcopalian), president, in the chair. A small attendance, accounted for by the severe weather. Those present took a lively interest in the meeting and listened very attentively. Rev. Messrs. McKinley and Lister also gave addresses. This branch has been unfortunate in losing its energetic secretary, Mr. G. Beynon, by removal, but it is confidently expected that his successor, Mr. E. O. Denison, will do good work. Collection \$4.75.

*Rapid City*, Feb. 4th.—The Rev. E. A. W. Gill drove me from Minnedosa to Rapid City. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Rev. T. B. Beynon, pastor, in the chair. A really good meeting, both in attendance and enthusiasm. At the close of my address Revs. Messrs. Doolittle (Baptist) and Gill spoke, and emphasized certain points in the address. Rev. T. B. Beynon was elected president for the ensuing year. Collection \$5.65.

*Birtle*, Feb. 6th, 7th, 8th.—On Friday 6th a meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance small, yet great interest was shown. Rev. W. T. Mitton, M.A. (Episcopalian), acted as president, and very ably and earnestly advocated the cause of the Society. Rev. Mr. Somerville (Methodist), followed my address, and interested all present by giving his own experience as a colporteur of the Society among the French Roman Catholics in the East. Dr. Smellie, an old friend of the Society, having held the position of president at Rat Portage, was elected to the like position of this branch. Collection 4.86. On Sunday I addressed a large union meeting of the Methodist and Presbyterian Sunday Schools, and in the evening preached on behalf of the Society in the English Church.

*Newdale*.—Monday, Feb. 9th, saw me at this place, where a new branch was established. Before the meeting I visited Messrs. Ray and De Witt; the former consented to act as depositary, the latter as president. Messrs. Holling and McGibben, respectively Methodist and Presbyterian students in charge, rendered great assistance. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and very well attended. At the close of the address it was unanimously decided to start a branch. Officers were elected, and although Newdale is not a large place, yet it is believed the work will be appreciated. Collection \$2.05.

*Shoal Lake*, Feb. 10th.—In company with Mr. Shaw, Methodist student in charge, I visited several friends, and enlisted their sympathies. At eight o'clock the meeting was held, Rev. R. Gow (Presbyterian), as president. The attendance was not so large as it might have been, as a number of farmers were in town. Towards the close Mr. Shaw spoke very nicely on behalf of the work. On being put to the meeting it was unanimously decided to form a branch. Officers were then elected. Collection \$2.55.

*Gladstone*, Feb. 19th.—This branch, like some of the others I have visited, has been in operation just a year. The sale of Bibles has been small, owing to the town and country being well supplied. The friends of the Society appreciate its most praiseworthy efforts, and very willingly contribute their mite towards the work. Your agent also being president of this branch, he invited W. R. Mulock, Esq., Q.C., secretary of the Winnipeg branch, to be present and give an address. He very kindly did so, and all present appreciated the weighty and instructive words which fell from his lips. The Rev. J. W. Runions (Methodist) spoke upon the Society's work in Quebec, and Mr. J. L. Logie, depositary, also entertained us. Your agent set forth the universal work of the Society. Collection \$6.10.

*Neeawa*, Feb. 24th.—This branch has been very unfortunate in having had bad weather for its annual meeting. I should have been present on the second instant but was prevented by a storm. Again it was even more stormy on the 24th, but we had our meeting; very small attendance. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, Rev. C. S. Murray, B.A., presiding. The branch has done very well in the way of subscriptions. After my address Rev. T. Argue (Methodist) and Mr. Rouleau, colporteur, followed. The latter set forth the power of God's Word, and gave illustra-

tions of its influence among the French, he himself being a French convert from Roman Catholicism. Collection \$1.50.

REV. JAMES GRANT—*Welland*.—This branch was visited by me on the 20th November. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The Rev. Mr. Kennedy, retired Presbyterian minister, in the chair. The interest in Welland has not been strong for a number of years, but owing, they say, to some stirring correspondence from me beforehand, the attendance at the meeting was much larger than for many years past. I think I succeeded in re-kindling the old fire. They think they will send about \$70 this year to the Society.

*Fonthill*.—There was an excellent meeting held in the Baptist Church. The house was full, the pastor in the chair; and after an earnest time with them, this branch, which has done little or nothing for a number of years, got revived, and is now at work collecting. I believe it will send a good account of itself before long.

*Niagara Falls South*.—The meeting of this branch was held in the village of Stanford, the Rev. R. Acheson, the excellent president, in the chair. The meeting was held in Mr. Acheson's church (Presbyterian), and was well attended, apparently most interesting to all present. This branch did not need to be provoked to good works. It is doing nobly, and this year has done better than ever.

*Niagara Falls and Queenston*.—I held the meeting here on the 26th November, in the Methodist Church, the Rev. Mr. Emory in the chair. There was a large representation of all the Christian denominations present, and the meeting was very successful in every way. Much interest was manifested in the Society's operations, and an effort is to be made by this branch to aid more largely than in the past.

REV. DR. HARPER—*West Toronto Junction*.—A meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church (Rev. J. A. Grant's) on the evening of November 26th, 1890. Most of the ministers of the town were present, and cordially supported the purpose as set forth in your agent's address, and in full accord with the principles and aims of the Society. The usual office-bearers were chosen (their names appear elsewhere) and collectors were appointed to canvass the field for contributions towards its general purposes. From these we expect to hear soon. The depository is in good hands, and has a judicious assortment of the Society's books. May the new branch "bring forth much fruit."

*South Etobicoke*—Held its meeting in the Methodist Church, Islington, on the 19th February. The pastor of the church was away. The Rev. Mr. Tremayne (Church of England) was present, opened the meeting and gave a neat, pithy and appropriate speech. The agent followed, and found the small congregation thoroughly appreciative. Collection taken, and the officers of the branch appointed. There is no depository kept here. Mr. D. L. Streight, the Secretary-Treasurer, is the right man in the right place.

*Bolton*—Was visited on the 23rd February. The Rev. Geo. Walker (Methodist), in whose church the meeting took place, rendered every assistance, and the attendance of the choir, with an audience larger than ordinary, made the occasion a delightful one. The agent was cheered beyond common by the attention which he received. Some changes were made in the officers, the collectors were appointed and urged to diligence in their work. Collection and free contributions were voted to the U. C. B. S.

*Mono Mills*.—The Rev. J. A. Long (Methodist) was the only minister present, who changed certain of his plans to be with me and render help. The meeting was in the Presbyterian Church. No change was made in the officers. The collectors were urged to enter on their work at once, and try to bring this branch once more to be as productive as in former days.

*Charleston* (Caledon) was taken on the 26th Feb. The Rev. W. C. Washington, M.A., provided for the meeting in his church, and entertained the agent. The night was cold but clear, yet no officer of the Society was there except the president, who opened the meeting but left all the time to the agent. The officers and friends of the Society were earnestly entreated to exert themselves for the revival of this branch's life and usefulness. Its condition needs regenerating.

*Weston.*—The meeting was in the beautiful Methodist Church. The Rev. S. C. Philp, Junr., took charge of the devotional exercises. The Rev. Mr. Harris, Church of England, gave an earnest and thoroughly evangelical address. The rest of the time was allowed to the agent, who had much liberty and comfort in addressing the audience. The collectors reported in part, and promised to complete their work in a few days. The office of the secretary-treasurer, deceased, was filled by the appointment of his son.

*Humber Summit* had arranged for its meeting being held at Emery Methodist Church, which was attended on the 12th March. The chair was filled by the vice-president. Mr. D. A. McCallum, secretary-treasurer, and Mr. Wallis, the depositary, were present, and gave needed help. Those present, though not numerous, were attentive and appreciative, and the agent was comforted by their expressed approval of his address. The collectors reported their work almost complete. The officers were appointed. This branch has done well in the past, and is determined to do better still in the near future.

*REV. R. HAY—Rothsay, Nov. 18th.*—We had here a good meeting although the attendance was not large. The Rev. Mr. Edmison, of the Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. Mr. Smith, of the Methodist Church, were present, and rendered efficient help. The officers of the branch were all present, and a very good report was given. Collectors are to be sent out at once, and it is expected that good contributions will be received.

*Drayton, Nov. 19th.*—Here we had a very good meeting, but I found that not much had been done last year. They received me most kindly, and assured me that they will do better in the future. There are many true friends of your work here, and I am satisfied that they were right in saying that the wretched state of the roads last winter had much to do with the manner in which their work was done. The pastor of the Christian Church helped me at this meeting, and showed me much kindness.

*Hollin.*—The meeting here was not large but good; the officers were mostly present, and a good report was read by Dr. Fell, secretary of the branch. Collectors were appointed, and their work will be pressed. You will soon receive a remittance from this branch.

*Glenallan.*—The pastors of the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches were present and took part in the meeting. The attendance was fairly good. This branch is in the hands of good officers, and promises well for the coming year. Collectors were appointed, who will do their work at an early date. They promise an advance on last year's contributions.

*Moorefield.*—I spent Sunday here, and preached in the Methodist Church to a very large congregation; every inch of room in the building was filled. On Monday evening we had an excellent meeting. This branch is favoured with good officers. The secretary gave an excellent report. Everything in connection with the work here is in good shape. Rev. Mr. Smith, Methodist minister, helped me much here.

*Mimosa.*—This is a country place and the evening was cold, yet we had a good attendance and a very good meeting in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Mr. Ross helped in the meeting here. Collectors were appointed, and asked to do their work at an early date. Everything is in good shape in this branch.

*Gavafraxa (Belwood).* The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. All the ministers in the village were present, Rev. Mr. Ross (Presbyterian), Rev. Mr. Kennedy (Methodist), and Rev. Mr. Webb (Congregationalist). In the absence of the president, Mr. R. Y. Blyth, Rev. Mr. Webb occupied the chair. Addresses were made by Revs. Kennedy and Ross. The attendance was good, and the meeting one of much interest. Steps were taken to extend the boundaries of the branch, and promises given that the work of the collectors would be at once performed.

*Palmerston.*—There had been no meeting here last year. The treasurer had left the town. I called on many friends of the branch, found a gentleman who would act as depositary, took stock of the books, etc. In all this work the Rev. Mr. Aull gave me valuable help, without which I could have done but little. Rev. Mr. Smith also gave valuable help. In the evening we had a fairly good meeting, and got the branch

into good working order. Collectors were appointed, and the boundaries of the branch enlarged. You should receive \$75 at least from this branch. If this forecast is realized, thank the Rev. gentlemen above-named.

REV. DR. HODGKIN—*North Bruce*, Oct. 20th.—The meeting was held in the United Brethren Church, the minister had travelled from his home at Port Elgin to be present at it. The Presbyterian minister was unavoidably absent. The attendance, considering that so many were engaged in threshing, was good; but the collection indicated a scarcity either in the line of interest or of cash. But the proceeds of an unusually good harvest had not yet been realized, and we live in hope.

*Underwood*, Oct. 21st.—I found in the manse a comfortable home, and had the pleasure of renewing my acquaintance with the minister whom, for over thirty years, I had not seen. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was well attended and good interest shown—which it is hoped will be more practically manifested when the returns of the collection are made.

*Tiverton*, Oct. 22nd.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, which, when erected twenty years ago, was the best edifice of church character in the county. The Rev. Mr. Anderson, while showing his interest in the Society by being present, was unable to remain through domestic affliction. But the agent was well aided by the Rev. Mr. McFayden, the Baptist minister. The meeting, however, did not come up to the expectations of the agent. But from this it by no means follows that the result will not be gratifying.

*Glammis*, Oct. 23rd.—At the secretary's house I had a cheerful welcome and a pleasant resting-place. Just after my arrival the rain began to fall and continued to descend. The meeting, notwithstanding, was very well attended, and by no means void of interest. The depository is Mr. Hendrie, but the actual keeper and manager of it is one of his daughters, who is, from every point of view, both systematic and efficient.

*Arnou*, Oct. 24th.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The attendance was very good, notwithstanding the bad walking, and the meeting bright and cheerful. The audience listened with great attention to the agent's address, and afterwards wished to hear from him further on the Bible subjects that had been referred to, and after the collection he resumed his discourse for half an hour, and closed one of the most pleasant meetings on the list.

*Kincardine*.—The annual meeting was held in the Baptist Church. The night was not very favourable, and the location was not by any means a desirable one, notwithstanding the interest which the pastor of that congregation takes in every good work. The meeting was a good one, however, the attendance being generally very small; certainly the ministers of the town were well represented.

*Bervie*.—I was gratified to find that the meeting was held in my old church, somewhat renovated and improved. The attendance was good, the singing cheerful and hearty, and the clergyman sympathizing with the object of the meeting.

*Ripley*.—This meeting was also held in the English Church, and its minister, with those of the Presbyterian Churches of the neighbourhood, added greatly to the interest of the occasion. The attendance was good—some had come a considerable distance on an unpleasant evening.

*Pine River and Amberley*.—The meeting was held in Bethel Methodist Church, and I suppose at least was an average one. The usual business was transacted and arrangements made to give the inhabitants of the large district occupied by this branch an opportunity of aiding in the good work.

*Port Albert*.—We found a hearty welcome at the house of Mr. Hawkins, the depository, and the meeting was a good one—bright and cheerful—in the new English Church standing on the height above the Nine Mile River. It has been a new feature in my agency work to attend three meetings in one week held in Anglican Churches.

REV. J. G. MANLY.—The visitation of the section whose eastern border is Bradford, was very pleasant and encouraging, beginning with *Ivy* and *Thornton*, though in the latter place, the removal to Toronto of our good friend, Mr. T. Scott, is much

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felt. Again in *Cookstown*, the Episcopal church was occupied; and incipiently in *Alliston*, where the Society is doing well in its depository and otherwise. *Rosemont* showed some temporary effect of ministerial removals. The newly-settled minister of *West Essa* well supplies the presidential vacancy. *Beeton* has lost by death its secretary-treasurer, but found a good successor. Good gatherings at *Bondhead*; and no failure at *Bradford*, where both town and country are well looked after, for the Bible work of Canada and the world.

