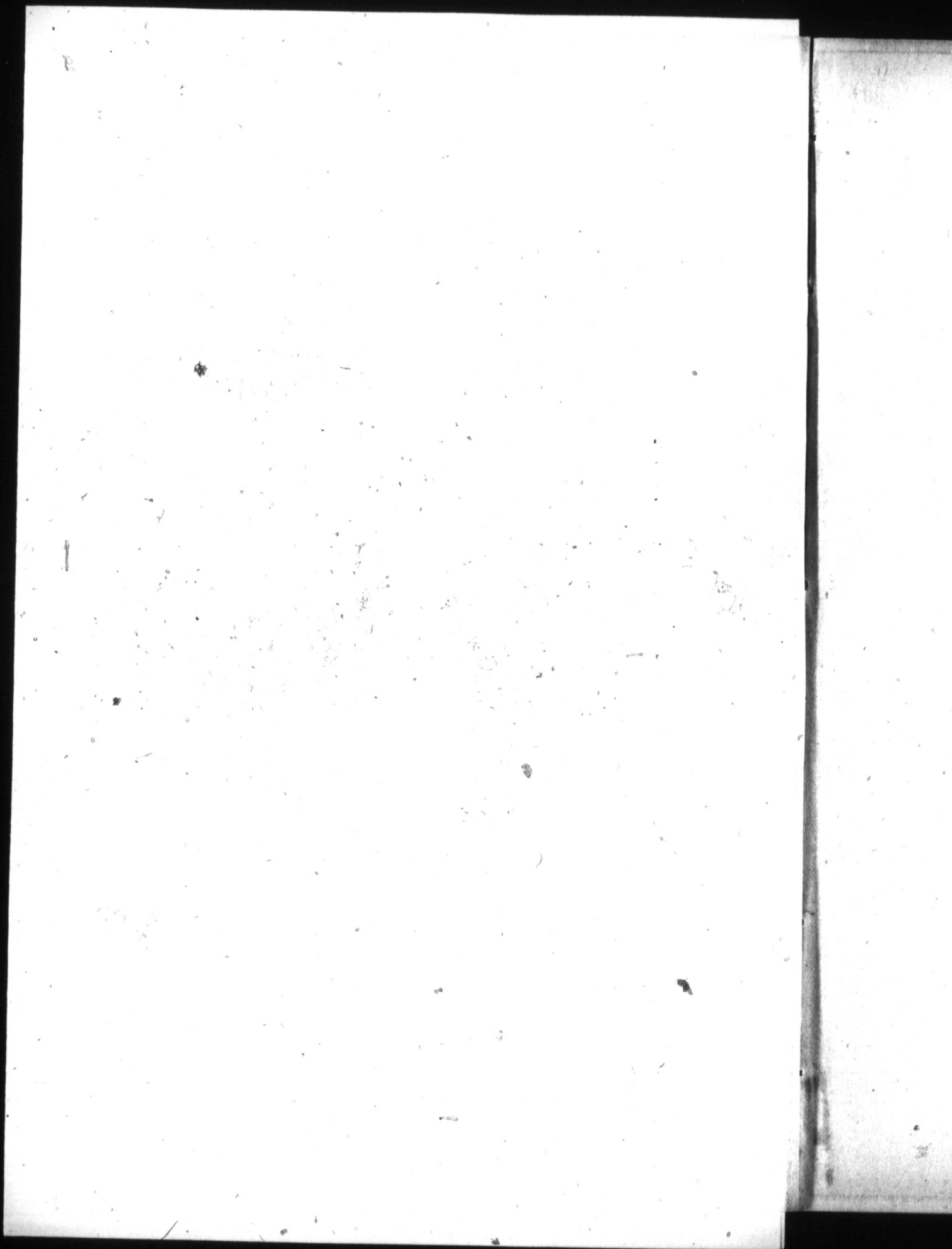

FIRST DAY.

TUESDAY, *June 21st*, 1870.

THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO, in obedience to the summons of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, assembled for Divine Service in St. James's Cathedral, on Tuesday, June 21st, 1870, at 10 o'clock, A. M. Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. J. D. Cayley, M. A.; the Lessons were read by the Rev. Canon Read, D.D., and the Rev. Canon Brent, M. A. The Ante-Communion Service was said by the Ven. the Archdeacon of Toronto, the Epistle being read by the Rev. Rural Dean Geddes, M. A. The Sermon was preached by the Rev. W. E. Cooper, M. A., from the text, Phil. i. 27. The Lord Bishop of Toronto celebrated the Holy Communion, being assisted in the administration of the elements by the Very Rev. the Dean, the Rev. Canon Beaven, and the Rev. Rural Dean Givins. The Offertory was devoted to the Mission Fund of the Diocese.

At 2.30 o'clock, P.M. the Synod assembled for the transaction of business, in St. George's School-room, the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop in the Chair.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

The Lord Bishop then delivered the following Address :—

REVEREND BRETHREN AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY,

I shall commence my usual annual address to you with a glance at the events of the past year. These, as far as they are connected with the work and interests of the Church,—though not in themselves remarkable or striking,—have always their importance.

The several Committees named last year by the Synod, to carry out the practical work of the Diocese, have held their respective meetings at the appointed periods, and have given, as I believe, their best attention to the duties assigned to them. But I feel justified in mentioning that, in several instances, a quorum of members could not be obtained; and as this was owing in a great degree to the largeness of the Committees, it might be well, unless in a few of the more important ones, such as the Commutation Trust and the Mission Board, to reduce their number from eight to six. This would help to obviate the difficulty complained of; for where there can be no provision made for the payment of expenses, it would be found desirable to lessen as much as possible the aggregate of such a burden. In the contemplated revision of the details of the Constitution, this point, I trust, will receive consideration.

Our missionary work, if it has not kept pace with the wants of the Diocese, has nevertheless made some satisfactory advance. Very large missions are gradually being divided; and as means and men are more abundantly furnished, there will be large opportunities for still more concentrating the labours of our Clergy, and giving better effect to their ministrations. We must all be sensible of the importance of rendering religious services at established stations as frequent as possible, and of not allowing too long intervals between them. The influence of such services is necessarily much weakened, if the instructions and admonitions they comprehend are not steadily and continuously followed up. On this ground, it has been my aim so to apportion the work of our Missionaries that every important station should have a regular Sunday service, and as frequent pastoral visits on other days as possible.

After the conclusion of the session of the Synod last year, I resumed my Confirmation duties, and completed the visiting of all places East of Toronto. About the middle of August, I commenced a Confirmation tour through a portion of the Niagara District. This was renewed during the following month, and all the places east and south of Hamilton, including that city, were visited with the exception of one mission postponed at the desire of its Incumbent. During the past year, also, three Confirmations have been held in the City of Toronto.

In order to accomplish the present year's work, without trespassing upon the more busy portions of the harvest season, I commenced a Confirmation tour on the sixteenth of May, which was completed on the sixth of the present month. Since my report at the last Synod, I have held Confirmations at eighty-two places, and admitted to that rite 573 males, and 839 females; in all 1412. This makes the whole number confirmed by me, since my entrance upon the Episcopal office, 5,695.

On the 19th September last I held an Ordination in Christ Church, Hamilton, when six were admitted Deacons, and five advanced to the Priesthood. The former were immediately disposed of, and several vacancies remained unsupplied. This induced me to hold a special Ordination in St. James's Cathedral in this city on the 1st May last, being the Feast of St. Philip and St. James, when four were admitted Deacons, and three of them at once despatched to points where the services of clergymen were much required. I have been enabled to send a young and active clergyman to the Muskoka Territory, and to place another of vigour and experience at Parry Sound.

Since I last addressed you, we have had to lament the death of the Reverend Jabez Sims, for several years the earnest and indefatigable Missionary to the Indians on the Manitoulin Island. He applied himself with great assiduity and zeal to the duties of his peculiar charge; and he gained very widely the respect and affection of the simple people to whom he was appointed to minister. Where respect and confidence are inspired, a salutary influence is sure to follow; and this was exercised by Mr. Sims in a marked degree amongst the Indians of his charge. They looked up to their pastor with a filial reliance, and he could exercise almost literally a parental control. If in

our late Missionary's intercourse with the white population, there were occasional collisions, it was only because this mode of ministerial oversight—so naturally adopted towards all—did not harmonize with the spirit of the more cultivated and worldly wise.

The duties of his mission required long and arduous journeys; and many of these could only be accomplished in boats. Severe and stormy weather would often be encountered, and many of these voyages were attended with great risk and danger. On one of these Mr. Sims lost his life; not from tempestuous weather, but from one of those accidents which, in the management of a boat, will sometimes happen to the most skilful. In a hasty movement to shift a sail, he unhappily fell overboard, and sank in thirty feet of water, before any assistance could be rendered: before, indeed, his fellow passengers—amongst them his wife and son—were aware of the calamity.

It was hard to supply the place of one who, like Mr. Sims, had become so experienced in the ways of Indian life, and knew so well the avenues to the communication of sound and holy impressions; and it is only within a few weeks that a successor has been found for him. The Reverend Rowland Hill, from the Diocese of Huron, has entered upon this work with every confidence on the part of the Committee for superintending our Indian missions, that he will prosecute it with energy and success. The Church at large will bid him "God speed."

We have also to regret the loss of the Reverend S. B. Ardagh, for many years Rector of Barrie, and latterly Rural Dean of the County of Simcoe. He was a clergyman of singleness of purpose and blameless life, who, at the outset of his mission, was able to devote himself with energy and success to his work; but for several years preceding his disease his health and strength had declined, and he was unable to exert his accustomed activity. He has been succeeded in the Rectory of Barrie by the Reverend Edward Morgan, who, for many years, combined with material help in Barrie an assiduous devotion to the neighbouring townships. The ministerial charge of these townships has now been assigned to two active clergymen.

Since I last addressed you, two Churches have been consecrated; several more will soon be ready for this solemnity; and many new Churches, some of considerable cost, are in progress throughout the Diocese.

I feel bound to renew the expression of my anxious hope that there will, throughout the Diocese at large, be the extension of a more earnest Missionary feeling. This cannot fail to be largely promoted by these our Synodical meetings. When the three thousand, converted on the day of Pentecost, went to their several homes,—scattered as these were over the whole face of the civilized world,—we can believe that each man thus converted became a pioneer and missionary of the new and great truths he had heard; we cannot fancy one of them to have been silent on the glorious theme the preaching of which so startled them, and awoke in them such strong new convictions. I believe that, in the same way, as year by year the lay members of our Synod return to their respective homes, it will be not only with an enlarged view of our spiritual requirements, but with a freshened desire to contribute their aid in providing for them. What they have here learned, we must believe they will endeavour to apply; and, assured of the duty of aiding in extending the Church, they will, we trust, be willing helpers in such plans as may be devised for advancing this high object.

The Synod generally will be gratified to learn that, during the past year, there has been a satisfactory increase to our Mission fund; so much so that we have been able to furnish the usual quota of aid to the several new Missionaries sent out during that period. But the Synod, through its lay members, can do much to ameliorate a condition of things which, amidst our many encouragements, is, it must on all sides be admitted, a serious detriment to the healthy progress of the Church. I refer to the pecuniary circumstances of such of the Clergy as are without any stipend except what is derived from the voluntary contributions of the congregations to whom they minister. The maximum of such stipend, including the grant from the Mission Board, rarely exceeds \$600 per annum, and not unfrequently it falls short of this amount; and our brethren must at once admit that this is a stipend which, in these expensive

times, is utterly insufficient to ensure to a clergyman with a family the ordinary comforts of life. Every clergyman, educated as he has been, and with so important a trust delegated to him, should be able to maintain the due respectability of his social position; and if he cannot do so, we must look too speedily for a diminution of his influence with all classes of his parishioners. The individual of humble grade and of narrow means may look with compassion, but not with confidence or respect, upon a clergyman reduced to a social equality with himself; and the compassion of those of higher standing and ample supply of the comforts of life, is, in many instances, apt to pass into contempt. A clergyman should certainly be spared the toil, if not humiliation, of many domestic services which not only take off his time and thoughts from higher pursuits, but which impair his physical energies, and seriously cramp the vigour of his mind and the glow of his feelings. He should not be obliged, for instance, after it may be three services and a drive of many miles, to groom his own horse, and add to his weariness and discomfort at a time when he needs repose, and the kindly ease and refreshments of his fire-side. It is unjust to them that they should be placed in such a position, and it is unjust to the Church at large. It must have the effect of deterring the choicest and most gifted of our youth from seeking the ministry as a profession; for though we may still gain many a good and earnest and useful man, we shall lose more who, with social position and the influence it brings, with bright talents, and an undoubted love of souls, would be a treasure and a blessing to the Church.

I should not, my brethren of the Laity, adduce this as a fact too notorious, had I not a strong hope that the simple assertion of the fact will awaken an effort to ameliorate, if not to remove the calamity. I hesitate not to assert it as my conviction that every parish or mission whose clergyman is thus circumstanced, would find it in their power—without feeling it to be in any sensible degree a burden—to add fifty per cent to the stipend now paid him; to raise his stipend of \$600 to \$800 and in many cases to \$1000. The possession of this amount of income would exempt him from the unnerving and unsuitable menial offices which, from the narrowness of his means

he is now constrained to perform. It would have the effect, too, of strengthening a mutual attachment; of heightening love and respect on the one side, and of creating more elastic and energetic services on the other.

And while we strive to foster a mutual love and confidence, let there be a general effort to work together, in unity and harmony. There is no need of division—no need for separate interests and actions—in the Church, even if there must be differences of opinion. All minds are not constituted alike; yet with one high and paramount aspiration, we can surely tolerate the varieties that may affect us in the mode of reaching it. The great Apostle St. Paul spent many chapters in urging Christians to mutual concession and mutual confidence, when, with one unvarying aim, all might not think or act alike.

We must, of course, assume that there is, on all hands, a loyal adherence to the fundamental principles of the Church, grounded as these are upon the infallible truths of the Word of God. When, therefore, we allude to diversity of opinions, this must be apart and separate from those fundamental principles: nothing can be sanctioned or countenanced that implies the slightest departure from them. But these are principles which may be held with the most devoted exactness by those who may differ in their outward manifestations of religious worship. Some are susceptible of emotions which are not so easily excited in others. According to a constitutional bias or taste, some will evince a preference for the subjective, others for the objective, form of pious manifestations. Religion with the one is quiet and unobtrusive; it impels in the other something more striking and apparent. Some are sufficiently edified, and their religious feelings sufficiently aroused, by the simplest manner of worship; others—probably the large majority—require more, in the work of devotion, that strikes the senses—that affects the eye and ear.

We must, in these cases, exercise mutual indulgence. If there be very many who desire an animated service, who, for the maintenance of their devotional feelings, seek for instance a larger admixture of music; who prefer that prayers, and creeds, and psalms should be sung rather than said—blame them not. The Church gives them this liberty; and none

should seek to abridge it, where it is claimed for the heightening of religious feeling. And if there be in others a more quiet spirit—one that desires not this method of arousing or stimulating devotion—let us have respect to their feelings, and not impugn their judgment or sincerity. Let each cultivate a mutual regard, if they cannot exercise an active sympathy. Let not the reproach of coldness be thrown upon the one, nor the accusation of an ostentatious formality be made against the other. While in both there is an unquestioned loyalty to the essential principles of the Church, they should be mutually tolerant and generous, if the practical work of religion should, in its external manifestation, exhibit on the one hand a grave decorum, and on the other more of fervour and impulse.

There is nothing on either side that should awaken suspicion, or create distrust. The more impulsive manifestations, inducing more of apparent form, are no actual evidence of a tendency to that communion where show and form are doubtless so much indulged as to endanger the life of religion; while the absence of impulsive demonstrations should not fairly be considered as a sign of that tendency to a speculative belief which has landed so many in the gravest heresies—which has reasoned them into a rejection of the divinity of the Saviour, and caused them to abjure the necessity of an atonement. In some instances in the mother country, we deny not that there has been, in the exaggeration of ritualistic observances, a symbolizing of erroneous doctrine,—a tendency, if not a purpose, to cloud and pervert the truth; but no instance, we believe, can be cited in this Province—certainly not in this Diocese—in which such a tendency can fairly be imputed, or such results shewn.

While some are impressed through the hearing of the ear, others are benefited by the presentation to the eye of what quickens devotion, and maintains the sentiment of religious reverence. These are edified by adornments of the sanctuary, by the effort to realize the pictures of glory and beauty, which in God's word, are revealed as the condition of heaven itself. They feel as if there were a blank and defect where the temple of prayer exhibited not some approach to the grandeur and gorgeousness which have a divine warrant in the old time before us, and are set forth in the divinely revealed pictures of the future world.

And in contemplating the wonder and mercy of the doctrine of the atonement through the sufferings and ignominious death of the Son of God himself, we should not justly feel or express surprise if the symbol of our redemption, the Cross, has a charm for many a Christian mind. We should grieve, and we should blame our brethren, if we discerned in this partiality anything like a superstitious veneration—anything that would indicate a tendency to worship the creature rather than the Creator. And though a large portion of the flock of Christ have gone much beyond a sober and edifying reverence in their passion for the image of the cross, we must be slow to impute blame, or indulge suspicion, if we find amongst those with whom we would “take sweet counsel,” a desire for the constant and prominent presentation of that image beyond what our own feelings would prompt. If it be wrong to hazard any superstitious and perilous results by an excessive veneration for the image of the Cross, we must not allow ourselves to think that the total absence of it, as a sign and remembrancer of the great atonement for the sins of the world, would be well or wisely insisted upon. On this point let me urge a kindly Christian tenderness and forbearance.

While I would press upon the Synod a close attention to those practical matters which serve to extend the ministrations and promote the influence of the Church, and urge a special consideration of the means by which the personal condition of the Clergy may be improved, there will be subjects brought before you, affecting fundamental principles, from the discussion of which you cannot be relieved. A prominent one is the question of Patronage. Upon this, views will, in some quarters, be entertained, in which, it is to be feared, personal considerations will be allowed to supersede ancient and established principles. Without any desire on my own part to have an undivided or uncontrolled authority in clerical appointments, I am anxious for such a settlement of the question as will best ensure the singleness and purity of the ministerial character, and induce on the part of congregations a reverence for the office of the ministry, rather than mere partiality for the individual who exercises it.

It has been an essential rule in God's Church that ministers

should be sent to the people, and not called by them; but in the maintenance of this wise and divinely-sanctioned rule, there should be the exercise of that sound and cautious judgment in the making of appointments, which probably could only be assured by antecedent conference with those on whose behalf such appointments are to be made. A proposal will be submitted to the Synod on this important subject which can, I trust, be moulded into such a form as to ensure justice and satisfaction to all the parties concerned, and best promote—what with all should be the leading consideration—the real welfare and prosperity of the Church.

In contemplating so high and dutiful a purpose as this—the welfare and extension of God's Church amongst us—we are not to overlook the value of the agencies by which this is to be promoted, and without which its internal strength and real advancement could never be assured. There has been a gratifying increase of the Schools for Boys in this Diocese, conducted on a religious basis, and where there is a careful inculcation of the principles of the Church; and the importance of such auxiliaries cannot be too highly estimated. The early training to future duties, moral and religious, has such a direct encouragement in Scripture, and so much commends itself to our own reason and conscience, that I need not expend words in urging it; and if this be assumed, and we desire that our youth should enter upon the great work of life with an intelligent sense of their responsibilities as Christians and as Churchmen, we must provide and encourage the Institutions in which they may acquire the necessary antecedent preparation.

But if this be our duty in regard to our rising youth, we are not to overlook the influence, for the same great attainment, which is exercised by the female members of every community within the fold of the Church. We should provide the means, as extensively as we can, of so training in their early days the female members of our communion, that, with a refined intellectual culture, there may be combined an ingrafted knowledge of the principles of the Church—the basis of truth upon which it rests,—the piety and beauty of its ritual,—and the privilege and comfort of a hearty participation in the devout

exercises it provides; the training, too, to that love of Christian good works and enterprises which are part of the responsibility of every member of the Redeemer's flock.

An attempt has been made, in the establishment of the Bishop-Strachan School, to realize this great advantage; and if a large degree of encouragement has been accorded to the enterprise, it is not to be denied that much discouragement has been felt from the want of unanimity in the countenance and support it receives. The appointment of a Committee at the last meeting of the Synod to devise the means, if possible, of placing this School upon such a basis as would assure the support of members of the Church at large, was an encouragement to this result which we all hailed with delight. But, unhappily, no satisfactory result has thus far attended the deliberations of this Committee; and it would be well, I think, to refer the question again to the Synod and obtain from them a basis of procedure which might lead to mutual confidence and a combined action, and render it—what I so heartily desire it should be—the School of the Church.

In my address to you last year, I referred to the benefit of securing, if possible, harmony and oneness in the mode of conducting the services of the Church; and expressed a belief that the subject would, at an early period, be taken up by the House of Bishops. With a view to the same object of harmony and uniformity, a Committee at the last meeting of the Provincial Synod was appointed to effect, if possible, a compilation of Psalms and Hymns which might be adopted in all the Dioceses of the Province. This is an attainment which our Metropolitan has much at heart; and, in deference to his wishes preliminary steps have been taken for the organizing of a sub-committee who might take the work in hand, and have in readiness a compilation for submission to the Provincial Synod at its next meeting. If our several Dioceses, as they have opportunity, would give expression to an opinion commendatory of this object, it might accelerate the completion of such a work; though I am not insensible of the difficulty, amidst the many tastes and opinions that have to be consulted, to accomplish such a selection as would generally be satisfactory. The effort, however, is undeniably a praiseworthy one, and it should not hastily be relinquished.

I must not, my brethren of the Synod, further occupy your time ; but conclude with urging a calm and patient discussion of the questions that may come before you. Let not earnestness and zeal allow you to be betrayed into intemperate warmth, or into expressions that would be inconsistent with the gravity of the occasion that calls us together.

"*Semel emissum volat irrevocabile verbum*;" some honestly uttered, but mischief-bearing words may affect him that hastily utters them with a lasting sorrow and humiliation ; but they are borne away, far and near, never to be recalled.

In the discussions which may evoke differences of opinion, exercise towards one another a Christian forbearance. Have a due consideration for those varieties of thought and predilection which are inseparable from the constitution of our human nature ; and in the conclusions you form, and the decisions you arrive at, have a single mind to the good of the Church and the glory of its Divine Head.

ELECTION OF HONORARY CLERICAL SECRETARY.

That the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune, M. A., be re-appointed Honorary Clerical Secretary.—*Carried.*

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CERTIFICATES OF LAY DELEGATES.

The Rev. A. J. Broughall and Mr. F. J. Joseph, the Committee appointed by the Executive Committee to receive and examine the certificates of the Lay Representatives, presented the following Report, which was read by the Rev. A. J. Broughall, as follows :—

The Committee appointed to receive and examine the certificates of Lay Delegates beg leave to report that the annexed list is a correct return, subject to the following remarks :—

1. We have no return for the Parishes of Brighton, Fergus, Keswick, Minto, Mount Forest and Arthur, Seymour and Percy, and Thorold.

2. The certificates for the following Parishes are irregular :
Bobcaygeon and Dunsford—Cobourg (in the case of one Delegate)—Shanty Bay—St. Catharines—all in regard of that clause of the printed form of certificate, which relates to the delegates having communicated at least three times during the past year, it having been either erased or omitted.

3. Four delegates have been returned for Wellington Square and Nelson.

4. The certificate for Sault Ste. Marie, though signed by the Churchwarden, is not in accordance with the prescribed form.

5. Mr. W. H. Boulton has produced a certificate signed by Rev. S. Briggs, which (he claims) entitles him to a seat in the Synod for Stayner, although the Incumbent of Stayner and Creemore, the Rev. W. R. Forster, has returned the names on the list as the duly appointed Delegates.

It has been reported to the Committee that a great deal of inconvenience has been occasioned by the non-observance of that clause of the Constitution which requires that returns should be made to the Secretary-Treasurer within seven days after the election, that the assessment should then be paid, and that proper certificates should be furnished the delegates,—some returns having only been made this morning.

Mr. Harman withdrew his motion, and Dr. Hodgins was duly elected Honorary Lay Secretary.

That all the cases in the Report of the Committee on the Certificates of the Lay Representatives, in regard to which doubts have been raised, be referred to the Court appointed by the Lord Bishop for the adjudication of contested seats.—*Carried.*

The Clerical Secretary announced that the Lord Bishop, had under his hand and seal, appointed the following members of the Synod to be a Court on contested seats :—The Rev. Dr. Lett, Rev. Canon Dixon, Messrs. Charles Magrath and J. George Hodgins. [In the absence of the Chancellor of the Diocese, the Registrar (Mayor Harman) was *ex officio* a member of this Court.]

ADMISSION TO A SEAT IN THE SYNOD.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. McMurray, seconded by the Rev. Rural Dean Geddes, that the Rev. George T. Johnston, Vicar of Harlington in the Diocese of Ely, be admitted to a seat in the Synod.—*Carried.*

ELECTION OF SECRETARY-TREASURER.

