

The only possible argument against woman suffrage that I can see is that it never has been and therefore never should be. Once upon a time there was a minister who preached against women wearing gay colors. MRS. GOELET DYING -ON \$1,000,000 YACHT

Widow of New York Millionaire in Grave Condition From Cancer

Husband Died on the Vessel-Wife Refuses to Leave-Has Been Custom to Live There Nine Months In The Year

New York, Sept 11-Mrs. Robert Goelet is reported to be dying aboard her yacht, the Nahma, the largest and most luxuriou yacht in the world. Since an operation for cancer was performed a little more than a year ago, Mrs. Goelet has steadily declined in health. The yacht is off South-ampton, Eng.

Word has been sent out by the staff of physicians who have been ministering to Mrs. Goelet for the last few months that it is only a question of days before the end. The doomed woman has refused to leave the yacht since she realized that her malady was mortal. Her husband, Robert Goelet, died aboard the Nahma in the Bay of Naples on April 27, 1890. Mr. Goelet had built the million dollar yacht only two years before.

Beatrice Goelet, the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Goelet, died in this city in February, 1902. She was geventeen years old. Her entire share of the vast Goelet. fortune went to her brother, Robert, who Under her husband's will Mrs. Goelet received the yacht, Nahma, outright and the use of the Goelet homes in this city, Tuxedo, and Newport for life, also an in-

Tuxedo, and Newport for life, also an income of \$200,000 a year.

Of course, in his life time, Mr. Goelet had made large gifts to his wife. The income of \$200,000 a year would scarcely keep the Nahma in commission and pay for the entertaining of royalty. It is estimated that the running expenses of the Nahma when in commission amounted to at least \$15,000 a month. It has been Mrs. Goelet's custom for the last decade to live aboard her yacht at least nine months of the year. Her entertainments have been noteworthy for exclusiveness and elegance rather than sumptuousness.


