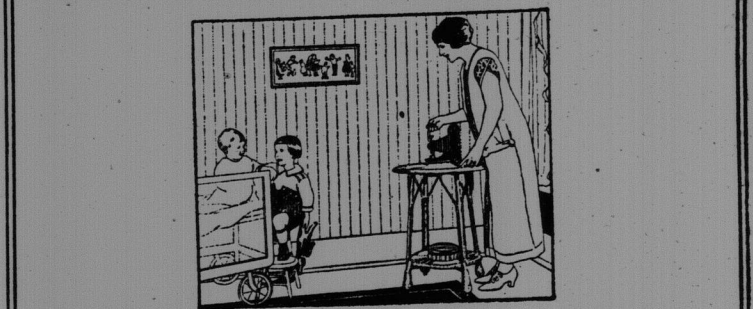

THERE MUST BE A CHANGE

The Toronto Globe, in discussing the delegation to Ottawa, in an editorial which is friendly in tone but which fails to recognize the urgency of the Maritimes' case and the depth of the sentiment behind their demands, says that "the shippers, not the railroads, determine the route."

To some extent that is true under present conditions, but if Confederation is to yield dividends we must not take it for granted that there can be no change in that as in not a few other matters.

When it is sufficiently recognized that a remedy for existing inequalities must be found, and that the trouble resulting from not finding it will be a greater national trouble by far than the trouble involved in finding it, there will be a change. The recognition must come soon—and action must follow it. Delay is a national danger.

The case of the shipper, referred to by the Globe, is but one of many conditions showing the need for real parliamentary determination to bring about the sort of transportation Canada must have in order that all its provinces may be served with reasonable equality at the common table and share alike the fruits of their labor and their enterprise.

As for the shipper and routing, it has been demonstrated, for example, that in one noteworthy instance (and doubtless many others like it might be uncovered) the C. N. R. was carrying Ford export freight to New London, and when the shipper came to understand all the circumstances, that freight was transferred to a Maritime port.

It would never do for this country to accept as inevitable the leakage of its traffic in increasing degree over American railroads and through American ports. It must be understood that Canadian railroads, built with Canadian money, and owned by the Canadian people, must be employed as diligent agents to keep Canadian traffic in all-Canadian channels. The shipper, except in very rare instances, will prefer a Canadian port if the rates are equal, and if it is in the national interest to reduce ocean freight rates in order to facilitate Canadian trade, it is likewise in the national interest to make Canadian railway rates such that Canadian business can be handled by our own railroads and ports rather than by those of another nation.

The Globe, in summing up, says that "the Governments railways must find some method of removing rate discriminations against the Canadian ports do that Canadian shippers will have an incentive to route by the latter, and in addition the Government and friendly shipping interests must try to bring about an equally favorable condition as to ocean transportation. Our Maritime fellow-citizens may be assured there is every disposition throughout the rest of Canada to try to understand their grievances and to remedy these if possible."

There, apparently, we have the admission that it will not do to leave the matter of routing entirely to the shipper. Means must be employed, in other words, to make it to the shipper's interest to use our railroads and our ports. The Globe says that because geography has somewhat militated against these provinces "in their special circumstances they are entitled to special consideration." The Maritimes are not asking for special consideration except in the sense that special consideration may be given to other parts of Canada in order to promote national unity and prosperity. The railroads were built with the money of all the provinces. So long as a deficit exists in connection with the C. N. R. it is paid by all the provinces. The National railways, if they are to become a great instrument of national prosperity, must be administered with the determination to serve the whole country. When Canada's traffic is more and more routed to its own ports for export, not only the Maritimes but the country at large will begin to reap the benefits promised when Parliament spent hundreds of millions of the people's money in building or in taking over the immense railway system.

Parliament may have to break some precedents, or make some new ones, in establishing real all-Canadian transportation, but it must move in that direction, and move definitely. No hesitating or watered-down transportation policy can meet the needs of the case which the Maritimes have founded on national grounds.

While Hon. Dr. Pugsley is still evidently a very sick man, his progress during the last few days gives to a host of friends throughout Canada stronger hope of his complete recovery.