Moved by the Very Rev. the Dean of Toronto, seconded by Mr J. W. Gamble,

That Mr. Wm. P. Atkinson be re-appointed Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod.—*Carried.*

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Lord Bishop announced to the Synod that he had appointed the following gentlemen members of the Executive Committee:—The Very Rev. the Dean of Toronto, Ven. Archdeacon of Toronto, Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara, Rev. Canon Beaven, Rev. Canon Baldwin, Hon. J. H. Cameron, Messrs. S. H. Blake, Clarke Gamble, Mayor Harman, and Prof. Wilson. The Lord Bishop appointed the following gentlemen as scrutineers to take the vote for the remainder of the Executive Committee:—Rev. A. Stewart, Messrs. C. J. Campbell, and W. Gamble. The ballot was then proceeded with.

MINUTES OF THE LAST SESSION.

Moved by the Rev. J. G. Geddes, seconded by Mr. J. H. Perry,

That the reading of the Minutes of the last Session be dispensed with, as they have already been printed and circulated, and that they be hereby confirmed.—*Carried.*

GOVERNOR GENERAL'S REPLY TO ADDRESS OF THE SYNOD.

The Clerical Secretary read the following reply, from His Excellency the Governor General, to the Address presented to him by the Synod last year:—

“MY LORD BISHOP AND GENTLEMEN,

“As the Representative of Her Majesty, I have much pleasure in thanking you for the dutiful and cordial address which you have just presented to me.

"It is most gratifying to me to hear from the lips of such prominent members of the Church of England those sentiments of devoted loyalty to the Queen, and of deep attachment to the Mother Country, to which you have just given utterance in such warm and becoming terms.

"Your mission as leaders in the Church is a lofty one, and I am happy to think, from what I have seen in my recent tour, that her interests are, not merely safe, but well and zealously cared for in your hands.

"The numerous Churches and Schools, which met the view on every side, cannot fail to prove perennial sources from which the blessings of Christian knowledge and sound moral training will flow throughout the land.

"My earnest prayer is, that you may be so guided in your important duties as to work hand in hand in the labours of peace and charity, to the furtherance of true religion, and the general diffusion of contentment and happiness throughout the Dominion.

The Ven. Archdeacon of Toronto presented and read the Report of the Special Committee on Patronage, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption.—(*See page 68.*)

The Rev. S. Givins presented and read the Report of the Special Committee on Insuring the Lives of the Clergy, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption.—(*See Appendix V.*)

The Rev. H. C. Cooper explained that owing to the fact that the Constitution had not yet been adopted, there was no Report from the Special Committee on the Consolidation of the Canons. He therefore moved, seconded by the Rev. John Fletcher,

That the Committee on the Consolidation of the Canons, appointed at the last session of the Synod, viz: Messrs. J. G. Hodgins, F. J. Joseph, N. F. Paterson, the Rev. H. C. Cooper, and the Rev. Dr. Lett (in place of Dr. Bovell), be reappointed with instructions to report at the next annual meeting of the Synod.—*Carried.*

REV. S. BRIGGS'S MEMORIAL.

Mr. John Carter moved, seconded by the Rev. S. Givins, That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to appoint another Committee on the "Rev. S. Briggs's Memorial," with a request that they report during the present session of the Synod.—*Carried.*

His Lordship appointed the following gentlemen:—the Revs. The Provost of Trinity College, F. L. Osler, Canon Baldwin, and J. Fletcher; Dr. McKelcan, and Mr. J. Carter.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The Rev. H. C. Cooper presented the Report of the Special Committee on the Constitution, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption.—(*See page 48*).

RELIEF OF SUPERANNUATED CLERGYMEN.

The Rev. H. C. Cooper moved the adoption of the Canon proposed by the Committee on the Relief of Superannuated Clergy; on being put to the Synod clause by clause, the first two paragraphs were adopted as follows:—

"Whereas it is desirable that a fund should be established from which pensions may be granted to Clergymen of the Diocese of Toronto, when incapacitated for duty by age or infirmity;

"Be it therefore enacted, that every Clergyman not receiving any stipend from the Commutation Fund, if desirous of securing for himself the benefit of the fund created by this Canon, shall pay the sum of five dollars annually to the same."

To the next paragraph, "with the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, the Offertory on Easter Day in all Churches and Chapels shall be appropriated to the same," it was moved in amendment by the Rev. J. Carry, seconded by the Rev. J. H. McCollum,

That out of the Harvest Thanksgiving Collection, the Lord Bishop be empowered to appropriate a percentage towards this Fund, but that such appropriation shall not apply to the present year.

Moved in amendment by Mr. D. E. Boulton, seconded by Mr. D. B. Read,

That the Canon be referred back to the Committee to consider and report upon a system of assessment that will provide for the Superannuation Fund.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. Canon Baldwin, seconded by Col. O'Brien,

That whatever sum be required for the support of any Clergymen incapacitated from duty and wholly dependent upon the liberality of the Church for their living, be raised by a *pro rata* addition to the annual assessment of the various Parishes for Synod purposes.—*Lost*.

Mr. D'Arcy E. Boulton's amendment was then put and lost.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. T. T. Robarts, seconded by the Rev. W. T. Smithett,

That every Communicant of the Church in the Diocese be invited to make an annual contribution to the Superannuation Fund, as a special freewill offering to God, to be presented at some period during the season of Lent through the offertory.—*Lost*.

The Rev. J. Carry's amendment was then put and lost.

Moved in amendment to the original paragraph by the Rev. J. Hilton, seconded by the Rev. J. Langtry,

That in order to raise a fund for the support of the Superannuated Clergy, the members of the Church generally be invited annually to give a special offering for that object, the said offering to be made during the season of Lent.—*Lost.*

Mr. Mayor Harman moved, seconded by Mr. R. A. Harrison,

That the subject of the necessity of a Superannuation Fund is one on which the Synod is agreed, but that as the opinions of the Synod as to the mode of raising such a Fund are diverse; it is desirable, and be it resolved, that the whole subject be referred back to the Committee to bring in a matured scheme, in which they will be greatly aided by the valuable suggestions thrown out during this discussion.—*Carried.*

SALARIES OF MISSIONARIES.

Moved by the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara, seconded by Mr. J. H. Perry,

That it be a recommendation from this Synod to its Mission Board, that the Salaries of its Missionaries, paid in whole or in part by the Board, be, for those in Priest's Orders \$800 per annum, and for those in Deacon's Orders \$600 per annum; and that this Synod pledges the Diocese to support this scheme.

The discussion of this resolution not being concluded at 6 o'clock, P.M., the debate was deferred to the following morning, and the Synod adjourned.

THIRD DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

THURSDAY, June 23, 1870.

The Synod assembled at St. George's Church, at 9 30, A.M.: Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. W. Belt. M. A.

After Divine Service, the Synod met in St. George's School-room for the transaction of business.

The minutes of the previous day's meeting were read by the Clerical Secretary, and approved.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. C. Magrath presented and read the Report of the Finance Committee, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption. (*See Appendix F.*)

Mr. D. B. Read presented and read the Report of the Special Committee on the sale of a Lot in Nottawasaga, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption. (*See Appendix W.*)

The Very Rev. the Dean stated that there was no Report from the Committee on the Bishop's Court, as there had been no meetings held.

The Rev. H. C. Cooper presented and read the Report of the Committee on the Canon for the relief of Superannuated Clergymen, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption. (The Report was subsequently referred to the Widows and Orphans' Fund Committee.)

STIPENDS OF MISSIONARIES.

The Synod then proceeded with the consideration of the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara's motion respecting the increase of the Stipends of Missionaries in the Diocese, laid over from the previous day.

After a prolonged discussion, the motion was put and carried unanimously, as follows :—

That it be a recommendation from this Synod to its Mission Board that the salaries of its Missionaries, paid in whole or in part by the Board, be, for those in Priest's orders \$800 per annum, and for those in Deacon's orders \$600 per annum; and that this Synod pledges the Diocese to support this scheme.

DIOCESAN SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.

Mr. Alexander Marling introduced the following series of resolutions, and asked leave that their consideration should be deferred till the Report of the Sunday School Committee be brought forward for adoption, which was granted :—

- (1) That it is expedient that a Diocesan Sunday School Association should be organized under the sanction of this Synod.

- (²) The object of the Association to be the promotion of Sunday School work on the most efficient system throughout the Diocese.
- (³) That the Association consist of the Lord Bishop, who shall be President, the Clergy, and a representative to be elected by the teachers of each Sunday School in the Diocese on a day to be named by the President.
- (⁴) That the first meeting of the association be held at such time and place as may be designated by the President, and that for such meeting fifteen Clergy and fifteen Representatives shall form a quorum.
- (⁵) That at the first meeting of the Association two Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Executive Committee of five Clergy and five Representatives shall be elected.
- (⁶) That an annual Report of the proceedings of the Association be presented to the Synod, and printed as an Appendix to the Journal.

ACT RESPECTING SALE OF LANDS.

Moved by the Rev. Canon Read, seconded by Mr. Wood,

That the Solicitors of the Synod be instructed to apply to the Provincial Legislature to amend the Act intended to give the Diocese of Toronto the same powers respecting the sale of lands as those possessed by Huron and Ontario.

Moved by Mr. R. A. Harrison, in amendment, seconded by Mr. A. H. Campbell,

That a select Committee be nominated by his Lordship the Bishop, to whom be referred the subject matter of the resolution of the Rev. Canon Read, with power to act thereon.—
Carried.

His Lordship appointed the following Committee:—Messrs. Wood, Harman, and R. A. Harrison.

THE TEMPORALITIES ACT.

Moved by the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara, seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That the matter comprised in the following notice of motion, viz: "That whereas the Minister of Justice for the Dominion of Canada has given his legal opinion, dated November 5th, 1869, that the approval required under the statute passed by the Legislature of the Province of Canada (29 & 30 Vic., cap. 15), entitled "An Act to make further provision in relation to the temporalities of the United Church of England and Ireland," by the Governor in Council, must be given by the Provincial Governments of Ontario and Quebec; he will move a resolution that a Memorial be presented to the Governments of Ontario and Quebec, respectfully praying them to sanction the Canon passed in the Provincial Synod of 1868, in accordance with the authority conferred upon it, so that it may become law," be committed as far as this Diocese is concerned, to the Committee charged with the care of the matter covered by the Rev. Canon Read's motion above cited.—*Carried.*

LENGTH OF SPEECHES.

On the suggestion of Mr. R. B. Denison and Mr. S. H. Blake, his Lordship ruled that during the remainder of the session of the Synod, the speeches of the mover and seconder of any motion be limited to ten minutes, and those of all others to five minutes. No member to speak twice on the same motion except to explain or to answer questions, unless by permission of the House.

LIBRARIES FOR MISSIONARIES.

His Lordship announced to the Synod that the Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge had placed in his hands forty Libraries for distribution among the Missiories of the Diocese.

QUARTERLY COLLECTIONS.

Moved by the Rev. Canon Brent, seconded by Rev. H. C. Cooper,

Whereas it appears that, in some instances, a portion of the Offertory taken up on the occasion of the Special Quarterly

Collections in all Churches and Stations of the Diocese for the Funds of the Synod has been customarily retained for Local Church purposes: *It is hereby recommended*, That in every case of such Special Quarterly Collections, the whole offertory be remitted to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod without any deduction.—*Lost*.

At 1 o'clock, P. M., the Synod adjourned for an hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

THURSDAY, June 23, 1870.

The Synod re-assembled at 2 o'clock, P. M.

SYNOD HOUSE.

Moved by Professor Wilson, seconded by Rev. Canon Read, Whereas the congregation of St. James's Cathedral, Toronto, find their present Parochial School House inadequate for the necessary requirements of their Sunday School, and have already had a proposition submitted to the Vestry for expending funds on its enlargement, the Synod be invited to consider the propriety of taking immediate steps for the erection of a Synod House, as it is believed that the Vestry of St. James will be prepared to grant a free site; and, with their present plans in view, additional funds might thereby be secured by some joint action in the work and arrangements for combining the accommodation required for the Parochial School House with that of the Diocesan Synod.—*Carried*.

A Committee was proposed to carry out this arrangement, consisting of the Very Rev. the Dean, Ven. Archdeacon of Toronto, Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara, Rev. Canon Baldwin, Rev. Rural Dean Geddes, Rev. W. S. Darling, Prof. Wilson, Messrs. C. S. Gzowski, J. Gillespie, J. H. Perry, S. B. Harman, J. S. McMurray, S. H. Blake, F. W. Cumberland, B. H. Dixon, C. Gamble, J. B. Sorley, W. Ince, and R. L. Denison.

Moved by the Rev. Canon Read, seconded by the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara,

That the proposed Committee be requested to confer with the authorities of St. James's Cathedral, and learn from them some estimate of the probable cost of the building; and that they report to the Synod to-morrow.—*Carried.*

OMISSION OF PORTIONS OF THE LITURGY.

Moved by the Rev. Canon Baldwin, seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That this Synod do respectfully petition the Provincial Synod to pass such a measure as will enable all Clergymen under the jurisdiction of the said Provincial Synod to omit certain portions of the Liturgy as they recur in the course of Divine Service, so that it may not be compulsory to repeat the same prayer twice or to make more than one solemn Declaration of Faith at any one Service.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. Canon Beaven, seconded by the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College,

That it is not expedient to desire any authority for omitting or changing any portion of the ordinary service of the Church in any regular service.—*Carried.*

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The Ven. Archdeacon of Toronto presented and read a Report from the Executive Committee in regard to the Bishop Strachan School, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption to-morrow. (*See Appendix S*)

Mr. Wm. Gamble read the Report of the Auditors of the Synod (*Appendix K*) and moved, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Lett,

That the Auditors' Report be adopted, and the suggestions contained in it be referred to the Executive Committee.—*Carried.*

REPORT OF THE CLERGY COMMUTATION TRUST COMMITTEE.

Mr. J. W. Gamble presented the Report of the Clergy Commutation Trust Committee (*Appendix I. (1)*), and moved, seconded by the Rev. J. H. Coachafer, that the Report be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Mackelcan, seconded by Col. O'Brien,

That the Report of the Sub-Committee of the Clergy Commutation Trust Committee be laid before the Synod and read.
—*Lost.*

The original motion was then put and carried.

The thanks of the Synod were unanimously voted to Mr. S. H. Blake for his admirable explanation of the Report of the Commutation Trust Committee.

At 6 o'clock, P. M., the Synod adjourned.

FOURTH DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

MORNING SESSION.

ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST'S DAY, FRIDAY, *June 24, 1870.*

The Synod met at St. George's Church, at 9.30 A. M.; the Prayers were said by the Rev. J. H. McCollum, M.A., the Lessons and the Ante-communion Service by the Rev. W. Stennett, M. A.

After Divine Service, the Synod withdrew to St. George's School-room, for the transaction of business.

The Minutes of the previous day's meeting were read by the Clerical Secretary, and approved.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The Clerical Secretary (on behalf of the Lord Bishop) presented and read the Report of the Mission Board and gave notice of a motion for its adoption. (*See Appendix N. (1).*)

Mr. A. H. Campbell presented and read the Report of the General Purposes Fund Committee and gave notice of a motion for its adoption. (*See Appendix P. (1).*)

The Rev. T. P. Hodge moved, seconded by the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara,

That the Special Committee on the Laws of Mortmain be reappointed, with the addition of the name of the mover.—*Carried.*

ENDOWMENT OF SEE COMMITTEE.

The Rev. Canon Read presented the Report of the Committee on the Endowment of the See—*Appendix II. (1)*—and moved, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Lett,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. J. M. Grover, seconded by Mr. Grierson:—

That the Endowment of the See Committee be instructed to make personal application by an agent or agents to all subscribers in arrears to the Fund by note or otherwise, in order to secure payment of the same or renewal of notes when desired, and that all amounts remaining unsettled for six months after such application has been made, shall be placed in the hands of the Solicitor of the Synod to be secured or collected.

Moved in amendment by Mr. S. H. Blake, seconded by Mr. Grierson,

That, instead of the words "all amounts ... collected," the following be substituted "the Committee be desired to take such steps as they may deem advisable for their collection."

The motion thus amended was put and carried.

RECTORY LANDS COMMITTEE.

The Rev. Canon Read presented the Report of the Rectory Lands Committee—*Appendix G (1)*,—and moved, seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

LAND AND INVESTMENT COMMITTEE.

The Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara presented the Report of the Land and Investment Committee (*Appendix E*), and moved, seconded by the Rev. J. Davidson,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND COMMITTEE.

The Rev. H. C. Cooper presented and read the Report of the Widows and Orphans' Fund Committee—*Appendix M* ⁽¹⁾, and moved, seconded by the Rev. Wm. Belt,

That the first portion of the Report, to the end of page 56, be received.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Mackelcan, seconded by the Rev. Dr. O'Meara,

That the Report of the Committee on the Widows and Orphans' Fund be received; but that this Synod desires that the terms of the By-law on the Widows and Orphans' Fund be in future adhered to, and that the case of Mrs. Lundy be referred back to the Committee for further consideration.—*Carried.*

The By-law reported by the Committee for making provision for the due administering of the Widows and Orphans' Fund was then brought forward and considered clause by clause.

The preamble and the first clause were read, and adopted, as follows :—

Whereas by the Act of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, passed in the 32nd year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, entitled "an Act to incorporate the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, and to unite the Church Society of the Diocese therewith," all moneys and property held in trust by the said Society for the benefit of the Widows and Orphans of Clergymen of the said Diocese, have been transferred to the Incorporated Synod of the same :—

It is therefore necessary to make such amendments in the By-law of the said Church Society for the administering of the Widows and Orphans' Fund as are required in consequence of the passing of the aforesaid Act, as well as other alterations now deemed by the said Synod to be expedient :—

1. *Be it therefore enacted as follows* :—The said Fund shall consist as heretofore of all rents, issues, or profits of lands or tenements now held, or that may hereafter be given, for the relief of the Widows and Orphans of Clergymen, and of all moneys now held, or that may hereafter be given or granted

for the same purpose, unless special provision be made by the grantor or donor of the same for the distribution thereof.

At one o'clock the Synod adjourned for an hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

FRIDAY, June 24, 1870.

At 2 o'clock, P. M., the Synod re-assembled, and proceeded with the consideration of the By-law for the administration of the Widows and Orphans' Fund.

The second clause was then read, and it was moved in amendment by Mr. Powis, seconded by the Rev. J. B. Worrell,

That this clause be omitted entirely.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by the Rev. N. Disbrow,

That the words "[each Clergyman] shall pay annually to the credit of the Widows and Orphans' Fund the sum of five dollars," in the second section of the proposed By-law, be struck out.—*Lost*.

The Rev. Canon Baldwin moved, seconded by Mr. A. H. Campbell,

That the words "the Mission Fund, the Divinity Students' Fund, and " be omitted.—*Lost*.

The amendment of Mr. Powis was then put and lost.

Moved by Mr. S. H. Blake, seconded by the Ven. Archdeacon of Toronto,

That the By-law of the Committee to make provision for the due administering of the Widows and Orphans' Fund be recommended to the said Committee in order that they may report thereon at the next meeting of this Synod; and that the names of the Rev. H. Holland, Mr. Powis, and Mr. Gaviller, be added to the Committee.—*Carried*.

Moved by Col. O'Brien, seconded by the Rev. Canon Baldwin,
That in accordance with the recommendation of the Com-

mittee on the Widows and Orphans' Fund, the application of Mrs. Ardagh—*See Appendix M. (4)*—be acceded to, and that she receive the usual pension allotted to Widows of Clergymen, on making the usual declaration required.—*Carried.*

REPORT ON SYNOD HOUSE.

Mr. Clarke Gamble presented and read the Report of the Special Committee on the erection of a Synod House, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption. The Report stated that the Committee had agreed that if the Cathedral authorities would give a site on such part of St. James's ground as should be approved of by the Committee, and the sum of \$3,000 to include their assessment towards the erection of Synod House, the Synod would give \$7,000 towards the same purpose: the total cost of the structure not to exceed \$10,000, the House to contain all the conveniences required by the Synod, the congregation to be allowed the use of the Synod Hall and such other rooms as they might require, for the use of their Sunday School, or for meetings during the week when the building was not required for the use of the Synod; provided the leave extended over a period of not less than five years, and not more than ten years; and provided that if the building should be abandoned by the Synod, it should revert to St. James's Church.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE SYNOD.

The Rev. Canon Baldwin moved, seconded by Mr. Wm. Magrath,

That the subject of the amended Constitution of the Synod be the next order of the day to be taken up.—*Carried.*

The Synod then proceeded to consider clause by clause the draft of the Constitution submitted by the Special Committee on the subject.

The Rev. H. C. Cooper read the first clause which was adopted as follows:—

1. THE INCORPORATED SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO
"shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the head of the Synod, and any Suffragan or Coadjutor Bishop

thereof, the Priests and Deacons of the same licensed by the Bishop or Suffragan, and of Lay Representatives to be elected "as hereinafter provided.—(Statute, January 23, 1869, 2nd section.)

Clause 2 was next read, as follows:—

2. The Lay Representatives shall be male Communicants of at least one year's standing, of the full age of twenty-one years, who shall have communicated at least three times during the twelve months previous to the election. They shall be elected at the Easter meeting held by each Minister having a separate Cure of souls, or at any meeting specially called for that purpose. At the first election after the passing of this Canon, there shall be elected three delegates—one for one year, another for two years, and a third for three years; and at all subsequent elections (unless a vacancy is to be filled) one only shall be elected who shall serve for three years, and all Laymen within the Cure, of twenty-one years of age or upwards, who shall annually sign a declaration in the form following, shall have the right of voting at the election: "I, ———, solemnly declare that I am a member of the United Church of England and Ireland; that I am an habitual worshipper with this congregation, and have not voted as a member of any other congregation within the year."

Moved in amendment by the Rev. Canon Beaven, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Lett,

That the words "who have not been in Holy Orders, and" be inserted after the words "twenty-one years."—*Carried*.

Moved by Mr. Fairbanks, seconded by Mr. Grierson,

That the second clause be amended by adding the following after the word "election" at the end of the first sentence, "and who are resident within, or habitual worshippers in, the Parish or Cure for which they shall be elected Representatives."—*Lost*.

Moved by Mr. Coleman, seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That two at least of such Delegates be residents of such parish or mission.—*Lost*.

Moved by the Rev. H. Holland, seconded by the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College,

That after the word "election," at the end of the first sentence, the following words be inserted, "provided that the Holy Communion shall have been administered so often during the year in the parish or part of the parish by which the said representatives are elected.—*Lost*.

Moved by Mr. R. A. Harrison, seconded by the Rev. Canon Baldwin,

That after the word "purpose" at the end of the second sentence, the following be inserted:—"In the event of there being a vacancy in any incumbency, owing to death or other cause, it shall notwithstanding be lawful for the congregation to meet for such election at such time and place as the Churchwardens shall appoint for the purpose.—*Carried*.

Moved by Mr. N. F. Paterson, seconded by Dr. Mackelcan,

That in the second sentence the word "annual" be inserted before the words "Easter Meeting."—*Carried*.

Moved by Mr. N. F. Paterson, seconded by Dr. Mackelcan,

That the third sentence as follows be omitted, "At the first election after the passing of this Canon there shall be elected three Delegates—one for one year, another for two years, and a third for three years; and at all subsequent elections (unless a vacancy is to be filled) one only shall be elected who shall serve for three years," and that the following be inserted in its place "and such Representatives shall be not more than three in number.—*Carried*.

The hour of 6 o'clock having arrived, the Synod adjourned till 7.30 o'clock, P. M.

EVENING SESSION.

FRIDAY, June 24, 1870.

The Synod re-assembled at 8 o'clock, P. M., and proceeded with the consideration of clause 2 of the Constitution.

Moved by Mr. R. A. Harrison, seconded by the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College,

That the following be added to clause 2:—

- (1) It shall be the duty of the Churchwardens to make, at least six weeks before the election, a list of persons entitled to vote at the election of Lay Delegates.
- (2) The said list shall be posted up in some conspicuous place for at least five weeks before the election.
- (3) The Incumbent and Churchwardens shall be a Court to decide on all questions as to the validity of the said list.
- (4) Any person complaining of having himself been wrongfully inserted upon or omitted from the said list, or that others have been improperly inserted upon or omitted from the said list, shall at least one week before the Court meets give notice to the Churchwardens of such his complaint, and of the cause and matter thereof.
- (5) Where the complaint is by one person against another of having been improperly omitted from or inserted upon the said list, at least two days' notice shall be given to the person against whom the complaint is made, so that he may appear and defend himself.
- (6) The list shall be final and no person shall be entitled to vote at such election whose name is not on the said list.
—*Lost.*

Clause 2 was then amended by the insertion of the words "in a book to be provided by the Parish for the purpose," after the words "sign a declaration" in the last sentence, and adopted.