In the *Kingston* field, there is some advance in every place: ministers in sympathy and ready to serve the good cause, for which we may well give thanks and take courage. Both Presbyterian and Methodist Churches of *Pittsburgh* occupied for the Society. *Secley's Bay* has brighter prospects; *Battersa* branch is improving; much better attendance at *Inverary*. Good meeting at *Sunbury*, under the presidency of the Rev. R. Laird, with the hearty help (as at *Battersea*) of the Rev. A. O. Watts; several collectors appointed. Cordially helped at *Cataraqui* by the young ministerial assistant; and at *Odesa* by the pastor. *Bath* promisingly re-organized in a sympathetic meeting. A good and lively meeting on *Amherst Island*. *Garden Island* as formerly. Found the Episcopal minister of *Wolfe Island*, a kind host and a good helper in his church. Service at *Harrowsmith* branch, and at *Glenvale* and *Hartington* on its borders. Usual attendance at *Parham*.

Returning from *Kingston*, had large attendance and liberal contributions in the *Mara* branch, at *Gamebridge* and *Brechin*. The possibilities of *Beaverton* for the Bible to the World are not exhausted. The *Eldon* meeting was well attended. It has started well and is doing well, under good pastoral presidency. Preparation for the *Sandford* meeting was wholly neglected. At *Goodwood*, the meeting was decidedly good on a rainy evening, by earnest ministerial co-operation, which had also extended to *Mt. Albert* and elsewhere; collectors appointed, and revival of depository projected and urged.

The official published report of *Picton* says that "the attendance was much larger than at any meeting for many years," and that "the address about Africa was received with rapt attention." Some subscriptions given along with the collection, and hope of progress expressed, for which indeed there is ample ability, as well as much need. Small attendance, but with ministerial cordiality and help at *Milford*. *Cherry Valley* a deplorable failure. Fair attendance at *Bloomfield* and *Wellington*. Good attendance and promise of due action at *Trenton*. Very kindly entertained and helped at *Frankford* by the clerical incumbent, with best contributions so far in this visitation. At *Brighton* unusual attendance and most earnest attention. Not large at *Colborne*. Small at *Grafton*, from some mysterious mismanagement or neglect. Earnest meeting at *Unionville*. *Castleton* not yet at the front. *Warkworth* good. No meeting at *Roseneath* by gross official neglect, but remedy kindly promised by the president, with the ready co-operation of the resident minister. Reached *Vernonville* next day with difficulty. For *Coldsprings*, three Sunday services and two collections. Good attendance at *Pickering* on a rainy day: satisfactory report and much attention. Good attendance at *Dunbarton*. *Hishland Creek* declines branch amalgamation.

In *Brooklin*, largest attendance ever known for the Bible Society, in the Episcopal church, under the chairmanship of the incumbent and with his hospitality, with also hearty help of Rev. J. B. McLaren, in absence on duty of Rev. G. Leach. Meeting of *Columbus* branch at *Raglan* for the first time, with good attendance and collection; and also next day at *Ashburn* with three ministers, Pres., Ep., and Meth. Meeting of like kind next day at *Kinsale*; and at *Brougham* unusually good. Altogether an interesting week's work ending here.

The *Zephyr* branch is in its infancy. *Keswick* good. *Campbellford* attendance doubled, with liberal collection. At *Stirling* the most enthusiastic meeting ever held in the twenty-seven years of the one presidency, and filling the room. *Madoc* good. Pleasant meeting at *Moira* under chairmanship of Rev. T. Cleworth. Annual meeting with same chairmanship on Saturday evening at *Thomasburgh*, with help of Rev. J. McKinnon; and next day preached at *Moira* in Methodist Church, and in the afternoon in *Roslin* Presbyterian. Organized new branch at *Shannonville*, with such competent and trustworthy officers as to guarantee good action. *Melrose* attendance fair. At busy industrial *Desoronto* indications of life, though without large attendance and no less at *Newburgh*. Good attendance at *Laskay*; good report from the

secretary, and good speech from himself and the resident minister; advance on last year, as is wont.

*Prince Albert*, with subscription of \$12.50 and a collection of \$2.38, has opened its New Year's work better than ever before. Notwithstanding the day's municipal elections, *Cartwright* meeting at Blackstock well attended. *Greenbank* gathering unusually large and emphatically attentive, giving a good collection. Strength and life at *Port Perry* for greater development. *Sonya* increased. Services in Methodist and Presbyterian churches of *Cobourg*; and the annual meeting in the Congregational church represented the ministerial scope and the good lay friends of the town. A snow-storm thinned the attendance of fruitful *Cannington*. The *Sunderland* meeting, attended by several ministers, proposed to renew the depository. The *Parkdale* meeting (Toronto) was held on the coldest evening of the winter, but was hearty and hopeful, giving a good report, and manifesting ministerial co-operation.

*Claremont* was fairly attended, and helped by Baptist and Methodist ministers in the absence of the Presbyterian on duty. *Kaladar*, unfortunately, was not reached from want or failure of conveyance, but written to in inability of agent to return, and also heard from. Good meeting at *Tweed*. *Tamworth* is well officered and efficient. Good collection at *Mount Pleasant*. After Sunday evening sermon to a large congregation, a large annual meeting in *Omeme*, appointing a large staff of collectors under an active president. *Bethany* meeting left by me before close to secure conveyance to *Janetville* for its afternoon meeting next day, which was unusually small, on account of local engagements. Train to *Garden Hill* missed by no fault of mine in rainy weather that precluded attendance; meeting held later. Excellent meeting at *Canton* of a good and well officered branch.

From a busy half-day at home to a good and hearty meeting at *Lakefield*, despite counter attractions. *Keene* better than ever. *Hastings'* attendance small in very cold weather, but officers and ministers on hand. Much better attendance than last year at *Norwood*. Union Sunday services at *Warsaw* in Presbyterian and Methodist churches, excelling all the past for attendance and collections. Good attendance in rain at *Cavanville*, and at *Springville*. Large congregation at *Bailieboro'* of the good *South Monaghan* branch. Good and increased attendance at *Millbrook*.

At *Woodville* "the light of other days is faded" or fled, for (as reported in the previous year) there was no congregation; but this sad condition of things will surely soon cease in a Knoxonian and Bible-regarding region. Revisitation now, after long absence and with very pleasant recollections, makes the present phase very painful. May it soon be said that the Bible-spreading light is come and the former glory returned to continue. A good and well-attended meeting at *Glenarm*; as also at *Cambray*, with both ministers; collecting work nearly finished. Large attendance at *Fenelon Falls*, including ministers of three churches, and good report of past year. Electioneering diminished the attendance at *Coboconk*, as elsewhere, but there was a hearty remnant, which, it is to be hoped, will make this place such a centre of Bible-supply for a large region as it really ought to be, and as I recommended and urged. Sermons in two churches of *Bobcaygeon*, and good attendance the following evening to hear and help about the Bible for Africa and the world as well as Canada; good collection and fair Bible sales. No gathering at *Pontypool* in a dark, rainy and slushy night, but fair sales of Scriptures since last meeting.

*Aurora* attendance lessened by political canvass, but aided by Baptist and Presbyterian ministers and other hearty friends of Bible circulation. Conveyed by *Aurora* president next day to *Richmond Hill*, through snow and cold, and by its own president homewards day after. Good attendance at *West Darlington* in a day of snow-storm, with no local minister either there or at *Hampton*. Both Presbyterian and Methodist minister aiding at *Enniskillen*, but with attendance diminished here as well as elsewhere by political canvass. Very excellent meeting at *Orono*, the largest and heartiest in ten years. Most kindly entertained and ministerially aided. *Kendal* then unreachable.

Good meeting of a good branch at *Thornhill*, with both ministers. *Oakwood* has done well, better than usually of old. *Little Britain* was to do its collecting in time for closure of accounts and forthcoming report. The *Eglinton* meeting closed the year's gatherings, preparatory to the annual assembly of May.

"The beam that shines from Zion hill  
 Shall lighten every land ;  
 The King that reigns in Salem's towers  
 Shall all the world command."

And in this universal evangelization, dark and down-trodden Africa shall be brought, has begun to be brought, as "a present to Jehovah of hosts (the mighty Messiah) in the place of His name, the Mount Zion."

REV. A. J. MCLEOD—*Banff*, Jan. 24th.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church. Rev. C. W. Gordon, in the absence of the president, ably presided and gave a helpful address. There was a good attendance and a fine spirit manifested in the meeting. The Society's interests are in good hands in the national park of the Dominion.

*Canmore* was visited on Jan. 28th. On the previous Sabbath your agent had the privilege of opening the first church in this place. The meeting was well attended, and a collection of \$4.75 was taken up. It was unanimously decided to organize as a branch society. Competent officers were appointed and two ladies were selected to make a general canvass.

*Maple Creek*.—The branch here was visited on Feb. 21st. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church—the pastor, Rev. Mr. Johnston, taking the devotional exercises, and otherwise helping in the meeting. The attendance was good and the interest in the work apparent.

*Swift Current* was visited, and a number of Bibles and Testaments disposed of during the morning and afternoon. There was a large gathering in the Presbyterian Church in the evening, and a collection of \$8.15 taken up. But it was not considered wise to establish a branch here. The village depends almost exclusively on work connected with the C. P. R.

*Fort McLeod*.—After a journey of 172 miles by rail and 30 miles by stage, Fort McLeod was reached. All arrangements had been made for the meeting in the evening; but it was poorly attended, owing to considerable excitement over election matters. Much credit is due to the energy of the efficient secretary of the branch society, Mr. A. F. Grady. Over \$27 was on hand as a free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society, and collectors were appointed to make this year's regular canvass.

*Lethbridge*.—The largest meeting yet held in the district to which I have been appointed took place in this thriving mining town. The large Presbyterian Church was filled. Rev. Mr. McKillop and Rev. Mr. Halsall gave valuable assistance. The report from the depository showed sales to the amount of \$26.75. Ladies were appointed for an immediate canvass. The collection taken up during the evening amounted to \$12.40. At this, as well as at the preceding meetings, after the business had been transacted and addresses made on the grand work of the parent Society and its greatest auxiliary, forty or fifty magic lantern views of India were exhibited. These embraced pictures of Zenana missionaries, Mohammedan mosques and customs temples and street views, etc., all of which were calculated to call out sympathy for the work of the Bible Society in heathen lands.

*Medicine Hat*.—The annual meeting of the Medicine Hat branch was held on Wednesday evening, March 4th. The agent occupied the chair. Stirring addresses were given by Rev. J. C. Herdman and Mr. Thomas Paton. With the aid of printed tables and diagrams your agent sketched the development and present standing of the parent Society and its great auxiliary. Revs. John P. Grant, of Pincher Creek, and R. A. Munro, of Pine Creek, assisted in the devotional exercises; as did also Rev. Charles Teeter, local Methodist minister. All reports were satisfactory. Efficient officers have charge of the work.

REV. T. ALBERT MOORE—*Caistor*.—The annual meeting was held on Thanksgiving evening in the Ker Methodist Church. The roads were very bad and the night dark, but there was a good attendance. The agent's address was listened to very attentively, all being much interested in his account of the growth of the Bible Society and the work of the colporteurs. Rev. Mr. Taylor gave valuable assistance. This branch is flourishing and will make excellent returns this year.

*Caistorville.*—The meeting was not well attended, but the effective labours of the earnest officers will have a good influence upon the branch. There is a prospect of better things in connection with our Society here. Rev. T. W. Kelley, B.A., assisted at the meeting; he always takes a lively interest in the work of Bible distribution.

*Beamsville.*—There is little general interest taken in the Society by the people here, and the audience was small. However, the agent delivered a short address upon the aims and work of Bible societies, and pointed out a few of the good results accomplished. Steps were taken which will create a deeper interest at this place. Revs. T. W. Jackson and Dr. McIntyre were present and showed they were deeply interested in the Society's work.

*Grimsby.*—The meeting here was held in the beautiful Presbyterian Church. Though not large, yet the audience manifested a deep interest in the objects and work of the Bible Society. There is every prospect of this branch going ahead of its past good record. Rev. J. G. Murray (Presbyterian), the president, and Rev. J. H. Hazelwood (Methodist) were present and rendered valuable assistance.

*Smithville.*—The roads here from Grimsby were very bad, but the agent soon forgot his "shaking up" amid the cheerful associations of the hospitable home of Rev. R. Walter Wright, B.D. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and proved to be very interesting. The efficient officers of this branch, with the help of Rev. R. W. Wright and other earnest friends will, without doubt, bring in good returns for the year's work.

*St. Ann's.*—The meeting here was held in the only church in the village (the Presbyterian), and was presided over by the Rev. W. M. Cruickshank, pastor of the church and president of the branch. A very deep interest is taken in the Society here, and the meeting was a good one. The agent gave emphasis to the work of the Society, dwelling particularly upon the labours of the colporteurs in various lands. The financial reports made by the branch were good, and the future prospect is encouraging.

*Wellandport.*—Unfavourable weather and a Church Social held the same evening prevented a large attendance at the meeting here. The agent was unable to reach the meeting, but in his absence Rev. R. W. Wright, B.D., of Smithville, filled his place and rendered excellent service. It was hoped that better reports from this branch would be made and the executive was earnest in striving for better things.

*Winona.*—For several years there had been neither meetings nor returns from Winona, but we succeeded in having a very interesting meeting, and, with the appointment of some new officers, it is sincerely hoped that a good report will be made for this year. This is one of the old branches, and many years ago maintained a very thriving life. To attain unto their former success is their present hope.

*Tapleystown.*—A rural branch. Only the Methodist Church in the village, and its pastor, the president of the branch, was engaged in special services seven miles away. Had the whole meeting to myself. Attendance very small, but interested. Trust for better reports a year hence. Was kindly entertained at Methodist Parsonage.