The Fredericton City Council endorses the action of the sheriffs of New Brunswick in asking for an amendment of the Criminal Code so as to provide that all executions in the Maritime Provinces would be carried out at the Maritime Penitentiary, Dorchester. It is a plan that will meet with general approval. We do not have many executions, but the experience in some cases strongly suggests the wisdom of having them take place in Dorchester rather than in the counties where the crimes were committed.

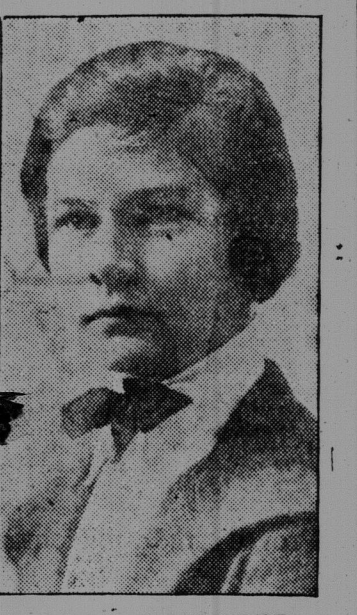
BRITAIN'S TRADE BALANCE. The British Board of Trade Journal, an official government publication, analyzes Britain's trade statistics for 1924, and shows that those who contended that the imports had greatly exceeded the exports were wrong, because they did not take into account the "invisible exports," by which is meant Britain's earnings from the carrying trade and from foreign investments.

When these are included, the Journal explains, there is no adverse trade balance, but in reality a favorable one of nearly £30,000,000. The earnings to which the Journal refers, and which it examines closely, are called "invisible" because they do not appear in the monthly figures of exports and imports which are given to the public. These "invisible" returns are also difficult of calculation, but the estimates made by the Board of Trade appear in every case to have been compiled on a very conservative basis. They are made up as follows: National income from shipping—the famous British "carrying trade"—£130,000,000; income from overseas investments, £185,000,000; commissions of brokers, bankers, insurance companies, etc., £40,000,000; other services, including sale of old ships to foreigners, tourists' expenditure in the United Kingdom, family remittances, etc., £15,000,000, making a total of £370,000,000. In the published trade figures which showed the "adverse balance" excess of imports over exports amounted to £341,000,000. But when the visible exports are added the 370 millions of invisible exports, a favorable balance accounts appears of £29,000,000.

"Any serious reduction in the amount of our investments abroad," concludes the Journal, "would imply a stagnation of trade and a defect in enterprise which do not seem to be compatible with the improvement in the position of sterling exchange, even when, on the ground of speculation, all reasonable discount has been made from the increased value of the pound."

There has been a great deal of difference of opinion as to the real extent to which Germany has violated the peace terms in not only neglecting to disarm but in quietly preparing for the organization of a great army. Foch is not the sort of man who would be likely to be mistaken as to what Germany is doing after having had every opportunity to look into the matter, and his opinion, as the head of a commission of inquiry, is that the Germans are persisting in maintaining a complete staff of officers such as would be needed by an army as great as that they possessed in 1918. BOXING RULES DEFINING FOULS MAY BE REVISED

Code Was Puzzle To Referees In Recent Bouts

NEW YORK, March 3.—The interpretation of the rule covering a situation in a bout where a boxer falls to the floor without being struck has been generally erroneous, according to the explanation of the rule advanced at the offices of the State Athletic Commission. The rule came in for considerable discussion because of the peculiar fact that in two matches on successive nights a referee was called upon to make such a decision. Rather than automatically disqualifying the boxer involved, the rule provides that the count over the fallen boxer shall be resumed where it was interrupted when he regained his feet. This provision is incorporated in the rules which are a part of the law governing the sport in this State, and reads as follows: "Should a contestant who is down arise before the count of ten is reached and again go down intentionally, without being struck, the referee and time-keeper shall resume the count where it left off."

