An Act for Granting to Her Majesty certain Duties on Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, Imported into this Colony and its Dependencies.

[12th October, 1839.]

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY.

WE, Your Gracious Majesty's most Dutiful and loyal subjects the Commons of Newfoundland, in General Assembly convened, towards raising the necessary Revenue, to defray Her Majesty's Public Expenses, in this Island, and to provide for the permanent improvement of the Colony, have freely and voluntarily resolved to give and grant unto Your Majesty the Duties hereinafter mentioned; and do therefore beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted, And be it therefore enacted, by the Governor, Council, and Assembly of Newfoundland, in General Assembly convened, and by the authority of the same, that there be raised, levied, collected and paid unto Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors, upon all Wines and Spirits, and upon all Goods, Wares, and Merchandize imported into this Colony and its Dependencies, the several Duties as the same are respectively set forth in Figures in the Table of Duties hereinafter contained, and denominated—

A Table of Duties payable upon all Wines, Spirits, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, imported into Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

All which Duties shall be paid by the Importer or Importers of such articles to the Collector or Sub-Collectors of Her Majesty's Customs, and shall be collected and secured by the means, and under the regulations and penalties, and in the way and manner hereinafter provided.

2nd.—And be it further enacted, that upon the entry of any Timber, Lumber or Shingles, subject to duty by this Act, and which may be hereafter imported into this Island or its Dependencies, the Master or Commander of the Vessel in which such Timber, Lumber, or Shingles may have been imported, shall, before such Vessel shall be cleared at the Customs, produce to the Collector of Sub-Collectors, respectively, a certificate from some one or the Sworn Surveyors of Lumber appointed by Law, of the true measurement and contents of such Timber, Lumber, or Shingles respectively.

3rd.—And be it further enacted, that the said Duties shall be raised, levied, and exacted, on all such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, over and above and in addition, to the Duty or Duties now raised, levied, or collected on the same articles, under and by virtue of an Act of the Imperial Parliament passed in the third and fourth years of the Reign of his late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Possessions abroad," and over and above and in addition to any Duty or Duties now raised, levied, or collected on the same, under or by virtue of any other Act or Acts of the Imperial Parliament, and that, nothing in this Act contained shall reduce or lessen or be construed to reduce or lessen, the amount of any such Duty, or Duties, now received or receivable under the said Acts of the Imperial Parliament or any of them.

4th.—And be it further enacted, that all sums of Money granted or imposed by this Act, either as Duties, Penalties, or Forfeitures, shall be deemed and are hereby declared to be Sterling Money of Great Britain; and that all such Duties shall be paid and received according to British Weights and Measures in use on the Sixth day of July, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-five; and that in all cases where such Duties are imposed according to any specific quantity or any specific value, the same shall be deemed to apply in the same proportion to any greater or less quantity or value.

5th.—And be it further enacted, that the produce of the Duties received by the means and powers of this Act shall be accounted for and paid quarterly by the Collector or Sub-Collectors of Her Majesty's Customs, into the hands of the Treasurer or Receiver General of this Island, or other proper Officer authorized to receive the same, to be applied to such uses as shall be directed by the Legislature of this Island of Newfoundland.

6th.—And be it further enacted, that all Ships and vessels arriving at any Port, Harbour, Roadstead or Cove, in this Island or its Dependencies, having on board any Goods, Wares or Merchandize, and the Masters, Owners, Consignees and Importers of the same respectively, shall be under and subject and be liable to the

same Rules, Regulations, Forms and Restrictions as are expressed and contained in an Act passed in the Imperial Parliament in the third and fourth years of the Reign of his late Majesty King William the Fourth, entitled "An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Possessions abroad," in respect to the report and entry of such Vessels and their Cargoes with the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs or the Sub-Collectors as aforesaid, both inwards and outwards, the entry of Goods comprising any of the said articles to be laden or unladen, the payment of all Duties and Dues, the entry inwards of such Goods by Bill of Sight, the Regulations made and provided in case the Importer of any Goods subject to Duty under this Act should refuse to enter the same and pay the Duties thereon, the validity of any entry made, the mode and manner of Warehousing Goods without payment of Duty on the first entry hereof, and the Rules in reference thereto, the mode of giving Bond on the entry of Goods to be Warehoused, the Fines Penalties and Forfeitures imposed or incurred on a breach of any and of all such Regulations, the mode and manner of prosecuting for and recovering any such Penalties or Forfeitures, and all Enactments, Rules and Regulations contained in the same Act of the Imperial Parliament,—all which shall be in full force and operation, and shall be used and applied to fulfil the intents and purposes of this Act, so far as the same are applicable to this Island and its Dependencies, and not repugnant to any of the provisions of this Act, as fully and absolutely, to all intents and purposes, as if the same were fully detailed, contained and re-enacted herein; Provided nevertheless, that the said Imperial Act shall not extend to annual, restrain or restrict, or be deemed to extend to annual, restrain or restrict, the operation and effect of any of the sections, clauses, or provisions of this Act, in reference to the Colonial Duties imposed, or to the Drawbacks allowed, on any of the said articles, the Rules or Regulations under which the same are prescribed to be collected or granted, or the Fines, Forfeitures, or Penalties herein imposed, any thing herein contained to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