Dr. Hodgins moved, seconded by the Ven. the Archdeacon of Niagara,

That the following be added as a sub-section of clause 2: In case there shall be two congregations in any Parish or Mission, the larger congregation shall have the right to elect two Representatives, and the smaller congregation one. In case there shall be three congregations in any Cure, each congregation shall be entitled to elect one Representative; and in case there shall be four or more congregations in any Cure, the largest as well as the next larger congregation shall each elect one Representative, and the remaining congregations shall

have the right to unite and elect the third Representative ; and in case of a vacancy in the Incumbency, the Easter meeting of each congregation shall be called by the Churchwardens thereof."—*Carried.*

Clause 3 was then read as follows :—

The Minister himself, if present, shall preside at the election ; and, in his absence, the Curate or Assistant Minister ; or in case neither the Minister nor his Assistant be present, a Chairman, to be elected by a majority of the electors present.

Moved by Mr. R. A. Harrison, seconded by Mr. Hewson, That the third clause be amended by inserting after the words "be present" the words "or if there be a vacancy in the Incumbency."—*Carried.*

The clause thus amended was then put and adopted.

Clause 4 was next read as follows :—

Within three days after such election, the Chairman of the meeting shall send to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod the amount assessed on the Parish or Cure, as hereinafter provided, together with a Certificate of such election according to the following form :—

"This is to certify that at a meeting held on the ——— day of ——— A.D. 187—, for the purpose of electing a Lay Representative (*or Lay Representatives*) in Synod for the Cure or Parish of ———, A. B., (*C. D., and E. F.*) being a communicant (*or communicants*) of at least one year's standing, of the full age of twenty-one years, and who has (*or have*) communicated at least three times during the year previous to the election, was (*or were*) elected by the laymen within this Cure, who have the right to vote at such election by virtue of their having signed the declaration provided in Section number two of the Constitution of 'The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Toronto.'

Date.]

———, "Chairman."

And on such certificate shall be endorsed as follows :

To the Secretaries of the Synod,

GENTLEMEN.—I have received the Synod Dues of this Parish or Cure ; you can therefore enter the names of the Lay Representatives on the Synod List.

Your obedient servant,

———, Secretary-Treasurer.

Which certificate so endorsed by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, shall by him be forwarded to the Secretaries, who shall enter the names of the Lay Representatives on the Synod List, to be printed and sent to each member of the Synod by the Executive Committee with the order of proceedings.

The Chairman of the meeting shall likewise furnish each Representative with a similar certificate ; without it, any person presenting himself as a Representative shall be required, before taking his seat, to afford sufficient proof that the requirements of the Synod have been complied with in his election. All Representatives shall continue in office until the next Meeting of the Synod after the election of their successors, or until they shall have resigned their office ; and every Representative resigning his office shall signify such resignation to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, who shall thereupon notify the Incumbent of the Parish of such resignation, in order to a new election being held.

No Representative shall be entitled to take his seat in the Synod until the assessment upon his Parish shall have been paid.

Clause 4 was amended by the alteration of the word "three" in the first line to "ten," and adopted.

Clause 5 was next read as follows :—If any Lay Representative be elected for more than one Parish, he shall, within one week after receiving notice thereof from the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, whose duty it shall be to send such notice, select the Parish for which he intends to sit and vote, and shall signify the same to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, who shall at once notify the Minister or Ministers of the other

Parish or Parishes for which such Representative shall have been elected; and thereupon such Minister or Ministers shall proceed to call a new election, by giving due notice thereof on two consecutive Sundays, such new election to take place within fifteen days from the receipt of the notification from the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod; and in case such Representative shall fail to make such selection, and to signify the same as herein required, the Secretary-Treasurer shall, within ten days after the expiration of the time allowed for making such selection, notify the Parish or Parishes that they proceed to a new election. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the number of Representatives of any Parish or Cure, either by death, removal from the country, resignation, or otherwise, the Minister of the said Parish or Cure shall in like manner, and within the same period, proceed to hold a new election to fill such vacancy, and the voters at the last election shall be entitled to vote at such new election without further registration.

Clause 5 was amended by the omission of the words "Parish or" after "notify the," and adopted.

Clauses 6 to 9, inclusive, (*see Appendix*) were adopted without alteration.

The first paragraph of clause 10 (*see Appendix*) was adopted without alteration.

Section (a) of clause 10 was then read as follows:—

- (a) The Secretary-Treasurer shall receive a salary of a year, which shall cover the remuneration to the said Secretary-Treasurer for all his services in respect of the various trusts and funds of the Synod, including all documents drawn up by him; which salary shall be payable quarterly.

After being amended by the filling up of the blank with the words "\$1400," and the omission of the words "including all documents drawn up by him," it was adopted.

Section (b) of clause 10 was read and adopted without alteration, as follows:—

- (b) It shall be the duty of the Secretaries to keep regular minutes of all proceedings of the Synod; to record them

in a book provided for that purpose ; to preserve all papers, memorials, and other documents ; to conduct the correspondence ; to attest the public acts of the Synod ; to deliver all records and documents to their successors in office, and to furnish daily, prefixed to the printed notices of motion, a summary statement or synopsis of the whole of the unfinished business before the Synod, in the order in which it is proposed to take it up.

Section (c) of clause 10 was read as follows :—

(c) It shall be the special office of the Secretary-Treasurer to attend to all the business of the Synod when not in session, under the direction of the Bishop, the Chairmen of Committees, and other Officers of the Synod ; and to draw up all legal and other documents required by the above-named Officers. And it shall be the further duty of the said Secretary-Treasurer to receive all moneys paid to him under the authority of the Synod, to keep them safely, to enter them in books requisite for that purpose ; and, under such regulations as may be made by the Executive Committee, to deposit all such sums as soon as they amount to \$100, to the credit of the said Synod, in such chartered Bank or Banks of the Dominion as may from time to time be approved by the said Executive Committee.

After being amended by the omission of the words, “and to draw up all legal and other documents required by the above-named Officers,” the section was adopted.

Section (d) of clause 10 was read, and adopted, as follows :—

(d) The said Secretary-Treasurer shall, under such regulations as may be made by the said Executive Committee, give security for the proper performance of his duties, and for the safe custody and deposit of all such moneys as may come into his hands as Secretary-Treasurer.

The first paragraph of clause 11 was read as follows :—

11. There shall be elected annually, on the third day of the meeting of Synod (as the first order of the day), eighteen Clerical and eighteen Lay Delegates to the Provincial Synod. Twelve of each order so elected, having the highest number of votes, shall be the Delegates to such Synod, and the remaining

six Clerical and six Lay Representatives shall be Substitute Delegates, to attend the Provincial Synod whenever, from sickness or other cause, the Delegates shall be unable to attend the Provincial Synod.

After being amended by the insertion after the words "elected annually," in the first line, the words "by the individual Clerical and Lay Members of the Synod respectively then present," and by the alteration of the words "eighteen Clerical and eighteen Lay" into "twelve Clerical and twelve Lay," and of the words "third day" into "second day," the word "so" into "thus," the words "the remaining six Clerical" into "six other Clerical," and after the word "Representatives," the words "next on the ballot list having the next highest number of votes," this paragraph was adopted.

Section (a) of clause II was read, and adopted, as follows :—

(a) Two Clerical Members and one Lay Representative, and two Lay Representatives and one Clerical Member (to be appointed by the Synod), shall be the scrutineers of the Clerical and Lay vote respectively.

Section (b) was read as follows :—

(b) Whenever any of the Delegates to the Provincial Synod shall be unable to attend its meeting, they shall be excused from such attendance upon notifying the Secretaries of the Synod of the fact at least a fortnight previous to the meeting of the Synod. The Secretaries shall thereupon notify the Substitutes, selecting them in the order in which their names stand upon the list, that they are required to attend the said meeting instead of the Delegates excused.

After being amended by the alteration of the words "Secretaries of the Synod" into "Secretaries of the Diocesan Synod," this section was adopted.

The first paragraph of clause 12 was next read as follows :

12. There shall be appointed annually, as the first business in the afternoon of the second day, an Executive Committee, to consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, eight Clerical and eight Lay Members of the Synod (one half of each order of whom shall be appointed by the Bishop, and the other half by a vote

of the Synod), and also of all the Chairmen of the several Standing Committees; of whom seven shall form a quorum, and who shall continue in office until their successors are appointed, and shall be called together by the Chairman or any three members of the Committee.

After being amended by the alteration of the words "eight Clerical and eight Lay" into "ten Clerical and ten Lay," and the omission of the words "and also of all the Chairmen of the several Standing Committees," on motion of Dr. Hodgins, seconded by Mr. W. Magrath, the paragraph was adopted.

Section (a) of clause 12 was read as follows:—

(a) It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to prepare in due form all such matters as the Bishop, or any member of the Synod, may desire to bring forward; to receive Reports of all other Committees, to examine and confirm, or refer them back with instructions to reconsider the same; but, in the event of any Committee so instructed re-affirming their previous Report, the Executive Committee shall submit such Report to the Synod; and said Committee shall prepare lists of all Standing Committees for the approval of the Synod.

Moved by Mr. S. H. Blake, seconded by Mr. R. A. Harrison,

That the words "to examine and confirm, or refer them back with instructions to reconsider the same; but in the event of any Committee so instructed re-affirming their previous Report, the Executive Committee shall" be omitted, and the words "and to" be inserted in their place.—*Carried.*

Section (b) of clause 12 was read, and adopted, as follows:—

(b) It shall also be the duty of the said Committee to print the Reports laid before them, or such parts of them as they may deem expedient, and to issue a circular under the Bishop's direction, stating the time and place of meeting, the business for the ensuing Synod, the order in which it shall be discussed, and the names of members of Synod, which circular shall be forwarded to each Clergyman and Lay Representative two weeks before the meeting of the Synod; and to pay out, or cause to be paid out, all moneys of the Synod, except those which are placed under the control of other Committees.

Clause 13 was read and adopted as follows :—

13. The business to be submitted to the Synod, to secure precedence in the order of proceedings, and all Reports of Committees, shall be sent to the Executive Committee three weeks before the meeting of the Synod.

The first paragraph of clause 14 was read, and adopted, as follows :—

14. The Standing Committees of the Synod shall meet quarterly, on the second Tuesday in the months of February, May, August, and November, and at such other times as they may deem necessary.

The next paragraph was read :—

These standing Committees shall be as follows :—

1. The Clergy Commutation Trust Committee.
2. The Endowment of the See, Rectory Lands, and Land and Investment Committee.
- ~~3. The Mission Board.~~
4. The Widows and Orphans' Fund, and Theological Students' Fund Committee.
5. The Statistics and Assessment Committee.
6. The Sunday School, and Book and Tract Committee.
7. The Audit Committee; and one-fourth of the members of the aforesaid, and of all Committees of Synod, shall be a quorum for the transaction of business.

On being amended by the insertion of the words "4. The Indian Missions Committee," after the words "The Mission Board;" the addition of the words "9. The Church Music Committee," after the words "The Audit Committee;" and the change of the words "one-fourth" into "one-third," the paragraph was adopted.

Moved by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune,

That after section 14, the following additional general regulations shall apply to all Committees of Synod :—

- (1) The Secretary-Treasurer shall convene the Quarterly and other Meetings of each Committee.

- (²) Each Committee shall from time to time choose its own Chairman.
- (³) All reports of Committees shall be in writing, signed by the Chairman.
- (⁴) The Chairman of each Committee, or any person on his behalf, shall explain, when requested by the Synod, any facts or other portions of the Report not understood.—
Carried.

At 11 o'clock, P.M., the Synod adjourned.

FIFTH DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

SATURDAY, June 25, 1870.

The Synod met at St. George's Church at 9.30, A. M.; Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. R. Harrison, M. A., and the Lessons were read by the Rev. A. J. Broughall, M. A. After Divine Service the Synod withdrew to St. George's School-room for the transaction of business.

The Minutes of the previous day's meeting were read and adopted.

CONSTITUTION OF THE SYNOD.

The consideration of the draft of the Constitution was resumed by the Synod.

Clause 14 was amended by the insertion of the words "General Purposes," before the words "Statistics and Assessment Committee."

Clause 15 was next read and after being amended by the omission of the words "of Toronto" after the word "City," was adopted. (*See Appendix.*)

Clause 16 was read, and adopted, with the same amendment. (*See Appendix.*)

The first paragraph of clause 17 was read and adopted.

On the second paragraph being read, it was moved in amendment by the Rev. S. Givins, seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That the second paragraph of clause 17 of the Constitution be a sub-section, and read as follows :—

The Indian Mission Committee shall consist of four Clerical and four Lay Representatives, who shall have charge of the Missions to the Indians, and shall manage and administer all moneys collected for, and all lands belonging to such Missions, upon the same trusts on which they were held by the late Church Society at the time of its Incorporation with the Synod, or in accordance with any By-laws which may hereafter be adopted by the Synod.—*Carried.*

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Lett, seconded by Mr. S. H. Blake,

That the members of the General Purposes Fund Committee, the Clergy Commutation Trust Committee, the Endowment of the See Committee, and the Widows and Orphans' Fund Committee, be paid their travelling expenses in attending the meetings of such Committees from the funds administered by them respectively ; and that the travelling expenses of the Members of the other Standing Committees be paid from the General Purposes Fund.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. Canon Read, seconded by the Rev. J. B. Worrell,

That in order to place all Committees on the same footing, the travelling expenses of the Members of the Clergy Commutation Trust Committee be not paid in future.—*Lost.*

The original motion was then put and carried. ✓

Clause 18 was read, and adopted, without amendment.

Clause 19 was read as follows :—

19. The Statistics and Assessment Committee shall consist of six Clergymen and six Laymen, members of the Synod, whose duty it shall be to prepare in tabular form the answers received from the Clergymen having cure of souls to the questions put to them by the Bishop of the Diocese relating to the statistics and condition of their several Cures, which shall afford (amongst other uses) a

basis of an equitable Assessment for the expenses of the Diocese, and to lay such table before the Synod in a convenient form for being printed as an Appendix to the Annual Report. It shall also be the duty of the said Committee to assess the several Parishes and Missions of the Diocese for all expenses authorized by the Synod, and for all other purposes for which an assessment may be ordered by the Synod.

Moved in amendment by Mr. S. H. Blake, seconded by the Rev. H. C. Cooper,

That clause 19 be amended by the insertion of the following words "General Purposes" before the word "Statistics" in the first line, and of the words "to provide means for the collection of, and to collect the General Purposes Fund so far as they can in pursuance of the By-laws of the late Church Society, and to manage the said Fund of the Synod, on the same trusts upon which it was held at the time of the incorporation of the said Church Society with the Synod, or in accordance with any By-law which may hereafter be adopted by the Synod; and also" before the words "to prepare in tabular form."—*Carried.*

The clause as thus amended was then put and carried.

Clauses 20 and 21 were adopted without amendment (*See Appendix*).

Moved by the Rev. Canon Beaven, seconded by the Rev. H. C. Cooper,

That after clause 21 the following clause be inserted:—

The Church Music Committee shall consist of six members, Clerical or Lay, whose duty it shall be to consider the Musical interests of the Diocese, and to take such steps as may from time to time appear desirable to advance and improve this portion of Divine worship.—*Carried.*

Clause 22 was adopted, without amendment, as follows, and Professor Wilson was added to the Committee on the adoption of the Seal:—

22. The Synod shall have a Common Seal, to be adopted by a Committee appointed by the Bishop, and the Bishop of the Diocese shall have the care and custody of the said Seal: and

he is hereby authorized and empowered to execute all deeds and documents which from time to time may be required to be executed on behalf of the Synod, pursuant to any resolution of the Synod, or any of the Committees thereof where such resolution is passed within the authority of such Committee. The mode of execution of such deeds and documents shall be by the Bishop causing the said Common Seal to be affixed thereto, and by his signature attesting the same.

Clause 23 was adopted, without amendment, as follows :—

23. No act or resolution of the Synod shall be valid without the concurrence of the Bishop and of a majority of the members of the Synod present, or of a majority of both orders, if a vote by orders be required ; and if a difference should be found to subsist between the orders, after a vote is taken, then the subject under consideration shall stand over to the ensuing Synod. This rule is not to refer to the election of a Bishop.

Clause 24 was next read as follows :—

24. The first meeting of the Synod in each session shall be preceded by public Morning Prayer, and a Sermon, and the celebration of the Holy Communion ; and the collection at the Offertory shall be devoted to Missionary or other purposes, on the recommendation of the Executive Committee. After Divine Service on the first day of meeting, the Clerical Secretary shall call over the Roll of the Clergy, to be furnished by the Bishop, and mark the names of those in attendance ; and the Lay Secretary shall call over the names of the several Parishes and their Representatives from the Synod List.

The election of the Honorary Secretaries and of the Secretary-Treasurer, shall then be proceeded with.

After this, on the first day, and on all other days after Morning Prayer the Order of Business shall be as follows :—

1. Reading, Correcting, and Approving the Minutes of the previous Meeting.
2. Appointing Committees.
3. Presenting, Reading, and Referring Memorials and Petitions and Correspondence.
4. Presenting Reports.

5. Giving Notice of Motions.
6. Taking up Unfinished Business.
7. Consideration of Motions.

On every day, after the first, the Synod shall meet at half-past nine, A.M., and shall be opened with Prayers appointed by the Bishop for the occasion.

Should an Evening Session of the Synod be desired, notice thereof shall be given not later than 5 o'clock, p.m., of the same day on which the Evening Session is desired.

Moved by the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara, seconded by the Rev. H. C. Cooper,

'That clause 24 be amended by the insertion of the following words after "Executive Committee:" "After Divine Service on the first day of meeting, a Committee of two, appointed by the Executive Committee, shall attend at the place of meeting of the Synod, to receive and examine the certificates of the Lay Representatives."—*Carried.*

The Clause, as thus amended, was then put and adopted.

Clauses 25 to 30 inclusive were read, and adopted without amendment.

Moved by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by Mr. S. H. Blake,

That the Canon on Contested Seats in the Synod, contained on pages 33 and 34 of the printed *Journal of the Synod* for last year, be incorporated in the Constitution of the Synod.

This motion was carried, with the following modification in the terms of the Canon itself.

Moved by Mr. N. F. Paterson, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Lett,

That after the word "thereon," in the last line of the last paragraph of the Canon on Contested Seats, the following words be added: "and to whom shall be referred for final adjudication all cases of doubtful certificates that may be mentioned in the Report of the Committee on the Certificates of the Lay Representatives."

Moved by the Rev. H. C. Cooper, seconded by the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara,

That the Constitution of the Synod as now amended be adopted.—*Carried.*

Moved by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune,

That for convenience of reference the sections of the Constitution be re-numbered so as to incorporate the sub-sections adopted yesterday and to-day as separate sections.—*Carried.*

Mr. R. A. Harrison moved, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Lett,

That any proposition for an alteration of the Constitution shall be first communicated to the Executive Committee, and be by it laid before the Synod, to be considered at the ensuing meeting of the Synod, and if approved by a majority at that meeting, shall lie over till the next ensuing meeting of the Synod, and if again approved by a majority consisting of two-thirds of both Clergy and Laity, it shall be adopted.

This motion, on being put to the Synod, was ordered to lie over for consideration to the next meeting of the Synod.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The Rev. S. Givins read the Report of the Indian Missions Committee, (*Appendix O* (1.)) and moved, seconded by the Rev. J. Chance,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

Mr. Dartnell read the Report of the Theological Students' Fund Committee—(*Appendix L* (1))—and moved, seconded by the Rev. C. E. Thomson,

That the Report, with the By-Law—(*Appendix D.*)—attached thereto, be adopted.—*Carried.*

The Rev. Canon Read read the Report of the Committee on Sunday Schools—(*Appendix Q.*)—and moved, seconded by the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

The Rev. Canon Beaven read the Report of the Book and Tract Committee—(*Appendix R.*)—and moved, seconded by the Rev. Dr. O'Meara,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

The Rev. Canon Beaven read the Report of the Church Music Committee—(*Appendix T.*)—and moved, seconded by Mr. Dartnell,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

The Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara presented the Report of the Statistics Committee—(*Appendix Z.*)—from which it appeared that only 74 out of 112 Parishes and Missions had reported. He moved, seconded by Mr. R. L. Denison,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

The Rev. S. Givins presented the Report of the Special Committee on Insuring the Lives of the Clergy—(*Appendix V.*)—and moved, seconded by the Rev. H. C. Cooper,

That the Report be adopted, and that the plan therein recommended be put in operation for the ensuing year; and that with a view to make provision as well for the support of the Superannuated Clergy, as for that of the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy, by means of insurance, it be recommended that the whole subject be referred to the Committee on the Widows and Orphans' Fund, who shall communicate during the ensuing recess with Committees appointed by the other Dioceses for the purpose, with a view to the formation of a general measure for the whole Province.—*Carried.*

On motion, the Report of the Special Committee on Superannuated Clergymen was referred to the Widows and Orphans' Fund Committee.

Moved by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by the Rev. T. W. Allen, that the Report of the Special Committee on Patronage be the first order of the day on Monday afternoon.—*Carried.*

NOTICES OF THE MEETINGS OF COMMITTEES.

Moved by the Rev. J. Carry, seconded by the Rev. J. H. McCollum,

That brief notices of the meetings of the several Committees of Synod, as formerly of the Quarterly meetings of the Church Society, be in future published in whatever paper the Synod may choose; giving the names of the members in attendance

and an outline of the work done ; and that copies be sent to all the members of the Synod.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by Mr. Paterson,

That the motion of the Rev. J. Carry, and the following notice of motion of the Mover be referred to the Executive Committee, with power to act thereon, viz. :—

(1.) That a publication (to be called the *Toronto Synod Gazette*,) shall be issued quarterly by the Secretaries, under the direction of the Bishop, and sent free to each member of Synod.

(2.) This *Gazette* shall contain the following information :—

- (a) A summary of the proceedings of each of the Quarterly and other meetings of Committees of Synod with the names of members present.
- (b) The "Journal" of the Synod now published in a separate form.
- (c) Pastorals, &c., issued by the Bishop, and Official Notices from the Bishop, the Secretaries, or other Officers and Committees of Synod.
- (d) Copies of Reports of Committees confirmed by the Executive Committee or re-affirmed to it, as provided in the 12th section of the Constitution.
- (e) Acknowledgments of all Moneys received from Parishes or Missions on behalf of any Synod object.
- (f) Any Circulars or Notices relating to the business of the Synod, not included in the foregoing sections.—The amendment was *Carried*.

The hour of one o'clock, P.M., having arrived, the Synod adjourned until two o'clock, P.M., on Monday, June 27.

SIXTH DAY.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

MONDAY, June 27, 1870.

The Synod reassembled at 2 o'clock, P.M.; prayers were said by the Very Rev. the Dean of Toronto.

The Minutes of Saturday's meeting were read and approved.

The Clerical Secretary read a note from Mr. R. Sydney Birch resigning his seat in the Synod as Delegate from St. Stephen's, Toronto.

Mr. Wood presented and read the Report of the Special Committee on Application to Parliament on Land, &c., Acts, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption.—(See Appendix X⁽²⁾)

SOLEMNIZATION OF HOLY MATRIMONY.

Moved by the Rev. T. Carry, seconded by the Rev. T. W. Allen,

That this Synod, with a view to maintaining in due honor and veneration the Ordinance of Holy Matrimony as a sacred rite of the Christian Church, express it as their solemn conviction that it is desirable that marriages may not be solemnized except in Churches, nor between parties who are either one or both unbaptized.

The motion was carried on the following division: *Yeas 44; Nays 33.*

REPORT ON STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Ven. Archdeacon of Toronto presented and read the Report of the Executive Committee on the nomination of the Standing Committees of the Synod, and, seconded by the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara, moved that it should be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Professor Wilson, seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That the Report be recommitted to the Executive Committee to report after the recess.—*Carried.*

PATRONAGE OF THE RECTORIES.

The Ven. the Archdeacon of Toronto read the following Report of the Special Committee on Patronage, and moved, seconded by Mr. S. H. Blake, that it be adopted.

To the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto. —

The Committee appointed at the last Annual Session of the Synod to "confer with the Lord Bishop, and to report to the Synod in what manner the patronage of the various Rectories and Incumbencies in the Diocese shall be dispensed," beg to report,

That the Committee have had several conferences with the Lord Bishop in reference to the important subject of the future administration of the patronage of this Diocese, and that, as the result of such conferences, and of their anxious and careful deliberations, the Committee, with the concurrence of the Bishop, report the following proposed Canon to the Synod, and recommend its adoption:—

CANON ON PATRONAGE.

1. The Synod of the Diocese shall elect annually two Clerical members and one Lay member of the Synod, to be a Committee of Patronage for the Diocese, who shall hold office until the next annual meeting of the Synod.
2. When a vacancy in a Parish or Mission shall occur, the Committee of Patronage of the Diocese, together with the Lay Delegates of the Parish or Mission so vacant, shall form a Board of Nomination to fill such vacancy.
3. This Board shall nominate one Clergyman in Priest's orders, and otherwise fitted to undertake such cure, and shall return his name to the Bishop, who shall forthwith institute the Clergyman so nominated, if satisfied of his fitness.
4. If such approval be not had, a fresh nomination shall be made as aforesaid, by such Board, and so on, until the Bishop is satisfied as to the fitness of the Clergyman proposed, who shall thereupon be instituted by him.
5. When no nomination shall be made to the Bishop within two months after a vacancy in any Parish or Mission shall

have occurred, the appointment to the incumbency of such Parish or Mission shall lapse to the Bishop.