Misinterpreted Rules. Application of this rule shows that Referee Patsy Haley and the single critics, as well as the fans who witnessed the bout, misinterpreted the rule in the recent Jack Delaney-Tiger Flowers bout. When Flowers was floored, regained his feet before a count could be started and then went down again without being hit. A similar misinterpretation was furnished in the bout at the New Manhattan Casino on Wednesday night last when Craik O'Connell faced Joe Dundee in a light-weight elimination bout.

Yet there is justification for this misinterpretation, as was pointed out at the commission office, because a contradictory rule also is incorporated in the boxing regulations. Under the heading of "fouls," which, in the discretion of the referee, warrant instant disqualification or a warning, a rule which stipulates that "purposely going down without being hit," constitutes a foul.

To Halt Demonstrations. It is altogether likely that the contradictory conditions of the printed rules and regulations will be adjusted without delay in order to avoid dissatisfaction and unsatisfactory results to bouts which carry the menace of disorderly outbreaks on the part of disgruntled fans. This latter possibility, incidentally, has grown to alarming proportions in recent months and threatens the sport itself unless checked. No greater demonstration of mob anger ever was manifested than that which took place in the arena when Referee Haley halted the Delaney-Flowers bout for a time favored the disqualification of Delaney for striking Flowers while the negro was down in a neutral corner.

The foul, undoubtedly, was unintentional, but it was there, nevertheless, and required immediate action. Haley saved the situation, even though he, like others, misinterpreted the rule, and since the bout the silver-haired referee has been roundly commended on all sides.

It is understood that an elaboration is contemplated on the provision contained in the rule under the heading of "fouls," and that the commission plans another meeting of referees soon for the purpose of discussing this and other situations which have arisen in recent matches.

**Baby's First Garments**

Sensible mothers in these days do not wear themselves out in preparing dozens of garments elaborately embroidered, as was the custom some years back. Dresses, petticoats, and nightdresses can be bought very cheaply. Little socks and booties, too, are inexpensive, according to taste. The bands, shirts and stockings can readily be obtained at all good baby linen stores. Get the second size, and only four of each, as they will be so soon outgrown and the seasons change so fast.

For winter babies the garments should be at least half wool. All wool garments shrink too much to be of any practical use.

Should the mother decide to make garments herself, many good patterns are supplied by the various ladies' publications. The number of yards needed is given with each set of patterns. Have your material as fine and dainty as you can afford, neatly sewed and with very little trimming.

A few garments with wool in them are lighter and much warmer than many of heavy cotton. Even in summer the little baby needs some small amount of wool, especially over the abdomen and legs. No baby who is cold can digest its food properly.

The flannel for the first bands should be torn into strips six to eight inches wide and twenty inches long; they may be planked on the edges, but not hemmed. They are used only four to six weeks, and then the silk and wool ribbed knit bands with shoulder straps and tabs onto which the diaper is pinned are to be substituted. The cumbersome pinning blankets or narrow coats are no longer used.

The flannel skirts should be made on a cotton waist for summer or a woolen waist for winter. They should be fastened on the shoulder and fit snugly but not tight. If they are very loose they will wrinkle; if too tight they will be very uncomfortable. You may use two or three white lawn skirts for dress-up occasions, but they are not an essential.

The night-dresses should be very fine, but plain, simply gathered into a band at neck and wrist, and not more than twenty-six inches long. A little fine lace or simply feather-stitching on the neck and wrist-bands makes a good finish.

Here is a complete list of essentials in the clothing line for the new baby. As many more can be added as desired.

**ABDOMINAL BANDS OF FLANNEL.**  
1 Ribbed-knit silk or cotton-and-wool bands, with shoulder straps and tabs, heat at baby's head too much. Four to six pads for the crib should be on hand too. While the baby is young, or in cool weather, pads fastened around the sides of the crib keep off drafts and may be easily removed to wash.

Your other nursery furniture should be white enamel or some washable wood, and should consist of a chair for the baby's clothes, a low chair without arms for the mother, two tables, one of which is a low one, a large screen with washable covers, and as the baby grows older a little low chair (no rockers) for his use when playing at the table. Other articles may be added from time to time as he grows older. A box for diapers and another for toys are useful.