7th.—And be it further enacted, that in all cases of Goods entered, either for duty or to be Warehoused, and chargeable to pay Colonial Duty, according to the Tale, Gauge, Measure or Weight shall be stated in the entry, and if the Good in such entry be chargeable to pay Duty according to the value thereof, such value shall be stated in the entry and shall be affirmed by the declaration of the Importer, or his known Agent, written upon the entry, and attested by his signature; and if any Person make such declaration not being the Importer or Proprietor of such Goods, nor his Agent duly authorized by him, such Person shall forfeit the sum of One Hundred Pounds and such declaration shall be made in manner and form following, and shall be binding on the Person by or on behalf of whom the same shall be made—(that is to say)

I, A. B. do hereby declare that the Articles mentioned in the entry above written, and contained in the packages therein specified, are of the value of Pounds Shillings and Pence Sterling; and I do now tender the same for all Duties. Witness my hand the day of One Thousand Eight Hundred and the above Declaration signed } the day of A. D. } 18 in the presence of } C. D. (Collector.)

8th.—And be it further enacted, that at the time of entering such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, the Importer thereof, or his known Agent, shall, it required by the Collector or Sub-Collectors of her Majesty's Customs, respectively produce the Invoice of such Goods,

and shall answer on oath all such questions relating to the value thereof as shall be put to him by such Collector or Sub-Collector of Her Majesty's Customs, who are hereby respectively authorized to administer such oath; and in case of failure or refusal to produce such Invoice (unless there be no such Invoice) or to answer such questions, or to answer them truly, or if other than the true and real Invoice be produced or if such true and real Invoice be altered by such Importer or his known Agent, then and in every such case such Importer shall forfeit the sum of One Hundred Pounds: Provided always, that if such Articles be charged with Imperial Duties, and have been valued according to the provisions of the Imperial Act, such valuation shall be accepted as the true value for paying or securing the Colonial Duties thereon.

9th.—And be it further enacted, that if, upon examination, it shall appear to the Collector or Sub-Collector of Her Majesty's Customs, Landing Waiter, or Guager, that such Articles are not valued according to the true value thereof, it shall be lawful for such Collector or other Person to detain and secure such Articles, and within three days from the landing thereof to take such Articles for the use of the Crown; and the said Collector or other Person, shall thereupon, in any such cases, cause the amount of such valuation, with an addition of Ten pounds Per Centum thereon, and also the Duties paid upon such entry, to be paid to the Importer or Proprietor of such Articles, in full satisfaction for the same, and shall dispose of such Articles for the benefit of the Crown; and if the produce of such Sale shall exceed the sum so paid, and all charges incurred by the Crown, One Moiety of the overplus shall be given for the Officer or Officers who had detained and taken such Articles, and the Moiety detained for the benefit of the Crown shall be paid to the Treasurer or the Receiver-General of this Island, or other proper officer authorized to receive the same, to be applied to the public uses of this Colony, as the Legislature shall direct.

10th.—And be it further enacted, that in all cases where the Duty imposed by this Act shall not amount to more than Twenty-five Pounds, the Collector or Sub-Collector of Her Majesty's Customs shall forthwith collect the same, before granting his Warrant for the removal of the Article so imported; and in case such Duty shall amount to more than Twenty-five Pounds, then such Collector or Sub-Collector shall be at liberty to secure the said Duties by taking Bond from the Importer Owner, or Consignee, to her Majesty, Her Heirs, and Successors, with Two sufficient Sureties, for the payment of the Rates and Duties herein before mentioned, in manner following, that is to say—for Wines and Spirits, one half of the said Duties in Three Months, and the remainder of the same in Six Months, and for all other Goods, Wares and Merchandize whatsoever, in Three Months from the date or dates of such Bond or Bonds respectively.