6. The foregoing provisions shall not apply to any Parish or Mission, the Incumbent of which is paid either wholly or partially from the Mission Fund; so long as such payment shall be required, the nomination shall be in the Bishop.

7. It shall be lawful for the Nominators of any cure, upon the occurrence of a vacancy, to signify to the Bishop in writing their desire to leave the nomination to him, who shall thereupon institute any duly qualified Clergyman whom he may think fit.

All which is respectfully submitted.

ARTHUR PALMER,

Moved in amendment by Professor Wilson, seconded by Mr. A. H. Campbell,

That clause 2 of the Canon be amended as follows:—

When a vacancy in a Parish or Mission shall occur, a meeting of the Congregation shall within fourteen days from the occurrence of such vacancy be called by the Churchwardens of the Church or Churches within such parish or mission, at which meeting three Laymen to be called Nominators shall be elected by those legally entitled to vote for Lay Delegates; in case there be more than one Church in a Parish or Cure, the meeting for the election of Nominators for such Parish or Cure shall be held in or near the Church which on the Easter Day of the year preceding had the largest number of Communicants, such Nominators, together with the Committee of Patronage of the Diocese shall form a Board, of which Board the Nominator standing highest on the list shall be convener, and such meeting shall be held in the Parish or Cure where the vacancy occurs.

Moved in amendment to the foregoing amendment by Mr. Westmacott, seconded by Mr. Lewis,

That the following words be inserted in clause two of the Canon:—"Together with the Archdeacon for that part of the Diocese where the vacancy occurs, the Rural Dean of the district, with the Churchwardens, if Communicants, and the Lay Delegates of the Parish.—*Lost.*

The Rev. T. W. Allen moved, in amendment to the amendment of Professor Wilson, seconded by Col. O'Brien,

That within one month of the occurrence of a vacancy in any Parish, the representatives of such Parish, that is to say, the Churchwardens and Lay Delegates to the Synod, residing in the Parish, hold conference with the Bishop of the Diocese in order to fill up such vacancy by electing a Clergyman acceptable to the Parish and approved by the Bishop; the Clergyman thus chosen shall be the Incumbent of such Parish; but in case no election be thus effected, the names of the Clergymen nominated respectively by the Bishop and representatives of the Parish shall be brought before the people of such Parish in a meeting duly called, and the Clergyman having three-fourths of the votes of those entitled to vote for Lay Delegates, shall be the Incumbent of such Parish.—*Lost.*

Moved, in amendment to the original amendment, by the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College, seconded by Mr. S. G. Wood,

That on the vacancy of any Rectory, Incumbency, or Mission within the Diocese, (with the exception of Missions sustained in whole or in part by the Mission Board, the mode of appointment to which Missions shall continue as heretofore), the appointment to the vacancy shall rest with the Lord Bishop of the Diocese: it being, however, provided that, before making such appointment, the Bishop shall consult with the Churchwardens of the vacant Parish or Mission, and with the Lay Delegates of the same, (if such Lay Delegates are resident within said Parish or Mission) for the purpose of receiving any objections which they may make against the proposed appointment.

On being put to the vote the following division took place:—

In the absence of the Chairman of the Committee the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune presented the Report of the Finance Committee—(*Appendix F.*)—and moved, seconded by the Rev. H. C. Cooper,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

THE BISHOP STRACHAN SCHOOL.

The Ven. Archdeacon of Toronto read the Report of the Executive Committee respecting the Bishop Strachan School, and moved that the Report be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Grierson, seconded by the Rev. J. B. Worrell,

That whereas it is expedient to place the Bishop Strachan School under the direct management of the Synod, in order to its more general support by the Laity of the Church,

It is resolved, that, on the passage of an Act of the Legislature for the transfer of the governing power to this Synod, the Executive Committee of this Synod shall nominate a Committee to be composed of sixteen members, of whom eight shall be Clergy and eight Laity, to constitute the governing body of the said School until the next meeting of the Synod.

Moved in amendment by the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara, seconded by the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College,

That it is desirable that the selection of six Clerical and six Lay Members of the Council of the Bishop Strachan School should be made by the joint vote of the Clergy and Laity of this Diocese, in Synod assembled.

At 1 o'clock the Synod adjourned for an hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

TUESDAY, June 28, 1870.

At 2 o'clock, P.M., the Synod re-assembled.

After a prolonged discussion on motions respecting the Bishop Strachan School, it was moved by the Rev. H. C. Cooper, seconded by the Ven. Archdeacon of Niagara,

That the Synod do now proceed to the next order of the day.—*Carried.*

REPORT OF THE MISSION BOARD.

The Clerical Secretary, in behalf of the Lord Bishop, Chairman of the Board, presented the Report of the Mission Board—(*Appendix N*⁽¹⁾)—and moved, seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

GENERAL PURPOSES FUND.

Mr. A. H. Campbell presented the Report of the General Purposes Fund Committee—(*Appendix P*⁽¹⁾)—and moved, seconded by the Rev. H. Holland,

That the Report of the General Purposes Fund Committee be referred to the General Purposes, Statistics, and Assessment Committee, for the purpose of enquiring further into the facts of the Darlington Rectory case, with power to take the advice of counsel, and to act thereon.—*Carried.*

Moved by the Rev. H. Holland, seconded by Dr. Mackelcan,
(1) That the proceeds of a revised assessment of the Diocese, on a scale not to exceed that of former years on the whole by

more than twenty-five per cent., which the Assessment Committee are hereby empowered to make, be applied to meet expenses directly connected with the meetings of the Synod.

(2) That for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses incurred in the management of the several Trusts and Funds now transferred to, or that may hereafter be vested in the Incorporated Synod, whatever sum may be required beyond that produced by the rent of lands or the interest of investments held for the General Purposes of the Synod, shall be raised by an equal ratable per centage on the several Funds administered by the Synod.—*Carried.*

MEMORIAL OF THE REV. S. BRIGGS.

The Rev. the Provost of Trinity College read the Report of the Special Committee on the Memorial of the Rev. S. Briggs—(*Appendix U.*)—and moved, seconded by Mr. Carter,

That the Report be adopted.—*Carried.*

Moved by the Rev. Canon Baldwin, seconded by Mr. D. B. Read,

That the Synod recommend that, inasmuch as the Rev. S. Briggs has not received anything from the Church Society or Mission Board of the Diocese since October, 1868, the proposed grant of \$200 per annum do date from the 1st of October last.—*Carried.*

NOTTAWASAGA GLEBE.

Mr. D. B. Read read the Report of the Special Committee on the sale of the lot in Nottawasaga—(*Appendix W.*)—and moved, seconded by the Rev. Canon Beaven,

That the Report be adopted.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. Dr. Lett, seconded by Mr. William Gamble,

That the Report be not now adopted, but that it, together with the resolution of last session on the sale of the lot in Nottawasaga, be referred to a Committee of three, to be appointed by the Lord Bishop.—*Carried.*

His Lordship appointed the following Committee :—Messrs.
R. A. Harrison, S. H. Blake, and Rev. H. C. Cooper.

SYNOD HOUSE.

Mr. C. Gamble read the Report of the Special Committee on a Synod House, and moved that it should be adopted.

After some discussion the Report was withdrawn by Mr. Gamble.

MARRIAGE WITHIN THE PROHIBITED DEGREES.

The Rev. Canon Beaven moved, seconded by the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College,

That this Synod do affirm its deliberate conviction that no Clergyman of our Church is justified in celebrating Marriage between persons standing within the Prohibited Degrees of consanguinity or affinity. And that it do request the Lord Bishop to appoint a Committee to report on the course which should be adopted in respect of persons, members of our Communion, who have contracted a marriage of this description.

At 6 o'clock, P.M., the Synod adjourned for an hour and a-half.

EVENING SESSION.

TUESDAY, June 28, 1870.

At 8 o'clock, P.M., the Synod re-assembled, and proceeded with the consideration of the Rev. Canon Beaven's motion respecting Marriage within the Prohibited Degrees.

In amendment to Rev. Canon Beaven's motion, it was moved by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by Mr. R. B. Denison,

That as there is great uncertainty felt among members of our Communion in this country on the subject involved in Canon Beaven's resolution, the Synod would appoint a Committee of five members to inquire fully into the matter, and

report at its next meeting; the Committee to consist of the Rev. Canon Beaven, the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College, Ven. Archdeacon Fuller, Rev. Canon Baldwin, and the Hon. J. H. Cameron.

After some discussion, the Rev. Canon Beaven, with the concurrence of the seconder, withdrew his motion, and gave notice that he would move for its adoption at the next meeting of the Synod, as follows:—

That this Synod do affirm its deliberate conviction that no Clergyman of our Church is justified in celebrating Marriage between persons standing within the Prohibited Degrees of consanguinity or affinity.

STATUS OF THE CLERGY.

Mr. W. H. Boulton gave notice that he would move the following resolution at the next meeting of the Synod:—

That a Committee be appointed to report upon the present status of the Clergy in this Diocese, and in connection therewith to consider and report upon the following points, viz.: The present extent of the authority of the Bishop to appoint or remove a Clergyman to or from his Incumbency or Mission, with or without his consent, or of his Congregation, and the proceedings necessary to be taken in reference to such appointment or removal.

DIOCESAN MISSIONARY MEETING DURING SYNOD.

The Ven. the Archdeacon of Niagara (in the absence of Prof. Wilson) moved, seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That a Diocesan Missionary Meeting shall constitute a part of the Annual Proceedings of the Synod.—*Carried.*

CELEBRATION OF MATRIMONY.

Moved by the Rev. J. Chance, seconded by the Rev. Dr. O'Meara,

That a Committee be appointed to enquire into the grievance that affects all Protestant bodies in this Province, inasmuch as

Romanists have certain advantages over them in reference to the all-important matter of the Celebration of Matrimony.—*Carried.*

His Lordship appointed the following Committee:—Messrs. R. A. Harrison, Q.C., Thomas Hodgins, M.A., T. H. Spencer, LL.D., Professor Wilson, LL.D., and D. B. Read, Q.C.

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Rev. H. C. Cooper, seconded by the Rev. W. Belt, moved, That, in the hope that the estimated deficiency in the 'Widows and Orphans' Fund for the current year will be met by an increased liberality on the part of the members of the Church in the October Collection for that Fund, it is not expedient to make any reduction in the present amount of annuities.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. A. J. Broughall, seconded by Mr. R. B. Denison,

That the annual grant to the Widows and Orphans now on the List be reduced in the case of each to such an extent that the aggregate amount paid be not more than the actual income arising from this Fund during the past year, and that in case the actual state of the Fund in October next permit it, the sum heretofore paid to each be continued.—*Carried.*

THE CHURCH CHRONICLE.

Moved by the Rev. T. W. Allen, seconded by the Rev. J. Carry,

That the *Church Chronicle* be suspended, and Reports, &c., of Synod be published in the *Church Herald*.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by the Rev. S. Givins,

That the motion of the Rev. T. W. Allen be referred to the Executive Committee, with full power to act in the matter.—*Lost.*

The original motion was then put and carried,

VOTES OF THANKS.

Moved by Mr. N. F. Paterson, seconded by the Rev. Dr. O'Meara,

That the thanks of the Synod are hereby tendered to the Ladies of Toronto for their kindness in providing Lunch for the members of the Synod at the Orphans' Home; and also to the different Railway Companies for having made liberal reductions in the fares of the members of the Synod.—*Carried.*

Moved by the Rev. Provost of Trinity College, seconded by the Rev. Dr. O'Meara,

That the thanks of the Synod are due, and are hereby tendered, to the Choir of St. James's Church, the Ladies of the Bishop Strachan School, and others, for their valuable assistance in the Service at the opening of the Synod, imparting to that Service a warmth and earnestness which it could not otherwise have possessed.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. N. F. Paterson, seconded by Mr. C. Gamble,

That the thanks of the Synod be presented to the Honorary Clerical and Lay Secretaries of the Synod for their valuable services.—*Carried.*

Moved by the Rev. T. W. Allen, seconded by Mr. N. F. Paterson,

That the members of the Synod hereby gratefully acknowledge the courtesy of the Board of Directors of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute in offering to them the privilege of the Reading-room during the Session; and also that of the President of University College in inviting the members of the Synod to visit the University Buildings.—*Carried.*

Moved by the Rev. H. C. Cooper, seconded by the Rev. J. Carry,

That the Lord Bishop of the Diocese be requested by the Synod now in Session to tender its grateful thanks for the kind sympathy evinced by the Venerable Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, for the labours of our Missionaries in presenting for distribution, in Rural Parishes, forty Libraries selected from the list of its valuable publications.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. J. H. Perry, seconded by the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune,

That the Secretary-Treasurer be instructed to apply to the authorities of the respective Railway Companies, with a view to obtaining for the members of the Committees of the Synod the privilege of travelling at reduced fares when coming to Toronto to attend the Committee meetings.—*Carried.*

Moved by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by Mr. C. Gamble,

That the Secretary-Treasurer be instructed to pay the usual sum for the use of St. George's School-room by the Synod for the past and present year.—*Carried.*

The business of the Synod being now concluded, the Lord Bishop after having addressed to the members present a few appropriate words on the work of the Session, pronounced the Benediction, and declared the Synod prorogued.

APPENDIX B.

THE CONSTITUTION

OF THE

*Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Toronto,**As adopted at the Eighteenth Session, June, 1870.*

COMPOSITION OF THE SYNOD.

1. THE INCORPORATED SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO "shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the head of the Synod, and any Suffragan or Coadjutor Bishop thereof, the Priests and Deacons of the same licensed by the Bishop or Suffragan, and of Lay Representatives to be elected" as hereinafter provided. (Statute, January 23, 1869, 2nd section.)

QUALIFICATIONS OF LAY REPRESENTATIVES.

2. The Lay Representatives shall be male Communicants of at least one year's standing, of the full age of twenty-one years, who have not been in Holy Orders, and who shall have communicated at least three times during the twelve months previous to the election. They shall be elected at the Annual Easter Meeting held by each Minister having a separate Cure of souls, or at any meeting specially called for that purpose, and such Representatives shall be not more than three in number. In the event of there being a vacancy in any Incumbency, owing to death or other cause, it shall, notwithstanding, be lawful for the congregation to meet for such election at such time and place as the Churchwardens shall appoint for the purpose. And all Laymen within the Cure, of twenty-one years of age or upwards, who shall annually sign a declaration in the form following, shall have the right of voting at the election: "I, ———, solemnly declare that I am a member of the United Church of England and Ireland; that I am an habitual worshipper with this congregation [naming it], and have not voted as a member of any other congregation within the year."

PARISHES WITH TWO OR MORE CONGREGATIONS.

3. In case there shall be two or more congregations in any Parish or Mission, the larger congregation shall have the right to elect two Representatives, and the smaller congregation one. In case there shall be three congregations in any Cure, each congregation shall be entitled to elect one Representative; and in case there shall be four, or more congregations in any Cure, the largest as well as the next larger congregation shall each elect one Representative, and the remaining congregations shall have the right to unite and elect the third Representative; and in case of a vacancy in the Incumbency, the Easter Meeting of each congregation shall be called by the Churchwardens thereof.

WHO SHALL PRESIDE AT THE ELECTIONS.

4. The Minister himself, if present, shall preside at the election; and, in his absence, the Curate, or Assistant Minister; or in case neither the Minister nor his Assistant be present, or if there be a vacancy in the Incumbency, a Chairman, to be elected by a majority of the electors present shall preside.

CERTIFICATE AND ASSESSMENT TO BE SENT TO SYNOD OFFICER.

5. Within ten days after such election, the Chairman of the meeting shall send to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod the amount assessed on the Parish or Cure, as hereinafter provided, together with a Certificate of such election according to the following form:

"This is to certify, that at a meeting held on the _____ day of _____ A. D. 18—, for the purpose of electing a Lay Representative (or *Lay Representatives*) in Synod for the Cure or Parish of _____, A. B., (*C. D., and E. F.*) being a communicant (or *communicants*) of at least one year's standing, of the full age of twenty-one years, and who has (or *have*) communicated at least three times during the year previous to the election, was (or *were*) elected by the laymen within this Cure, who have the right to vote at such election by virtue of their having signed the declaration provided in section number two of the Constitution of 'The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Toronto.'

GENTLEMEN.—I have received the Synod Dues of this Parish or Cure; you can therefore enter the names of the Lay Representatives on the Synod List.

Which certificate so endorsed by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, shall by him be forwarded to the Secretaries, who shall enter the names of the Lay Representatives on the Synod List, to be printed and sent to each member of the Synod by the Executive Committee with their order of proceedings.

CERTIFICATE TO LAY REPRESENTATIVE—PERIOD OF OFFICE.

The Chairman of the Meeting shall likewise furnish each Representative with a similar certificate; without it, any person presenting himself as a Representative shall be required, before taking his seat, to afford sufficient proof that the requirements of the Synod have been complied with in his election. All Representatives shall continue in office until the next Meeting of the Synod after the election of their successors, or until they shall have resigned their office; and every Representative resigning his office shall signify such resignation to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, who shall thereupon notify the Incumbent of the Parish of such resignation, in order to a new election being held.

SYNOD DUES MUST BE PAID BEFORE SEAT BE TAKEN.

No Representative shall be entitled to take his seat in the Synod until the assessment upon his parish shall have been paid.

IN CASE OF DUAL ELECTION, &C., REPRESENTATIVE TO SELECT.

6. If any Lay Representative be elected for more than one Parish, he shall, within one week after receiving notice thereof from the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, whose duty it shall be to send such notice, select the Parish for which he intends to sit and vote, and shall signify the same to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, who shall at once notify the Minister or Ministers of the other Parish or Parishes for which such Representative shall have been elected; and thereupon such Minister or Ministers shall proceed to call a new election, by giving due notice thereof on two consecutive Sundays, such new election to take place within fifteen days from the receipt of the notification from

the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod ; and in case such Representative shall fail to make such selection, and to signify the same as herein required, the Secretary-Treasurer shall, within ten days after the expiration of the time allowed for making such selection, notify the Parishes that they proceed to a new election. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the number of Representatives of any Parish or Cure, either by death, removal from the country, resignation, or otherwise, the Minister of the said Parish or Cure shall in like manner, and within the same period, proceed to hold a new election to fill such vacancy, and the voters at the last election shall be entitled to vote at such new election without further registration.

[NOTE.—In case of a vacancy in the Incumbency, the meeting for the election of a Representative is to be called by the Churchwardens, as provided in the second and third sections above.]

MEETING, ADJOURNMENT, OR DISSOLUTION OF THE SYNOD.

7. The Synod shall meet annually on the first Tuesday in June, or at such other period as may be deemed expedient by the Bishop, who shall also appoint the place of meeting, and shall adjourn or dissolve the Synod, as may appear to him most conducive to the welfare of the Diocese.

FORM OF PRAYER TO BE USED BEFORE AND DURING SYNOD MEETING.

8. During one month previous to the meeting of the Synod, each Minister shall, at Morning and Evening Service, use the following Form of Prayer for the Divine blessing on the proceedings of the Synod :

ALMIGHTY FATHER, who in the beginning of the Gospel didst cause the Apostles and Elders to meet together under the guidance of Thy Holy Spirit ; and hast promised, through Thy Son Jesus Christ, to be with Thy Church to the end of the world : Vouchsafe, we pray Thee, to be present with the Synod of this Diocese now about to assemble [*or now assembled*] ; give unto them the spirit of wisdom, patience, love, and of a sound mind ; and so direct, sanctify, and govern them, that they may seek truth and peace ; and that through them the saving Gospel of Christ may be more effectually preached and ministered, Thy dispersed sheep gathered into the fold, and Thy holy Church established, strengthened, settled, united, and sanctified ; through the merits and intercession of the same Jesus Christ, Thy Son our Lord.

PRESIDING OFFICER OF THE SYNOD.

9. When the Bishop is not present, and has not appointed a deputy, then the Senior Dignitary or Clergyman of the Diocese present shall preside in his place.

QUORUM OF THE SYNOD.

10. A quorum of the Synod shall consist of not less than one-fourth of the whole number of the Clergy, and one-fourth of the Lay Representatives of the several Parishes of the Diocese; and no business shall be transacted without a quorum.

OFFICERS OF THE SYNOD TO BE ELECTED ANNUALLY.

11. There shall be two Honorary Secretaries of the Synod, one a Clergyman, the other a Layman, both members of the Synod; the former to be elected by the Clergy, and the latter by the Lay Representatives; and there shall also be a Secretary-Treasurer, to be appointed by the vote of the Synod; and such elections and appointments shall be held and made on the first business day of the annual meeting of the same.

SECRETARY-TREASURER AND HIS SALARY.

12. The Secretary-Treasurer shall receive a salary of \$1400 a year, which shall cover the remuneration to the said Secretary-Treasurer for all his services in respect to the various trusts and funds of the Synod; which salary shall be payable quarterly.

DUTIES OF HONORARY SECRETARIES.

13. It shall be the duty of the Honorary Secretaries to keep regular minutes of all proceedings of the Synod; to record them in a book provided for that purpose; to preserve all papers, memorials, and other documents; to conduct the correspondence; to attest the public acts of the Synod; to deliver all records and documents to their successors in office, and to furnish daily, prefixed to the printed notices of motion, a summary statement or synopsis of the whole of the unfinished business before the Synod in the order in which it is proposed to take it up.

DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY-TREASURER.

14. It shall be the special office of the Secretary-Treasurer to attend to all the business of the Synod when not in session, under the direction of the Bishop, the Chairmen of Committees, and other officers of the Synod. And it shall be the further

duty of the said Secretary-Treasurer to receive all moneys paid to him under the authority of the Synod, to keep them safely, to enter them in books requisite for that purpose; and, under such regulations as may be made by the Executive Committee, to deposit all such sums as soon as they amount to \$100, to the credit of the said Synod, in such chartered Bank or Banks of the Dominion as may from time to time be approved by the said Executive Committee.

SECRETARY-TREASURER SHALL GIVE SECURITY.

15. The said Secretary-Treasurer shall, under such regulations as may be made by the said Executive Committee, give security for the proper performance of his duties, and for the safe custody and deposit of all such moneys as may come into his hands as Secretary-Treasurer.

ELECTION OF DELEGATES' SUBSTITUTES TO PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

16. There shall be elected annually, by the individual Clerical and Lay members of the Synod, respectively, then present, on the second day of the meeting of Synod (as the first order of the day), twelve Clerical and twelve Lay Delegates to the Provincial Synod. Twelve of each order thus elected, having the highest number of votes, shall be the Delegates to such Synod; and six other Clerical and six Lay Representatives whose names shall be next on the ballot, having the next highest number of votes, shall be Substitute-Delegates, to attend the Provincial Synod whenever, from sickness or other cause, the Delegates shall be unable to attend the Provincial Synod.

SCRUTINEERS OF ELECTION OF DELEGATES.

17. Two Clerical members and one Lay Representative, and two Lay Representatives and one Clerical member (to be appointed by the Synod), shall be the scrutineers of the Clerical and Lay vote respectively.

WHEN SUBSTITUTE-DELEGATES SHALL GO TO PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

18. Whenever any of the Delegates to the Provincial Synod shall be unable to attend its meeting, they shall be excused from such attendance upon notifying the Secretaries of the Diocesan Synod of the fact at least a fortnight previous to the meeting of the Synod. The Secretaries shall thereupon notify the Substitutes, selecting them in the order in which their names stand upon the list, that they are required to attend the said meeting instead of the Delegates excused.

NAME OF DIGNITARIES TO HEAD THE LIST.

[*Order of Precedence.*—In publishing the list of Delegates to the Provincial Synod at the beginning of the Report, (or Journal of Proceedings), the name of a dignitary of the Church, if elected, should head the list, and the names of the other members should be printed in alphabetical order.—*Session of 1862, page 40.*]

APPOINTMENT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

19. There shall be appointed annually, as the first business in the afternoon of the second day, an Executive Committee, to consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, ten Clerical and ten Lay members of the Synod (one half of each order of whom shall be appointed by the Bishop, and the other half by a vote of the Synod), of whom seven shall form a quorum, and who shall continue in office until their successors are appointed, and shall be called together by the Chairman [Secretary-Treasurer, section 24⁽²⁾] or any three members of the Committee.

DUTIES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

20. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to prepare in due form all such matters as the Bishop, or any member of the Synod, may desire to bring forward; to receive Reports of all other Committees, and to submit such Report to the Synod; and said Committee shall prepare lists of all Standing Committees for the approval of the Synod.

NOTICES OF MEETING OF SYNOD AND ITS PROPOSED BUSINESS.

