

THE STORAGE BATTERY AS A SOURCE OF FILAMENT CURRENT.





OLD WOMAN GUILTY OF FORGING A WILL

Mother of 14 Children Serves Two Days' Imprisonment.

London, June 29—(By Mail)—Mrs. Elizabeth Hunt, an old-age pensioner, aged 82, and the mother of 14 children, pleaded guilty at the Norwich Assizes to the charge of forging the will of her brother, a wealthy Norfolk farmer.

Counsel for the prosecution, said the woman's brother, Thomas Goose, who died at the age of 87, lived happily for 26 years with his wife, and in 1916 made a will leaving her all his property. In December, 1917, prisoner drew up his will, which she was now charged with having forged.

Under this will nearly all the property would come to the woman and her children. She went to a Norwich solicitor, who drew it up in legal form and sent it to her for signature of her brother and witnesses. It was returned apparently duly signed by Mr. Goose and the witnesses.

Mr. Goose died in January leet and

On being shown it, the prisoner said that there was a later will, the one she had forged.

Mr. Goose's widow, aged 83, protested that it was not the will of her husband and that the signature was not his. Under it the prisoner was given \$10,000, and her relatives \$7,500. In February the woman confessed that she had forged the will, saying "I signed it for my brother as well as myself."

The estate was worth \$85,000, and the prisoner left half for the widow.

The woman was sentenced to two days' imprisonment and ordered to pay the costs of the prosecution.


BIG TUNA, IN FIGHT WITH