*Caledonia.*—Your agent found a wide-awake branch, whose interest in the great work of the Bible Society is at a high standard, judging by their contributions. The meeting was very well attended, and all were interested in the story of Bible work in many lands, as related. Rev. C. W. Cosens (Methodist) was present, and conducted the opening services. The officers are zealous and do their work well.

*REV. J. H. MOORHOUSE—Princeton.*—The meeting was opened by reading Isaiah 35 and by prayer. Rev. J. H. McCartney (Methodist) was present and gave an address warmly in favour of the Society. Collectors were carefully appointed. The attendance was not large, but a lively interest was manifested by those present. A pleasing feature of the meeting was the excellent singing by the choir.

*Drumbo.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Both resident ministers were unavoidably absent. The old problem of how to reach the ear of the public presented itself here—there being only 30 present. A great revival of interest in Bible Society work is needed in this section of the country. The circulation of literature on the claims of the Bible Society might do good. The meeting itself, however, I am glad to say, was bright and hearty. The con-

tributions last year were raised by collections in churches. I suggested that collectors should be appointed this year, and the whole territory regularly canvassed.

*Plattsville.*—This was a good meeting. Two resident ministers were present. The branch confessed that there had been some falling-off in work for the Society, but expressed a desire to see the interest revived. Collections \$3.25.

*Chesterfield and Ratho.*—This meeting was held this year at *Ratho*. The attendance was fair. I was glad to find Rev. Mr. Straith (Presbyterian), the minister in charge here. I had met him at Holstein, his former field, at the time that branch was organized, and, as he is a warm friend of the Society, we may expect the cause to go forward in this locality. This neighbourhood has had a gloom cast over it by the recent death of Rev. Mr. Robertson, Presbyterian minister at *Chesterfield*. The long period (32 years) during which he laboured here, together with the universal respect in which he was held, combined to make his death a heavy blow.

*Washington.*—I was glad to find that although this branch appears blank in the report \$23 had been afterwards contributed. The attendance was fair, and the work was all carried through thoroughly. This appears to be a flourishing little branch.

*St. George.*—This branch gave a handsome contribution of \$75 last year. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Two of the resident ministers were present and spoke helpful words on behalf of the Society. The question of replenishing the depository and starting afresh, was, after discussion, left over for the Committee to decide.

*New Durham.*—I was kindly met at the station by Mr. Charles Walker and driven to his home some three miles distant. Mr. Walker is president of this branch, and is one of the warmest friends of the Society I have ever met. There was a falling-off in the returns from this branch last year on account of some of the collectors not having done their work. But the report at the meeting this year showed a marked increase; the amount being about double that of last year. The old officers were re-appointed.

*Scotland.*—A wet afternoon and evening did not contribute to the success of this meeting; but there were 22 present and the business of the branch was thoroughly attended to. Rev. Mr. Hastings (Baptist) was present, and in a pointed address advocated the claims of the Society.

*Mount Pleasant.*—A bright, interesting meeting. Four resident ministers were present. The business was all carried thoroughly through. A hope was expressed that this branch would this year push its work in advance of recent contributions. It was thought that Burtch Corners, a point some  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles distant, furnished new ground that might advantageously be worked, and it was arranged that the Presbyterian and Methodist ministers should hold a meeting there and get collectors appointed.

*Burford.*—The meeting was held in the Congregational Church. On the preceding Sunday I preached morning and evening in the Episcopal Church. This may have helped to secure a good attendance, for although special services were being conducted in the Methodist Church, we had an attendance of about 120 at our Bible Society meeting. Rev. A. K. Griffin (Episcopalian) was present, and assisted with the opening exercises. Mr. Cox, president, occupied the chair, and spoke warmly in favour of the work. He expressed a hope that the Burford branch would make an advance this year in its contributions. The choir was present, and ably assisted with the singing. The audience was kindly and appreciative, and listened with the closest interest to the address, which was an hour in length.

REV. S. N. MOYER—*Zurich.*—The annual Branch Society meeting was held here this year in the Evangelical Association Church. A pretty large gathering—considering the high gale of wind prevailing at the time—was in attendance, and apparently deeply interested in the work of the Bible Society. The local pastors were also present, and gave the agent efficient aid in his work. The Rev. D. Kreh, of New Hamburg, was also with us, and added some very excellent remarks on the subject.

*Crediton.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Owing to the dark and dreary night, there were few people in attendance, but, by the aid of the local

pastors, these seemed to be stirred up and infused with so much courage and enthusiasm that we anticipate an increase in the amount of the free contributions for this year.

*Tavistock.*—An encouraging anniversary meeting was held in the Baptist Church. The local pastor followed the agent with an interesting address. The Society has a good list of working and paying officers and members of the committee, having renewed their membership subscriptions previous to the meeting. The sales of last year exceeded those of many years previous.

*Sebringville.*—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. "The attendance," it was said, "was the largest we have had for many years." The local ministers were present, and gave efficient aid. The people here are considerably interested in the grand enterprises of the U. C. and B. & F. B. S., as the forthcoming report will show.

*Milverton.*—Here our anniversary meeting was not large, which was, in part, caused by the inclemency of the weather—a pouring rain nearly all day—and, partly, because it had not been definitely made known from the pulpits in what language the agent would address the meeting. The local pastors gave excellent testimony to the Bible Society's operations, and the few who were present seemed to take a lively interest in the matter. The president assured the agent that "Milverton will have a better tale to tell next year."

*Ayton.*—An interesting and fairly well attended meeting was held here, in which the president and local pastor aided the agent. An exemplary preparatory meeting had been held, at which a most satisfactory business programme had been prepared, which the annual meeting adopted, thus facilitating the opening part of the meeting. The people here seem to have a willing mind to aid the Bible Society operations.

*Elmwood.*—A most interesting and enthusiastic meeting was held here in the Mennonite Church. All the local pastors were with us, and their influence and help did much toward making the meeting a success. After the agent's address had been delivered, the president called on the secretary to pass through the meeting and take down the names of any who desired to be enrolled as members. In a few moments he reported about a dozen.

*Mildmay.*—The meeting here was held in the Evangelical Association Church. The attendance was large, and, by the help of the local ministers, the people were infused with new enthusiasm in this grand mission enterprise. The agent spoke in both the German and English languages, after which thirteen or fourteen renewed their membership subscriptions. This was a most encouraging meeting.

*Morrison.*—The meeting was held in the Evangelical Association Church, and was well attended. The local pastor gave the agent his hearty co-operation. The people here display a cheerful readiness to assist the Bible Society in its noble work. This branch is not large—its sales are small, but its free contributions compare favourably with some larger Branch Societies.

*Waterloo.*—The anniversary meeting of this branch was held in the Lutheran Church. The pastor of the church aided your agent by giving a very excellent and pithy address on the work of the Society, and by earnestly soliciting the audience to aid the Society in its noble work. Several of the other pastors of the town were also present and gave efficient aid. I believe there is an increasing interest in the Bible Society's work in Waterloo.

**REV. J. PHILP—East Williams.**—The meeting was held on the 18th November in the East Williams Presbyterian Church, the pastor, the Rev. D. Cameron, assisting. The chair was ably filled by the president, the Rev. J. Anderson, Presbyterian, of Nairn. There was a fair attendance, and the results were encouraging. This aged and honourable branch has lost none of the vigour of its earlier years. The officers, committee and collectors merit great praise.

*Ravenswood.*—An enthusiastic meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, the president, Mr. Nimmo, presiding, and the Rev. James Hussar, Methodist, assisting in the exercises.

*Arkona.*—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, and was the largest known for years. All the resident ministers were present, and gave brief addresses full of encouragement. We believe that the results of this meeting will be very apparent.

*Mooretown.*—Your agent arranged to do the work of this branch on Sunday. He preached in the Presbyterian Church, Mooretown, in the afternoon, and in the Methodist Church, Courtright, at night. The pastors were present and kindly lent their aid. The congregations were large and the interest good. With collectors for both villages we expect better financial returns than for some years past.

*Sombra.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Wilkesport, the pastor, the Rev. Mr. Fairchild, presiding. The night was cold and stormy, and the attendance small. There was, however, a lively interest, and we have reasons for expecting advancement.

*Corunna.*—A rousing meeting in the Methodist Church. All the officers on hand in due time. All the local ministers were present, and gave short and spicy addresses.

*Camlachie.*—Methodist Church nicely filled, Rev. G. McLennan, Presbyterian, presiding. Choice words fitly spoken by the president and by the Rev. T. Jackson, Methodist. Interest said to be the best for years.

*Thedford.*—Meeting in Methodist Church; attendance above average. Rev. Mr. Cooper, Methodist, gave good assistance. Rev. Mr. Currie regretted unavoidable absence. The canvassing here had been neglected by some of the collectors because of unkind reception from some persons on whom they had called. We hope for better things and grander results. The prospects are brighter.

*McGillivray and Biddulph.*—An interesting meeting in the Methodist Church. The Rev. R. C. Henders, of Lucan, a brother beloved, was present with his valuable aid. The members were encouraged and full of hope.

*Watford.*—The meeting was held in the Episcopal Church, the Rev. Mr. Thomson, pastor, in the chair. The Rev. J. H. Graham, B.A., Presbyterian, gave a capital address, and your agent followed, sketching the origin, aim and success of the Society. The attendance was the best for years, and we trust that the results will speak of new and enlarged interest.

REV. J. W. RAE—*Eramosa.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, where, considering the stormy weather, a good congregation gathered to perform the business of the Society, and to listen to the report of your agent. This field is well organized. The officers are men of experience, and are filled with the right spirit. The meeting was full of interest, and the reports from collectors very encouraging.

*Rockwood.*—At Rockwood a fair-sized audience greeted your agent. The Rev. Mr. Strachan presided with his usual acceptability. A combined choir furnished us with very excellent music, and led the meeting in sacred song. The addresses were listened to with marked attention. The Rev. Mr. Hart, Methodist, aided us much in our meeting. The report of Mr. John R. Harris, secretary-treasurer, was very complete, the amount raised being quite satisfactory. All seemed to think that greater success may be looked for in the future.

*Everton.*—Owing to the zeal of our friend Mr. Black in the good cause, we found all arrangements had been made for a good meeting. A well-lighted and well-warmed building and a fairly large audience, together with an excellent choir, all combined to make the meeting successful. Rev. Mr. Strachan, president, occupied the chair. If the opinions of the Rev. Mr. Brennstuhl and Mr. Black be taken to indicate the general feeling, and doubtless they do, a new era has dawned on the work here, and abundant success may be expected in the year to come.

*Malton.*—No meeting being held here last year the interest in our work has fallen off somewhat. The attendance at the meeting was small, but those present were very appreciative, and doubtless fair returns will be made to aid the work of our Society. The failure of agents to fulfil their promises tends much to injure our cause.

*Brampton.*—The visit of your agent to Brampton was a most pleasant one. An audience of about two hundred people assembled in the parlours of the Methodist Church. The Rev. A. Langford, pastor of the church, presided. Mr. Geo. Dawson, the veteran president of the Society, was most happy in the rendering of his report, and forcibly reminded those present that 1892 will find the Brampton branch fifty years old, and on their jubilee next year every effort should be made to worthily celebrate the occasion. Short, stirring and thoughtful addresses were given by the Rev. Alf. Gandier, Presbyterian, and the Rev. R. Boyle, Methodist, which, following the address of your agent, helped to make the meeting one of the most successful in the history of the branch.

*Ayr.*—On account of other meetings of special interest the same evening, the audience gathered in the Methodist Church was smaller than had been expected. The report of the treasurer, the Rev. Mr. Hardie, showed that already \$117 had been collected, with one section yet to hear from, which is the largest amount ever collected in any previous year of the Society's history. The Rev. Mr. Thompson, Presbyterian, and the Rev. Mr. Stewart, Methodist, were present, and aided in the work, the former leading in the service of song.

*Acton.*—The evening was exceedingly stormy, which had been chosen for the meeting here, and therefore the attendance was not large. Mr. H. P. Moore presided over the meeting, and the choir added much to make it a success. The report of the secretary-treasurer, Dr. W. H. Lowry (Reeve of Acton), was very complete. Your agent's address was well received, and the presence and encouraging words of the Rev. Dr. Gifford, Rev. R. B. Cook, Mr. David Henderson, M.P., and Mr. John Warren helped much, together with the president's address, to make the meeting, though small in numbers, abundantly successful.

REV. J. H. SIMPSON—*Bayfield*, Sept. 30th, 1890.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The devotional exercises were conducted by the president, Dr. Stanbury, and the pastor, Rev. R. Henderson. Short, but excellent, practical addresses were given by the Revs. T. G. Newton, Episcopalian, and R. Henderson. These were followed by the address of your agent. Choice and suitable music was furnished by the choir. The meeting was one of excellent spirit, and full of love for the Society. The gift of W. A. to the Society of \$20 materially supplemented the funds for this branch.

*Varna.*—The president, Mr. J. B. Secord, occupied the chair. Urgent and practical addresses were given by the Revs. T. G. Newton, the newly elected president of the Bayfield branch; James Walker, pastor of the Methodist Church in which the meeting was held; J. R. McConnell, pastor of the Presbyterian Church; and your agent. This branch was stimulated to greater activity, and better results may be expected than formerly.

*Blake.*—This is a new branch, formed at this date. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was well attended. Strong interest in Bible Society work was manifested. With such men as Mr. Wm. Carnie as president, and Mr. Allan Douglas as secretary, under God's blessing, this branch is sure to prosper. Your agent was ably assisted at the meeting by Mr. C. T. Tough, a rising young student of Knox College.

*Clinton.*—The meeting, though not very large, was a very interesting one. It was held in the English Church school-room, and ably presided over by the Rev. William Craig, B.D., the president. Short but earnest, practical addresses were given by Revs. Messrs. Shelton, Osborne, Diehl, Stewart, and also by the agent.