21. It shall also be the duty of the said Committee to print the Reports laid before them, or such parts of them as they may deem expedient, and to issue a circular under the Bishop's direction, stating the time and place of meeting, the business for the ensuing Synod, the order in which it shall be discussed, and the names of members of Synod, which circular shall be forwarded to each Clergyman and Lay Representative two weeks before the meeting of the Synod; and to pay out, or cause to be paid out, all moneys of the Synod, except those which are placed under the control of other Committees.

BUSINESS TO BE NOTIFIED AND REPORTS TO BE SENT TO EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

22. Notice of the business to be submitted to the Synod, to secure precedence in the order of proceedings, and all Reports of Committees, shall be sent to the Executive Committee three weeks before the meeting of the Synod.

THE STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE SYNOD.

23. The Standing Committees of the Synod shall meet quarterly, on the Second Tuesday in the months of February, May, August, and November, and at such other times as they may deem necessary; these Committees shall be as follows:

1. The Clergy Commutation Trust Committee.
2. The Endowment of the See, Rectory Lands, and Land and Investment Committee.
3. The Mission Board.
4. The Indian Missions Committee.
5. The Widows and Orphans' Fund, and Theological Students' Fund Committee.
6. The General Purposes, Statistics, and Assessment Committee.
7. The Sunday School, and Book and Tract Committee.
8. The Audit Committee.
9. The Church Music Committee.

QUORUM OF COMMITTEES, &c.

24. (1) One-third of the members of the aforesaid, and of all Committees of Synod, shall be a quorum for the transaction of business.
- (2) The Secretary-Treasurer shall convene the Quarterly and other meetings of each Committee.
- (3) Each Committee shall from time to time choose its own Chairman.
- (4) All reports of Committees shall be in writing, signed by the Chairman.
- (5) The Chairman of each Committee, or any person on his behalf, shall explain, when requested by the Synod, any facts or other portions of the Report not understood.

CLERGY COMMUTATION TRUST COMMITTEE AND ITS DUTIES.

25. The Clergy Commutation Trust Committee of the Synod, for the management of the Clergy Commutation Trust Fund of the Diocese, shall consist of sixteen members, one-half of whom shall be Clergymen of the Diocese who are on the Commutation Fund, and the other half shall be nominated from among the Lay Representatives. The said Committee shall manage all real estate or personal securities held by the "Clergy Commutation Trust Committee" of the late Church Society of the Diocese, and all the proceeds accruing from the same, and shall administer the same.

as a distinct fund, separate and distinct from all the other funds of the Diocese, and shall invest and take up and re-invest in Government Securities, City, County, or Township Municipal Debentures, all moneys coming into their hands for re-investment, and all surplus interest and dividends. They shall report to the Synod at its annual meeting a full and detailed statement of all investments and changes in investments, and of all moneys received and paid on account of the fund during the previous year. They shall further report the actual state and condition of the fund, at the time of their last quarterly meeting, shewing the nature of the different securities belonging to the fund, and the incomes which they severally yield, and what arrears of interest may be due on any of the said securities, and the particular securities on which such interest may be over-due. The proceeds of the said fund shall be administered in accordance with the provisions of the By-laws of the late Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto relating to the same, as they existed at the time of the Incorporation of the said Church Society with the Synod, or in accordance with any By-laws adopted subsequently by the Synod. In case the surplus should at any time become insufficient to pay the amount of \$400 to each non-commuting Clergyman placed on the list of annuitants on the said fund in accordance with the By-law of the late Church Society, then a proportionate reduction shall be made from the annuities payable to all such non-commuting Clergymen.

COMMITTEE ON ENDOWMENT OF SEE—RECTORY LANDS AND INVESTMENT COMMITTEE AND ITS DUTIES.

26. The Committee on the Endowment of the See, the Rectory Lands, and Land and Investment, shall consist of six Clergymen, three of whom shall be Rectors of the original Government Rectories, and of six Laymen, members of the Synod, whose duties shall be, *Firstly*, to take charge of, and administer, and dispose of, any money or sums of money, or any securities for money, and all real estate and securities, which have already been, or which may hereafter be paid, given, assigned, or devised from or by any person or persons, or bodies corporate, for the endowment of the See; *Secondly*, to dispose of the Rectory Lands of the Diocese, and to take charge of, and administer the proceeds arising from sales of the same, in accordance with the special By-law of the late Church Society governing the administration of such funds, or in accordance with any By-laws adopted, or that may be adopted subsequently by the Synod; *Thirdly*, to manage all other lands vested in the Synod, except those the management of which has been already placed under the control of the Clergy Commutation Trust Committee, and to invest the

proceeds of all sales of land in Government Securities, City, County, or Township Debentures. All real estate, securities, and moneys placed under the management and control of this Committee, shall be managed, held, and administered upon the same trusts on which they were held at the time of the Incorporation of the late Church Society with the Synod of the Diocese.

MISSION BOARD AND ITS DUTIES.

27. The Mission Board shall consist of the two Archdeacons, eleven Clergymen, and eleven Laymen, members of the Synod, one at least of each order from each Rural Deanery of the Diocese. A fund shall be established, to be called the Mission Fund, which shall consist of all special collections made from time to time in the Churches and Chapels of the Diocese in aid of the same, of the interest of legacies, of all donations and subscriptions, and of all collections for missionary objects to be made annually, as hereinafter provided, in the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese, any By-law or Regulation of the late Church Society to the contrary notwithstanding, and of the interest derived from the invested proceeds of the sales of lands given for Missionary purposes; and the Fund so created and established shall be administered by the Mission Board in accordance with the By-laws of the late Church Society relating to the same, as they existed at the time of the Incorporation of the said Society with the Synod, or in accordance with any By-laws that may at any future time be adopted by the Synod. It shall be the duty of every incumbent of a Parish or Mission in this Diocese to hold annually, in every Church, Chapel, or place in his Parish or Mission where Divine Service is held on Sundays, or in some other place within his Parish or Mission, a Missionary Meeting in aid of the Mission Fund of the Diocese, and to cause collections to be made for the same object, and to remit the same to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod not later than the last day of April in each and every year.

INDIAN MISSIONS COMMITTEE AND ITS DUTIES.

28. The Indian Missions Committee shall consist of four Clerical and four Lay Representatives, who shall have charge of the Missions to the Indians, and shall manage and administer all moneys collected for, and all lands belonging to, such Missions, upon the same trusts on which they were held by the late Church Society at the time of its Incorporation with the Synod, or in accordance with any By-laws which may hereafter be adopted by the Synod.

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND AND THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS' FUND
COMMITTEE, AND ITS DUTIES.

29. The Widows and Orphans' Fund, and Theological Students Fund Committee shall consist of six Clergymen and six Laymen, members of the Synod, who shall be charged with the care of the Widows and Orphans' Fund of the late Church Society of the Diocese, to whom all claims for pensions to Widows or Orphans of the Clergy of the Diocese shall be referred, and by whom such claims shall be decided upon and paid, on approval of the Bishop, according to the By-law of the late Church Society governing the administration of the said Fund, or according to any By-law adopted subsequently by the Synod. It shall also be the duty of the said Committee to make annually to the Synod a detailed report of the state of the Fund, specifying its several securities, the amount of income which they each and altogether yield, the number of Widows and Orphans on the Fund, and the amounts which they severally receive. The same Committee shall also have charge of, and administer, the Theological Students' Fund, for the same objects and upon the same trusts for and upon which it was held and administered by the late Church Society, or according to any By-laws which may be adopted by the Synod for the administration of the same, and shall report annually to the Synod the condition of the said Fund and the mode in which it has been administered.

GENERAL PURPOSES, STATISTICS AND ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE
AND ITS DUTIES.

30. The General Purposes, Statistics and Assessment Committee shall consist of six Clergymen and six Laymen, members of the Synod, whose duty it shall be to provide means for the collection of, and to collect the General Purposes Fund so far as they can in pursuance of the By-laws of the late Church Society, and to manage the said Fund of the Synod on the same trusts upon which it was held at the time of the incorporation of the said Church Society with the Synod, or in accordance with any By-law which may hereafter be adopted by the Synod and also to prepare in tabular form the answers received from the Clergymen having cure of souls to the questions put to them by the Bishop of the Diocese relating to the statistics and condition of their several Cures, which shall afford (amongst other uses) a basis of an equitable Assessment for the expenses of the Diocese, and to lay such table before the Synod in a convenient form for being printed as an Appendix to the Annual Report. It shall also be the duty of the said Com-

mittee to assess the several Parishes and Missions of the Diocese for all expenses authorized by the Synod, and for all other purposes for which an assessment may be ordered by the Synod.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND BOOK AND TRACT COMMITTEE AND ITS DUTIES.

31. The Sunday School and Book and Tract Committee shall consist of five Clergymen and five Laymen, members of the Synod, whose duty it shall be to obtain statistics, and to present a Report annually to the Synod on the condition and progress of Sunday Schools throughout the Diocese, to make suggestions for their improvement as they shall judge expedient, and to consider what steps can from time to time be taken to secure the publication of books suited for libraries and for instruction in Sunday Schools. It shall also be their duty to manage the Book and Tract department as the same was conducted by a Special Committee of the late Church Society, or under any regulations which may hereafter be adopted by the Synod for the management of the same, reporting annually to the Synod the condition of the said department both in relation to its stock of Books and Tracts, and the funds of the same.

AUDIT COMMITTEE AND ITS DUTIES.

32. The Audit Committee shall consist of three Clergymen, and three Laymen, members of the Synod, whose duty it shall be to examine into the condition of all funds, moneys, and securities belonging to, and under the control of the Synod, and to lay before the Synod annually a detailed statement of the results of their audit and examination of each separate fund—the Committee to have power to employ and pay an auditor, or auditors, for the purpose of making the regular audit.

CHURCH MUSIC COMMITTEE AND ITS DUTIES.

33. The Church Music Committee shall consist of six members, Clerical or Lay, whose duty it shall be to consider the musical interests of the Diocese, and to take such steps as may from time to time appear desirable to advance and improve this portion of Divine Worship.

SEAL OF THE SYNOD AND ITS PURPOSE.

34. The Synod shall have a Common Seal, to be adopted by a Committee appointed by the Bishop, and the Bishop of the Diocese shall have the care and custody of the said Seal: and he is hereby authorized and empowered to execute all deeds and documents which from time to time may be required to be executed on

behalf of the Synod, pursuant to any resolution of the Synod, or any of the Committees thereof where such resolution is passed within the authority of such Committee. The mode of execution of such deeds and documents shall be by the Bishop causing the said Common Seal to be affixed thereto, and by his signature attesting the same.

CONDITIONS TO VALIDITY OF ACTS OF SYNOD.

35. No act or resolution of the Synod shall be valid without the concurrence of the Bishop and of a majority of the members of the Synod present, or of a majority of both orders, if a vote by orders be required; and if a difference should be found to subsist between the orders, after a vote is taken, then the subject under consideration shall stand over to the ensuing Synod. This rule is not to refer to the election of a Bishop.

ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS AT MEETINGS OF SYNOD.

36. The first meeting of the Synod in each session shall be preceded by public Morning Prayer, and a Sermon, and the celebration of the Holy Communion; and the collection at the Offertory shall be devoted to Missionary or other purposes, on the recommendation of the Executive Committee. After Divine Service on the first day of meeting, a Committee of two, appointed by the Executive Committee, shall attend at the place of meeting of the Synod to receive and examine the certificates of the Lay Representatives. The Clerical Secretary shall then call over the Roll of the Clergy, to be furnished by the Bishop, and mark the names of those in attendance; and the Lay Secretary shall call over the names of the several Parishes and their Representatives from the Synod List.

The election of the Honorary Secretaries and of the Secretary-Treasurer, shall then be proceeded with.

After this, on the first day, and on all other days after Morning Prayer the Order of Business shall be as follows:

1. Reading, Correcting, and Approving the Minutes of the Previous Meeting.
2. Appointing Committees.
3. Presenting, Reading, and Referring Memorials and Petitions and Correspondence.
4. Presenting Reports.
5. Giving Notice of Motions.
6. Taking up Unfinished Business.
7. Consideration of Motions.

On every day, after the first, the Synod shall meet at half-past Nine, A.M., and shall be opened with Prayers appointed by the Bishop for the occasion.

Should an Evening Session of the Synod be desired, notice thereof shall be given not later than Five o'clock, P.M., of the same day on which the Evening Session is desired.

COURT ON CONTESTED OR DOUBTFUL SEATS IN SYNOD.

37. (1) The Bishop shall furnish to the Secretaries of the Synod, as soon after Easter as possible, a list of the licensed Clergy of the Diocese: the Secretaries shall prepare printed copies of said list, together with the list of all Lay Delegates whose names have been duly entered on the Synod list according to Section five of the Constitution of the Synod, and they shall furnish a copy of said list to each such Clergyman and Lay Delegate at the time when they are forwarding to them the circular mentioned in Section five.

(2) It shall be competent for any member of the Church resident in the Diocese to object to the claim of any person on the said list to take a seat in the Synod, provided always that said objection, together with the grounds thereof in writing, be transmitted to the Secretaries at least one week before the meeting of the Synod; and that they shall, without delay, transmit a copy of the same to the party so objected to;—provided also, that objection may be taken at any time during the Session of the Synod, to any person whose name shall not have been entered on said Synod Lists.

(3) The Chancellor of the Diocese for the time being, or in his absence the Registrar of the Diocese for the time being, together with two Clerical and two Lay Members, whose titles to seats have not been disputed before this Synod, to be appointed by the Bishop, under hand and seal, on the first day of the Synod previous to Divine Service, shall be a Court to consider such objection and to adjudicate thereon, and to them shall be referred for final adjudication all cases of doubtful certificates that may be mentioned in the Report of the Committee on the certificates of the Lay Representatives; and the decision of the Court shall be final.

HOW A BISHOP SHALL BE ELECTED.

38. In the Election of a Bishop to a vacant See, or to a new See, the Clergy and Laity shall vote separately by ballot; the Clergy by individuals, and the Laity by parishes. A majority of votes in each order shall determine the choice, provided that two-thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote be present and vote, and that two thirds of the parishes entitled to vote be represented and vote; otherwise two-thirds of the votes of each order shall be necessary to determine the choice.

WHO SHALL PRESIDE AT ELECTION OF BISHOP.

39. On a vacancy in the See, the Dean, or the senior Archdeacon, or in his absence the Archdeacon next in order of seniority, or in the absence of an Archdeacon, the senior Rural Dean shall, within one week from the occurrence of such vacancy, summon a meeting of the Clergy and Lay Representatives, to be held at the expiration of twenty days from the date at which such meeting shall be summoned, to elect a successor in the See.

BISHOP ELECT TO RESIGN PREFERMENT.

40. Any Clergyman elected to be a Bishop, and holding at the time of such election any preferment or benefice, shall resign such preferment or benefice prior to his consecration.

NEW DIOCESE TO BE BOUND BY CONSTITUTION OF OLD DIOCESE,
PRO TEM.

41. In the event of a subdivision of the Diocese, the portion intended to form the new Diocese shall be bound in all their public proceedings by the Constitution of the Diocese of which they form a part, until the said new Diocese shall be fully organized by the election and consecration of the Bishop.

BY-LAWS, RULES, ETC., FOR COMMITTEES OF SYNOD.

42. The Synod may make such By-laws, Rules, and Regulations for the preservation of order and the organization of Committees as from time to time shall be considered expedient.

IN UNPROVIDED CASES, CANONS AND RULES OF 1869 TO PREVAIL.

43. If any case or cases not provided for by this Constitution should arise, then the Canons, Rules, and Regulations of the Synod of this Diocese, as they existed at the time of the passing of the Act of Incorporation, shall be the rule of this Synod in such case or cases.

APPENDIX C.

An Act to Incorporate the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, and to unite the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto therewith.

[Assented to 23rd January, 1869.]

WHEREAS the Synod of the United Church of England and Ireland, of the Diocese of Toronto, have petitioned for an Act for the incorporation of the said Synod; and for union with the Church Society of the said Diocese; and the said Church Society have also petitioned for the same, and it will greatly facilitate the objects for which the said Synod and Church Society were established, to grant the prayer of the said petitioners: Therefore her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:

1. The Synod of the United Church of England and Ireland, of the Diocese of Toronto, shall be, and the same is hereby incorporated by the name of "The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Toronto."

2. The said Synod shall consist of the Bishop of the said Diocese, who shall be the head of the Synod, and any Suffragan or Coadjutor Bishop thereof, the Priests and Deacons of the same licensed by the Bishop or Suffragan, and of Lay Representatives, to be elected according to the Constitution of the said Synod as the same exists at the time of the passing of this Act, or as it may, from time to time, be altered by the said Synod after the passing of this Act.

3. The Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto shall be and is hereby united to, and incorporated with, the said Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, and shall hereafter be called and known as "The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Toronto."

4. All the property, of what nature or kind soever, now held by or vested in the said Church Society, shall be and is hereby declared to be vested in the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, without any conveyance thereof by the said Church Society to the said Synod; and the name of the said Synod is and shall stand and be in the place of the name of the said Church Society in all deeds and other writings relating to the property and affairs of the said Church Society, and in all suits and proceedings, either at law or in equity, by or against the said Church Society.

5. The said Synod shall be subject to all the liabilities of the said Church Society, and shall hold all property vested in trust in the said Society upon the same trusts as such property was heretofore held by the said Society, and shall administer the same according to such trusts; and all claims, rights, suits, actions, cause and causes of suit and action, which might but for this Act be brought, prosecuted, or enforced, by any person or persons, body or bodies corporate whatsoever, against the said Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, may be brought, prosecuted and enforced against the said Synod, and against its funds, property and effects; and nothing herein contained shall relieve any officer or corporator of the said Church Society from any existing claim or liability at law or in equity, or take away any right of action or suit of any corporator of the said Society or other person, or of the said Society, in respect of any of the affairs or property of the said Society.
6. The said Synod shall have all the powers, rights, privileges, and franchises conferred upon the said Synod under the Act passed in the session held in the nineteenth and twentieth years of her Majesty's reign, entitled "An Act to enable the Members of the United Church of England and Ireland to meet in Synod," as well as those conferred upon the Church Society by the several Acts of the Legislature of the Province relating to the said Church Society, and to enforce all rights and claims which either such Synod or Society could enforce against any person or persons whatsoever, body or bodies corporate, or otherwise howsoever.
7. The said Synod shall have full power and authority to make such canons, rules, regulations, and by-laws, as by the said Synod may be considered necessary in the exercise of the powers conferred upon the said Synod, under the said Acts in the next preceding clause mentioned, and also for the conduct of their proceedings, regulation of their members, and all such other matters as may pertain to the proper and orderly discharge of their business.
8. The said Synod may exercise all its powers by and through such Boards or Committees as the said Synod may from time to time appoint by by-law or by-laws, for the management of all or any of the affairs or property of the said Synod but in accordance only with the trusts relating to any property to which any special trust is attached.
9. The said Synod may appoint or remove all such officers as may be found necessary for the management of the affairs and business of the said Synod, and provide for their remuneration.

10. Until other provision is made under this Act by the Synod, all the property and funds of the said Church Society shall continue to be managed by the Committee and officers of the said Church Society, and under the by-laws thereof, but subject to the supervision and control of the Synod, to whom all reports respecting the same shall be made.

APPENDIX D.

By-law for the Management of the Theological Students' Fund.

[Laid before the Synod by the Committee, and adopted 25th June, 1870.]

1. A Committee of Synod shall be appointed annually, whose duty it shall be, immediately on their appointment, to enquire into the state of the Fund, and to declare thereupon what number of Exhibitions in Trinity College, tenable for three years, and of the value of £30 per annum, will be open to applicants in that year, giving notice to this effect in the Church —.
2. It shall be the duty of the Committee, at the August, meeting, to receive and examine the testimonials of applicants and to select as Exhibitioners such as they shall consider to be most deserving, notifying the Provost of Trinity College of such selection.
3. Persons nominated to Exhibitions shall be required to pass the Matriculation Examination with such credit as may satisfy the Examiners of their probable fitness to enter the Divinity Class at the expiration of their first year; and they shall forfeit their Exhibitions if they fail to satisfy the Examiners of their actual fitness in the ensuing June Examination.
4. Every Exhibitioner shall be required, at Matriculation, or on entering the Divinity Class, to subscribe a declaration of his purpose of completing his course of study, and of serving in the Diocese of Toronto for not less than five years.
5. No Exhibition shall be continued for more than three years, the first of which shall be passed in the Arts course, and the last two in the Divinity course.

6. If any Exhibitioner, having satisfied the Examiners in the June Examination of his first year, shall (by the advice or with the consent of the Professors,) remain for a further period in the Arts course, his Exhibition shall be suspended until he shall enter the Divinity Class.

7. The College authorities shall furnish to the Committee at their August meeting, in each year, a Tabular Report of the conduct of the several Exhibitioners under the following heads :

1. General Conduct.
2. Attendance at Chapel.
3. Attendance at the Holy Communion.
4. Attendance at Lectures.
5. Application to Studies.
6. Progress in Studies.
7. Examinations.

And any Exhibition shall be subject to withdrawal if such report be unfavorable, or if, for other reasons, the Committee shall be dissatisfied with the conduct of the Exhibitioner.

8. No person holding a Scholarship in Trinity College shall be allowed to receive or retain an Exhibition.

9. No Student of Trinity College shall be admitted to an Exhibition except he present to the Examiners a certificate of conduct from the authorities of the College of the form above prescribed, and a certificate from the Provost that he is, in respect of any regulations before mentioned, eligible for election to an Exhibition.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE ENDOWMENT OF THE SEE.
For the Year ending 30th April, 1870.

The Committee beg leave to report as follows:

The annexed statement shews that the sum of \$409.77 has been received from payment of notes and other subscriptions during the past year; but this portion is small compared with the amount still unpaid, and which is all, or nearly all, now past due. Circulars have been sent to subscribers both by the Secretary-Treasurer and by other persons employed to collect, but the result proves that some other means must be employed before the Fund can be gathered in. Awaiting the action of the Synod, the Committee have directed the Secretary-Treasurer to obtain the services of a suitable collector to make personal application to each contributor in order to obtain payment of subscriptions and notes, or renewal of the latter with payment of back interest where such may be desired; and would strongly recommend that an expression of opinion should be given by the Synod at its present session as to the means which should be adopted for closing this investment by the collection of outstanding obligations.

It will be seen that the receipts on account of interest for the past year have been very satisfactory. The Committee have been enabled to pay the Episcopal Income in full, leaving a balance of \$422.19 to credit. In addition to the regular interest on invested capital, amounting to \$1,883.35, \$313.15 have been received as arrears of interest on the St. Catharines Bond, and \$239.75 on contributors' notes.

REPORT OF THE CLERGY COMMUTATION TRUST COMMITTEE.

The Clergy Commutation Trust Committee beg leave to report as follows :—

1. We have investigated, so far as the materials we have been able to procure would enable us, the position of the Fund under our control for the year ending the 1st of May, 1870, and beg leave herewith to submit the result of our enquiries.

2 The assets of this fund are composed of

First—Debentures—a schedule of which is attached to this report marked with the letter "A"—this schedule shews the nature of the debenture, the period of its payment, its amount, and the rate of interest it bears: these debentures in the aggregate amount to \$366,822.37, and we believe them to be all first class securities, which will be redeemed in full on their maturity.

Second.—The debt of the Hon. John Hillyard Cameron—the amount of which has not been definitely settled between the Committee and Mr. Cameron, but it has been taken for the purpose of arriving at a settlement and subject to correction, as being on the first of May, 1868, \$105,000—this sum, it is claimed by Mr. Cameron, should be diminished by a small amount, whereas some members of the Committee are of opinion that it should be somewhat increased. From the manner in which this account has been kept, we are unable at present to state positively how it stands, although we believe its true position will before long be approximated. In the mean time adopting the above as a basis, the account will stand as follows at the date of this report:

Messrs. Farmer and deBlaquiere and the Synod, and in view of certain disputed payments, it is impossible to state with accuracy the amount of this debt. We have met with the same difficulties in dealing with the instruments securing this debt. In schedule "C" we have set forth the nature and approximate value thereof.

Fourth.—A mortgage of the Vaughan Road Company on which there is due for principal money \$4,200. A mortgage of H. J. Boulton, jr., on which there is due for principal money \$245.25. A mortgage from St. Stephen's Church, Toronto, on which there is due for principal money \$750. Provincial Insurance Company Bonds, on which there is due for principal money \$15,000. Covenant of the Diocese of Ontario to pay principal and interest on Debenture of City of Hamilton, \$1000. We are of opinion that the amounts represented by all these securities will be realized on their maturity.

In pursuance of the resolution of the Synod in that behalf, we met a Committee of the Synod of Ontario, and after negotiations agreed with them to take a transfer of the Hamilton and Port Dover Bond assigned to them, on giving them unexceptionable securities of Mr. Cameron to the amount of \$26,000. Of this sum securities to the amount of \$16,000 have been handed over to the Synod, and the balance will be transferred so soon as securities satisfactory to them are forthcoming; when these further securities are furnished this will close the dispute, the subject of the lawsuit between these Dioceses.

The charges upon the Fund amount annually to about \$27,000, made up as appears in schedule "D."

