SEVEN DIE IN FIRE IN NEW YORK

Bodies of All Believed to Have Been Burned to Cinders

THE EQUITABLE DISASTER

Vaults Found Unharmed by the Conflagration—Society Officers Say Hundreds of Millions in Securities Will Be Found All Right

(Canadian Press) New York, Jan. 11.—Seven lives are believed to have been lost in a fire which raged through a three-story frame building in Broadway avenue, early today. Those who were in the building at the time of the fire are believed to have perished in the flames, which spread so rapidly through the wooden structure, that the firemen say that none could have escaped save Thomas McDough, his wife and five boarders whose names are known to the police.

There is little chance of identification of the bodies, as they probably have been burned to cinders. Firemen tonight today the preliminary work of clearing away the debris and fire which caused the safe deposit vaults in the burned Equitable life building. The vaults of the Equitable life have been found to have successfully withstood the flames, though they will not be opened until they have completely cooled off. Officers of the society say there is not a doubt that the \$90,000,000 in securities of the society are unharmed by the flames. It is announced that the \$6,000,000 on which the Equitable had issued scribbles between \$3,000,000 and \$10,000,000 had been found to be unharmed in the steel boxes in which they were kept. Securities are already being removed from the vaults of the Mercantile Trust Company.

London, Jan. 11.—Lord Macdonnell, ex-Under Secretary for Ireland, who, it is said, is likely to become a member of the government before long, made an important statement in the House of Commons yesterday. The statement is of unusual interest at the present time, for Lord Macdonnell is in close touch with the government, and it is fairly safe to say that he has been consulted in regard to the forthcoming home rule bill. He said that fiscal autonomy for Ireland could be supported only if it could be shown unquestionably that it involved no danger and no risk to Great Britain. "For my own part," he said, "I cannot conceive how we can have fiscal autonomy in Ireland without a possibility of serious danger and serious risk to the fiscal policy of Great Britain."

(Canadian Press) Quebec, Jan. 11.—Yesterday will go down in the annals of the province of Quebec as perhaps the most significant in its history, since it became a province. Two projects of epoch making character were announced by Premier Sir Lomer Gouin with the assurance that it is the government's intention to carry them out. The first and most important was to construct a railway throughout the northern part of the province of Quebec to James Bay. The other was the proposal to spend \$10,000,000 on the roads of the province.

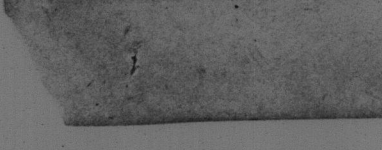

BRIDE OF BUT A FEW DAYS; DIES VICTIM OF PNEUMONIA ATTACK

Mrs. George B. Hussey, a Writer of Merit, Seized With Disease on Wedding Day

New York, Jan. 11.—Mrs. George B. Hussey, an author of merit and a relative of Miss Phoebe and Mrs. Alice Cary, the well-known writers, died at the home of her parents, No. 288 William street, East Orange, from pneumonia which developed on her wedding day last month.

Robbed in her wedding gown, Mrs. Hussey was buried from the church in which she was married less than three weeks ago, and the Rev. William Whiting Davis, who assisted at the marriage ceremony, conducted the funeral service.

Mrs. Hussey was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel E. Cary, a talented writer of stories for magazines, and was throughout the Oranges for her humanitarian work. She was thirty-five years old.

Although suffering from illness, which was regarded as a postponement of the date set for her marriage to Mr. Hussey, a member of a family prominent in the Oranges. The ceremony was performed at the Christ Episcopal church, East Orange, and with labored voice Miss Cary made the responses. Following the wedding, Mrs. Hussey was taken to her parents' home. She was able, while seated in a chair, to receive congratulations from her friends. Soon after the guests had gone she became seriously ill and pneumonia quickly developed.