*Kinburn* (Constance P.O.).—The president, Mr. Wm. Wilson, occupied the chair. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church; very well attended. Excellent music was furnished by the church choir. The officers were present and gave their reports.

*Seaforth.*—The meeting, which was largely attended, was held in the First Presbyterian Church. The president, Rev. A. D. McDonald, occupied the chair. Before the agent gave his address, Revs. Messrs. Hodgins and Casson delivered earnest and

encouraging, yet short, speeches. The music by the choir aided much in the interest of the meeting. The collection alone was nearly equal to the subscriptions of last year.

*Egmondville.*—The meeting was small but earnest. The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. George Needham, B.A., pastor of the Presbyterian Church, in which the meeting was held, who also gave, after the agent, a short address. In the absence of the president, Rev. Wm. Graham, Mr. Samuel Carnochan occupied the chair.

*Nile.*—Your agent was ably assisted at this meeting by the Rev. E. A. Fear, pastor of the Methodist Church, in which the meeting was held, and by Mr. J. Hetherington. There was a large attendance and a good deal of interest manifested. The officers were all present, and the president acceptably occupied the chair.

*Dungannon.*—Owing to special and other services, the meeting was not as large as it otherwise would have been, and these meetings necessitated the absence of some of the ministers. The devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. R. Fairbairn, M.A., the earnest pastor of the Presbyterian Church, in which the meeting was held. All the officers were present. Your agent's address was much strengthened by the remarks of the president, Mr. H. M. Roberts, and the Rev. Mr. Fairbairn.

*Auburn.*—The meeting, which was held in the English Church, was largely attended; being ably presided over by the Rev. Mr. Racy, pastor. Choice music was given by the church choir. Your agent was heartily supported by the Revs. A. McMillan and J. Swan. The old Society has many warm friends here.

*Blyth.*—The president, Mr. N. H. Young, occupied the chair. Mr. H. McQuarrie, treasurer, who has been associated with Bible Society work for over thirty years, and the earnest secretary, Dr. Sloan, aided the meeting materially. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church and was largely attended. Good music by the church choir. Short, earnest addresses were given by the Rev. A. F. Campbell and Rev. A. McLean.

*Londesboro'.*—By request, Rev. D. M. Ramsay, M.A., B.D., occupied the chair, conducted the devotional exercises and gave a very interesting, pointed address. Your agent was much encouraged by the meeting, which was fairly attended, and marked interest taken in the work of the Society. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church.

*Kippen.*—The meeting was held in St. Andrew's Church, and was very well attended. The pastor, Rev. S. Acheson, conducted the devotional exercises, and, by request, presided; and after the agent's address gave a very encouraging short speech, full of Christian warmth and zeal.

*Goderich.*—The evening was very stormy, yet the attendance was very fair. The meeting was held in the English Church and, by request, presided over by the Rev. Mr. Young, the rector, who conducted the devotional exercises. Before the agent's address, very earnest and encouraging remarks were made by the Revs. J. A. Anderson, B.A., and George Richardson.

*Brucefield.*—This being the home of your agent, it was left till the last; but by no means is it the smallest among the thousands of Judah. The meeting, which was well attended, was held in the Canada Presbyterian Church. By the request of the agent, who is president of this branch, the meeting was presided over by the Rev. William Graham. There is in this place great love for the Bible and Tract Societies, and their work progresses encouragingly. The secretary-treasurer, Mr. George Baird, sr., was present, and aided materially in the meeting.

REV. J. M. SMITH—*Glanford.*—Your agent appointed the annual meeting of this branch for Monday evening, Oct. 13th, but an earnest request came from the branch for the agent to preach on Sabbath. The pastor in charge of this wide field, the Rev. D. Chalmers, kindly gave up his appointments to your agent, and did all in his power to make the meeting a success. I delivered three addresses on the Sabbath, and, through the kindness of the church officers, received the collections for the Society's funds. Wet weather prevented large meetings, but the interest was good.

*Carlisle.*—The annual meeting of this branch was held on Tuesday evening, Oct. 14th. Owing to stormy weather and muddy roads, the attendance was slim. But the interest in the work of the Society is good, and the address of the agent was given marked attention. The Rev. Mr. Muir followed the agent with a short address which augurs well for the report of this year. The officers are all re-appointed, and are practical in their work. As good a report as last year's may be expected.

*Ancaster.*—This branch is well-officered, and is in a healthy condition. The annual meeting was held on Wednesday evening, Oct. 15th, in the Town Hall. The time of the meeting was largely taken up with the appointment of collectors and the condition of the depository. Instructions were given to have new and more suitable stock purchased, and in other ways putting the depository in a better condition. The Rev. Messrs. Clark and McLung took part in the meeting, and altogether the outlook is encouraging for a good report this year.

*Jarvis.*—At the request of the local branch Bible Society, I visited them on the Sabbath, Oct. 19th, preaching in the Presbyterian Church in the morning and in the Methodist Church in the evening. The day was wet and the attendance small, but the interest was good. On Monday evening the weather cleared, and a large and enthusiastic meeting was held. The officers are energetic, and a great improvement is expected in this year's report.

*Hagersville.*—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church on Tuesday evening, Oct. 21st. There was a good turn-out. The officers here are live men, and this year's report is confidently expected to show a gratifying advance. The depository is well located, and considerable stock is being sold. My visit was a very pleasant and profitable one.

*Oneida.*—This society is in flourishing condition. The annual meeting was well attended, especially by the young people. Peter Elder, Esq., who has been secretary-treasurer for over twenty-eight years, resigned on account of failing health. He has been a true friend to the Society, and we hope his successor will prove the same. A crisis in the history of this branch has been passed favourable to future work.

*York.*—The annual meeting here was held under the most adverse circumstances. It rained heavily all day and night, and the roads were impassable. Nevertheless the meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church, was one of the best gatherings which have greeted your agent. The officers are thoroughly devoted to the Bible Society. The Rev. Mr. Bowlby took an active part in the meeting. It was decided to re-establish the Society, and your agent was authorized to select new stock.

*Binbrook.*—The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church on Friday evening, Oct. 31st. The president, the Rev. Mr. Walker, and the Rev. Messrs. Hall and Harris, also took part, and emphasized the points in your agent's address; and, altogether, a good report may be expected from this healthy branch.

*Hanover,* Nov. 12th. The annual meeting was held in the Anglican Church. It was large and enthusiastic, the weather being all that could be desired. The ministers of the town are much interested in the Society's work, and all of them took some part in the meeting. The address of the agent was given the closest attention. The collectors were appointed and urged to begin their canvass at once. The officers are intelligent and sympathetic, and a good report may be expected.

*Tara and Invermay,* Nov. 13th.—Here your agent was received by a large audience in the Methodist Church. A union choir contributed largely to the pleasure and interest of the evening. The officers here are well aware of the great advantage of concerted action, and it certainly produces the best results in the Bible Society work. The clergy of the town took part in the exercises and spoke kindly of the work of the Society.

*Arkwright,* Nov. 14th.—The annual meeting was held at Mount Hope, according to the arrangement of last year. It was a wise thought, as the meeting this year surpassed other years, both in attendance and collection. They have resolved to hold the meetings alternately at Mount Hope and Arkwright. The Rev. Mr. Gilpin took an active part in the meeting, which was very enthusiastic. On account of the preva-

lence of "La Grippe" last year no collecting was done. I think it will be thoroughly done this year, and a good report made.

*Warton.*—This branch held its annual meeting in the Congregational Church. The night was dark and stormy, nevertheless there was a good attendance, and the address of your agent was eagerly listened to. The pastor of the church presided, and the ministers of the other churches took part in the exercises. The collectors were appointed this year at the meeting, and promised to make their canvass at once. This is an important and interesting Society in a much needed district.

*Pinkerton, Nov. 20th.*—A beautiful night and a small meeting. Dr. Douglas, the secretary, and Mr. Keyes, the depository, had removed from the village. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, but no ministers were present. R. Garland, Esq., the honoured president, occupied the chair. Reports were read, officers elected, and collectors appointed for the year. Your agent had good attention all through his address, and the outlook for the year is very promising.

*Riversdale, Nov. 19th.*—The Rev. R. Gray, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, in which we gathered, occupied the chair in the absence of the president, and contributed largely to the success of the meeting. This branch is much needed, as the village population is largely Roman Catholic. An application for a free grant of Bibles and Testaments for gratuitous circulation was placed in my hands and forwarded to Toronto. Collectors were appointed, and this thriving branch will, I have no doubt, report well this year.

*Paisley, Nov. 21st.*—The annual meeting this year was held in the Anglican Church. All the clergymen of the town were present, except Mr. Gillies, the president of the Society, who was at home sick. The meeting was a rousing one, and the interest in the Society's work is at high-water mark. The reports of secretary and treasurer were read showing a gratifying increase in the collections. The report from this Society will be very encouraging. The collectors have nearly all visited their districts, and the receipts in the hands of the treasurer are already ahead of last year.

*Burgoyne, Nov. 24th.*—A service on Sabbath afternoon in the Presbyterian Church, with one in the morning in the Baptist Church, brought out a large congregation to the annual meeting. The Rev. Mr. Tolmie took an active interest in the Society's work, and the Rev. Mr. Gardiner also assisted in the exercises. The officers were all re-elected, reports were made, and your agent addressed the people on the Society's operations both at home and abroad.

*Southampton, Nov. 25th.*—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church. The history of this society has been a chequered one, but through the united efforts of the officers and clergymen it has taken a new lease of life. Your agent preached in the Presbyterian Church on Sabbath evening, and a good meeting on Tuesday evening was the result. The address of your agent was received with marked attention. The depository is to be replenished with a suitable stock; altogether the outlook here is hopeful.

*Walton, Nov. 26th.*—This young branch has all the vigour characteristic of youth. Your agent found an energetic and wide-awake executive. The reports showed a healthy condition of things. The depository sales are encouraging, although not large. The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was well attended. Revs. Messrs. Forrest and Ottwell took an active part in the exercises. Your agent was given a good hearing, and the outlook for the year is very hopeful.

*Allenford.*—The public meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was well attended. The officers were re-appointed for the coming year, and your agent had the interest and sympathy of the people in his address. This branch is in a healthy condition, and I have no doubt will report encouragingly this year.

*Whitechurch, Dec. 4th.*—This branch is young and vigorous, well officered, and has also the sympathy of the people and co-operation of the pastors of the different churches. Its field is wide, and calls for self-denial on the part of the collectors. The annual meeting was interesting, and your agent had hearty reception.

REV. W. W. SMITH—*Huntsville*.—Meeting was held on Monday, after preaching in two churches the day before, so as to get the people interested. But other important meetings had been arranged for the same evening, and the attendance was very small. Rev. M. Sieveright (Presbyterian) gave us good assistance; and Mr. Scarlett, the president, was very kind and hospitable to the agent. The officers and collectors were re-elected.

*Bracebridge*.—An excellent meeting: the Presbyterian Church well filled. Energetic officers, and the meeting well announced. The president, Mr. Myers, retires in favour of Mr. Sheriff Bettes. Rev. Mr. Brown (Methodist) and Rev. M. Armitage (Baptist), and the pastor of the church, Rev. Dr. Clark, all assisted us enthusiastically and well. Contributions always well attended to. A flourishing branch.

*Rugby*.—A fair meeting. The venerable president of the branch, Mr. Tudhope, had a fine grasp of the subject, and spoke with much effect. The agent followed, giving the work of the past year. Collectors will go to work at once. Rev. Mr. Dobson, the president (Presbyterian minister), warmly advocated the cause. One clause in the secretary's report which was adopted calls on the pastors to bring the cause of the Bible Society prominently before their people.

*Coldwater*.—Meeting in Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Bedford, the minister in charge, warmly supported us. Mr. Lovering, the president, was very anxious to see the cause prosper. I think this branch will do better this year. Collections are to be taken up. No depository, as they depend on Orillia, near by.

*Midland*.—A fast-growing new place. Meeting in Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. James (Presbyterian) the president of the branch, and Rev. Mr. Luckens (Baptist) gave valuable assistance. The treasurer and depository, M. Horrell, is a whole-souled friend of the cause. The collectors had just finished their rounds, and \$36.44, free grant, was handed over. Collectors thanked and re-appointed. Preached in Presbyterian Church on Sunday morning.

In the afternoon went over to *Penetanguishene*, and preached in Presbyterian Church Sunday evening. The meeting, held on Monday, was not a large one. Rev. Mr. Pattyson (Methodist), who was president, and Rev. Mr. Currie (Presbyterian) were present and warmly assisted. We find the ministers everywhere warm in the Bible cause, but it is hard to get the general public interested. Collectors were appointed.

*Edgar*.—Mr. R. A. Thomas, secretary, drove me out from Barrie. As the president had removed, Mr. Miller, the treasurer, presided. Rev. Mr. Toy (Methodist), at present the only resident minister, was unable to be with us on account of his health. Collectors had done pretty well through the year, and were expected to do as well the coming year. A fair meeting in the Methodist Church. The agent, as in several other cases, had all the speaking—giving a bird's-eye view of the work all over the world. Here, as everywhere, much Christian kindness and hospitality was experienced.

*Minesing*.—Next day I was driven across the country to Minesing, where I again got within sight of a railway. A good meeting, a good live president (Mr. Orchard), with a good choir; and the Methodist and Presbyterian ministers (Rev. Mr. Knox and Rev. Mr. Kenny) well warmed up in the cause. An excellent report was read by the secretary—over \$40 having been collected during the year. Collectors were appointed. Wherever, as here, there are energetic officers, the branches are found to be flourishing.

*Elmvale*.—This is a young branch, and has never yet done much. Mr. Leeming, the young Episcopal clergyman just appointed to the parish, and only a short time in the country, gave us such assistance as he could. The night was damp and dark—being the only unfavourable evening I had—and there was a small attendance. The treasurer, Mr. Vansickle, is a good friend, and made up largely for discouragement elsewhere.

