Fur Buyers and Shippers.

Regulations under Provisions of "The Game and Inland Fisheries Board Act."

1.—Any person who engages in the business of buying or shipping the skins of fur-bearing animals in the Colony of Newfoundland SHALL OBTAIN A LICENSE FROM THE GAME AND INLAND FISHERIES BOARD, as a fur buyer or shipper such license shall be valid only until the 31st day of December in the year of its issue. A fee of fifty cents (50 cents) for each fur-buyer or shipper's license shall be paid by the licensee to the person issuing the same.

2.—Every buyer of fur shall report to a Magistrate, Justice of the Peace or Sub-Collector, or to the Game and Inland Fisheries Board, St. John's, on a form provided for the purpose, the quantity and kind of all fur exported by him from the Colony. Residents shall report on or before December 31st, in every year, and non-residents shall report before leaving the Colony on or before December 31st, in every year.

NOTE.—Penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or, in default, imprisonment for a term not exceeding two months. See "The Game and Inland Fisheries Board Act, 1910," and Regulation made thereunder.

Declaration of Principles

The Federal Council of Churches which concluded its quadrennial meeting in the city of Chicago, set forth the following platform as the "Declaration of Social Service Principles," declaring that the churches must stand:

- "For equal rights and complete justice for all men in all stations of life."
- "For the protection of the family by the simple standard of purity, uniform divorce laws, proper regulation of marriage, and proper housing."
- "For the fullest possible development for every child, especially by the provision of proper education and recreation."
- "For the abolishment of child labor."
- "For such regulation of the condition of toil for women as shall safeguard the physical and moral health of the community."
- "For the abstention and prevention of poverty."
- "For the protection of the individual and society from the social and moral waste of the liquor traffic."
- "For the conservation of health."
- "For the protection of the worker from dangerous machinery, occupational disease, and mortality."
- "For the right of all men to the opportunity for self-maintenance, for safeguarding this right against encroachments of every kind, and for the protection of workers from the hardships of enforced unemployment."
- "For suitable provision for the old age of the workers, and for those incapacitated by injury."
- "For the principle of conciliation and arbitration in industrial disputes."
- "For a release from employment one day in seven."
- "For the gradual and reasonable reduction of the hours of labor to the lowest practicable point, and for that degree of leisure for all which is a condition of the highest human life."
- "For a living wage as a minimum in every industry, and of the highest wage that each industry can afford."
- "For the most equitable division of the product of industry that can ultimately be devised."

Confesses Murder After Many Years

Vancouver, May 28.—Claiming that twenty-one years ago in London, Eng., he strangled his infant son, only two days old, to death, Gelp Grange, a middle-aged Englishman, one-time sergeant in the army, appeared at the police station Saturday night and surrendered himself to Desk Sergeant Kerner. During these years, while he has been stationed in the out-of-the-way places of the earth, Grange claims that his name has followed him, and at last, to secure peace, he has been forced to confess.

On the strength of his story the sergeant ordered his arrest and at the present time he is being detained pending medical examination and a reply from the Metropolitan police of London.

Approaching the wicket at the desk sergeant's office shortly after ten o'clock, Grange told of the unwelcome entry into this world of his little son. The birth occurred on January 10, 1884. What to do with the little child was a question which oppressed both father and mother, and finally the impending prospect of the former in a moment of passion to strangle it.

Following the crime, Grange, who was then a private in a fusilier regiment, says he was sent to India, and ever since has served in the Orient and other places, where he has endeavored to forget his deed. This, however, proved impossible.

"Of course, I did all I could to avoid the big rivers, but the 'dongas' which are irregular channels made by the tropical rains, were a difficulty. None of the sluice (streams) are bridged, and the water courses are sometimes very deep. I found that I had to choose between going gently through the water in which case there was no impetus to carry the machine up the sharp ascent at the other side, or 'rushing' it. I chose 'rushing' it as more exciting and also as more effective, although I frequently got wringing wet in the process, and incidentally had rather a bad spill through trying to 'rush' a steep water course at Majuba, where the road crosses Laing's Nek at a height of 500 feet. Near Fourteen Streams I all but cycled into the Vaal during a violent thunder storm."

America Cup

Mr. Charles Nicholson (of the Gosport yacht-building firm of Camper and Nicholson) is already at work on the design of the Shamrock IV., Sir Thomas Lipton's new yacht, with which (having induced the New York Yacht Club to modify their rules) he will make another effort next year to bring back the America Cup.

Mr. Charles Nicholson says the new boat will not be an extreme type of yacht, with an enormous sail area and exaggerated beam and draught in proportion to length, which have been features of previous Shamrocks, but will be more like yachts now constructed to British rules of measurement with a fairly big body. She will have a comparatively shallow draught, and not be a freak.

Meanwhile something like a bombshell has been dropped into New York yachting circles by the action of Mr. Nat Herreshoff, the designer and builder of defenders for the America Cup for twenty years, who has tentatively declined to enter into competition for designing the defender of the Cup.