The interest from Debentures, Bonds, and Mortgages, other than those of Mr. Cameron and of Messrs. Farmer and deBlaquiere, and which we think can be relied upon, amounts annually to about \$21,600. The interest that should be received from the other assets amounts to about \$8,500, so that if all the interest upon the securities of the trust were regularly paid, it would amount to about \$30,000, and we think we may count in the future, with reasonable certainty, upon an income of \$27,600 a year from this Fund.

Mr. Cameron has proposed to the Committee in liquidation of \$80,000 of his indebtedness to accept the following securities at the figures set opposite to them:

The Auditors have carefully examined and tested these Statements, and find those of the Rectory Lands Fund (A), Episcopal Endowment Fund (B), and Synod Account (D) correct and full in their details. Of the Clergy Trust Fund (C) it has to be remarked that on the credit side of the Balance Sheet an item appears under the head "Consolidated Interest," \$13,135.80. For this the Auditors can find no entry in either Cash Book, Journal, or other primary book of the Trust, but simply so many figures placed upon the Ledger—a process in book-keeping which, it may be unnecessary to say, is most irregular. These figures were placed upon the Ledger prior to the transfer of the books of the Trust to the present Secretary.

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Further: in the Statement of Receipts and Expenditure (C 2) will be found an item of \$3,003.60, Hon. J. H. Cameron's note and expenses, charged to "Income and Expenditure." The Auditors are of opinion that the Income of the Trust should not be called upon to assume this charge. If the Trust had to retire this note it should be debited, the Auditors think, to the account of the maker, forming a portion of his debt. The "Income," at the same time, has received credit for a partial payment on account of the note, \$1,035.

The Auditors have further to report that they have carefully tested and verified the statements of the various securities held by the different Trusts. These securities in the hands of the Secretary were duly produced. Certificates signed by the Managers of the Banks were produced for those deposited with them.

The Auditors beg leave to refer to the system of accounts generally, and would suggest that it be simplified and condensed. The multiplicity of books and bank accounts in connection with the Synod Account (late Church Society) the Auditors are of opinion, might be advantageously reduced, thereby decreasing labor and the liability to error.

REPORT OF THE THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS' FUND COMMITTEE,

For the Year ending 30th April, 1870.

In submitting their Report, your Committee would desire briefly to call the attention of the Diocese, through its Synod, to the importance of this Fund, its objects, and the great necessity of augmenting its resources and thus increasing its usefulness.

In a young and growing community like that of Canada, the Church, as a profession, affords but few attractions. The career of a high-minded and faithful Minister of God's Word is full of toil, his labours are poorly remunerated in comparison with those of the other learned professions, and the prizes within his reach are limited in number, as well as in amount. Under these circumstances, it cannot be a matter of surprise, that, vast as is the field for missionary and parochial work throughout the Diocese, the supply of well-trained and educated candidates for Holy Orders is very far below the needs of the Church.

For the reasons above mentioned, little reliance can be placed upon obtaining the services of the Clergy of other or distant Dioceses, and the chief efforts of the Church must necessarily be directed to the training and education of such young men in our own community as feel called upon to enter the Ministry.

These considerations led to the establishment of "The Theological Students' Fund" by the founders of "The Church Society," and it has been continued by its successors, the Synod of Toronto, for the purpose of aiding and assisting deserving young men to pursue those studies, and obtain that education which otherwise would be beyond their reach. The great majority of those who seek for admission to Holy Orders are unable to bear the expense of a course of preparation, and, in the absence of some such assistance as this Fund is designed to furnish, are compelled to take upon them the duties of the sacred Ministry with very inadequate qualifications for it.

In a profession, the worldly advantages of which are so circumscribed, it is of the highest importance that the attainments and talents of one so prominently placed in social life as that of a minister and expounder of God's Word, should be of such a character as to ensure respect; the more so, as the general diffusion of knowledge among our population would make conspicuous any deficiencies in this respect. Nor should it be lost sight of, that the spread of infidel and latitudinarian opinions renders a sound education for the duties of the ministry more than ever imperative.

The only source of supply to this Fund (other than from casual donations) arises from one of the four quarterly collections directed by this Synod to be taken up in every church and station throughout the Diocese, in aid of the general work of the Church as administered by this Synod. From this source your Committee have

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had placed at their disposal during the past year the sum of \$858.38, enabling them to offer four contributions of \$120 each to a like number of students and candidates for Holy Orders, without which assistance they would have been unable qualify themselves for the ranks of the Ministry. A statement of the receipts and expenditure of the Fund is appended hereto.

The quarterly collections (two) for the Mission Fund taken up in 147 stations, amounted to \$671.85 (each collection), being an average of \$4.57 per station; for the Widows and Orphans' Fund, \$900.37, in 150 stations, or an average of \$6 per station; and for the Divinity Students' Fund, \$446.23, in 137 stations, or an average of \$3.26 per station. The total number of stations and churches is 217. From this it would appear that in at least 80 instances the duty of bringing the claims of this Fund before the congregations has been omitted.

A fair increase in numbers and amount of the collections at the various stations in aid of this Fund would enable your Committee to place additional names upon the list of those who may fairly claim assistance from it.

It should be remembered that the omission by the Clergyman to carry out the rules of the Church by faithfully appealing to his congregations in aid of any one of the Funds named, involves the forfeiture of any claim his family might have upon the Widows and Orphans' Fund.

Your Committee therefore urge most strongly upon the Clergy the importance of bringing the claims of this Fund frequently and distinctly before their congregations, feeling assured that by so doing the intelligence of our churchmen would lead to a right understanding of its purposes, and their liberality to a prompt augmentation of its resources.

APPENDIX M. (1)

REPORT OF THE WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND COMMITTEE, For the Year ending 30th April, 1870.

With the view of placing before the Synod a correct, though brief, statement of the condition of the Widows and Orphans' Fund, your Committee have examined the accounts as given in the Annual Reports from the year ending 30th April, 1864, after the transfer had been made to the Diocese of Ontario of the portion of the Fund awarded to it on its separation from this Diocese.

Keeping the Income Account distinct from that of Investments, it appears that the annual income from Collections, Subscriptions, Rents, and Interest, was sufficient to cover all the annual expenditure till the year 1868, when the income fell short of the demands upon it by \$261.76; for 1869 also, it fell short to the amount of \$532.68, but an opportune payment of arrears of interest due from the Clergy Trust Fund (\$528) reduced the deficit to \$4.68. For the year ending 30th April last the expenditure was \$3,506.88, the income being only \$2,360.10, leaving a deficiency of \$1,341.82. A sum, however, was received from the General Purposes Fund on account of Clergymen's payments of \$5 each, which reduced the above deficiency to \$1,074.22. The total deficiencies of the three years amount to \$1,342.66 which had necessarily to be met by funds withdrawn from the invested capital.

Your Committee deem it incumbent upon them to advert to the continued non-observance of the third section of the By-law for the management of the Widows and Orphans' Fund, which runs thus:

"3. And that the Society shall and will put to the credit of the Widows and Orphans' Fund, yearly, and every year, a sum of money equal to one pound five shillings for each duly recognized Clergyman in the Diocese from the Fund for General Purposes, providing that fund will bear such a charge upon it; and that after the current or customary expenses of the Society are paid, the charge for the Widows and Orphans' Fund shall be the first paid from the General Purposes Fund, and that such sum shall be put to the credit of the Widows and Orphans' Funds on the first day of January in each year, on the Lord Bishop of the Diocese forwarding to the Treasurer a list of the Clergy duly recognized, signed with his hand."

The By-law of which the above section is a part, it will be remembered, was adopted in the year 1859, after having engaged for a considerable time the unre-mitted attention of some of the ablest men of our Communion. It was foreseen that, although the claims for pensions might not at first be numerous, yet they must inevitably in the course of nature increase, and that the Fund could not be kept equal to the demands unless some provision were made for a regular addition to its capital, such as the above section contemplates. The object of this special fund appealing strongly to general sympathy, the contributions to it were always liberal, so that the necessity for these annual appropriations was not felt; and the moneys at the disposal of the General Purposes Fund were in most years, though not invariably, applied to the more pressing exigencies or grants in aid of the erection of churches, parsonages, and other like objects.

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In the year 1860, however, a Committee appointed to examine the general condition of the Society's Funds, reported (p. 467, Minutes,) that in consequence of the non-observance of this rule, in the seven years from 1853 to 1859 inclusive, a loss to the Widows and Orphans' Fund had been incurred of \$5,246; in compensation for which, in 1861, lands were transferred to it of the value of \$5,250. Ten years have elapsed since the Report of 1860 was made, and during that period the only transfers from the General Purposes Fund to the Widows and Orphans' Fund to meet the requirement of the By-law were, a sum of \$520 in 1862, and a sum of \$267.60 in the present year, involving by the omission a loss of \$5,472.40 to this Fund.

This amount, however, is predicated upon the assumption that the General Purposes Fund, after meeting current expenses, was equal to such transfer. The extent of its surplus, after meeting expenses, is shewn by the amount of its grants, which from 1860 to 1869 have been \$3,825*; and not desiring to claim from that Fund more than the By-law fairly assigns, it is nevertheless submitted that the Widows and Orphans' Fund is in a worse position by at least that amount of \$3,825 than it would have been in had the rule been always observed; its claim being the next after that of expenses, and taking precedence of all grants.

Your Committee would therefore suggest that, in compensation for this loss, and adopting the mode pursued by the Church Society in 1860, lands to the value of \$3,825 be transferred from the General Purposes Fund to the Widows and Orphans' Fund, or that the former Fund pay to the latter interest on the above amount at the rate of six per cent. per annum, either of which modes would make an addition of \$229.50 to the annual income of the Fund.

In addition to this, a sum of \$2,000, originally belonging to this Fund, is due from the estate of the late Rev. T. S. Kennedy, which there appears to be a reasonable prospect of recovering from legacies left by relatives in England, security for the repayment having been given by the present representative of the interests of the family.

Your Committee would also draw attention to the unexpected burden thrown upon the Fund by the payment of two claims for arrears of pensions, amounting together to \$1,200. The first claim was made four years ago, and the amount, \$600, has been paid in three annual instalments. The second, for the same amount, \$600, was made last year, and one instalment has been paid, leaving \$400 still to be paid. Your Committee are of opinion that the intention of the By-law is fully

compiled with when a pension is granted as soon as applied for; and looking at the 9th section, which evidently intends that all the claims upon the Fund should be laid before the Society, and be made known to it, at its meeting in May in every year, and also at the 11th section, which enacts that every widow "desiring an annuity" shall apply by a memorial setting forth certain particulars, and that "such memorial, supported by the recommendation of two Incumbents and the Lord Bishop, shall entitle" such widow to an annuity; it appears to your Committee that neither the letter nor the spirit of the By-law justifies the recognition of any claim, or the payment of any pension, until such claim shall have been duly and formally preferred.

It is also to be observed that some of the investments belonging to this Fund have, owing to circumstances over which the Society could exercise no control, become unproductive, yielding no interest; the recovery also of the capital represented being in most instances doubtful, viz.:—Bank of Upper Canada Stock, \$540; Grand Trunk Telegraph Debenture, \$575; Mortgage of A. Dixon, \$1,000; Loan to Clarke Parsonage, \$200; in all, \$2,315; and it has been thought better not to retain these on the list of Investments, as the doing so only makes the Fund appear in a better state than it really is. The amount covered by the Dixon mortgage may, it is thought, eventually be realized. The loan to the Clarke parsonage was made in the year 1854, and, the Churchwardens say, without the authority of the Churchwardens or Vestry, and there are no documents to disprove their statement.

In brief, the present condition of the Fund, and the inadequacy of its income to meet the demands upon it, appears to your Committee to be attributable in a considerable degree to the following causes:—

1st. The non-observance, or but partial observance, for the last ten years of one specific regulation which has withheld from the Fund a certain annual sum now amounting in the whole to \$3,825, the interest of which alone would more than pay one widow's pension.

2nd. The loss, though perhaps only temporary, of \$2000, due from the estate of the late Rev. T. S. Kennedy.

3rd. The loss of the interest on certain unproductive investments representing a capital of \$2,315.

4th. The applying the moneys of this Fund to meet payments to the Darlington Rectory, to the amount, it is supposed, of about \$800.

5th. The unexpected charge of \$1,200 for arrears of pensions to two widows, whose claim to arrears your Committee cannot but consider somewhat questionable.

Independently of the last, the other four items represent a capital of \$8,946, and at 6 per cent. an income of \$536.76 per annum. If, however, the General Purposes Fund can pay the interest on the sums named in the 1st and 4th items, an annual amount of \$277.50 will be added to the income.

The 9th section of the By-law requires that as soon as, or whenever, the annual income from all sources shall be insufficient to pay all the annuitants a premium of \$200 each as before provided, besides a reserved surplus for contingencies at the rate of \$200 for every 100 Clergymen in the Diocese, then a proportionate reduction shall be made on all the annuities. The Church Society, however, and the

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Synod, have felt reluctant to take this step, trusting that some means might be devised to avoid making any reduction in the small pensions allowed to the widows and orphans of our deceased Clergymen; and that reluctance has been increased by the consideration that the circumstance of the annual income of the Fund having latterly proved insufficient to meet the demands upon it, has been owing not so much to the natural increase of these demands, as to an annual augmentation of its capital, and also to the Fund not having always been kept distinct from the other special Funds of the Society.

Since 1st May, 1869, two widows (Mrs. Lundy and Mrs. Sims) have been placed upon the list of annuitants at the amount of \$200 each, and a memorial from a third widow (Mrs. Ardagh) awaits the decision of the Synod. These would make the whole number 15; and it may give some idea of the rate at which the demands increase, to note that in 1850 the annuities were \$1,087, while last year they amounted to \$3,066.

Report of Widows and Orphans' Fund Committee on Mrs. Ardagh's Claim.

The Committee on the Widows and Orphans' Fund submit also a special Report in reference to an application for a pension made by the widow of the Rev. S. B. Ardagh, Incumbent of Barrie, deceased.

The Memorial of Mrs. Ardagh was laid before the Committee at its meeting on the 10th May, but as it appeared that the requirement of the By-law in respect to the Quarterly Collections had not, in Mr. Ardagh's case, been invariably observed, the Committee—considering that they had no power to administer the Fund entrusted to their care otherwise than in strict accordance with the By-law—felt themselves bound, however much against their inclination, to decline granting the request of the Memorial.

The provision of the By-law bearing upon this case is in the 4th section, and runs as follows:—

"4. That each Clergyman, either Incumbent or Travelling Missionary, having cure of souls in this Diocese, in order to entitle his Widow and Children to claim the annuity hereafter provided, from the passing of this By-law, or from the time of his appointment in the Diocese, shall be an incorporated member of the Society, or a subscriber thereto of one pound five shillings per annum; shall observe the directions from time to time given by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, in respect to the collections to be made under the provisions of the 19th Article of the Constitution of this Society."

Which said 19th Article of this Constitution is:—

"19. That four Sermons be preached annually in the several Churches, Chapels, and Stations in this Diocese, in aid of the funds of the Society, at such times as the Lord Bishop shall appoint; that of these collections the proceeds of one shall be for the benefit of the Widows and Orphans of Clergymen deceased; of another, for the maintenance of Travelling or Resident Missionaries in this Diocese; of another, to aid Theological Students; and that the proceeds of the fourth shall be appropriated to any other objects embraced within its Constitution, as the Society may from time to time direct."

The collections not made were, that for the Divinity Students' Fund in the years 1868, 1867, 1865, and 1863; that for the Mission Fund in 1865; and for the Widows and Orphans' Fund in 1860, as far back as the Reports were examined.

On reporting their decision to the Bishop, his Lordship was pleased to address the following letter to the Chairman of the Committee:—

"MY DEAR SIR:

"TORONTO, May 14, 1870.

"While I feel that the Widows and Orphans' Committee were bound to arrive at the decision in regard to Mrs. Ardagh's claim communicated in your letter of the 12th instant, I should be glad that any indulgence provided by the By-law should be extended to her.

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It is stated in clause 4 of this By-law, "that it shall at all times be competent for the President to recommend to the Standing Committee any case which, in his Lordship's opinion, may require special consideration; and should the Standing Committee report favourably thereon, then the Society may grant such proportion of an annuity as to them may seem fit."

I assume that the Widows and Orphans' Committee, appointed at the last meeting of Synod, have taken the place of the "Standing Committee" referred to in the By-law above quoted; and I would therefore refer to them again the petition of Mrs. Ardagh, and pray that her case, in consideration of the long services of her deceased husband, may be so favorably reported upon that it can be referred to the Synod with their recommendation for her relief on such terms as they in their wisdom may judge to be equitable.

APPENDIX O. (1)

REPORT OF SYNOD COMMITTEE ON INDIAN MISSIONS,
For the Year ending 30th April, 1870.

In presenting to the Synod the Report of the Indian Mission Committee for the past year, your Committee have to deplore the great loss sustained by the death of the Rev. J. W. Sims, the Missionary labouring in the Manitoulin Islands. The circumstances attendant on the loss of this excellent Missionary were in all respects painful. He had succeeded in mastering the native language; had made great progress in establishing a new Mission Station and School House at Shequindah; and was engaged on an expedition in connection with his Mission work, when he was drowned, in sight of his bereaved family. The Committee desire to record their most tender Christian sympathy on behalf of his afflicted widow; and to commend her and her young orphan family to the prayers, and to the generous sympathy of the Church at large.

The necessity of finding a successor to fill the place left vacant by this painful loss was immediately recognised by the Committee; and they are gratified in being able to report that the Lord Bishop has nominated to the duty the Rev. Bowland Hill, B.A., the only Clergyman who offered his services for that Mission. Mr. Hill is a young Clergyman, late of the Diocese of Huron, whose zeal and success are highly spoken of by the Bishop of that Diocese—who deems him well fitted to succeed the late Mr. Sims. He has already made some progress in the requisite steps for fitting him to minister to the Indians of Lake Huron in their native tongue.

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The Committee earnestly trust that, under the Divine blessing on the labours of the new Missionary, they will be able, ere long, to report highly satisfactory results in the interesting field of his operations.

The Committee is also called upon to record its sympathy on behalf of their esteemed Missionary the Rev. Jas. Chance, and his wife, who, in the midst of their devoted labours have recently sustained the loss of an interesting daughter, under peculiarly trying circumstances. They commend the afflicted parents to the sympathy and prayers of the Church.

The necessity for more extended Missionary efforts among the Indians within this Diocese, along the north shore of Lake Superior, has pressed itself so strongly on the attention of the Committee, that they gladly entertained a proposition, made by the Rev. Mr. Wilson, an agent of the Church Missionary Society, for opening a Mission to the Indians in that long-neglected region. This proposition was submitted to the Bishop, and his sanction having been obtained, it was arranged that the Reverends Messrs. Chance and Wilson should visit the different localities to which Indians usually resort, with a view of selecting a suitable location for such a Mission.

In view of the great changes in progress, consequent on the opening up of the North West, there appears to be every prospect of an important opening for a Mission for White Settlers, as well as Indians, at Fort William, consequent on its becoming the terminus of the road to Red River. The Committee would urge on the Church the duty of occupying this as an important centre of Missionary operations.

It only remains for your Committee to press anew the claims of the Indian Missions on the liberality of Churchmen; and to urge them to renewed efforts, so that these Missions shall be established on a scale that will prove a credit to our Church, and accomplish the object of gathering into the fold of Christ the wandering Indian tribes of this Continent, on whose inheritance we have entered; and to whom pertained the very lands on which our own homes have been built, and our Churches are reared.

APPENDIX P. (1)

REPORT OF THE GENERAL PURPOSES FUND COMMITTEE,

For the Year ending 30th April, 1870.

The General Purposes Fund Committee beg leave to present the following Report:—

1. The Committee during their year of office considered it expedient that, in the commencement of the new system of managing the funds and business of the Synod, a clear understanding of the Committee and of the origin and resources of the General Purposes Fund, as well of the trusts to be administered by the Committee should be arrived at; in order that the result of their investigations should be laid before the Synod for such action as the proceedings hereinafter set forth may require, and in order that the contributors to the fund might fully understand to what purposes these moneys had been applied.

2. By the Constitution of the Synod the powers of the Committee are defined to be as follows:—(1.) "To provide means for the collection of, and to collect such [General Purposes] Fund, so far as they can in pursuance of the By-laws of the late Church Society, and (2.) "To manage the said Fund of the Synod on the same trusts upon which it was held at the time of the Incorporation of the said Church Society with the Synod, or in accordance with any By-laws adopted at any future time by the Synod."

3. In their investigations as to the origin and sources of the Fund, the first thing considered was the origin of the name by which the Fund appears to have been managed. Nothing very clear on this point could be traced in the Reports of the late Church Society; but the conclusion came to was, that during the operations of the late Church Society it became necessary to have a distinct fund to meet the expenses of the management of the Society, and which could from time to time, supply appropriations or grants to such general objects of the Society as were authorized by the Act of Incorporation, and which could not be supplied by the other Funds of the Church—specially appropriated as they were to various specific trusts defined in the Charter of the Society.

4. A short summary of the objects to be promoted by the late Church Society, as defined by its Charter, will lead to a better understanding of this point. These objects were, (1) To provide for the support of Missionaries and Clergymen. (2) To create a Fund for augmenting the Stipends of Poor Clergymen. (3) Making provision for Aged or Disabled Clergymen. (4) The support of the Widows and Orphans of Clergymen. (5) The encouragement of Education and the support of Sunday Schools. (6) Assistance to Theological Students. (7) Circulating the Bible, Prayer Books, and Books and Tracts. (8) Aiding the Erection, Endowment, and Maintenance of Parsonages. (10) Setting apart Burial Grounds and Churchyards. (11) The Endowment and support of Parsonages and Rectories, and the management of all matters relating to such Endowments.

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5. Nearly all the above objects are managed by separate Committees and have special funds set apart for their maintenance. The objects contemplated by number 3, seemed not to have been specially cared for as yet, though plainly a pressing necessity on our Church organization, while Nos. 7, 8, and 9, appear to be the only ones properly subject to the management of the General Purposes Committee.

6. The sources of the income of the General Purposes Fund appear to be as follows:—(1) One-fourth of moneys collected by each District Association was transmitted to the Treasurer of the General Society to be at the disposal of the Central Board. (2) All unappropriated moneys not required for local purposes transmitted to the General Treasurer in like manner. (3) The proceeds of one of the four sermons required by Article XIV. (4) Lands and Bequests granted for the general purposes of the Church Society; and (5), Subscriptions and Donations.

7. As appears above, the one-fourth of the whole District Collections were transmitted by the Local Treasurer to the Treasurer of the Church Society; but in 1860 a By-law respecting the Mission Fund was passed, whereby one-fourth of the Parochial Collections was directly appropriated to the General Purposes Fund, as set out in the By-law referred to.

8. So far as the Reports of the Church Society indicate, the charges upon the General Purposes Fund, are not very clearly defined. The Report for 1854 states of it:—"This is the only Fund at the disposal of the Society to meet the salaries of its officers, the rent and taxes, the printing of the Report and all the other contingent expenses." In subsequent reports we find it bearing charges of appropriations to the Widows and Orphans' Fund; grants to Churches and Parsonages; donations of books and tracts; legal expenses; taxes on lands of the Society; and advances made on account of sundry investments—to be repaid on the realization of the funds on account of which the advances were made. And, as the result of our investigations, we have to report, that we find the above to be the present ordinary charges upon the General Purposes Fund of the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto; but on the accounts placed before us at our meetings we found a charge for payments to the Rev. J. Pentland, to meet which the Committee had no funds properly at their disposal.

9. A By-law relating to the Widows and Orphans' Fund, passed by the Church Society in 1852, appropriates yearly from the General Purposes Fund (if the Fund so permits) a sum of money equal to \$5 for each duly recognized Clergyman in the Diocese, and that after the current and customary expenses of the Society are paid, *this charge for the Widows and Orphans' Fund shall be first paid by the General Purposes Fund.* This By-law is the only one we find which determines the priorities of the charges on our Fund, and we therefore report such priorities to be as follows:—(1) Current and Customary Expenses of Synod office; (2) Appropriation to Widows and Orphans' Fund; (3) Grants for the Circulation of the Bible, Prayer-Books, and Books and Tracts; (4) Grants towards the Erection and Maintenance of Churches; (5) Grants towards the Erection and Maintenance of Parsonages; (6) Special Advances for Taxes on Lands, and charges on Sundry Investments of the Society, to be repaid on the realization of such lands or Special Investments.

10. The only special trust under the control of this Committee is the Burnside bequest. Dr. Alexander Burnside, of Toronto, by his will, devised to the late Church Society a mortgage of \$3200 to apply the proceeds and interest of the same "towards the erection and improvement of Churches in remote parts or places in Upper Canada." During the year we have made appropriations out of this fund towards the erection and improvement of Churches in the following remote places:—

1. St. Paul's Church, Mono, Lavery's Corners.....	\$50
2. Church at Douglas, Garafraxa.....	50
3. " at Sault Ste. Marie.....	50
4. " at Greenbank, Uxbridge.....	50
5. " at Orangeville.....	50

Of the above grants, No. 1 has been paid; Nos. 2 and 3 are to be paid when the buildings are enclosed; Nos. 4 and 5 are to be paid in July.