REV. P. STRAITH—*Clifford*, Oct. 24th.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Though the night was unfavourable there was a manifest interest in the

work of the Society. Rev. S. Young, pastor of the church, and Rev. Mr. Phillips, of the Methodist Church, were present and took part in the meeting.

*Wroxeter.*—Unfortunately none of the resident ministers were able to be present. Thomas Gibson, Esq., M.P.P., president of the branch, occupied the chair and made a few encouraging remarks. The night was rainy, but the attendance was, under the circumstances, good, showing that the branch is in a live state.

*McIntosh.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, Rev. A. C. Stewart, pastor, was present and took part in the meeting. Mr. Thomas Inglis, president of the branch, occupied the chair. Mr. Cromar, colporteur, was labouring in this port at the time and was present and spoke of the colporteur's work.

*Lakelet.*—The night and the roads were unfavourable for the meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church. Mr. Jos. Scott, president of the branch, occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Phillips, pastor of the church, was present and took part in the exercises.

*Teeswater.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The attendance was good considering the night. Rev. W. W. Sparling, president of the branch, occupied the chair, and Rev. Messrs. Wardrope, Malcolm and Linton, Presbyterian ministers, were present and took part in the meeting. This is one of the most active branches of the Society.

*Mount Forest, Nov. 9th.*—Your agent preached according to appointment in the Methodist Church in the morning, and the Baptist Church in the evening, and held a united meeting in the Presbyterian Church in the afternoon. At the afternoon meeting Mr. W. J. Gilray, president of the branch, occupied the chair. Rev. Messrs. Charlton (Methodist) and Walker (Baptist) were present and took part in the meeting. Rev. D. Bickell was necessarily absent. The annual meeting was held on Monday evening and arrangements were made for a thorough canvass.

*Harriston.*—Your agent preached in Knox Presbyterian Church in the morning and in the Methodist Church in the evening, and in Cotswold Mission Station (Presbyterian) in the afternoon, and also addressed a meeting for all the churches in Guthrie Presbyterian Church in the afternoon. Rev. Mr. Smith, president of the branch, occupied the chair at this latter meeting. Rev. Mr. Gregg, who supplied Guthrie Church this Sabbath, also took part.

*Fordwich.*—The night was very unfavourable. The meeting was held in the Church of England. Mr. P. Hepinstall occupied the chair and made some appropriate opening remarks. Rev. Mr. Wright, incumbent of the church, and Rev. Mr. Muir, Presbyterian, also made earnest addresses setting forth the claims of the Society.

*Newbridge.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Mr. Adam Spence, president of the branch, occupied the chair. Mr. Hepinstall, president of the Fordwich branch, was also present and made an encouraging speech. Though the branch is small there is an evident interest in the Society.

*Gorrie.*—The meeting was held in the Church of England. Mr. Jos. Perkins, president of the branch, occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Wright, incumbent of the church, and Rev. Mr. Muir, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, made encouraging addresses.

*Arthur, Dec. 15th.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. L. W. Thom, president of the branch, occupied the chair. Mr. Geo. Thom, brother of the president, was also present and addressed the meeting. This branch is showing activity in the Society work.

*Grand Valley.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. George Tough, president, occupied the chair. Rev. Hugh Crozier, pastor of the church, made a short address. Several other meetings at the same time injured somewhat our attendance.

*Waldemar.*—The meeting was held in the Orange Hall. Mr. W. P. Tolton, president of the branch, occupied the chair. The meeting was well attended, showing an active interest in the work of the Society.

*Holstein.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Mr. Thomas Brown, president, occupied the chair. Rev. G. Lounds, pastor of the church, made a few remarks urging the claims of the work.

*Durham, Jan. 2nd, 1891.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. N. W. Campbell, president, occupied the chair. Rev. Robert McNair, pastor of the church, and Messrs. Cameron and Forest, Presbyterian ministers, also made addresses. The night was very unfavourable and your agent did not reach many, but on a following Sabbath the claims of the Society were brought before the people of the congregation.

*REV. A. J. SNYDER.*—The first branch visited was *Port Dover*. Here I found the officers thoroughly posted in their work; three of them have served the Society for a quarter of a century. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and would have been largely attended but for a political meeting held in the village at the same hour. Our meeting, however, was fairly attended and an excellent staff of collectors appointed. This branch is in good hands.

*Vittoria.*—Was next visited by your agent. I went (as is my daily custom in this work) to the public schools and addressed the children and announced our meeting, and had them promise me they would tell their parents, and thus we have never failed to get a good audience and have unusual interest. Meeting held in the Episcopalian church; the Presbyterian minister presided. The collection was good and the outlook unusually hopeful.

*St. Williams.*—Meeting in Methodist church; a large attendance, and everything placed in proper order for effectual work during the year. Here we took a new departure, viz., by asking the people for their subscription at the public meeting, and thus encourage the collectors in their work. The people were surprised to find more had been subscribed at the meeting than the income of last year, and with one consent they said, "We shall double our giving this year."

*Port Rowan.*—The meeting was held in the Episcopalian church, and the rector, Rev. Mr. Johnson, presided. The Baptist minister gave a good address, and your agent did his best. The collection was liberal. Again we called for subscriptions and more was subscribed than was collected last year.

*Langton.*—As usual I appealed to the school children to tell their parents and friends. In the absence of the president, through illness, the excellent secretary, Geo. E. Smith, Esq., took the chair. We managed to get the minds and hearts of the people, and had a good collection.

*Waterford.*—The secretary, Mr. McMichael, had arranged that I should preach in the Methodist church in the morning and Baptist church in the evening; both services to be in the interests of the Bible Society. At the annual meeting considerable enthusiasm prevailed, and the officers say they will exceed the income of former years.

*Lynedoch.*—We had a most enthusiastic meeting in the Episcopalian church, the rector presiding. The Methodist and Presbyterian ministers were also present. The collection was good, and the subscription was good. Everything here is well conducted, and the income will exceed that of any previous year.

*Norwich.*—The meeting was held in the Episcopalian church, which was fairly well filled. The president presided. The meeting was enthusiastic, the collections large and the subscriptions good. We shall hear a good report of Norwich.

*Otterville.*—There was a good attendance though the night was very stormy. The president, R. Paxton, Esq., presided, and made a nice address. Your agent followed in an hour's address on "The Society and the Book." The choir of the Methodist church assisted greatly, and here I might add that, by previous correspondence and arrangement, we had the assistance of excellent choirs at nearly all of our meetings.

PROCEEDINGS  
OF THE  
FIFTY-FIRST ANNIVERSARY  
OF THE  
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,  
HELD IN THE  
Metropolitan Church, Toronto, on Tuesday Evening, May 19, 1891.

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The chair was taken by the Hon. G. W. Allan, President of the Society, a  
eight o'clock, and the meeting opened by the singing of the first hymn—

“Jesus shall reign where'er the sun,”

after which the Rev. Leroy Hooker, pastor of the church, read as a scripture  
lesson Psalm xix.; the opening prayer by the Rev. Dr. Gregg.

The CHAIRMAN in his opening address said: My Christian friends, it is once  
again my privilege to welcome you to our anniversary meeting, and I trust it will  
be a meeting of more than usual interest.

I rejoice to be able to say that the work of the Upper Canada Bible Society  
has continued to commend itself to the generous support of our people, as shown  
most satisfactorily by the fact that you will find mentioned in the Annual Report  
that, for the fiscal year which closed on the 31st of March last, the ordinary  
revenue of the Society amounted to over \$35,000, which is \$1,600 beyond that of  
any former year; and if we add to this \$5,000 on account of the bequest of  
the late Mr. Wm. Gooderham, which has been placed as a separate invest-  
ment, the interest of which is to be devoted to specific purposes in connection  
with the work of the Society, the total revenue for the last year will amount to a  
little over \$40,000.

I am glad in connection with this matter to allude to another, also men-  
tioned in the Report, and which will form the subject of one of the resolu-  
tions which will be submitted to you this evening, and that is the scheme which  
has lately been under the consideration of the Board of Directors, and has now  
finally been determined upon, to establish Branch Societies in different parts of  
the city of Toronto and its immediate vicinity, under the control of a committee  
of the Board.

It has long been felt by those connected with the management of this Society, and I have alluded to the subject more than once at our Annual Meetings, that the city of Toronto did not bear as large a part in proportion to the numbers and wealth of the people as it might be expected to do in contributing to the support of the Bible cause. Doubtless this may be in some measure due to the fact, as suggested in the Report, of the many and urgent appeals for the maintenance and support of benevolent and Christian work of every kind, not only within this city but in every part of the Dominion, which are constantly being made upon the city of Toronto. Numerous, however, as are these claims, I believe that the citizens of this great city would not be one whit behind their fellow-subjects elsewhere in contributing also most liberally of their means to the glorious work of sending forth the Word of Life to perishing souls if only that work and what is required for its support were brought more generally and thoroughly to their attention; and I sincerely trust that the establishment of these Branch Associations will have the effect of bringing a much larger number to our Annual Meeting. I mention this subject more particularly, and am perhaps in some measure anticipating the resolution, because I feel very strongly about it, and I would like to express my very earnest hope that all of you, my friends, who are present here this evening will give your hearty assistance to the organization and support of these Branch Associations in your various neighbourhoods, and that thus from many new sources may flow fresh life and vigour and an increasingly generous support toward the common cause.

The work of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for which it appeals to the liberality of all who love and value God's Holy Word, is, as you all know, first the sending forth of that Word to all who are destitute of it within what I may term the *home field*, and that is a very wide one, including as it does not only very nearly the whole of this great Province of Ontario, but stretching away across Manitoba and the prairies of the great North-West, to British Columbia and the shores of the Pacific. In Ontario we have six faithful colporteurs at work in the distribution of the Scriptures, and for four months during the past year we had the services of a gentleman (formerly an agent of the British and Foreign Bible Society, in China), in the work of visiting the settlers and distributing the Scriptures in the North-West Territory and British Columbia. I am sure that it will be a matter of rejoicing to all friends of the Bible to know that both in Manitoba and British Columbia strong and vigorous branches of this Society have already taken sound root, and are all bearing good fruit.

The annual meeting of the Winnipeg Branch took place a short time ago, and liberal remittances have been received from there both for the purchase of the Scriptures and as free contributions, and in British Columbia there are no less than nine branches and depositories, the principal ones being at New Westminster and Victoria, and I may quote here a paragraph from the report which I am sure will be heard with interest, "That the officers of the branch at Victoria are taking a special interest in the work among the Chinese, and have imported a quantity of the Scriptures, and portions thereof, in Chinese, direct from Hong Kong, for circulation among the Chinese in Victoria." And here I

cannot but express the strong sense which I entertain of the vast importance of the work in our great North-West. When we recall what we have read and know of the early settlements, in many new territories on this continent, outside of our own borders, the lawlessness and irreligion which at first prevailed, I think we cannot be sufficiently thankful to Almighty God that in our own country, to some extent at all events, the Bible has gone in with the settler; that the emigrant to those wide territories of our North-West has not been left wholly destitute of God's Word and the ministrations of religion, and although we could earnestly wish that the labours of the missionary and the colporteur could by the increase of their number be far more widely extended, yet I am persuaded that, even limited as they still are, they have by God's blessing contributed, and are contributing, very largely to the peace and order of these new communities.

I think, then, that the work in that part of our own field appeals most strongly to the sympathies of every lover of his country.

We must remember, too, that not only our countrymen and those speaking the English tongue are seeking homes in that wide territory, but many Old World nationalities are flocking in also; and I observe among the issues from our Depository during the past year have been copies of the Scriptures, doubtless to meet the wants of some of these, in Icelandic, Danish, Finnish and Norwegian, besides other European languages.

Nor must we forget what we owe to the races that once held undisputed possession of those wide regions—the Indian tribes of the North-West. Slowly, very slowly it may be, but we may hope steadily and surely they are yielding to the influences of religion and civilization, and as their children more especially are by degrees being educated, they will be able to study for themselves the pages of God's Word if only it is placed within their reach.

While mindful of the claims of the western portion of our country the Society has not been forgetful of the important work being carried on by our brethren of the Montreal and Quebec Auxiliaries in that portion of the Dominion where, to many of our fellow-subjects, the Bible has been more or less a sealed book, and our Report will show that our Branches have contributed liberally to assist in the work of both these Auxiliaries.

To pass now from the home field. It has ever been felt by the members of the Upper Canada Bible Society that one of our greatest and most precious privileges is to bear our share in contributing to the world-wide work of our great Parent Society; that while we are duly mindful of the claims of those nearer home we desire also to take our part in the glorious work of sending forth the Gospel to all the world. This year the Report shows that the contributions to the Parent Society have been, on purchase account, \$11,983, and free contributions, \$5,583, being a total sent to the British and Foreign Bible Society of \$17,566. I shall not venture, however, on this occasion, as I have generally done at our Annual Meetings, to touch, however briefly, upon the deeply interesting details of the grand work of this Society as they come to us in its Annual Report, and for this reason, that we have with us on this platform an honoured visitor and

distinguished representative of the Parent Society, whose presence among us we all hail with the utmost pleasure, and satisfaction, and from whose lips we expect to hear in the course of the evening such an account of the glorious work of the Society as his long connection with it as Honorary Home Secretary must enable him above all others to give to us. I shall not therefore detain you further, but shall conclude with expressing my earnest hope that this meeting may, by God's blessing upon the words which shall be spoken to us to-night, be largely instrumental in stirring up in all our hearts fresh love and zeal for the Bible cause, and that we may leave this meeting this evening each of us determined that as God shall give us the means and the opportunity we will endeavour to do more than we have ever yet done in assisting to send forth the Word of His Truth, the Gospel of His Salvation, into all the world, and so hasten that glorious time when they shall no longer "teach every man his brother, saying, Know the Lord, for all shall know Him from the least to the greatest."