The members of the yacht-building syndicate, therefore, after a conference with Mr. Herreshoff, visited Mr. B. B. Crowninshield, of Boston, who designed the Independence, the unsuccessful candidate for selection as Cup defender at the last trials.

Cheaper Oil Fuel

London.—By an invention patented by the British Motor Car company it is hoped to end the London taxicab strike, now going on for eleven weeks.

The invention has an interest for all users of the automobile as it makes possible the regular use of cheaper fuel than petrol. Petrol fumes less than half the constituents of the new fuel, which experiments, it is stated, give a higher mileage per gallon than pure petrol. The cost price is stated to be 10½d per gallon, 2½d less than the price the taxicab companies are asking from the men for petrol.

The new fuel is useless for the purpose of starting the engine, but that difficulty is overcome by the construction of an apparatus which is supplied with pure petrol from a small independent tank, and used only for the purpose of starting the engine.

The consulting engineer of the Royal Automobile Club has reported the apparatus to be simple and effective, and not liable either to disarrangement or to any danger, and that it is applicable to any kind of petrol engine as used in motor vehicles.



What's in a Name?

Performances vs Professions

The application of the name 'Liberal' to the political party opposing the present Government is a misnomer.

The name 'Liberal' stands for everything to which the party now claiming it is opposed.

The cognomen therefore should be dropped by the Party till it proves that it is entitled to use it by abandoning its present un-Liberal and unprogressive policy in the political life of the country.

Every measure calculated to advance the interest of Newfoundland the past five years they have persistently opposed.

The building of railway branches they have opposed in the Assembly and outside it.

They have gone to the length of getting up petitions and having them presented to the Assembly by their leader, or the man who was once their leader, Sir Robert Bond, asking the Legislature to oppose the ratification of Railway Contracts, and appealing to His Excellency to dissolve Parliament so that they may have a chance to bamboozle the country into their way of thinking.

Now, the building of railways and the extension of transportation facilities throughout the country was the dominant feature in the policy of the Liberal Party during the past four decades of our political history.

But the men who today lay claim to the name of Liberal have proven themselves unworthy of it in so far as they have abandoned the policy and proved false to the traditions of the Liberal Party in everything that constitute 'Liberal' as a political party distinction.

These tactics of the Bonaldites are diametrically opposed to every principle that has always been regarded by the electorate as essentially 'Liberal'.

They have opposed the extension of the telegraph system to the Northern and Western sections of the country, and the connecting of outlying islands around the coast by cables.

They have opposed every effort of the Morris Government to improve the condition of the country's agricultural pursuits, and by the aid of their emissaries in the outports and their partisan organs in the city they have somewhat handicapped the Government in their operations in this respect.

They have opposed expenditures on the wireless telegraph extension to the northern portions of the Labrador.

They have opposed subsidizing additional steamers for Bay and Labrador service.

They have opposed the increase of laboring men's pay from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per day, which increase was made by Sir Edward Morris as soon as he had an opportunity to do so, and later he stipulated for a still further increase in the laboring men's pay, making it part of the Railway Contract that the men who worked at railway building should receive not less than \$1.50 per day.

They opposed the inauguration of the daily cross country train service which gives us a daily mail from the continent of America, and gives our business people a chance to transact their affairs in less time than formerly, and those who travel an opportunity to get over the road in less than half the time it formerly occupied.

They opposed the establishing of the "Fish Reducing Plan" which the Premier introduced and

which is now in operation on the Southwest Coast, with the prospect of proving a great boon to the fishermen of the country, and of seeing several such established on other parts of the coast before long.

They opposed the passage of the bills introduced for the sole object of inducing American fish manufacturing firms to establish themselves in our country. When they could not prevent these acts from becoming law they set themselves, through misrepresentation, to discourage those interested in the venture, and with the aid of their party press succeeded only too well in their unparliamentary and un-Liberal policy to the great loss to the fishing interests and the fishermen of Newfoundland.

They opposed the Government's Old Age Pension Act, the increased grants for schools and school buildings, the pension for the teachers, the holding of Agricultural Exhibitions, the opening of public and agricultural roads in neglected districts and every other thing that was undertaken by the Government for the advancement of the people's interest the past five years.

What has been their attitude towards that invaluable service rendered by the operations of the dredge around the Coast? Why, they have gone to scandalous extremes in their condemnation of it. The fact that it was a great boon to many important settlements North and West had no weight with them. They have used it as a political foot ball and done all possible to mislead the people regarding it and its usefulness.

Then as regards the reduction of taxation. They opposed the Government for three years while they believed the Government could not remove the duties, and they appealed to the galleries to behold how Morris had failed to carry out one of his most important promises. That was when they believed that Morris could not carry out his promise.