11. We have made no other grants during the year, not having any available funds at our disposal.

12. Though the clause of the Constitution of the Synod provides that this Committee is to manage the General Purposes Fund, yet it appears from the other clauses that the Committee has really very little control over the expenditure of the Fund. The 13th clause of the Constitution vests in the Executive Committee the power "to pay out or cause to be paid out the moneys of the Synod payable pursuant to the Constitution." But in the fulfilment of our duty "to collect such Fund so far as the Committee can in pursuance of the By-laws of the late Church Society," we found that the annual subscriptions of Incorporated Members were practically abrogated, and applied to the Bishop, under the following resolution, for subscriptions to the Fund:—"That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to issue a circular to the Incorporated Members of the late Church Society, requesting them to continue their subscriptions as formerly for the present, in order to enable the Synod to meet the General Purposes expenses, for which provision has not yet been made;" and, in accordance with our request, a Pastoral Letter was issued by the Bishop, last December, but we regret to say that a few of the old Incorporated members only have as yet responded to the call.

13. At our Quarterly Meetings, the Officer of the Synod laid before us statements of the Receipts and Expenditures of the Fund, and amongst such expenditures we found charges for payments made on account of the Darlington Rectory. We considered this an improper charge upon the General Purposes Fund, and after investigation of the matter from the Books of the late Church Society, we considered it advisable to report the whole matter to the Synod for its determination. The facts appear in the Reports printed as an Appendix to this Report, and we therefore refrain from comment upon the loss of a valuable endowment disclosed in the proceedings there reported, by which \$8000 of good securities, and \$2000 cash were given up for a mortgage for \$10,000 made in 1857 (after the financial crisis) upon unproductive town lots in the heavily mortgaged town of Port Hope, which town lots ultimately realized to the Church Society the sum of \$2084.50. This Committee, however, submits the matter to the Synod, and reports that whatever claims the Darlington

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Rectory may have upon the Funds of the Synod, such claims are not, in their judgment, proper charges upon the General Purposes Fund, nor do they affect any Trust subject to their management.

14. As some plan should be adopted for raising funds for the General Purposes of the Synod, we would recommend that further application be made to the former Incorporated Members of the Church Society and others for subscriptions or donations to the Fund; and we further recommend that each of the Funds managed in the Synod Office, should bear a proportionate share of the expense of management.

15. We append the Financial Statement submitted to us by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod.

APPENDIX P. (3)

REPORT ON THE DARLINGTON ENDOWMENT.

At the annual meeting of the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, held on the 7th June, 1864, the Report on the Darlington Endowment was presented, when it was moved by the Rev. H. C. Cooper, seconded by J. W. Gamble, Esq., and Resolved, that the Report on the Darlington Endowment be adopted.

REPORT.

The Committee, appointed on the 18th February last to enquire into the Darlington Rectory Land Transactions, beg leave to report—That, in the year 1836, lot No. 25 in the 1st concession of Darlington, was granted by the Crown as a Glebe for the Rectory of Darlington; that, subsequently, Dr. Macnab, as Rector, was dispossessed of the said land by a decree of the Court of Chancery; that Dr. Macnab, as Rector, then applied to the Government for land in lieu of that of which he had been so dispossessed; that, by an Order in Council of 24th March, 1854, a copy of which is hereto annexed, the Government ordered the Glebe to be valued and the Incumbent to be allowed to select a disposable lot, the patent for which, however, should not issue until a decision should have been had upon the Rectory question, the value of the selected lot to be charged against the estimated value of the Glebe Lot, and the difference to be made good to the Church Society by a payment in money; that, in 1857, Dr. Macnab petitioned for a grant of the north-halves of lots 17 and 18 in the 2nd concession of Ekfrid, in accordance with terms specified in the said Order in Council; and, by an Order in Council of the 20th November, 1857, it was directed that, as the Court of Chancery had sustained the Rectory Patents, a Patent should be prepared as requested by Dr. Macnab in his name as Incumbent, and in the names of George H. Low and Frederick Cubitt,

Churchwardens, and their successors in office, in trust for the use and benefit of the Incumbent from time to time, the value of those two half-lots combined (stated at £275) to be charged against the estimated value of the late Glebe Lot, and subject to further action on the Order in Council of the 24th March, 1854; that the Council recommended that the then value of the late Glebe Lot should be ascertained through, and to the satisfaction of, the Crown Land Department, and that the value of the half-lots granted to the Rector and the Churchwardens should also be ascertained, and that, to supply the difference in value between the said lot and the two half-lots, other lands be granted at a valuation to be fixed by the Crown Land Department, and that the Patent therefor issue to the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto in trust for the Rector of Darlington, with power to such Society to sell, alienate, or dispose, of such lands from time to time, with the assent of the Rector for the time being, and of the Churchwardens of the Parish in which such Rectory is situate, free from the said trusts, and the proceeds thereof to invest in securities upon real estate, in good municipal debentures, or in Government securities, and the same to exchange from time to time, with power to the said Society, with the assent of the said Churchwardens, to make to the Rector, or his personal representatives, out of the proceeds of any such sales, such compensation as the said Society, with the assent of the said Churchwardens, may deem reasonable for past losses sustained by any such Rector by reason of his having been deprived of said lot No. 25, under the said decree of the Court of Chancery; that, in compliance with such Order in Council, a patent was granted to the Church Society on the terms above stated for the lots mentioned in the paper hereto annexed, marked (A), containing upwards of 5,000 acres of land in the townships of Ekfrid, Ops, Fenelon, Tilbury West, Mersea, Verulam, Maidstone, and Romney; that, at a meeting of the Church Society held on the 10th November, 1858, a communication was read from the Rector and Churchwardens of St. John's Church, Bowmanville, recommending the Society to accept the offer of Mr. Workman, of Montreal, for the purchase of the 5,250 acres of land given by the Government in lieu of the Darlington Glebe;—the offer being £1,000 cash and two notes for £1,000 each, one payable in twelve, the other in twenty-four months, with interest; whereupon it was *Resolved*, That the Society consent to the sale of the lots given by the Government in lieu of the Darlington Glebe, as recommended by the Rector and Churchwardens for the sum of £3,000—£1,000 down, and the balance in notes of £1,000 each, the first payable in one year and the other in two years from the date of sale, security in real estate, municipal bonds, or Government debentures, such as shall be satisfactory to the Solicitor of the Society, being given for the payment of the principal and interest.

That, on the 19th November, 1858, a deed was made and executed between the Church Society of the first part, the Rector and Churchwardens of St. John's Church, Bowmanville, of the second part, and Ferdinand McCulloch of the third part, conveying the 5,250 acres of land to the said McCulloch, in consideration of the above said sum of £3,000; the substitution of Mr. McCulloch's name for that of Mr. Workman being explained by the following letter of Mr. Workman to Robert Armour, Esq., of Bowmanville, under date of 27th October, 1858:—

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I am in receipt of your kind favour of 23rd, containing the offer of the lands you mention therein; I am much obliged for your consideration, and were I in good health and out of business, I would probably embrace it; but my health is poor, and I cannot draw £3,000 out of my current business this moment; and I do not like breaking in on my stock to raise cash to lock up in land.

"As you have been so kind, however, as to introduce the matter, and as you recommend it, I will do this.—I will take the purchase at the £3,000, £1,000 cash down, £1,000 in one year, and the remaining £1,000 in two years from date of purchase, with interest. Should this offer be accepted, the deed to be made in the name of Ferdinand McCulloch, Cashier of City Bank. I, if necessary, will give my guarantee to McCulloch's obligation, or I will endorse his paper for the instalments to become due, or give my own paper endorsed by him. I do not think you will require any delay to the conveyance on such paper. I enclose the offer from the trustees, and, with very kind regards, remain most respectfully yours,

(Signed) "WILLIAM WORKMAN."

That, at the next monthly meeting of the Society, the Solicitor presented the following

"REPORT OF THE DARLINGTON RECTORY LANDS.—The deed of the lands granted by the Crown in lieu of the original Glebe lot has been executed, and security given by the Hon. Sidney Smith for £2500 of the purchase money, payable in five years, with interest at 8 per cent., which is further secured by the bond of Mr. McBean, of Cobourg. This security is on property in Port Hope which has been valued at £7600 as a fair cash value, and is otherwise entirely unincumbered.

"I have also examined the terms of the trust contained in the deed to the Society, and have made enquiry of the intention of the Government respecting the appropriation for past losses that the Rector of Darlington had sustained by the sale of the Glebe prior to the issuing of the patent; and, being satisfied that it was intended to indemnify any Rector of Darlington who had sustained losses on that account, I am of opinion that the Society should authorize the following sums to be paid out of the unappropriated balance of the purchase money, these several sums having been assented to by the Churchwardens in accordance with the terms of the trust to the Society.

"The sum of £300 to the Rev. T. S. Kennedy, the sum of £100 to the Rev. Dr. Macnab, the sum of £59 to Mr. Cubitt, together with the expenses of conveyances and opinions as to titles, &c.

(Signed) "J. HILLYARD CAMERON."

That, in minutes of said meeting of 8th December, 1858, the said report is preceded by the following minutes:—"The Solicitor presented the following report upon the nature of the investment made of the proceeds of the Darlington lots, also the various claims referred to him by the Standing Committee, which, being satisfactory, the investment was approved of, and the claims ordered to be paid."

That further explanation of the transaction is furnished by the following letter of the Solicitor, dated Toronto, 4th May, 1864, addressed to the Chairman of the Darlington Glebe Committee:—

"I am in receipt of your communication of 2nd inst., requesting certain information in reference to the Darlington Rectory Endowment.

"In the month of October, 1858, I was informed by the Rev. T. S. Kennedy and Dr. Macnab that a purchaser had been obtained for the Crown Lands granted in lieu of the Darlington Glebe, who would pay £1000 cash, £1000 in one, and £1000 in two years by notes, but would not give any mortgage on the property, as he desired to have the land unincumbered. I said that the land could not be sold for notes, as they were only personal security, but the unpaid purchase money must be secured by mortgage on real estate. I was subsequently informed by Dr. Macnab that the Hon. Sidney Smith would take the notes if he received £500 of the money, and would give mortgage security on property at Port Hope for the £2500 with interest at 8 per cent.; and this, I explained to Mr. Kennedy, could, in my opinion, be done, Mr. Smith's mortgage being, in fact, tendered as part of the purchase money, as if he had been himself the purchaser. The whole of the arrangement for the sale of the lands to Mr. McCulloch, and the transfer of the two notes for £1000 each and £500 cash to Mr. Smith was negotiated, as I understood, with Mr. Robert Armour, of Bowmanville, and I have no doubt that the nature of the arrangement for the purchase of the land, and the security to be given by Mr. Smith was explained by Mr. Kennedy or Dr. Macnab, or both of them, to the meeting of the Society on the 10th November, 1858, when the order for the sale was made; and I was also informed by Dr. Macnab that it was assented to by Mr. Cubitt and Dr. Low, his then Churchwardens at Bowmanville.

"After the meeting of the 10th November, Mr. Kennedy informed me that the sale had been agreed to, and that the transaction would be carried out, as arranged with the Rector and Churchwardens at Darlington, by giving Mr. Smith £500 in money and the two notes of £1000 each, and taking his mortgage in part payment of the purchase money so as to comply with the terms of the trust.

"Mr. Smith had already sent me an abstract of the title of the property and a valuation amounting to £7,500, and being satisfied with both, I had the necessary documents prepared; and the deed was executed by the Society, the Rector and Churchwardens; and the mortgage was at the same time executed by Mr. Smith and his wife, and a personal bond by him and a Mr. McBean, who was represented to be a solvent person. I considered that the whole arrangement about the sale of the lands and the security from Mr. Smith, had been assented to by the Rector and Churchwardens at Bowmanville, and that the Church Society was merely giving effect to their views. It was also agreed that the endowment for the Rectory should stand at £2500, as the former and present Incumbents seemed to consider that £500 would be necessary to pay arrears of income (which were included in the grant of lands), expenses, &c., and that sum was absorbed, with the exception of \$100 which was placed at the disposal of the Churchwardens with, as I was informed, but do not myself know, the consent of the Rector.

"The money and notes from McCulloch were given by Mr. Armour to me. I gave the notes and £500 to Mr. Smith on the 2nd December, having received from him on that day his mortgage duly executed and registered, and the bond to secure the same, made by himself and Mr. McBean, and retained the remaining £500 until I

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could obtain the assent of the Society to its appropriation, which took place on the 8th December, when it was appropriated under resolution, and finally a balance of \$100 remained, which the Churchwardens received as before mentioned. I attended the meeting of the 8th December and explained the whole matter as I understood it at that meeting, and left the abstract of title, valuation, mortgage, and bond with the Secretary. I transferred the notes and money to Mr. Smith before this meeting, under the authority of the resolution of the 10th November, and the directions of the Secretary; considering, as I have already said, that the mortgage was virtually part of the purchase money, as I would not treat the notes as such, and having been made aware by Dr. Macnab that the consent of himself and the Churchwardens had been given to the proceeding; but I declined to appropriate the surplus £500 until the Society had sanctioned it by resolution, which was accordingly passed on the 8th December.

That your Committee find from dates and statements in letters of Mr. Armour of the 18th April last, of Mr. Cubitt, of 15th and 29th February, of Dr. Low, of 18th April, and from the statement of Dr. Macnab, of 31st March, that the sale to Mr. McCulloch and the loan to Mr. Smith were as much as possible parts of one transaction, and that the loan of the proceeds was effected with the entire concurrence of the Rector and Churchwardens, who appear to have approved of it as a safe investment, although they were not, nor were required to be, personally parties in the indenture of mortgage which was executed by Mr. Smith to the Church Society alone; but that there is no evidence to shew that they (the Rector and Churchwardens) were acquainted with the amount or value of the property actually given as security by Mr. Smith.

That, for a short period, the interest on the loan was paid to the Society by Mr. Smith, but that on the 20th November, 1863, "the account of moneys paid and due under the Hon. Sidney Smith's mortgage to the Church Society" as furnished to the Committee by the Secretary, Mr. Brent, stood as follows:

That, with reference to the advances made to Dr. Macnab, action was taken by the Society on the 12th November, 1862, as appears by the following minute:—
 "In reference to the foreclosure of mortgage held in trust for the Darlington Rectory, the following resolution was carried:—*Resolved*, That with the consent of the Rector and Churchwardens of St. John's Church, Bowmanville, the interest on

the £2500 mortgage held by the Society in trust for that Church, be advanced to the Rector, and, with any interest already advanced, be the first charge on any moneys realized from the sale of the Lands: it being clearly understood that this interest is paid as an advance, and not because the Society is under any liability for the same when not received by the Society; to which arrangement the Rector gave his written consent on the 20th November, but there is no evidence of the consent of the Churchwardens having been similarly signified.

That, by the resolution of June 10th, 1863, it was resolved that the above arrangement should be carried out "until such time as the sale of the lots took place," which should be "within one or at the most two years;" and a Committee was then—i. e., on the 10th of June,—appointed to examine the minutes relating to the Darlington trust, who reported thereon on the 12th August last and recommended that the property held under the mortgage should be offered for sale in the latter part of November, on the terms of one-tenth down, the balance payable in nine annual payments with interest, a reserved price being fixed upon each lot, to be ascertained and fixed in such way as may be determined by the Society. No sale, however, has been effected.

That the mortgaged property consists of 38 lots in the town of Port Hope, in reference to the value of which the following information has been furnished by a gentleman of that town, in a letter dated May 4th, 1864:—

"Enclosed you will receive a list of the lots named in your letter with a valuation put upon them, about two years ago, by two gentlemen of this town; I do not know that they would even bring that amount now, were they offered for sale by auction, but the list will, perhaps, assist you in making your report."

(Signed) "GEO. WARD."

A certain value is attached to each lot, the total being \$1850.

Your Committee having brought the history of this Endowment to the present date and, having stated, as far as they can ascertain, its present position, forbear offering any opinion as to the course to be pursued by the Society, further than to recommend that the facts contained in this report and from all the documents relating to the endowment, be submitted without delay to the legal adviser of the Society for his opinion thereon, especially as to the following points: 1st. The extent of the liability of the Society in relation to the said trust; 2nd. In what way the amount of interest already advanced, can be recovered by the Society; 3rd. As to the expediency, in the present low value of real estate, of selling the property secured by the mortgage, the term of which, (5 years) expired on the 20th November, 1863; such opinion to be laid before the Society at its next quarterly meeting on the second Wednesday in August next.

It seems also imperative upon the Society to take legal steps for recovering the \$100 loaned to Messrs. Cubitt and Manning, and Dr. Low, with the interest thereon; such sum being part of the principal of the Endowment, and the Society being responsible for the same, no security upon real estate having been taken as required by the terms of the patent.

Copy of Minute of Meeting of November 10th, 1858, relative to the Darlington Glebes, page 390.

A communication was read from the Rector and Churchwardens of St. John's Church, Bowmanville, recommending the Society to accept the offer of Mr. Workman of Montreal for the purchase of the 5250 acres of land granted by the Government in lieu of the Darlington Glebe—the offer being £1000 cash, two notes for £1000 each, one payable in twelve and the other in twenty-four months with interest, whereupon it was

Resolved, That the Society consent to the sale of the lands given by the Government in lieu of the Darlington Glebe as recommended by the Rector and Churchwardens for the sum of £3000; £1000 down, and the balance in notes of £1000 each, the first payable in one and the other in two years from the date of sale, security in real estate, municipal bonds, or government debentures, such as shall be satisfactory to the Solicitor of the Society, being given for the payment of the principal and interest.

Dr. Macnab was present at this meeting.

Copy of Minute of December 8th, 1858, page 393.

The Solicitor presented the following report upon the nature of the investment made of the proceeds of the Darlington lots, also on the various claims referred to him by the Standing Committee, which being satisfactory, the investment was approved of and the claims ordered to be paid:—

Report of the Darlington Rectory Lands.

The deed to Mr. McCulloch of the lands granted by the Crown in lieu of the original Glebe lot has been executed and security given by the Hon. Sidney Smith for £2500 of the purchase money payable in five years, with interest at 8 per cent., which is further secured by the bond of Mr. McBean of Cobourg. The security is on property in Port Hope, which has been valued at the sum of £1600 as a fair cash value, and is otherwise entirely unincumbered. I have also examined the terms of the trust contained in the deed to the Society, and have made enquiry of the intention of the Government respecting the appropriation for past losses that the Rector of Darlington Rectory had sustained prior to the issuing of the patent; and, being satisfied that it was intended to indemnify the Rector of Darlington who had sustained losses on that account, I am of opinion that the Society should authorize the following sums to be paid out of the unappropriated balance of the purchase money, these several sums having been assented to in accordance with the terms of the trust to the Society:—

The sum of £300 to Rev. T. S. Kennedy, the sum of £100 to Rev. Dr. Macnab, the sum of £59 to Mr. F. Cubitt together with the expenses of conveyances and opinions as to titles, &c.

In reference to the foreclosure of the mortgage held in trust for the Darlington Rectory the following resolution was carried:—

Moved by Rev. T. B. Read, seconded by the Rev. Dr. O'Meara, and

Resolved, That, with the consent of the Rector and Churchwardens of St. John's Church at Bowmanville, the interest on the £2500 mortgage held in trust for that Church, be advanced to the Rector, and, with any interest already advanced, be first charge on any moneys realized from the sale of the lands, it being clearly understood that this interest is paid as an advance, and not because the Society is under any liability for the same, when not received by the Society.

Copy of Minutes, Wednesday, June 10th, 1863, page 627.

The following resolutions were adopted respecting the Darlington Rectory:—

That the resolution with regard to the Darlington Glebe passed in November last be carried out until such time as the sale of the lots shall take place, and that such sale shall take place as soon as may appear desirable; that this resolution shall not be considered to refer to an indefinite period, it being understood that the sale shall take place within one, and, at the most, two years.

Moved by Hon. G. S. Boulton, seconded by Mr. Carter,

That the Rector of Bowmanville, F. Farncomb, M. Cochrane with the mover and seconder be a Committee to ascertain what security was given in regard to the loan for the benefit of the Darlington Rectory in addition to a mortgage, and to adopt such measures as they may deem necessary to make the security available for the benefit of the Rectory.

Abstract from Minutes, August 12th, 1863.

The Secretary read the report of the Committee appointed at the annual meeting of the Church Society as follows:—

The Committee beg to report that they have examined the Minutes relating to the sale and transfer of the lands given by the Government in lieu of the Darlington Glebe, they find that in 1858, the lands (5250 acres) were sold to Mr. Workman for the sum of £3000: £1000 cash down, and notes given for the balance payable in one and two years with interest.

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The said notes, with the sum of £500 were transferred to the Hon. Sidney Smith and security taken on property in Port Hope for £2500 payable in five years with interest at 8 per cent., and further secured by the bond of Arthur McBean of Cobourg. The property on which the security was taken, was valued, according to the Solicitor's report, at £7600, a copy of which valuation is not forthcoming, and, it is believed, that the bond of Mr. McBean is of no value.

Your Committee would recommend that the property should be offered for sale in separate lots in the latter part of November on the terms of one-tenth down and the balance payable in nine annual payments with interest, a reserved price being fixed in such way as may be determined by the Society.

It was then moved by Dr. Bovell, seconded by Judge Gowan, and

Resolved, That the resolution of June, 10th, 1863, respecting any advances on account of the stipend of the Rector of Darlington be not continued in force after the 1st July next, and that, from that date, the resolution be rescinded.

In May, 1863, the following resolution was adopted:—

That the Incumbent and Churchwardens of St. John's Church, Bowmanville, be informed that in future the Society can only pay over to the Incumbent such sums as shall from time to time be received as interest on the mortgage held by the Society in trust for the benefit of the said Parish, after deducting the amount already advanced by the Society, or any necessary costs which have been or may be incurred on account of the same. And that, as the property represented by the said mortgage is, at present, unproductive, the Society will be glad to hear whether the said Incumbent and Churchwardens desire that the same should be sold forthwith, or whether it is their wish that the sale be postponed until a more favourable time.

Report of the Solicitor on the Darlington Endowment.

Toronto, 5th November, 1864.

In accordance with a Resolution of the Society, passed at the meeting in August last, "That the proposition of Dr. Macnab, together with the legal opinion accompanying it, be referred to the Solicitor of the Society, and that the Solicitor be requested to report upon the Darlington Glebe question at the next quarterly meeting." I beg leave to send you the following report upon the several points submitted by the Darlington Glebe Committee at the conclusion of their report. These points are,

First. The liability of the Society under the Trusts in the Patent.

Secondly. The claim of the Society to be refunded any part of the money paid to Dr. Macnab which has not been received by the Society.

Thirdly. The proper time for the sale of the land mortgaged by Mr. Smith.

Upon the first point, as I have already stated in a communication made to the Committee in May last, I consider the mortgage obtained from Mr. Smith, as in reality a part of the purchase money of the Glebe Land, quite as much as if the land had been sold to him, and his mortgage had been upon it for a part of the purchase money, and not upon the land at Port Hope. If the mortgage had been upon the Glebe Land as part of the purchase money, and Mr. Smith had failed in the payment of either the interest or principal of it, no one would have dreamed of holding the Society answerable for the amount, and I cannot view the transaction in any other light.

In the ordinary case of a loan of money by trustees, there can be no doubt of the correctness of the opinion of Mr. Crooks, that trust money cannot be lent upon unproductive property of a speculative value, without the Trustees rendering themselves liable for any loss that may arise; but even in that case, the position of the *cestuis que trust* must be looked at, and if they have the power to assent, and have assented to the investment, I think it would be difficult to find a case, where

a Court of Equity would charge the Trustees with loss; and as in this case, I consider that the circumstances shew not only that the mortgage was in reality in the nature of a security for the purchase money, but also had the sanction of the *cestuis que trust*, even if they were not cognizant of the exact position and value of the property. I am of opinion that the Church Society is not liable for either the principal or interest of the money in the mortgage. I have not attached any weight to the consideration which I think might also be fairly taken into account that the Glebe Land was wild and unproductive, and that at the time of the sale there was no doubt of Mr. Smith's solvency.

On the second point: if my view on the first point be correct, the Society is not responsible for the interest, except when received, and Dr. Macnab is liable to refund the £200 per annum from the time he agreed to receive it as an advance from the Society.

On the third point: I consider that in the present depressed value of real estate, it would not be advisable to sell the mortgaged property.

In reference to that part of the resolution which relates to the proposition of Dr. Macnab, the Society must consider that proposition in view of all the circumstances of the case. Its acceptance may be looked upon as a compromise of the extreme claims of either party, and may prevent a litigation, which will be tedious and expensive, and it will give time and opportunity to realize the best prices that can be obtained for the mortgaged land. I recommend neither its acceptance nor refusal. The Society must act upon it entirely upon its own merits.