The Chairman, having called upon Warring Kennedy, Esq., to move the first resolution, resumed his seat, and MR. KENNEDY addressed the meeting as follows:—

Mr. President, the task assigned me is a very easy one. The Report has been printed and will be found in the pews. The programme of our meeting is also printed and contains the names of the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year. I would move, sir, that these two documents be taken as read; and, further, that the Report as printed and distributed be adopted, and "that the following gentlemen be Officers and Directors for the ensuing year." Their names you will find on the programme. I have been cautioned, Mr. President, not to make a speech. In fact, I have been commanded simply to move the resolution, and do no more, which I do with great pleasure.

The motion was seconded by the REV. J. BURTON, M.A., B.D., who said:—

Mr. President and Christian friends, I shall not fall into the error of the Secretary of the Society in New York, who last week spent three-quarters of an hour at the beginning of the meeting in reading a printed Report. You will permit me, however, to take the opportunity, in seconding this resolution, of discharging a duty which was there laid upon me. It was my privilege last week on behalf of this Society to attend the seventy-fifth anniversary of the American Bible Society, and at one of their committee meetings they asked me to convey to their Canadian friends their warm thanks for having sent a representative, and their hearty congratulations upon the work that we are doing. There was also this expression made use of, that though our friends in politics did not permit us to have reciprocity in commercial matters we still had full reciprocity in Gospel work and Bible distribution.

There is one matter in connection with the Report which would have been referred to had the papers been here in time, and you will permit me just to take up one minute in asking attention thereunto. I know that comparisons are sometimes odious, but I do feel that something of the spirit of our American friends, who think that America is first in everything, should obtain with us in Canada as well as in the other parts of the world under the British flag. We

have a Bible Society which does not represent quite 65,000,000 of people. Will you permit me to read one or two statements? In the seventy-fifth year of the American Bible Society there was distributed, according to the Report, of Bibles Testaments and portions, in round numbers, one million and a-half. I received this afternoon the Report of the British and Foreign Bible Society meeting, showing that last year Bibles, Testaments and portions were circulated by our Society to the extent, within a very few, of four millions, which is slightly in excess of the million and a-half. I do not say this by way of boasting, but I think it is well for us to realize that our friends at home with whom we are connected are not by any means behind in the great work in which we have the honour to be engaged. More than that, acknowledgment was made of this fact, that the contributions from the Canadian Auxiliaries are the largest that have yet been received. In no previous year have they been exceeded. That also is a matter for congratulation; not for us to rest simply and be thankful, but as an incentive towards still greater energy and more active work in the future. One sentence we would quote from the Report, and it is this, that an individual in India unfriendly to Bible colporteurs gave warning that something should be done to stop the work because the Scriptures were destroying more temples than the old Moguls did. And that Report also contains this further information, that the Sultan of Turkey has caused to be distributed, below cost, two volumes of comments upon the Koran. They found it necessary to lower the cost of their scriptures, I suppose, to try and counteract the work of our colporteurs. Just pardon the time I have taken, Mr. President, in making these simple statements, and with them I have much pleasure in seconding the resolution.

The motion was duly put and carried, and after the singing of the hymn

“How precious is the Book Divine,”

the Chairman called upon Walter B. Geikie, Esq., M.D., to move the second resolution.

DR. GEIKIE in moving the resolution said:—Mr. President and Christian friends,—I will begin the little that I have to say by reading the resolution that has been put into my hands. Here it is:—

“That this meeting learns, with much satisfaction, that the Board of Directors has decided to enlarge the scope of the Society's operations in and around the city of Toronto, by forming branches wherever they may be likely to be useful in stimulating the great work which the Society has in hand; and expresses the fervent hope that great success may follow this step, and that it may be adopted in other centres of population and receive every encouragement from those who prize the Word of God.”

This resolution, that has been placed in my hands, bears upon a new scheme that has just been decided upon. I have a little report in my hand in connection with that scheme, but I am not going to read what it says. The scheme is just this: That the city is in a fashion to be split up into districts by the Board, and here and there, as the Board of Directors may deem it most wise, Branch Societies are to be formed. We intend to look out for some six or eight or a dozen

men, not taking them promiscuously in these districts, but with care and judgment, selecting the very best, the most earnest Christian men that we can get, representing the different sections of the Christian church, and I was going to say to ordain them, most certainly to solemnly set them apart, and tell them they are to see to the sacred work of making this Society's territory greater and greater than ever, to increase our resources and enlarge our field of action. We intend too to hold our meetings, and, at these meetings, we shall endeavour to interest, of course, all who are present, and in this movement we are depending upon certain things for our success—upon one thing in particular—and if I were to tell you that we depend upon this meeting for our success I am quite sure that I should not be going astray. Unless you, here, before whom this scheme is now laid, carry that scheme upon your hearts to the very throne of God Himself, unless some of you, acquainted as you are with the various districts in which we purpose forming the Branches and holding the meetings, unless you ask for the outpouring of God's Holy Spirit upon our new departure, it will fail of results; but if on the other hand you say, each one, "I rejoice to think that the Board has determined to do this in order to increase the general interest in the Society's work," and will work for us and pray for us, and speak to your friends here, there and everywhere, and come personally and help us to increase the interest in this grand old Bible Society, if you do you will be astonished at the results. I can fancy some saying: What need have we to take such an interest in the Bible Society? Are not testaments to be had for a penny, and Bibles for sixpence? Yes, thank God, they are, and we have more Bibles than we use as we should, to our shame be it spoken. Let us use them better. But it is not for ourselves, the very essence of Christianity is unselfishness, and we must go beyond ourselves. This meeting must interest itself in these meetings, that we are about to hold, and in these branches that we are about to form, And these branches, again, must interest themselves in their own district, yes, and over the entire world, because upon you and upon every one of the Directors of this Bible Society an enormous amount of responsibility lies. God looks, I believe, to each one of us, to each Christian, just as though each Christian were the only one in the universe to whom the Word of God had come, and says to us, to you: I look to you to do your utmost towards the distribution of My Word to all the races of mankind. Let us feel this, let us remember this, let us love this, let us pray this and let us work this, and I tell you what it is, it will not be the Metropolitan Church that presents a comparatively scanty audience when the annual meeting of the Bible Society is held, but every one will bring his friends. Come to the meeting of the great and grand Society, and let us hear the things that God is doing—not for myself—but what he is doing for others, for the souls of men, and women, and children all over the great world. That is the spirit in which we should try to take up this work. We should not go at it merely as something new, as a ploughman turns over a new furrow, but we should go at it trusting in God's blessing, and in order to do the people to whom we would send God's Word good, and to do ourselves good, because none can work for God, and for the good of God's creatures, without himself being very much blessed in what he does.

And then, the next clause of the Report is to the effect that we are going to ask the branches which we may establish to appoint lady collectors, who will collect in aid of the funds of the Society. Now, it is not a mere moneymaking business this, though we do need money. I am very sorry that I am forced to say that \$1,000 represents all that is collected for this grand Society in Toronto. But that is merely because the field has not been worked as it should be, that is all, and because the machinery that sufficed admirably for the little Toronto of old is altogether inadequate for the big Toronto of to-day, and for this reason we are endeavouring to provide a better organization, and in connection with that these Christian ladies are to be asked to act as collectors. They are not to be asked simply because they happen to be ladies, but because they have the love of God in their heart. For my part I shall make it my business to say to those who go to each locality, whatever you do get consecrated collectors who will go from their knees to the work of collection for this Society, because the money is for no mean purpose—it is to take God's Word to those who do not know it and who are longing for it with a longing we know nothing about; with a longing something like that of which Stanley speaks when he and his large body of men were starving in their dreadful journey through that almost interminable forest. Yes, there are thousands, tens of thousands, who have never seen the Bible. There are thousands of people sitting in darkness to-night who would give just anything they have got simply to be able to read a few verses of that blessed Book in their own tongue. Well, it is being sent out to them, and it is to help to satisfy their longing that we are going to set to work to do at any rate what we can to increase the resources of the Society in this direction, and may God bless us in our new departure.

Well, now, there is another clause—and that other clause is a recommendation that a Bible Society Sunday be appointed or set apart in each year in which the minister of each congregation within and around the city shall be asked to preach on the subject of the Bible Society and the Bible Society's work throughout the world, and to press as earnestly as possible the claims of the Bible Society on their respective congregations. We owe much to the pulpit, but I tell you we do not owe one-thousandth part as much to the pulpit as the pulpit owes to this grand old book, and it is the least, sir, that can be done by God's servants, by God's ambassadors, specially to open their mouths, and give their influence and the influence of the pulpit to aid it. They want to be imbued with special power, gotten in answer to earnest prayer for the Holy Spirit to open their mouths in earnest fervour in that—I was going to say—the grandest of all causes, the distribution, in most cases almost without money and without price, of God's Holy Word.

Christian people, even those who are clergymen, require to be galvanized, if I may use that expression, in this matter; indeed, we all need to be galvanized, as it were. If not, sir, the mildew will spread over our hearts more or less, and I read to-day in a short extract from a splendid address delivered by the Chairman of one of the Congregational Unions in England, where he spoke of this, saying that there was a sort of deadness creeping over Christians,

a forgetfulness that there was such a thing as sin, or any such thing as a need that must be felt for salvation. Well, I tell you what it is, my friends, if we do not take care of it, this mildew will creep over us. Has it not crept over some of us already, and do we to-night, do we all over this city realize as we should that our own hearts are deceitful above all things, and that we require a Saviour, and that that Saviour is so precious to ourselves that we will do anything and everything we can to make Him equally as precious to those over whom we may have any influence. I hope everyone here will stand by the Board of Directors in this suggestion to get a Bible Sunday in which, not the advocacy of the securing of so much money, but the glory of the Word of God may be spoken of again and again to the people, so that many, perhaps, in whose houses it is but an ornament will go home and read it and clasp it to their bosom and wonder how they could possibly have neglected such a treasure so long.

Well now, the last clause of the Report is that we are going to wait, some of us, on the Ministerial Association, and ask them to second our efforts. We want the ministers to go to work with us. We want them to be the very vanguard in this movement, or amongst those who are the vanguard, and we want always to feel that we have a "God speed you" from every servant of God; and under no circumstances can we have anyone who calls himself a servant of Christ, ordained to be such,—under no circumstances can such an one turn the cold shoulder to Bible Society work or give a sort of shrinking support to it. Oh, my friends, time is short, in a little while the place that knows you and me, and everyone here, shall know us no longer, and I tell you what it will be that will please us most,—what will please us solely, in the end, will be what we have done for God and for the Bible, and what will please us least will be that when we had the opportunity we let it slip past; when we had the invitation to come forward and assist in the distribution of God's Word, and in promoting the glory of God's name, we, because perhaps we did not care much for this one who was at the work, or looked askance at that one,—we allowed the opportunity to slip past, and there we are standing before God, with it justly laid to our charge that what He looked for from us, what He had a right to look for from us, were duties that we did not discharge, and alone, all alone shall we stand in comparison with the position that we might have occupied were it otherwise. Not that our holiness or the reverse will be accounted as merit in us; our righteousnesses, at the best, are as filthy rags, and then we must one and all stand only in the righteousness of Christ. But, then, how delightful the thought that when that day comes, we shall stand before the Great White Throne, conscious that while we were treading the short pathway of life we tried, not in our own strength but in God's, to do our duty, and that our most earnest prayer was, as I trust it is, that every creature the world over may crown the Lord Jesus Christ, the Author of that grand old Book, as Lord of Lords. I have much pleasure in moving the resolution

The REV. HUGH JOHNSTON, D.D., in seconding the resolution, said :—

Mr. President, in seconding this motion I shall ask the privilege of detaining you only for a moment. The time of this evening belongs to the distinguished

representative of the British and Foreign Bible Society who is with us, but I just wish to add a word to what has been so earnestly placed before you by the mover of the resolution.

Toronto has had a greed of growth, but our Society has not kept pace with this progress. We have had as efficient Presidents, officers, staff, and Board of Directors as could be found in any organization, but in looking after the working of the whole Province, we have let other cities outstrip us, and Toronto does not hold to-night the pre-eminent place in Bible Society work which she holds in missionary and benevolent effort. Now, if the Society can enlarge the scope of its operations, if we can establish wide-awake, live branches throughout the city, and have a Bible Sunday with our hundred pulpits emphasizing the value of this mission of the book, if we can bring our hundred churches into vital sympathy with this Society which claims above all others the sympathy and co-operation of all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth, if we can have half a dozen or more annual meetings, meetings larger and more important than this, then Toronto will take her proper place; and just as the Bible stands among other literature, alone, the Book of Books, so this Society which has for its sole object the publication and dissemination of the Word of God will stand, the Society of societies, in the hearts, prayers and giving of the people of Toronto. I have great pleasure in seconding the motion.

The motion having been carried, and the collection taken up,

THE CHAIRMAN said: I have now the very great pleasure of introducing to this audience the Rev. Thomas Aston-Binns, Honorary Home Secretary British and Foreign Bible Society, whom we most gladly welcome here this evening, coming to us as he does with kindly greetings from our great Parent Society; and I am sure he will receive such a reception at your hands as will make him feel that he is at home in Canada, and that among the many ties which bind us to the dear old land there is none stronger than the love of that Book which has ever been the true secret of England's greatness and which we trust will ever be found to be cherished and loved by those of her descendants in our own land.

THE REV. THOMAS ASTON-BINNS then advanced to address the meeting, and was accorded a most flattering reception. He said:

Mr. President, and ladies and gentlemen—shall I say Christian friends—that comes a little closer—someone who preceded me said that he had been ordered not to speak, and he obeyed the order. I am afraid I have been ordered to speak, and only hope I shall not too fully for your patience obey the order. The first thing I have to say is this, that you are to be congratulated over the Parent Society that you have your President in the Chair to-night. We learn to-day, from London, that our beloved and honored President, Lord Harrowby—and I would like to say to you that the Hon. the Earl of Harrowby is no mere ornamental figure-head to the British and Foreign Bible Society, but a very earnest, devoted and hard-working President—was unable to take the chair at Exeter Hall on the 6th ult., because he was laid down by an attack of that dreadful influenza that has been doing so much mischief amongst us.