But as soon as Morris did remove the duties on food stuffs, and gave the people a free breakfast table, the hybrid Liberals raised the hue and cry that the country would be bankrupt because the duties were removed, and went so far as to try and create an unfavorable impression in the foreign money markets against Newfoundland's credit so that our bonds would be depreciated and the financial standing of the country injured. Morris had done more than they thought he could do, he had done what they declared they could not do themselves, he had done that which they had repeatedly declared he could not do without bankrupting the country, and their fury knew no bounds.

Now in the face of this record, and it is only part of it, what right have they to call themselves by the name of Liberal?

The policy which Morris is carrying out is the Liberal Policy as the people of the country understand it, and if it is not we will welcome from any contributor a definition of what is the Liberal Policy.

And we go farther and we invite any man who takes issue with our contention to show what the policy of the Opposition is and wherein they have any right to the cognomen 'Liberal Party.'

What is the policy of the Opposition? Where does the Opposition stand on all these important questions so intimately connected with the development of the country and the well-being of every man who earns his bread by the sweat of his brow?

What have they proposed to do should they get power that is an improvement on the policy and programme of the People's Party?

Hymns appropriate to the occasion were sung by choir and congregation, and a sermon from the text found in Rev. 14: 13: "I heard a voice from heaven saying, Write, blessed are the dead which die in the Lord," etc., was delivered by Rev. Wm. Grimes.

The preacher first referred to St. Paul's statement where he says "All things work together for good." It is easy for one to quote these words to another who is passing through trouble, but difficult for one in trouble to realize that the words are true. And yet many had, undesirable experiences that we pass through are really blessings in disguise. The saddest is all down here—in the hearts of the ones who are left behind. When the Bible says "Blessed are the dead," why should we speak of them as "poor So and So."

Our loved ones are resting from troubles, toil, cares and temptations. No sigh heaved, no sickness, no sorrow, no good-bye. No storm upon the sea; no bitterness in the cup; no shadow upon the landscape. No matter how the sun shines here, the clouds do gather. There they hunger no more; no pain; no death. The storms of life have been weathered; the lessons of life have all been learned.

In their place crowns, harps thrones, loved ones. St. John's words are true: "Blessed are the dead." Their works do follow them. That is, they take their work with them into heaven. If we are going to take our work into heaven, will they make us happy or will they make us miserable? We make or mar our own happiness in the future state, to a large extent, by the life we live here.

Referring to the deceased, Mrs. Baggs, Mr. Grimes stated that owing to the circumstances surrounding her death she had not the privilege of being brought to the church. He was only acquainted with the deceased a few months, and visited her during her illness. On all occasions she expressed herself as being ready for the summons of death when it came, but she thought the Lord was going to spare her for the sake of her little ones, but it was not so ordered.

Grenfell Hall Service

On Sunday last the usual afternoon service was held in the Grenfell Hall, St. John's, the Rev. W. H. Thomas conducting. Dr. Grenfell spoke upon the subject of "Practical Religion." A large gathering was present and great interest was shown in the masterly way in which the Doctor dealt with his subject. He clearly proved that true religion meant sacrifice of self interest for the common good. Miss E. M. Jones sang a solo, "Jesus Only," in a tasteful manner.

Weights and Measures

The following sections of the Act Respecting Weights and Measures are published for general information:—

"Any person who shall use a beam scale, weight, or measure, in the sale or exchange of any commodity, not assayed and stamped, or who shall alter the same after being so assayed and stamped, or who shall use a beam scale, or any weight, or measure, in the sale or exchange of any commodity, not assayed and stamped, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars."

"Salt may be sold by measure, or by weight; if sold by measure, there shall be eighteen gallons to a tub (liquid measurement) and three tubs to a hogshead. Any person who shall sell or dispose of salt by measure, otherwise than according to the standard hereby established shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars."

"The Chief Inspector, and Inspectors shall, when required, inspect and adjust all beams, weights and measures brought to the office of either of them, according to the said standard, and they shall stamp or mark thereon the initials of the reigning Sovereign, and their own proper initials."

PUBLIC NOTICE

The attention of the public is hereby called to Sec. 4. of the 'Crucely to Animals Act,' which reads as follows:—

Sec. 4.—Every cart or vehicle with shafts, used for draft purposes shall be provided with a sufficient number of shafts thereof, in such manner as to leave the animal tacked to such vehicle free from the weight of the load thereon. Any person driving any cart or vehicle not provided with such shafts or support, or neglecting to use the same when necessary, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten dollars.

And also to Section 23 of an Act, entitled 'Nuisance and Municipal Regulations' and which reads as follows:—

Sec. 23. All carts and wagons employed or used upon any of the public roads or streets of this land shall have the owner's name painted in full length on some conspicuous part thereof, in letters of not less size than two inches, and painted in White on a Black ground, under a penalty not exceeding ten dollars.

These two Sections of Acts named above, will be strictly enforced in the future.