11th.—And be it further enacted, that there shall be allowed on the exportation of all Wines, and all Brandy, Gin Rum, and all other Spirituous Liquors, and of all Muscovado Sugar, from this Island of Newfoundland to the United Kingdom, or any other British Possession, or to any Foreign Port or Place, a Drawback of the full Duties which shall have been paid under this Act upon the Importation thereof into Newfoundland: Provided proof be made, to the satisfaction of the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs, or other proper Officer authorized to collect the Colonial Revenue in this Island, that such Wines, Brandy, Gin, Rum, and other Spirituous Liquors, and such Sugar, respectively, had been duly imported into the United Kingdom, or other British Possession, or into such Foreign Port or Place, by a certificate, under the hands

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of the Collector and Comptroller of the Customs at such Port in the United Kingdom, or in such British Possession, or under the hand and seal of the British Consul or Vice-Consul in such Foreign Port or Place, or if there be no Consul or Vice-Consul at such place, then under the hands and seal of two well-known Merchants, of the actual and due landing of such Wines, Brandy, Gin, Rum, and other Spirituous Liquors, or of such Sugar, at such Port in the United Kingdom, or such British Possession, or such Foreign Port or Place, respectively: Provided always, that no Drawback shall be allowed upon any such Wines, Brandy, Gin, Rum, or other Spirituous Liquors, or such Sugar, unless the same shall be exported in Boats or Vessels exceeding in burden Sixty Tons registered Tonnage, and be claimed within One Year from the day of such Shipment: Provided nevertheless, that the aforesaid Collector, or other proper Officer, is hereby authorized to allow a further time for the production of such Certificate on reasonable cause.

12.—And be it further enacted, that in case any Goods, Ships, Vessels, or Boats, shall be seized as Forfeitures, or detained as undervalued, under this or any Colonial Law, it shall and may be lawful for the Governor Lieutenant Governor, or Person administering the Government of this Island, for the time being, by and with the advice and consent of Her Majesty's Council, to order the same to be restored, in such manner and on such terms and conditions as he shall think fit to direct; and if the Proprietor of the same shall accept the terms and conditions prescribed by the said Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Person administering the Government, by and with the advice and consent aforesaid, he or they shall not have or maintain any action for recompense or damage on account of such seizure or detention, and the Person making such seizure shall not proceed in any manner for condemnation.

13th. And be it further enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Person administering the Government of this Island, to nominate One member from the Council and Two Members from the Assembly, who shall constitute a Board of Audit, who shall have power to Audit the Accounts of the Receivers of the Duties imposed by this Act, and finally to settle and close the Accounts of such Receivers: Provided always, that such Accounts so audited shall be laid before the Legislature in each Session, within One Month from the commencement thereof.

14th. And be it further enacted, that there shall be allowed and paid to the Collector and other Officers of Her Majesty's Customs, and to defray all expenses of remuneration for the collection of the Colonial Revenue, and charges incidental thereto, the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred and Ninety Seven Pounds Seventeen Shillings, to be appropriated in the manner following, to wit:

Collector of Her Majesty's Customs at Saint John's Fifty Pounds.

To the same Officers, to be deposited in the Colonial Chest until the adjudication of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, on the subject of increased remuneration, be ascer-

tainied, One Hundred and Fifty Pounds.

Tide Surveyor at St. John's One Hundred and Fifty Pounds.

Landing Waiter at St. John's, One Hundred and Fifty Pounds.

Clerk of Collector at St. John's, One Hundred Pounds.

Sub-Collector at Fogo, One Hundred Pounds.

sub-Collector at La Poile, One Hundred Pounds

sub-Collector at Greenspond, One Hundred Pounds.

preventive Officer at Bay Bulls, Fifty pounds

Tide Waiters at St. John's Two Hundred and seven pounds seventeen shillings.

Imperial sub-Collectors, One Hundred and Ten pounds.

stationery, printed Forms, postages, and other ordinary Charges and Expenses, Thirty pounds.

15th. And be it further enacted, that this Act shall be in force and continue from the period of the expiry of an Act passed Anno secundo Victoriae reginae, cap. 9, denominated "An Act for Granting to Her Majesty certain Duties on Goods, Wares, and Merchandize imported into this colony and its Dependencies," and from thence until the Eighteenth day of November, in the Year of Our Lord one Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty, and no longer.

*The Harvest and the Weather.*

Since our last, we have taken some pains to obtain the means of communicating to our readers accurate and satisfactory information as to the probable result of the harvest in this county, and the county at large. With regard to this county, farmers and experienced men are generally of opinion, that although a considerable quantity of grain will be reaped, in an inferior and deteriorated condition, yet the gross yield of the crops is, on the average, so much above that of last year, that the produce of good and sound corn, per acre, will be equal to the aggregate yield of good and bad last year, and that the damaged wheat this year, will therefore be a surplusage upon the entire produce of last year. In addition to this state of the comparative result per acre, it seems to have escaped the observation of many who have written on the subject, that the breadth of corn this year, and of wheat in particular, very far exceeds the quantity of corn average last year, and consequently, supposing the proportion of the yield to be as we have described, the actual total produce realized this year, must be considerable above the last year's produce. We have not been able to obtain, with anything like precision, an estimate of the probably breadth of wheat land this harvest, as compared with the last, but we have been informed by intelligent and practical agriculturists, that there must have been sown for the present harvest, at least one-fourth more land than for the preceding, and that something ought also to be reckoned for the increased productive capacity of the land, attained through the medium of the extensive and progressive improvements which of late years have resulted, from the exertions of agricultural societies. The details we have given apply, we believe, to the country at large. They are, in the main, if we be not much mistaken, incontrovertible; and the conclusion, therefore, to which they irresistibly lead us is this, that though much fear and ap-

