Two timber inspectors at length found them, reduced to very near the last extremity, and through their efforts they were taken care of, barely in time.

Certain rivers in northern Ontario have become clogged up with driftwood during their long histories of unusefulness and the Ontario Department of Colonization Boads has a proposition under consideration for opening them. Mr. G. W. Bennett, Superintundent of that department, leaves to morrow to investigate the possibilities of navigation through the Driftwood and Mount Joy Rivers, connecting Lake Abittibl with other waterways running south through the settled districts around Porcupine and Cochrane with the purpose of opening a new line of navigation for the pulp wood in the Abittibl district to the new pulp mills under construction at Iroquois Falls, near Porcupia.