FEARED OPERATION

Longshoreman Fled From Hospital and Was Found Dead in Doorway

New York, Jan. 11.—Patrick Sheehan, a powerful longshoreman, who escaped from an operating room of the Williamsburg hospital, to avoid an operation for appendicitis, was found in a hallway, dead from exposure.

Sheehan's courage fled as he lay on the stretcher, and he fought his way to freedom past surgeons, nurses and attendants. The operation was necessary, surgeons said, to save his life.

THE CLOSING EVIDENCE IN THE H. S. CLARK CASE

At the afternoon session of the circuit court, yesterday, in the case of the King vs. Harry B. Clark the taking of evidence was concluded. Mr. Kessen completed his statement and C. F. Sanford was heard. The witnesses for the defense were the defendant and H. H. Smith.

On resuming in the afternoon, the cross-examination being continued. Mr. Kessen said that Melton's gave Vanderbilt Realty bonds as collateral.

Before going to New York the defendant had revealed that Collins had got a certified check of \$20,000 from the bank as well as two items of \$25,000 and one of \$13,000 on deposit receipts, making \$83,000 in all, and that Collins had a scheme by which the bonds of the Norfolk Steel Co. could be sold to recoup the bank for the amount of his indebtedness. Clark said nothing of his own indebtedness to the bank and the witness knew nothing of it until after June 7. He had been told there was a possible equity in the Norfolk bonds, but nothing had been realized on them up to the present.

Judge Barry witness said that the certified check of \$20,000 or any of the deposit receipts, excepting one for \$25,000 were not entered on the bank books.

To Mr. Fowler witness said there were also claims on the Collins account against the bank of \$7,000 for a straight loan, \$11,000 of an overdraft and \$17,000 in discounts.

C. F. Sanford said he understood from Mr. Clark that Collins had a scheme to realize \$1,000,000 of Norfolk Steel bonds upon his hypothesis to the Assets Realization Co., of Chicago, for \$300,000 and accrued interest. The bonds were guaranteed by the Crucible Steel Company of America, a \$7,000,000 concern, to run for twenty years at four per cent and were recommended at any time at eighty cents.

To Mr. Fowler the witness said the Crucible Steel Co was reported all right, but was in a position to prevent the sale of the bonds and for this reason the brokers could not touch them. This closed the case for the crown.

EXTRA TAX ON BACHELORS KILLED BY GOVERNMENT

Berlin, Jan. 11.—The government of Mecklenburg has hilled the tax on bachelors imposed last month by the provincial diet.

Bachelors, on reaching the age of thirty, are to be paid taxes 25 per cent higher than married men, unless they were legally obliged to provide for relatives.

The minister of the interior wrote to the president of the diet stating that the government were unable to consider there was any justification for the proposed tax.

IVORY CRUCIFIX, DEEMED OF LITTLE VALUE, FOUND TO BE RARE ART PIECE

Madrid, Jan. 11.—A beautifully carved ivory crucifix, which was purchased for the sum of \$10 at a rag fair in Rouss, Catalonia, twenty-five years ago, has been discovered to be one of the finest carvings of Leonardo da Vinci.

Ten years ago the purchaser left this crucifix with her other possessions to her daughter, wife of a deputy, Senor Mayner. No great value had ever been attached to the object, except as a souvenir, until some weeks ago, when a person who was visiting the house offered \$500 for it. Senor Mayner refused to sell, and she also rejected a further offer of \$75,000 from an antiquarian who had heard of the incident and examined the crucifix. A third offer of \$125,000 is now said to have been received from an American collector.

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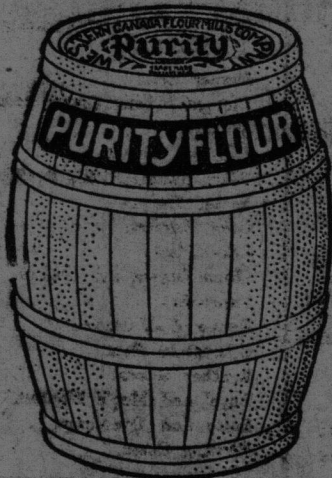