Report presented in 1866.

The Committee appointed to enquire and report on the Darlington Rectory question, beg leave to report:—That having heard the statements of Dr. Macnab and R. Armour, Esq., of Darlington, and having examined carefully all the minutes of the Church Society bearing upon the question of the Darlington Endowment, and having read the legal opinions of the Solicitor of the Society, and Mr. Adam Crooks of this City, this Committee are of opinion that it will be very much to the interest of the Church Society that it accept the very liberal offer of Dr. Macnab as a final settlement of the question; which offer is to the following effect, viz., that the Church Society undertake the payment to the Rector of St. John's Church, Bowmanville of the sum of one hundred pounds per annum, to be computed from the date of the last payment to Dr. Macnab by the Society, in lieu of all claims upon the proceeds of the lands lately sold by the Church Society in the town of Port Hope, under a mortgage made by the Hon. Sidney Smith to the Church Society.

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APPENDIX Q.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS COMMITTEE.

For the year ending 30th April, 1870.

The Committee on Sunday Schools beg leave to report that during the past year several meetings have been held, and although the attendance was not as large as could have been desired, the members present have given very careful consideration to the whole scope of the work assigned to them; and the result has been to deepen their conviction of the importance of making some well-directed efforts for the awakening of a more general interest in the subject of Sunday School instruction and discipline, for the promotion of a greater amount of system and uniformity in their management, and providing the means for readily obtaining library and class books.

In the present day, when the advantages of secular learning are so widely diffused, it becomes more important that the young mind thus opened and enlarged should be guided and sanctified by careful religious instruction. And although the Sunday School system is not co-extensive with that of the public day school, yet its influence is more than any other instrumentality under the Church's control. And all who study the subject will be convinced that the development of active Christian zeal and the extension of the Church's principles have, under God's blessing, been largely due to the early training of the Sunday School.

It therefore becomes us, by every means in our power, to make these valuable Christian agencies still more effective in accomplishing the work assigned them of bringing the great truths of the Gospel to bear more directly upon the hearts and minds of the children committed to our care—of seeking to develope those higher and nobler springs of action for their guidance in after life both in the Church and in the world—and of endeavouring to enlist their young hearts and warmest sympathies in the missionary and benevolent objects which the Church has ever had in view for the promotion and extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom.

The Committee are very sensible of the difficulty which besets any effort in this direction; but at the same time feel that difficulty ought not to deter us in a work of so much importance as the Christian training of the Church's children.

With regard to providing library and class books, the Committee have not yet felt that the time has arrived or the necessary opportunity has presented itself for making any decided move, and they therefore refrain from offering any suggestions at present.

It is a matter of regret that little information has been furnished on the present condition and management of our Sunday Schools. The value of improvements in discipline and instruction which may be adopted in particular schools is lost to others. It is therefore the more necessary that some scheme should be adopted by which earnest, active workers should have an opportunity of giving each other the

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benefit of their experience, and of discussing improved matters of Sunday School organization which have been adopted in the mother country or elsewhere, and of thus rendering individual progress beneficial to the whole.

From these considerations, and with a hope of awakening a more general interest and correspondence on the subject, the Committee have decided upon recommending the establishment of a Church Sunday School Convention for the Diocese of Toronto, the operations of which might be extended to the neighbouring Dioceses if approved in the proper quarters.

It is proposed that this Convention should meet annually (or oftener if desired) at some central and convenient place—that all clergymen, superintendents, and other friends of Sunday Schools should be invited to attend—that, in order to secure a general representation, each congregation where a Sunday School is established in the Diocese should be requested to send one or more delegates chosen by the superintendent and teachers of the Sunday School—that members of Convention should bring with them all the information they could collect on the management and wants of Sunday Schools—and that, at the meeting of the Convention, papers should be read, and addresses delivered bearing on the subject.

From the establishment of such a Convention the Committee confidently believes that much latent interest in this important work, waiting only a suitable means of development, will take the form of vigorous action; and they therefore recommend that the authority of the Synod be given for the summoning of such Convention.

Some mistakes having gone abroad in regard to the Catechisms furnished by this Committee, they deem it advisable to state that the only Catechisms distributed by them are all from the lists of the Christian Knowledge Society (a Society supported and managed by members of the Church of England generally) with the exception of the Church Catechism Broken into Short Questions, which is simply a revision of a similar work published by the above Society, and authorized by the late revered Bishop, in which care was taken to make no change whatever in doctrine, but to re-arrange the matter for greater convenience in using. The other Catechisms distributed are the Church Catechism, Crossman's, Mant's, and Sinclair's.

It is also deemed advisable to state that the whole of the works circulated by this Committee, are either works which were placed in their charge when the Committee was constituted in its present state, or works on the various lists of the above-named Society.

They have, indeed, been authorized by the late Church Society to place on their list any other works which approve themselves to their judgement; but as yet they have not found it desirable to exercise that power.

The Committee had intended to include in their Report a scheme for the future discharge of their functions; but the illness of the Chairman, and his absorption in the discharge of other duties, prevented his calling the Committee together; but this is the less to be regretted, as they perceive that a plan is in contemplation for uniting this Committee with the Sunday School Committee: a plan which prevents obvious recommendations, but which would require a reconstruction, in order to form the newly created Committee.

In regard to the instructions to the Executive Committee, given by the Synod at its last Session, "to deliberate and agree upon such measures as will, in their opinion, tend to secure for the Bishop Strachan School the united support of the Diocese,"—The Executive Committee beg to report the following resolution, proposed by one of its members, who is also a member of the Bishop Strachan School, who stated that he made the proposition therein set forth with the consent of the Council, and which resolution was carried by the casting vote of the Chairman of the Committee:—

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EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, February 8th, 1870.

Resolved—That this Committee concur in the proposal submitted by the Chairman as to the Constitution of the Governing Body of the Bishop Strachan School, the following being the proposition referred to: "That six of the Clerical Members thereof shall be annually elected by the Clergy of the Synod of the Diocese, six of the Lay Members by the Lay Delegates therein, and that the remaining four members of the Council, two Clerical and two Lay, shall be annually appointed by the Bishop during the regular Annual Session of the Synod, and that the Council (of the Bishop Strachan School) will be ready to promote, either in the Legislature or elsewhere, such measures as may be deemed necessary to carry the above arrangement into effect."

The Church Music Committee beg to report that the sale of the Chant and Tune Book steadily progresses; but regret to have to again report a considerable debt still due to the Chairman of that Committee. They would again urge upon the members of the Synod the desirability of an increased use of this book in their congregations, being convinced that it is well adapted for the promotion of Congregational Singing. The Committee have had under consideration a plan for the more speedy reduction of the debt, which they have not yet been able to complete.

APPENDIX U.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE MEMORIAL OF REV.
S. BRIGGS, M.A.

The Committee, appointed to consider the memorial presented to the Synod last year, on behalf of the Rev. S. Briggs, the prayer of which was that the circumstances of his case might be thoroughly investigated, beg to report:

That very contradictory evidence has been before them respecting Mr. Briggs's conduct in his Mission. Very grave charges had been made in 1867, but on Rural Dean Osler's visiting the Mission these charges were not substantiated—one person who had signed the paper avowing his utter ignorance of its contents—another being obliged so to modify his charge as to make it utterly frivolous, and the result being that absolutely nothing remained to Mr. Briggs's prejudice.

In the following year the Rev. Mr. Ardagh visited the Mission at the Bishop's request, and made an unfavourable report, but it appears that he saw Mr. Briggs and the complainants separately, and that his report was based on charges made, for the most part, in Mr. Briggs's absence.

The Church Society withdrew its grant, on the ground that the people would pay nothing. This was done in August, 1868, taking effect from the following October. The people pleaded, and their plea seems to have been accepted by the Church Society, that Mr. Briggs had violated his engagement by not living at Creemore. The Bond which the people gave has been before the Committee, and the condition imposed on Mr. Briggs is, not that he shall live at Creemore, but that he shall live within the limits of his Mission, which included Stayner, the place of his residence.

The Committee, while they fully allow that Mr. Briggs would have consulted the interests of the Mission by living at Creemore, are not prepared to accept the allegation of the people, that he violated his engagement by living at Stayner.

Under these circumstances they consider that a grievous wrong was done to Mr. Briggs by the non-payment of the Bond, which entitles him to great consideration.

The Committee very deeply regret that Mr. Briggs should, since the appointment of another Missionary at Creemore, have adopted the line of conduct which he has. They cannot justify either his language or his actions, by which he has greatly prejudiced his case: they would, however, move the Synod to recommend him to the favourable consideration of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, and of the Mission Board, with a view to his becoming entitled to a salary of \$200 from the Board, by his appointment to some other Mission, as he is not in their opinion entitled, as he is by no means anxious, to be placed on the superannuated list.

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APPENDIX V.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE INSURANCE OF THE LIVES OF THE CLERGY.

The Committee beg to report that the plan for this purpose submitted at the last meeting of Synod having been "referred back for further and fuller information," they sought to obtain it by causing the report to be published and widely circulated in connection with an obituary notice of a devoted Missionary whose lamented death afforded a striking instance of the necessity of such a provision being made.

The information obtained by this means has led the Committee to make a material alteration in the plan originally proposed.

The straitened condition of the Widows and Orphans' Fund, and the rapid increase of claimants on its resources, are such as to cause serious apprehension as to its capability to meet them much longer at the present rate. To avoid a contingency so much to be deplored, it is deemed inadvisable to solicit any aid towards the proposed object—from the laity—but leaving them to devote their undivided liberality towards the support of the Widows and Orphans' Fund—the Committee recommend that the enterprize of insuring the lives of the Clergy be confined to their own subscriptions; and that at first, at least, it be limited to the object of securing, (on the mutual assurance principle) to the widows, or orphans of each subscriber, a certain amount at his death.

The Committee have pleasure in stating that the project has been taken up in other Dioceses, and they look forward with hope that the benefits of the scheme may be greatly extended by the formation of an association embracing the Clergy of the whole Province; but, in the mean time they urge the immediate adoption of the following plan which can be carried out without much cost or inconvenience, viz, That each Clergyman now doing duty in this Diocese be requested to unite in the association, by paying to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod, as soon after the adoption of this report as possible, the sum of \$—, which shall be deposited by him in a bank, at interest, and on the death of a subscriber, the Bishop, on the application of the Archdeacon in whose Archdeaconry the deceased Clergyman shall have lived, shall order the amount in hand—(being the subscriptions of the members) and such others as may be disposed to contribute—to be paid over to the widow, or guardian of the orphans, of such deceased Clergyman; and immediately upon payment of the amount, the Secretary-Treasurer shall assess each member for a sum equal to the amount of subscription as before paid, which shall be held over in similar manner until the next death, and so on until a permanent scheme shall be adopted by the Synod.

Should a long interval elapse before the amount subscribed be claimed, the interest accruing thereon, after deducting expenses, shall be appropriated from time to time by the Bishop to relieve deserving cases of widowhood or orphanage as his Lordship shall deem fit.

APPENDIX W.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE SALE OF A LOT IN
NOTTAWASAGA.

The Committee, appointed to investigate the circumstances under which Lot 26 in the 7th Concession of Nottawasaga was sold by the Church Society, and to report to what Mission the proceeds thereof, properly belonged, beg leave to Report:

2. That for several years, prior to the year 1855, Church service was held in Creemore, by the Rev. Mr. Ardagh. Creemore being the only place in the township of Nottawasaga in which Church service was then held.

4. That Mr. Webster granted the said acre under the expectation that the south-half of lot 26 in 7th concession of Nottawasaga should, from the revenue to be derived therefrom, form an Endowment of the Church to be erected on the said acre, and shortly afterwards proceeded to raise funds by subscription, and erected on the said acre in Creemore a Church, at an expense of about seven hundred dollars, and the said Church at Creemore was the first Church erected in the township of Nottawasaga.

5. That the Church at Creemore was erected in 1854; and the Rev. Mr. Langtry having, in 1855, been appointed to that Mission, occupied this Church in his ministrations, still being the only Church in the township, receiving the rent of the south-half of the lot 26 during all the time he was there, (a period of years) under the sanction and by the authority of the Church Society.

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8. That there was no Church in Collingwood erected till 1856, two years after the erection of the Church in Creemore.

9. Your Committee further report, that the south-half of the lot 26 referred to, was in February, 1868, sold by the Church Society, and conveyed to one James Kelly for the sum of three thousand and five dollars, \$605 of the purchase money being paid down, and the balance \$2,400 secured by mortgage on the land sold, payable in four annual instalments, with interest at seven per cent., the first instalment whereof has since been paid.

10. The trust contained in said mortgage is "That the Church Society shall hold and stand possessed of the land therein contained, and of the principal money and interest thereby secured when paid for the use of the Incumbent of the Church of All Saints, at Collingwood, as the Church Society of the Diocese may from time to time appoint."

11. Your Committee do not presume to give a legal opinion upon the effect of the trusts contained in said mortgage, but if the effect thereof is, as the words seem to indicate, that the principal money thereby secured is appropriated to the Incumbent of the Church of "All Saints," at Collingwood, then it is the opinion of your Committee that such trust is foreign to the purpose for which the capital of the fund was originally created by the donor of the land, and not in accordance even with what would to them seem to be the intention of the resolution of the Church Society.

12. Your Committee report, that the Rector of Collingwood has assigned the income derivable from the purchase money, secured by the aforementioned mortgage as security for instalments payable under another mortgage on the land given to secure money borrowed for the erection of a parsonage in Collingwood; and, although your Committee feel that the Rector thought he was entitled so to do under the terms of the Resolution of the Church Society referred to, your Committee do not find that the Church Society (the Trustees) were a party to the assignment, and it becomes a question for the Synod to determine how far such assignment can be available for the purpose for which the assignment was made.

13. It is the opinion of your Committee that the principal and interest of the fund, arising from the sale of the land referred to, should be secured to the intent that the interest of the fund should be appropriated to the use of the Church at Creemore, or the Incumbent thereof, the Church at Creemore having been the first Church erected in the township of Nottawasaga, and the revenue of the endowment having been in the first instance, for a period of time at all events, appropriated by the Church Society to that Church.

14. As to the incumbrance created on the interest of the fund, your Committee hope that some equitable arrangement may be made which will be mutually satisfactory to the Church of Creemore and Collingwood, as, from the resolutions of the Church Society, the Church at Collingwood have undoubtedly been led into the belief that they could, at least, deal with the interest, the principal of the fund being intact, and there being now standing to the credit of the fund, the sum of \$1,038, as appears from page 96 of the *Journal of the Synod* of 1869.

In re NEW CHURCH TEMPORALITIES ACT.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE,

Ottawa, November 5, 1869.

The undersigned, to whom was referred the letter of the Rev. Charles Hamilton, Clerical Secretary of the Provincial Synod, bearing date the 8th of February, 1869, transmitting a certified copy of the "Canon of the Temporalities of the Church," adopted by the Provincial Synod of the Church of England and Ireland in Canada, during its fourth session; and to whom was also referred a letter on the same subject from the Hon. John Hillyard Cameron, Chancellor of the Diocese of Toronto, dated 4th February last, begs leave to report:

That after full consideration of such 6th Canon, he has come to the conclusion that the approval required under the statute passed by the Legislature of the Province of Canada, 29 & 30 Vic. cap. 15, entitled "An Act to make further provision in relation to Temporalities of the United Church of England and Ireland," by the Governor in Council, must be given by the Provincial Governments of Ontario and Quebec.

The Temporalities of the Church are, in other words, the *property* of the Church. All laws relating to property and Civil Rights are under the jurisdiction of the Local Legislature, and the 65th clause of the "British North America Act, 1867," transfers to the Lieutenant Governors of Provinces respectively, the administration of all laws coming within their respective jurisdictions.

It does not seem that under any of the powers conferred upon the Government or Parliament of the Dominion, the Governor General has the power to act in this case.

The undersigned thinks that this opinion is conclusively established by the fact that the Act in question, which authorizes the adoption of the Canon, is liable to be amended or repealed like any other Act; and that, beyond a doubt, any such amendment or appeal can only be effected in the Provincial Legislatures.

It is to be noted that the Legislature of Quebec has already assumed (and in the opinion of the undersigned, properly) jurisdiction on this subject with respect to the Church of Scotland in Canada, by Statute, 32 Vic. cap. 76; by which Statute the Act of the late Parliament of Canada, entitled "An Act to incorporate the Board for the management of the Temporalities Fund of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, in connection with the Church of Scotland," is amended. The Act so amended affected the Temporalities of that Church in the whole of the late Province of Canada.

No argument in favor of the Governor General acting in the matter, can be founded on the inconvenience of the Synod being obliged to apply to two Governments.

This is simply being obliged.

The undersigned Governor General, in reflection, has considered the merits of the Canon. Besides, the Governor General is to act upon a cause endless the Canon.

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This is simply the case of a Corporation holding property in two countries, and being obliged to have recourse to the Legislature and tribunals of each.

The undersigned was at first of opinion that there would be no harm in the Governor General in Council sanctioning the Canon, *quantum valeat*; but, on reflection, he now thinks that it would be an improper course—that it would be an undue, and therefore, a reprehensible interference with the rights of the Governments of Ontario and Quebec, and, as such, might be resented as a usurpation. Besides, the consequences to the Church might be very serious if they proceeded to act upon a Canon which might subsequently be decided to be illegal. It might cause endless litigation, not only as to property, but as to every action taken under the Canon.

Even supposing, however, that the right of approval did rest with the Governor General, some grave questions arise on the Canon itself.

The Act of 1866 gives no such absolute power of repeal or amendment of the several statutes recited in it, as is assumed by the Canon when it substitutes its provisions for those Acts and repeals them entirely.

The statute of 1866 gives the Synod the power to make such repeal, change, alteration and amendment of the Acts therein recited as they shall deem advisable and necessary *for the better and more uniform regulation and management* of the Temporalities. It does not confer any powers additional to those contained in the several Acts relating to such Temporalities.

Now, in some of these Acts, the soil and freehold of the Churches and Churchyards are in the Incumbent, the management being in the Incumbent and Churchwardens. In others, the fee is in the Incumbent and Churchwardens. Now, in the Canon all this is changed. The fee of the Churches is to be in the Incumbent, and of the Church-yards in the Incumbent and Churchwardens.

It may be a question whether this is not a matter of title altogether, and not of regulation and management; and, therefore, beyond the powers of the Synod.

Again, by the Temporalities Acts of Upper Canada and Quebec, 1840 and 1843, the Incumbent is not expressly made a Corporation *sole*, and the Churchwardens are only made a *quasi* Corporation. The words of the Acts are, "that the Churchwardens shall, during the term of their office, be *as* a Corporation to represent the interests of such Church."

The Montreal Temporalities Act, 1851, makes the Incumbent and Churchwardens a Corporation. It might be doubted whether the Synod has the power to assimilate the laws of the three Dioceses in that respect, and to make the Incumbent and Churchwardens a Corporation in Ontario and Quebec as in Montreal.

On looking at the 8th clause of the Canon itself it will be seen, that the Incumbent and Churchwardens are not expressly made a Corporation as, it is presumed, was intended; but it provides that the Incumbent and Churchwardens *being a Corporation* shall use the name of, &c., &c. The clause merely refers, in its language, to such Incumbents and Churchwardens as were Corporations at the time of the adoption of the Canon, and leaves the law as it was in Upper Canada and the Diocese of Quebec.

The 20th clause of the Canon makes valid all conveyances to the Bishop for Church purposes (notwithstanding the Statutes of Mortmain), provided the conveyance is made six months before the death of the person conveying, and registered within six months after his death.

Now, the 20th section of the Montreal Temporalities Act (14 & 15 Vic. cap. 176) provides that the Bishop shall not hold properties exceeding £5,000 annually. This limitation is ignored in the Canon.

Other questions may arise, as, for instance, whether the power of regulation and management involves the power of sale of property, as provided in the 21st and 24th clauses of the Canon. Its preamble, after stating in general terms that the Synod has power by the Act of 1866 to repeal or amend any portions of the Acts therein recited, subject to certain reservations in the Act made, proceeds to declare the Canon to be substituted for the said Acts, ignoring even those reservations and substituting the Canon for the Acts to all intents and purposes.

It may be said that such substitution, being in excess of power, is void so far as it may conflict with the reservations or with the limitations above mentioned in the amount of property to be held by the Bishop of Montreal, but the Canon is valid for the remainder. This may be so, but it is inadvisable that such apparent conflict of law should exist, and the Governor General could not well be advised to approve of a Canon offering such conflict.

The undersigned has felt it his duty to state what appeared to him to be objections to the Canon itself, but desires to base his recommendation that the Governor General do not grant his sanction on the ground first stated, viz., that the sanctioning power is vested, since Confederation, in the Lieutenant Governors of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, and not in the Governor General of Canada.

The undersigned did not earlier make a report on this reference, because he sent its substance in a letter to the Hon. John Hillyard Cameron, dated the 12th March last, in which letter he invited the attention of that gentleman, as Chancellor of the Diocese of Toronto, to the several objections taken by him the undersigned. A copy of that letter was sent on the same day to the Right Reverend the Bishop of Toronto.

No communication having been received from Mr. Cameron in answer, and no further action having been taken, the undersigned was under the impression that application would be made to the Lieutenant Governors of the two Provinces, until a letter addressed by W. P. Atkinson, Esq., Secretary, dated the 28th September last, to the Clerk of the Privy Council, asking whether the new Church Temporalities Act passed at the last Session of the Provincial Synod had received the sanction of the Governor General, was referred to him.

APPENDIX Y. (2)

DRAFT.

An Act to confer upon the Bishop and Incumbents of the Diocese of Toronto similar powers to those held by the Bishop and Incumbents of the Diocese of Ontario.

WHEREAS by Statute 25 Vic., ch. 86, sec. 8, the Bishop, Rectors, and other Incumbents of the Diocese of Ontario have the power of aliening and transferring lands and personalty vested in them respectively for the uses and purposes of the said See and of the Churches, Parishes, and Livings therein :

And whereas it was intended that by the Statute 28 Vic., ch. 54, similar powers should be conferred upon the Bishop, Rectors, and other Incumbents of the Diocese of Toronto, but doubts exist whether such powers were thereby conferred, and it is expedient that such doubts should be removed, and that the powers hereinafter granted should be conferred upon the last named Bishops and Incumbents :

Therefore Her Majesty, by and with, &c., enacts as follows :

1. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Toronto for the time being shall have the administration of all lands and personalty which now are or hereafter may be vested in him or conveyed to him for the use or endowment of his See, or for the general uses of the Anglican Church in his Diocese, or for the use or endowment of any particular Church, Chapel, Parsonage, Parish, Mission, or Living erected or established, or hereafter to be erected or established therein, or for other purposes appertaining to the said Church in his Diocese, or to any particular Parish therein.

2. The said Bishop, by and with the consent of the Incorporated Synod of the said Diocese, shall have power to sell, alien, and transfer any lands or personalty which now are or may hereafter be vested in or conveyed to him for the general uses and purposes of the said See, or of the said Church, and by and with the consent of the said Synod and of the Rector or Incumbent of the Parish or Mission to which the same may pertain, or for the benefit of which the same may be held, shall also have power to sell, alien, and convey any lands or personalty which now are or hereafter may be vested in or conveyed to the said Bishop for the purposes, use, or endowment of, or pertaining to, any Church, Chapel, Parsonage, Parish, Mission, or Living.

3. The Parson, Rector, or other Incumbent, of any Church, Chapel, Parsonage, Parish, Mission, or Living, for the time being, to whom any lands or personalty shall have been or hereafter may be conveyed, or in whom the same may now be or hereafter may be vested for the purpose, use, or endowment of such Church,

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Chapel, Parsonage, Parish, Mission, or Living, shall, by and with the consent of the Bishop of the said Diocese and of the Synod thereof, have the power to sell, alien, and convey such lands and personalty.

4. The price or consideration money of any such sale alienation, or transfer, shall be applied to the uses and purposes for which the land or personalty so sold, aliened, or transferred, was originally conveyed to or became vested in the said Bishop and Incumbents respectively.

5. The said Bishop, and any Rector, Parson, or other Incumbent, in the said Diocese, in each case by and with such consent as is herein provided for in regard to such sales by them as aforesaid, shall have power to grant and convey any glebe, house, or lands, which now are or hereafter may be vested in them respectively, to any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, in exchange for any other house, buildings, or lands, and it shall be lawful for the said Bishop, Rectors, Parsons, or other Incumbents, with the like consent, to accept and take in exchange to him, them, and their respective successors forever, from any person or persons, or body corporate, any other house, buildings, or lands, in lieu of and exchange for such house or lands so granted and conveyed.

6. The consent of the Synod, Bishop, and Incumbent, respectively, hereinbefore required, shall be testified by their respectively executing the deed or other assurance by which any lands or other premises shall be conveyed or assured.

7. Nothing in this Act shall extend or apply to the lands mentioned in the Statute 29-30 Vic., ch. 16, intituled, "An Act to provide for the sale of Rectory Lands in this Province."

8. This Act shall be a public Act.