I owe the pleasure of being with you to-night very largely to the fact that our American brethren were kind enough to write to our Committee six months ago, or more, asking that a representative from London should attend their seventy-fifth anniversary (held in New York last week), and after a little consideration the Committee decided to comply with their request, and asked me to become their representative at that meeting. On thinking the matter over it occurred to me that the occasion would afford a favourable opportunity for cultivating a closer acquaintance with our friends here in Canada. The moment I suggested it to the Committee the idea was warmly taken up and they were exceedingly glad that after visiting New York and Philadelphia I should go on and visit our valued auxiliaries here in Canada; that is how it comes to pass that I have the pleasure of being with you to-night, and I bring with me most cordial greetings from London. At a Committee meeting held a very short time before I left London, on the 22nd April, this Resolution was passed:—

“British and Foreign Bible Society, Queen Victoria Street, London, April 20th, 1891.

“At a meeting of Committee held this day, W. Schoolcroft Burton, Esq., in the chair, it was resolved—That the Committee rejoices in the opportunity afforded by the visit of the Rev. T. Aston-Binns, the Honorary Home Secretary, to send their hearty greetings to the great Auxiliaries in Canada, to which they are indebted for most welcome contributions and for valuable co-operation in the circulation of the Holy Scriptures. The Committee pray that the Divine blessing may yet more abundantly rest on the operations of all their fellow-labourers in the Dominion.”

I bring you that message of most cordial greeting to-night with the very greatest personal pleasure. Now, I am in a little difficulty and yet not exactly in a difficulty. I do not want to make any mistake or to be misunderstood. No one could have received me more kindly, more warmly, or in a more brotherly fashion than our friends in the States. The greeting they gave me there was far more than I expected, far more than I personally deserved, but I got it of course because I came as a representative of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Now, I come to you, and I must say that in some respects one feels just the least bit more at home after crossing into Canada. In the States they are our brethren and very warm friends doing the work of their own Bible Society, but you are part of ourselves, our own auxiliary, and there is nothing to which I am more accustomed and in which I more rejoice than in visiting our auxiliaries at home in England, thanking them for what they do and encouraging them in their work. I feel just absolutely at home amongst you here to-night, and it is very delightful to think that we in England, they in America and you in Canada are bound together as it were in one three-fold chord, a triple-alliance in the good work of distributing the scriptures throughout the world, and whatever little differences there may be, whatever differences of feeling, sentiment, or opinion, the Bible and this Bible work bind together these three great countries in indissoluble union, and we ought to be determined that whatever happens we will always be friends, because we all believe in this Book, because God has

given us this Book to use and to distribute, and because it would be a disgrace to us and dishonour God and His Book if ever we were to fall out in regard to other matters.

Now, what shall I say to you? My difficulty in speaking to-night—as my difficulty in speaking at home—is to decide what to select out of the vast mass of interesting matter that lies spread out before one's mental gaze. At the Bible House we hold all the strings of the work throughout the world, and, though the Home Department is my special care, I am brought more or less into contact with the rest of the work and to a very considerable extent have knowledge of what is going on.

But, in the first place, I want to say just two or three words suggested by the last Resolution and last address. You are on the right track in what you are doing in forming branch associations in your great city of Toronto, and if you will allow me I will take care when I get back to England (or it may be sooner) that there shall be sent to you details of a plan which we have recently thought out in our Home Organization Committee for the organization of large towns. The large towns are by no means our strongholds; they are not so well worked as they ought to be. I have been in Birmingham lately, trying to stir up the friends there, also in Manchester and other great cities, and I find the reason why these great places do not do so much as they should (and why Toronto does not do so much as she should) is because they are not systematically worked. Possibly our paper of suggestions, though prepared for our own use in England, may not be altogether useless to your Board of Management here.

Then there is that other important thing—the Bible Sunday. Well, Mr. President, that is exactly what we are trying to get in England, wherever it is possible. It does seem to me a most extraordinary thing that all sorts of Christian objects (and some not distinctively Christian) are brought into our pulpits, and yet there are some congregations in which a Bible Society sermon is never preached, from year to year; numbers of clergymen who do not sufficiently understand the work of the Bible Society to be able in their pulpits to take it up and in an interesting fashion explain it to their people. We should press this matter home, and if you do so you will very soon see a great change in the aspect of things in Toronto. Is it ungracious in me to say that I was a little astonished when I heard that here, in Toronto itself, you only raise one thousand dollars for the purposes of your Society? I live in a little town twenty miles out of London—its population is certainly less than ten thousand people—I am not going to say it is not rather a wealthy little town—I think we have got more than the average share of the good things of life in that town, but when I went to live there about eight or nine years ago and first attended the meeting of the local Bible Society we had possibly fifty people in a good sized hall. I think our collection was something less than three pounds that night. What would that be?—\$15; I think that is right, although I have not yet become accustomed to your money. And we were sending up—or rather they were sending up (I am not going to take any responsibility for what they then did), they were sending up fifty pounds a year to the British and Foreign Bible Society. If you

compare that with your two hundred thousand in Toronto, who contribute one thousand dollars, that was not so bad. We had our last local meeting a short time ago. I am somewhat proud of our auxiliary now; there were at least half as many more people present at that meeting than are here in this church to-night; the meeting was presided over by my friend, George Williams, Esq., founder and President of the Y. M. C. A., whose name is known to nearly every young man in England and far beyond. And I will say that the annual meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association should not be held on the same night as the Annual Meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society; Mr. Williams would have taken care of that. Our free contribution from Reigate (I don't mind letting you know the name of the town) to the British and Foreign Bible Society is close upon two hundred pounds this year—that is to say, it is close upon one thousand dollars, and if we add to it our purchase account, it comes up over one thousand dollars. Now, for a little town like Reigate, that is very satisfactory. And we have no big subscribers, one who gives five pounds, none more I believe; it shows what may be done where a field is thoroughly worked—and our place is thoroughly worked—it is worked by the ladies. Some one said to-night, that in your scheme for local organization ladies were not to be asked to help, simply because they were ladies. They ought to be asked just because they are ladies. At home we should be nowhere without the ladies; they do the greater part of the work of the Bible Society. At Reigate we have a good staff—about fifteen—who meet regularly in committee, and once each year I meet them, at the beginning of the year, to talk over their work with them and encourage them in what they are doing; all over our country one great source of the strength of the Bible Society lies in the devotion, in the earnest, persevering, systematic effort of our lady friends; the Bible Society would be nowhere without the ladies. Whilst I am speaking about the ladies I am reminded of something I heard when a youth (I am sorry to say a great many years ago now): Rev. Dr. Binney, a great man of that day, was giving a lecture on the life of Sir Fowell Buxton. He was a powerful orator and used to say very original things, and I remember on that occasion Dr. Binney said, "People say the boy is father of the man, but I say the *mother is the father of the boy*," and I am quite certain of this, that the ladies are some of the best business men amongst us.

You want to hear a little about the work of our Society during the past year. You send us the funds and we thank you very earnestly for the acceptable contributions you have been sending us from year to year, and if you organize your city of Toronto and the other towns and villages in the auxiliary territory that belongs to you, you will very soon be able to send a much larger amount to London, and for that we shall be very thankful; gratitude, as Dean Swift says, is a lively expectation of favours to come; I bring that gratitude for the future as well as for the past.

What have we been doing during the past twelve months? We also have taken a new departure. We found our home income was going back and began to inquire into the causes of the decrease, and are trying to remove them, and

one thing which we are doing is to improve our literature. I am very glad indeed to find from your earnest and devoted Secretary, Mr. Harvie, that you appreciate our efforts in this direction. In a paper I had the honour of reading some time ago about auxiliaries I said an auxiliary was very much what the Secretary made it, and my own impression is you have got a first-rate Secretary. Though it is only some twenty-four hours since I first had the pleasure of meeting him, I think you have got the right man in the right place. Be thankful for him and make much of him, lest we send over to Toronto and ask him to come to England and do some work for us there. The Secretary has a great deal to do with the work of an auxiliary. We have been endeavouring to work up our auxiliaries. We have been improving the literature. I find you have a considerable circulation of our *Monthly Reporter* and *Gleanings*; we shall be glad to send you the largest number of which you can make profitable use. We believe it is a very good thing to give information as to the work the Society is doing. It is perfectly wonderful how many very intelligent people know nothing about the details of our work, even in this city, where you are so much more clever than we are in England; it is quite likely that there are a number of people who are not adequately informed as to the work of our Society. Take care that they are informed, give them particulars of what you are doing and circulate freely among them this attractive *Monthly Reporter*. We want our people also to understand the relation of the Bible Society to Missionary work; if they understood that better they would support Bible Society work much more heartily. What are our relations to the Missionary Societies? A witty friend of mine in England sometimes relates (perhaps you have not read it yet in Kings or Chronicles, but I have my friend's authority for it) that when Solomon's temple was being built, the royal builder went around and talked to the workmen. He went to the mason and said, "Who makes your tools?" The mason said, "Please, your majesty, the blacksmith makes my tools." Solomon asked the same question of the bricklayer, the stonecutter, the carpenter, the carver and the other workmen; it was always the same answer, "The blacksmith makes my tools." At last the king came to the blacksmith and put the same question to him; the sturdy smith answered, "Please, your majesty, I make them myself." That is the condition of things with the various Missionary Societies doing their work in different parts of the world. They are doing their work, but we of the Bible Society make their tools, and they could not get on without us. I do not know exactly what your missionary arrangements are here in Canada, but in connection with the Church of England in the Old Country we have two great Missionary Societies—the "Society for the Propagation of the Gospel," and the "Church Missionary Society." The Church Missionary Society wants the Scriptures in sixty languages, and for every one comes to us; the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel wants the Scriptures in thirty-five languages (its missionary work is not so extended as that of the C. M. S.), and for twenty-five out of those thirty-five it has to come to us. The London Missionary Society comes to us for all its Scriptures; there is also the great Wesleyan Society—the Methodist Missionary Society, I think you call it here; they come to us for all

their Scriptures, as generally do the others. Where would all these societies be if they were not able to come to us and get their books on most liberal terms, that is, on terms which practically cost them nothing. And when earnest-minded men, who may have held aloof from the Bible Society, come to be aware of these facts, they usually become our warm supporters. The Rev. Dr. Mitchinson, who speaks of himself as a High Churchman, when he went out to his Diocese in Barbadoes was not a friend of the British and Foreign Bible Society. But out there he began to discover what the Bible Society was doing for the needs of his Diocese, and how much he had to depend upon the Society to meet them, and how generously it treated him, and now Bishop Mitchinson is one of our warmest friends; he will go any where, and take any pains in order to serve the Bible Society. Recently he went to Oxford, and addressed a very important meeting—Heads of Houses, Dons, and leading people—upon the British and Foreign Bible Society, giving them a number of reasons why Churchmen of all sorts and schools should support the work of the Society. After showing the indebtedness of the Missions of the Church to the British and Foreign Bible Society, he wound up in one sentence by saying, "But for the Bible Society, the Missions of the Church must simply collapse." If anyone who cares for Missions knows and recognizes that, he will surely do all he can to further our work; it surprises me very much that people interested in Christian missions, clergymen who preach for Missions and would think themselves almost heathens if they did not have Missionary sermons regularly every year; people who put their hands liberally into their pockets in support of Christian Missions, will give perhaps not a tenth part as much to the Bible Society, although the Society is such an indispensable helper to missionary effort. A distinguished Bishop, the Bishop of Winchester, said, "I look upon the British and Foreign Bible Society as the grandest Missionary institution in the world." What other institution is there at this moment that has one thousand missionaries in its service? We have seven hundred colporteurs, missionaries of the Book, employed in every country in Europe, in India, China, Japan, Malaysia, and the Islands of the sea; employed, some of them, in your own Canadian territory, in your Dominion, in North and South America; seven hundred of these men, all Missionaries of the Book, not preaching missionaries, but distributing missionaries and reading missionaries. They go about to sell and read the Scriptures, and to converse with those with whom they come in contact; and then there are three hundred native women in the East, employed by the British and Foreign Bible Society in connection with the various Missionary Societies, for we know no distinction of sect or denomination. We have three hundred of these Christian women reading the Scriptures to fifteen thousand of their country-women every week; three hundred women reading the Scriptures every week to fifteen thousand native women, and teaching hundreds of these women to read the Scriptures in their own tongue. I suppose there is no more acute mind amongst us than Dr. Westcott, the Bishop of Durham. Speaking at Cambridge, twelve months ago, he said, "I think you are doing nothing of such importance as reaching the native mind in India, China, Ceylon, etc., through the agency of these Biblewomen who go about influencing the minds of their countrywomen."