prehension has filled the public mind, arising in a great measure from the defective and inaccurate accounts which have been promulgated, yet there is a moral and demonstrative certainty if not of an abundant harvest, at least of a produce very importantly exceeding that of last year. We have much gratification in submitting this fact for the consideration of the timid, and for the satisfaction of the public at large.—*Preston Chronicle.*

The Bristol and Clifton Gas company have contracted with the Great Western steamship company, to light their premises with two hundred burners. The workmen will thus be enabled to proceed with the iron vessel which the company have in preparation, by night as well as by day. Engines intended as reserves for the Great Western are also in course of manufacture.

At a dinner given to Dr. Chalmers in Dingwell, the rev. Mr. M. Gillivray, of Lairg, stated that the county of Sutherland was "one of the few counties in which there was no Dissenting place of worship."

The *Gazette du Mail* publishes a letter from Constantinople, of the 12th September, in which it is formally stated, that Russia had proposed to the Turkish government to place at its disposal a corps of 25,000 men, in case Ibrahim Pasha should march upon Constantinople, and that the Porte had apprised the Ambassadors of the other Great Powers of this offer of Russia.

*Death of Lord and Lady Sutherland.* At Bath, the Earl was attacked with a putrid fever, with which he struggled 51 days, and then expired. His Countess, having watched in his chamber twenty-one nights and days, without intermission, sank an unwilling victim to an amiable, but excessive attachment, 17 days before the death of her lord, in her 25th year; his lordship was 31. They left an infant daughter, Lady Elizabeth, the late Duchess Countess of Sutherland, who died, Feb., 1839. A very remarkable circumstance aggravated this bereavement. Lady Sutherland's mother, Lady Alva, knew nothing of the death of her daughter, and only that of his lordship was communicated to her. Whilst Lady Alva was hastening to the assistance of her daughter, she happened to alight from her carriage at an inn on the road to Bath, where she saw two hearses standing. Upon inquiring whose remains they contained, she was told they were those of Lord and Lady Sutherland, on their way to Scotland for interment.—*Countess of Huntingdon's Life and Times.*

The Honorable the NORTHERN CIRCUIT COURT, closed its sittings at the Court-House in this Town, on Friday last, and His Honor Judge LILLY, took his departure for Portugal Cove, on his way to the Capital, in the new Packet-Boat of Mr. Doyle, on Saturday.

The following has been extracted from the Criminal Calendar of the Court, for the whole Autumn, being the names of Offenders, their Crimes, Verdicts and Sentences.

At *Trinity*, No. 6.—Patrick Rice—Assault—Guilty—One Calendar Month imprisonment in Her Majesty's Gaol at Trinity. No. 7.—John Scott—Assault—Fourteen Days imprisonment in Her Majesty's Gaol at Trinity.

At *Harbor Grace*, No. 8.—Gregory Layman—Assault and Battery, firing a Gun and accidentally wounding two Females—Pleaded Guilty—Six Calendar Months imprisonment in the Gaol at Harbor Grace. No. 9 and 10.—Robert Oliver and John McGinlay—Assault and Battery on Gregory Layman—Guilty—Two Calendar Months imprisonment each, in the Gaol at Harbor Grace. It must be truly gratifying to all friends of peace and good order, to know, although Conception Bay contains Twenty-seven Thousand souls and upwards, being more than one-fourth of the population of the whole Island of Newfoundland;—that during the last fourteen years, not only the Criminal business has decreased, to an extent that could not then have been anticipated, but that the Civil business likewise has lessened at Harbor Grace from 320 cases to only 148 for the present year, proving our former position, that the scales of justice are held with an even hand.

Mr. Jukes, who has been engaged in a Geological Survey on the Southern and Western coasts of this Island, for several months past, during which he has been indefatigable in his researches, returned here on Saturday in the hired Ketch *Beaufort*. We are not at present able to furnish any particulars as to the result of the expedition, but are informed that considerable quantities of coal, limestone, &c., have been discovered at St. George's Bay, and some other distant parts.—*Gazette*, Nov. 19.
