Plattsburgh, N. Y., Aug. 25—Theo-dore Roosevelt in an address tonight at the military instruction camp here, de-clared that for thirteen months the United States had "played an ignoble part among the nations," in that it had "tamely submitted to seeing the weak, whom we had covenanted to protect, wronged," and "had seen our own men, women and children murdered on the high seas without action on our part." The former president condemned the government for having "not taken the smallest step in the way of preparedness to defend our own rights." Germany, he condemned as "utterly brutal and ruthless in its disregard of international morality" and declared that it "would be a base abandonment of morality" for American manufacturers of munitions of war to refuse to make shipments "for the use of the armies that are striving to restore Belgium to its own people." Munition makers who refused to make such shipments should be put, he said, on a "roll of dishonor."