Let me say a word too about India. The Bishop of London, at a great meeting at the Mansion House lately, said: "You are educating the conscience of the world through your circulation of the Scriptures." Educating the conscience of the world! The Rector of a church in Oxford, who has spent a long time in India, and has lately returned, said, that just before leaving the city of Bombay he was present on two occasions when a highly educated man occupying the position of a judge in Her Majesty's service, but not professing himself a Christian, addressed two large audiences on moral and religious subjects, and the first of his addresses was based upon the words in the Gospel, "Repent ye, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand." The second, on I. Corinthians, xiii. And in that second address he contrasted the comparative failure of modern religious reformers in India, with the success that attended the ministry of St. Paul and the Apostles, and he said the reason of the failure in the one case and of the success in the other was to be found in the fact that St. Paul and his fellow-workers had the life, teaching, and character of Jesus Christ as the chief weapons of their warfare; the religious reformers of India did not possess these, and, said he "if we are to succeed as they did, we must use their weapons and adopt their methods." The secretary of the Baptist Missionary Society, a very energetic and able man, visited India some ten years ago, and has lately been there a second time, and he has told us of the remarkable contrast between the condition of things ten years ago, and the condition of things on the occasion of his recent visit. He said, when he went to India ten years ago he attempted to distribute copies of the Gospel among the people where he went. They were constantly rejected with scorn, torn up, spat upon, trodden under foot. Now, he said, he did exactly the same work, and in no single instance did he meet with a reception of that kind. He knew of cases of colporteurs attending great religious festivals who would sell in the course of a few days as many as five thousand copies of the Gospel in the native languages. He said, when you get into a railway carriage, if you happen to sit by the side of a young Indian gentleman, an educated man, he is not only ready, but eager to talk about the character of Jesus Christ, and if there is anything exciting the mind of India at the present time it is the subject of Jesus Christ, interest in His character, what He was, and did, and taught. Now, this is wonderful testimony, and this, to a very large extent, is the work of the Bible Society in disseminating far and wide thousands and tens of thousands of copies of God's Word in whole or part. We were delighted three years ago to find that the issues from our depot in Calcutta amounted to nearly 1,000 copies weekly—50,000 in the course of the year—and these nearly all sold; but last year that circulation doubled; now we are circulating 100,000 copies from that single depot in Calcutta, and by means of colporteurs in the immediate neighbourhood of that great city. Truly we are educating the conscience of the people in those far off lands.

I might speak about Malaysia; during the last few years, we have established an agency in Singapore, sending out an earnest and able man, who, when he began the work, was almost the only evangelistic agent amidst a population of nearly 40,000,000 Malays. Our friend Mr. Haffenden says they receive him as a

brother ; he has learned to speak their language perfectly. He can move amongst them with absolute safety, he came home to London three years ago and gave us a report in Committee of the work he had been doing. The Chairman said, Mr. Haffenden, you have been telling us what you have been doing for us, now tell us what you want us to do for you? "Everything" he replied. "I want you to do everything for me, I want you to give me men, I want you to give me money, I want you to give me books, I want you to give me presses, and," he said, "the work that I can do in Malaysia is only bounded by the means you place at my disposal." The world is wide open before us. Almost everywhere we are welcome. We only want the means to go and the men to go in connection with the work.

Someone said to me before I came on the platform to-night, that he had been in the Russian Empire, and wanted to know how the work was going on in Russia. There is no country in the world that takes so many Scriptures from us as does the great Russian empire. It would be a long story to tell you how the Bible Society became established in Russia. Last year we circulated in the Russian empire not far short of half a million copies of the Holy Scriptures. The Russian government has perfect confidence in us, that we will not interfere in any political or ecclesiastical matters. We go there simply to do our work which is the circulation of God's Word without note or comment, and I may say for your information, and for the information of the friend who spoke to me just now, that a few years ago we sent a deputation to Russia to visit the principal centres and points at which we were working ; that deputation on their return recommended the Committee to publish a new, cheaper, and more portable edition of the New Testament in the Russian language. In a short time what we call the "People's Edition of the New Testament" was brought out. It costs the Society a shilling, and we sell it to the poor peasants in Russia for sixpence. The first edition was 50,000 copies. That was gone as soon as issued. Then 100,000 copies, and now we are selling the sixth hundred thousand of this People's Edition of the New Testament in the Russian language.

One other thing, I am quite sure, you will be delighted to hear. I see in the Abstract of our Report, which has only reached my hands to-day, mention of the work of Dr. Baedeker, in Russia. He is a German gentleman living in England who knows Russia well and speaks the language ; the condition of the prisoners in the Russian prisons seemed to be laid upon his heart, but he thought it would be impossible to gain access to them. It happened in God's wonderful providence that he was introduced to the wife of the Chief Director of the Prisons of the Russian Empire, and by her to that gentleman himself, and he began to tell him of what he had been thinking. The Director said, what is it you want? He said, I would like to visit the prisons throughout the Empire, to be allowed to converse with the prisoners and distribute amongst them copies of the Scriptures. "Is that all you want, then there need be no difficulty about that. I will give you an order to visit all the prisons throughout the Empire." And so the order was made out, put into his hands, and Dr. Baedeker last year, armed by us with suitable Scriptures, went through nearly all the prisons in the Russian

Empire, was allowed perfectly free access to these poor prisoners and distributed amongst them 5,000 copies of the Scriptures. Not all Bibles, but Testaments and portions. And he went this year to Siberia, and visited the greater portion of the prisons in Siberia and the convict settlements, being received with open arms; and one of the last things that happened before I left London was an intensely interesting report he gave us in Committee of the work he had been doing in Siberia.

And then, dear friends in Toronto, remember this is *your* work; it is yours just as much as it is ours. You have sent us \$17,000 towards it and I think we have made good use of your money. I have given you a good account, I think, of what we have done with those dollars. Send us as much more as you can, and you may depend upon it we will make an equally good use of the money and give you a faithful account of every dollar that you send us.

Would you like to hear a little about one or two other Continental countries? There is that lovely country of Italy. We had a valued agent in Italy, a dear old Scotchman. Some years ago God took him home to his rest; he has been succeeded by a Waldensian pastor, a friend of mine living in Florence. He took up our work there at a circulation of 40,000 copies in the year. That was pretty well for a country like Italy. But he wrote my daughter a private letter the other day in which he said "Your father will be very glad to know that our circulation this year is the largest we have had in Italy. It has reached up to 153,000 copies." Is not that magnificent work, under the very shadow of the Vatican. There has been a great deal done in Rome. Some of you know Rome, I have no doubt. When you are there again, go and visit the Bible Society depot and see what is being done. In Florence, I have often gazed at the tower of the Palazzo Vecchio in the centre of the city, and remembered Savonarola—I think I am not mistaken that a Canadian author has just published a Life of Savonarola—and I never looked at that tower without remembering how Savonarola, after being cruelly racked and tortured, was dragged up to the top of it in order that no attempt at rescue might succeed, and next morning was burned at the stake at the foot of that tower; and now, within a stone's throw of that spot, we have a Bible stall where Bibles and Testaments are being sold freely to the Contadini, the country-people that come into the city. We have as handsome a shop almost as any you have in Toronto, devoted to the sale of the Scriptures, in the very centre of that city. Throughout the whole of that country there is now no difficulty in selling the Bible; the priests of course oppose, but the Government guarantees perfect civil and religious liberty. A year or two ago in the Italian Parliament some one was foolish enough to stand up and complain of this freedom, when Signor Bonghi, well known as a statesman and an author, a man who the Speaker of our House of Commons told me is one of the ablest men in Italy, and a personal friend of his own, rose and delivered an address impromptu, in which he spoke about the reading of the Bible as being the greatest thing for any country, for the advancement of civilization, for morals, for education, for everything that makes a country great, noble and strong, and he was applauded to the echo. Signor Meille—that is the name of

our friend in Italy—says there is no book in the Italian language at the present time which is so largely bought and he believes so largely read as the Word of God.

Coming through France not very long ago I met our agent in Paris, our distinguished and able agent, M. Gustave Monod, a nephew of the late Adolphe Monod, the most distinguished of modern Protestant preachers on the Continent. The nephew is a man of the same principles and spirit as his distinguished uncle. He was educated for the law; he gave up the law for the Bible, and we are very fortunate in having him for our agent in France. I met him, and some of his colporteurs at his bureau, and we talked over the work and then we went to see the site of the Exhibition, and towering above the site of the Exhibition there is the great Eiffel Tower. Now, a word about the Eiffel Tower, and something that happened there. Those of you who have travelled in France will know that there is a very popular paper called the *Figaro* which has a very large circulation. It is a very enterprising paper, and during the Exhibition the publishers put up a press in the Eiffel Tower and printed from week to week an Eiffel Tower edition of the *Figaro*. One morning to our surprise and pleasure this Eiffel Tower edition of the *Figaro* came out with an account of the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society in the Exhibition, and mentioned the fact that we circulated the Scriptures in 300 languages. One of those wise gentlemen, who know so much, wrote a letter to the *Figaro* and said, "Mr. Editor, either the Society has been befooling you or you are trying to befool your readers. The idea of any one book being published in 300 languages is absurd, because there are not 300 languages in the world." This gave the editor the opportunity of returning to the charge the following week, which he did by printing in extenso the list of the 300 languages in which we publish the Scriptures. One night when M. Monod was riding home in the dark upon one of the tram cars, he heard the conductor bemoaning his unhappy fate in having to do with so many people who spoke so many different languages. Said he, "I can't understand them, and they don't understand me. One needs to understand all the languages in the world." And the gentleman with whom the conductor was talking said, "Then you would have to know a great many, you would have to know 300 at least." That was got either from our figures posted up in the Exhibition or from the information given in the *Figaro*.

The Eiffel Tower is the highest building in the world, the highest building yet erected on the face of the earth. We have been circulating from year to year during the last four or five years an average of four million copies of Bibles, Testaments and portions. Now, take a single day's issues of the British and Foreign Bible Society and go out into an open space in one of your squares, and taking a broad flagstone for a base, begin to make a pile of the books on that flagstone. Take the big Bibles until you have done with them, and then the next size until you have finished with the Bibles, and then the Testaments, Gospels, and portions, etc., and by the time you have done your day's work you will have built a pile as high as the top of the Eiffel Tower. That is one single day's work, and is not that magnificent work and well worth doing? Another thing about the Paris

Exhibition. Mr. Monod asked permission to make a present of a Bible to every man who had acted as doorkeeper during the period of the Exhibition. Of course we gave him leave, and we shall hear of these Bibles one of these days. There was an Exhibition held in Paris some years ago, I forget the exact date—somewhere in the sixties—and at the close of that Exhibition the same thing was done. Some four or five years afterwards one of our colporteurs was walking through a village in the south of France and saw a poor woman standing at the door of a cottage and weeping bitterly. He asked what was the cause of her trouble and if he could help her. "No one can help me, I am weeping for my husband lying on his death bed and he cannot live many hours longer." The colporteur asked if he might go in and see her husband, and on being taken in began to speak to him as a Bible Society colporteur would naturally speak under such circumstances, about Christ and salvation, the forgiveness of sins and eternal life. "Sir," the dying man said, "thank God, I know all about that. I was one of the doorkeepers at the Exhibition at Paris and all of us men—forty of us—got a present of a book when we came away. I brought mine home and read it, and that book has taught me about those things of which you speak, and now, thank God, I am dying at peace with Him and in my own heart through what that blessed Book has taught me." That is the work of the Bible Society.

Shall I give you another illustration: Some years ago there was a little girl named Annie; her birthday was coming, and her mother asked her what she would like to have for her birthday present. "I would like to have two Bibles," she said. Two Bibles, what for? "I want one for myself, and one to send to the people in India who have no Bibles." Her birthday came, the two Bibles had been obtained, one in English, the other in Hindi, Telugu, or Tamil, to go to India, and after the little girl had received her own present, her mother asked her what she would do with the Indian Bible? "I would like to write a message in it before it goes." And what shall I write? "Put, 'From Annie, a little girl in England who loves the Lord Jesus Christ, to someone in India who, she hopes, will learn to love Him too.'" That was a good many years ago; Annie grew up to be a woman, and wanted to be a missionary. India was laid upon her heart, and to India she went, and after some time there, travelling up the country, she was introduced to a family in which there were ladies, and on entering into conversation they welcomed her as a Christian sister. "How came you to know about the Gospel," she asked? "We have got a Bible. It has taught us everything," they said, and one of the ladies went to another room to fetch the Bible; it was put into Annie's hands, and when she opened it—"From Annie, a little girl in England, who loves the Lord Jesus Christ, to some one in India, who, she hopes, will learn to love Him too." God had heard her prayer and blessed her gift; the Book had found its way to that home and was made the means of the conversion of those people, and she was permitted to go and see the result of her own love and her own prayer when she was a little child. And now Annie has gone from her work to her reward. We are always hearing of these things and how God blesses individual copies of the Bible that have been sent out through our instrumentality.

I must not go on talking any longer, although I could speak all night about the great work, for I have only touched upon a very few points. The whole world is open before us, Christian hands are bearing the light of the Bible into the dark Continent of Africa, and to Arabia, and have shed the light of the Bible far and wide over the isles of the Southern Seas. In India, in China, in Japan, in Turkey, in Persia, all over the Continent of Europe the work is carried on. There is no country closed against us. The same thing may be said of North America, as you know. Also of South America, indeed all over the world; you cannot go to any country of the world, scarcely to any part of the world, where you will not hear of the Bible and the work of the Bible Society. I believe the British and Foreign Bible Society is the greatest missionary institution in existence, and that we are doing more than any other agency to bring on that glad time for which we long and pray and of which we sometimes sing, when

"Kings shall fall down before Him,  
And gold and incense bring,  
All nations shall adore Him,  
His praise all people sing,  
For He shall have dominion,  
O'er river, sea and shore,  
Far as the eagle's pinion  
Or dove's light wing can soar."

The long address was listened to throughout with the most close and sympathetic attention.

The REV. G. H. SANDWELL seconded the resolution, saying:—

Mr. President and Christian friends, I am quite sure you would have listened for another hour to Mr. Aston-Binns, but I am equally sure you would not listen with patience to myself for five minutes, after ten o'clock; and indeed I do not think you ought to do so, for at ten o'clock we ought to be at home, if not indeed in bed. I have very great pleasure in seconding the resolution that Mr. Aston-Binns has moved in so delightful, so instructive and so pithy a speech.

The Chairman put the resolution, which was carried amid applause, and then called upon Mr. N. W. Hoyles to move the fourth resolution.

MR. HOYLES moved, "That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the pastor and trustees of this church for its use on the present occasion, and also to the organist and the choir for their valuable services."

MR. JAMES BROWN seconded the resolution, which was duly put and carried, and the meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the Doxology,

"Praise God from whom all blessings flow,"

the Rev. Dr. Thomas pronouncing the Benediction.