Small clothes horse for warming baby's clothes (not drying diapers) before the fire is useful.

The baby's scales are very important, and it is worth while to get some good make, that can be used throughout the baby's life, and not simply for a few months of babyhood. If the scales have a platform, a basket may be used on this while the baby is small.

You will need a bathtub, and can place it in your regular tub, that is if your bathroom is near enough to the nursery, and warm enough for the baby's bath there. When the baby is very young, it is a good plan to use a piece of flannel or an old blanket in it if you bath baby in the nursery, the tub should always be placed upon the table, never on the floor.

You will also need a covered pail for soiled diapers, a wash-basin and two pitchers, if baby is to be bathed in the nursery. A room thermometer is an essential and should be hung at the level of the baby's head when in his crib. The temperature of the nursery in the day time should be 68 to 70 while the baby is young and about 60 at night. When the bath is being given the room should be 72.

It should take a baby twenty minutes to finish a bottle. The formula for normal babies during their first month consists of six ounces of milk, fourteen ounces of boiled water and two tablespoons of sugar. Increase this once each week by adding half an ounce more milk, and subtracting half an ounce of water.

17 CLYDESDALES BROUGHT HERE ON S.S. MARLOCH

Ten Percherons Are On Marburn, Due in Port This Afternoon

ONTARIO MAN SAYS BIG DEMAND COMING

W. J. McCallum of Brompton Speaks of Importation.

On the Canadian Pacific steamship Marloch, which arrived here this morning from Glasgow, Scotland, was a valuable shipment of Clydesdale stallions, brought to Canada by W. J. McCallum of Brompton, Ontario, one of the largest importers of horses on this continent.

See Big Demand. In conversation with a reporter for The Times-Star Mr. McCallum said that in 1923 there were 27,584 fewer foals in Canada than in 1919 and 9,928 fewer stallions. He said that there will be a big demand for first class Clydesdales during the next few years.

Percherons Also. Mr. McCallum left here three months ago and went to Scotland, where he spent two months. He then proceeded to France, Belgium, and Italy. In all he purchased 28 Clydesdales and 10 Percherons.

After purchasing his stock in Scotland, Mr. McCallum went to Paris and selected some of the best Percherons. He was in Antwerp on February 18 and supervised the loading of 10 Percherons on the Marburn and then proceeded to Brussels, where he took an aeroplane for London, arriving there in time to supervise the handling of his Clydesdales and embark on the Marloch.

Meal Above Clouds. Speaking about his aeroplane trip from Brussels to London, Mr. McCallum said he traveled at a rate of 125 miles an hour and had a meal served to him while he was above the clouds.

Marloch Passengers 217. The Marloch arrived last night and docked at Sand Point early this morning. She encountered heavy weather during the early part of the voyage and was delayed nearly two days.

Coscar Boys Arrive. There was only one special party on board made up of six Coscar boys, en route from England to the Boys' Government Hostel in Montreal. They were bright looking and eager to get a glimpse of Canada, which is to be their future home.

INSPECTORS SAY DRUNKEN MEN THERE. Further hearing in a charge against Charlie Fong, proprietor of the King Cafe, Charlotte street, of permitting drunkenness on his premises was given in the police court this morning before Magistrate Henderson. At request of counsel, the case was set over until Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. W. M. Ryan appears for the prosecution, and E. J. Henneberry for the defence. Accused paid a deposit of \$50. The case for the prosecution had been completed, Mr. Henneberry applied to have the case dismissed for lack of evidence. Mr. Ryan was heard in reply, and the magistrate decided there was sufficient evidence to go on.

Evidence Given. Inspector Killen said, in company with Inspectors Garnett, Armstrong and Hanson, he had visited the cafe on last Sunday morning at 12:30 o'clock, and found several men drunk. He said he warned the Chinese there to put the drunks off their premises. One man was lying half-way across a table. The inspectors then went outside. About 1:10 o'clock Sunday morning they returned and found the drunks still there. They notified the proprietor to appear in court.

