

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

TORONTO MECHANICS' INSTITUTE,

ANNUAL MEETING, 1870.

May 9th, 1870.

The Annual Meeting of members was held in the Lecture Room this evening, the Vice-President, Mr. W. P. Marston, in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Annual Report was then read by the Secretary, and, on the motion of Mr. N. G. Bigelow, seconded by Mr. J. H. Mason, was adopted.

It was moved by Mr. D. G. Carnegie, seconded by Mr. J. J. Withrow, and Resolved, That six gentlemen be elected out of this meeting, to confer with the Directors as to the advisability of going on with the erection of the proposed New Hall, and to report to a special meeting at an early day; the following members to form the Committee, Messrs. J. H. Mason, Robert Wilkes, Alderman Hallam, John Paterson, John McBean and D. G. Carnegie.

It was moved by Mr. J. P. McDonald, seconded by Mr. Thomas Downey, That the Directors be instructed and empowered to negotiate the interest of the Institute, to some party or parties willing to erect the proposed New Hall, on his or their own account without risk to the Institute, with a view of its being used in connexion with, and its internal affairs managed by, the Institute, on reasonable terms, and failing that, to sell the property in question to the highest bidder, at Public Auction, or private sale; but so as no loss shall re-

sult to the Institute, and that the arrangements be submitted to a special meeting of the members, for their sanction before completion. The motion was put to the meeting, and lost.

Mr. J. J. Withrow gave notice that he would move, at next quarterly meeting, that Section 2, of Art. 1, of the constitution be amended by substituting \$3 in place of \$2 50; and that Rule two of "Rules and Regulations for the admission of subscribers" be amended by substituting \$3 for \$2 50; and Rule three by substituting \$2 50 for \$2.

Messrs. J. A. Rattray, W. B. Thompson, and J. E. Cupples, were appointed to act as scrutineers.

The President declared Mr. William Edwards, Treasurer, for the ensuing year, the same being elected without opposition.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1870.

At the close of their term of office, and new members. That so many should disthe 40th year of the existence of this Institution, your Directors beg to submit a brief report of their proceedings.

The first and most important department of the Institute is its membership; it that fails, success in the objects for which it has been established must also of necessity fail. The past year, in this respect, has not been one altogether of discouragement. The number of members returned

Showing an increase of 110 members during the year. There are, however, not included in the above, a large number of names on the books of members whose subscriptions have been in arrears since prior to the 1st of January. Many of these have not relinquished their membership, and will yet pay up their subscriptions. Had these been included in the above returns, as in former years, the increa se would have appeared much larger than now reported. Your Directors have decided not to include in this return any whose subscriptions became due and were not renewed before the 1st of January last; and if this system is adhered to in the future, it will more accurately show the increase, or otherwise, for each Institute

During last autumn, with a view to add to the membership of the Institute, your Directors engaged with Mr. James Rollo,

continue their connection with the Institute. year by year, as the annual returns show. is a fact to be deplored; but with an indus. trial population so liable to change of residence, and the organization of various national and philanthropic societies and associations, having strong claims upon the active sympathies and efforts of so many of our fellow citizens, it appears to be a difficulty with which this Institute has increasingly to contend. Even in respect to a class of entertainments which originated in this institution, and which, for a time, were so successful, and have been copied extensively by other in. stitutions in the province, the various churches and benevolent societies have taken them up; and by the peculiar claims to sympathy presented to their members and the public, have rendered the success of lectures and reunions in this Institute almost impossible. If, however, the moral and intellectual improvement of the youths of our city is promoted, though in connection with other associations than our own. it is still a matter for congratulation: but your Directors, nevertheless, must submit that this Institute has strong claims, peculiarly its own, and quite different to those of any other organization, to the generous support of the citizens of Toronto.

FINANCES.

