WALL STREET NOTES.
New York, Sept. 11—Americans in London unchanged to 14 higher.
Oscar Strauss says through daily meetings arbitrage boards will purchase an early decision.
Steel prices for sheets and galvanized tubes advanced \$2 to \$3 a ton.
The Sun has an article quoting a number of bankers who predict great prosperity, but think stock prices will participate slowly in the improvement.
The short interest in the market is still large and the bears receive encouragement to remain short.
Mr. F. shows a deficit of \$2,326,019 for money loaned at 4 3/4 yesterday; shows clearing of the local monetary position. The interior is drawing on New York in large amounts.
One man says the market is full of bears, and another says that he is mistaken, what he takes for bears are sold out bulls.
The railroads will have more than they can handle this fall and winter. Labor is scarce and it will require labor saving devices.
There will be work by the pools in their stocks. The price of money may affect some of them, especially the high priced ones.
Politics from now on will become more prominent. The democratic papers are not saying much about Governor Wilson's last tariff speech.
The steel tonnage report calls attention to the tremendous business being done by the steel companies. It would look as if steel should do better wherever the market is ready to advance. At present the market continues very professional and in trading swings.

CAPTAIN BRIDGES, LATE OF THE SOBO, IS DEAD
(Halifax Recorder)
Many friends in the city and elsewhere who have with deep regret the news which reached the city today of the death of Capt. T. G. Bridges, for several years master of Pickford & Black's steamer Soboc, sailing between Halifax and the West Indies.
A year ago last month, Captain Bridges left Halifax on the Soboc for England, at the expiration of the P. & B. charter of that steamer which is owned by the Elder-Dempster Line.
Although the marine register still gives Captain Bridges' name as master of the Soboc, it is believed by his Halifax friends that he was transferred to another of the company's steamers running between England and South Africa.
The word received here states that his death occurred at Tenerife Island (one of the Canary Islands) on the West Coast of Africa, on August 14. The captain leaves his wife and six children.
