It starts out with the ideal of amateurism and then proceeds to allow that ideal to be violated. It boosts amateur sport in one sense and winks an eye at professionalism in

No system built on such an unstable foundation in this country No system built on such an unstable toundation in this country would stand very long. A man is either an amateur or a pro, and it makes no difference whether he takes part in one line of sport or a thousand.

He is either in favor of an ideal or he is not. He may be the greatest athlete in the world and receive a princely salary for one line of sport, but how in the name of common sense could you class him as a real amateur, as the terms are now understood, under such a system as proposed.

IF SUCH AN IDEA were adopted, we would sincerely pity an amateur official. He'd be as busy as a dog trying to tackle two dozen fleas at

the same time.

For example, a man would be an amateur hockey player and a professional baseball player. As a track man he would be a simon pure, but at rugby football, the lure of the greenback would be too strong to resist. As a boxer he would be allowed to compete with the pugilistic gentlemen known as bruisers and continually extend an outstretched and itching palm for services while as a wrestler he could mix with the purebreds to his heart's content. As the genuine amateur article of a track man, he could also be at the same time a perfect example of a box office artist at the speed-skating game. You say this is an exaggerated example. Not a bit of it. They'd all be