The finances of the Institute are, undoubtedly, in a very unsatisfactory condition, owing to the project entered into some two years since, for the erection of a large public hall, in connection with the present building. This project, although repeatedly endorsed by the members, at annual and quarterly meetings, and strongly advocated by a portion of the city press, has, from various causes, not yet been proceeded with. In the meantime a total sum of upwards of \$1,300 has been disbursed from the ordinary funds of the Institute, in payment of in stalments and interest on the additional property purchased and expenses connected therewith; and upwards of \$600 of the liabilities now reported are also chargeable to the new hall building account. The excess of liabilities over assets thus shown is larger than given in the last Annual Report; but here again your Direc tors have adopted the system of not only including liabilities actually due, but all items of Interest, Gas and Water accounts, Newspapers, Periodicals, &c., up to the 1st instant; although the period for payment of these current accounts is yet sometime distant. Had the same mode of reporting liabilities been adopted, as in former years, the returns would have shown a considerable deduction as compared with the last year's report, notwithstanding the large payments made on the new hall account.

Full details of the finances will be found in Appendixes A and B.

MEMARY AND READING ROOM.

The depressed state of the finances at the time your Directors assumed office, and which has continued through the year, has prevented as large an expenditure in the purchase of books as was felt to be desir. able; yet, not with standing this financial pressure the sum of \$256 21 has been dis bursed in the purchase of new books; \$175 94 in binding magazines and old books, and \$484 51 in newspapers and magazines for the Reading Rooms.

During the year several entertainments were given, the proceeds of which it was proposed should be devoted exclusively to These, however, as will be the Library. shown in a subsequent portion of this report, resulted in a serious financial loss to he Institute. Considering the object proposed to have been benefitted by these entertainments, the result was not only unfortunate, but manifested a want of sympathy on the part of the membership in the efforts put forth by your Directors.

The Reading Room continues to be supplied with a large number of the leading successful than in previous years.

> Your attention is here drawn to the very reprehensible practice on the part of some person or persons unknown, in continuing to remove papers and magazines from the Reading Rooms, and in mutilating others. This has been a source of great annoyance to your Directors, and loss to the Institute. Various notices have from time to time been posted up, and other means resorted to; but so far the guilty parties have not been discovered, nor deterred from their dishonest

The thanks of the Institute are due to a large number of publishers, who continue to furnish their papers to the Reading Room free of charge.

The usual examinations were held; and the distribution of prizes awarded to successful pupils took place in the Music Hali, on Monday the 11th of April. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the Hon. William Pearce Howland, C.B., was present, and took part in the presentation of the prizes.

LECTURES AND ENTERTAINMENTS.

During the past season your Directors arranged for and carried out eight entertainments, namely: 4 Literary Readings, 1 Reunion, and 3 Lectures. As a strong inducement to the members, beyond the mere merits of the entertainments, it was announced that the net proceeds would be devoted to the purchase of new books for the Library. Notwithstanding this announcement and the exertions made to render them a success, each one but the last resulted in a loss to the Institute, amounting in all to the sum of \$106 22; while a profit arising from Mr. Robin's lecture on Scottish song, given under the patronage of the Caledonian Society, amounting to \$28 49, reduced the loss on the whole series to a net sum of \$77 73.

THE NEW HALL.

J. G. Worts, Esq., of the firm of Gooderham & Worts, promised no specific sum, but assured your committee they would not be behind any other firm in its support Your Directors regret that they cannot report any further progress in the undertak.

The scheme has not been placed before the public as a charitable project. A large Hall is required in the city, for the use of the various religious and benevolent institutions, and for other purposes: the Institute, from the fact of its already possessing extensive accommodation, is in a position to provide such a large Hall, and the apartments necessarily connected therewith, at a far less cost than they can otherwise be provided; and, when completed, with the present building will furnish a most magnificent suite of rooms. The Hall, proposed to be 130 feet in length, by 60 feet in width. is anticipated with the site to cost \$20,000 of this amount at least \$10,000 must be furnished by free contributions, to render it safe for the Institute to undertake there sponsibility of its erection.
