









After over twenty years of work, Harry Fisher, of New Zealand, has perfected a liceboat which, to use his wn words, "cannot be sunk unless it s cut in half." He adds:--"I have had experimental models crash into heavy hips in the roughest seas, have rammed gaping holes in the outer protection of the boat and have put it through every test that a lifeboat would be likely to encounter, and the result is complete confidence in its

Lifeboat that Can't Sink

ability to withstand anything." The safety of the boat was strikingly emonstrated at a try-out at Toronto, where the boat was built. The lifeboat was attached by flanges to a steel girder raised thirty feet in the air above the deck of a vessel, and was supposed to run to the end of the girder and

then drop into the water. The boat was loaded with eager volunteers. All went well until the boat had rolled about half the length of the girder,

when the attachments broke and the ifeboat dropped to the edge of the vessel and bounded into the water. Before the spectators had time to scream, the lifeboat bobbed up serenely about forty feet away, and one of the crew merrily waved a flag through one of the port holes. A huge hole was stove in the side of the outer compartment, but the craft settled down to the level of the y. The present boat is twenty four

feet long, being somewhat larger than the model used by the inventor in New Zealand. It is a cylindrical shaped ody and is constructed entirely of steel, with conical ends forming separate compartments by means of bulk neads. These conical ends, utilized for the storage of water or engine fuel, are airtight. Bearings, attached to the

bulkheads, hold in suspension a threequarter cylinder of lesser diameter, and allow the larger or outer shell to roll or turn at will. Passengers enter this queer looking