Cross-examined by Mr. Henneberry, the witness said he did not see any drinking going on at the time. He said the Chinese had been warned repeatedly to keep drunks off the premises. Inspector Garnett gave corroborative evidence. To Mr. Henneberry he said he did not see any of the drunken men enter the cafe. Inspector Armstrong said circumstances were as described by the previous witness.

CAPTAIN JOHN J. CAMPBELL DIES; VETERAN OF WAR

St. John Mariner Won Honors in Great World Conflict

VESSEL TORPEDOED BY GERMAN U-BOAT

Life Ends in Same House in Which He Was Born.

A veteran mariner and one who had served his King and Country well during the Great War passed to rest this morning in the person of Captain John J. Campbell at the residence of his sister, Mrs. John Hamilton, 255 Waterloo street. Captain Campbell had visited in his lifetime nearly every port of the seven seas, had circled the globe many times and during the war was in command of transport ships in the Mediterranean.

For his conspicuously fine services, he was awarded several medals, including the Mercantile Marine medal. On his return home after the armistice had been signed in 1918, he was appointed second officer of the Canadian Government steamer "Laurentian" at this port. He had been in failing health, however, ever since his return. The news of his death was received with regret by a wide circle of friends who came to love the quiet, unassuming veteran navigator.

Dead Where He Was Born. Captain Campbell was born in St. John in 1865 in the house where he died this morning. His parents were the late John and Mary Campbell. When a youth, he conceived a great love for the sea and soon embarked on one of the many sailing vessels that made St. John their home port when he was a young man. In 1885 he came to make his home in England, where he married and where one of his daughters still resides. His skill as mariner soon pushed him to the top and in time he came to command several big vessels. When the war broke out, he volunteered for duty with the British Government and was given command of a transport ship. On one occasion, his ship was torpedoed by a German submarine.

Two daughters survive, Mrs. E. E. Moriarty of Kirkdale, Liverpool, Eng., and Miss M. of this city; also one stepson, James M. Wherry, of New Jersey, N. Y., and one sister, Mrs. John Hamilton. The funeral will be held on Thursday morning at 9 o'clock to the Cathedral.

CELEBRATE FOUR BIRTHDAYS AT ONCE. Unique Party at Home of Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Wood, Manawagonish Road.

Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Wood held a unique party at their home, Manawagonish road, last evening, when four birthdays were celebrated together. The real anniversaries occurred on four consecutive days, beginning on Friday last week. 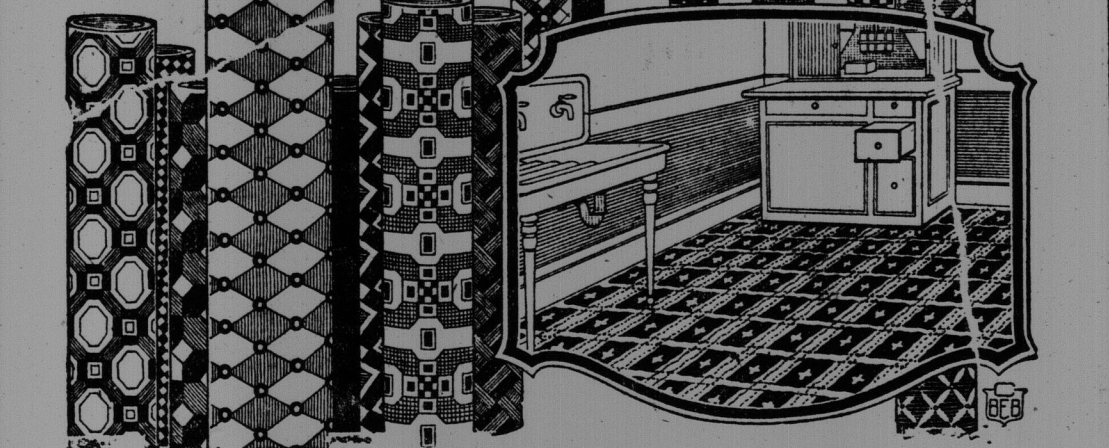
