Havre, Feb. 13.—The French Line Steamship Niagara, which lost a propeller at sea while bound from Havre for New York, returned here this evening. 



Diary of Events

HISTORIC DAYS IN CANADA

Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, former president of the Grand Trunk railway, was born in London eighty-three years ago today. He was educated at Eton and Oxford, and at twenty-five became a clerk in the treasury. Later he was private secretary to two secretaries of the treasury, Wilson and Hamilton, and to two chancellors of the exchequer, Disraeli and Lowe. In 1873 he was appointed comptroller-general of the national debt-office, and three years later he was made a British government administrator of the Suez Canal Company. In 1878 he was ytce-president of an international commission to inquire into and propose remedles for the financial disorders in Egypt, and was also finance minister in the cabinet of the Khedive. A new Khedive appointed him, in 1880, president of the Internation Commission of Liquidation. His ability as a financier had by this time become recognized all over the empire and in many foreign lands. He assumed the presidency of the Grand Trunk in 1895, and in that capacity, during the following decade and a half, he worked unceasingly for the development of the system and the prosperity of Canada.

February 19 is the birthday of Wil-liam Francis Ganong, the distinguish-ed botanist, at St. John, N. B., 1884. On this date in 1873 a charter was granted to the Canadian Pacific Rail-

way Company.

On this date in 1758 a fleet under command of Admiral Boseawen, with Wolfe as one of the officers of the land forces, salled from England to attack Louisburg, the Cape Breton stronghold of the French.

FIRST THINGS

LABRADOR.

The first men to attempt permanent settlement under the British flag in Labrador were George and William Cartwright. Their name and fame are perpetuated at Cartwright, one of the chief ports of Labrador, by a square tombstone. George was the greater of the two brothers. He was the man who made modern Labrador possible, and who wrote a history which is still a model as a description of life and conditions in Labrador before Dr. Grenfell came to relieve the dark and dreary lives of the inhabitants and the dishermen. George Cartwright died ninety-five years ago today, as is set forth in the inscription on his tombstone, in which he is described as "Captain in His Majesty's 37th Regiment of Foot, Who, in March, 1779, made a settlement on the coast of Labrador." The epitaph also sets forth details regarding John Cartwright, and adds: "To these distinguished brothers, who in zealously protecting and befriending, paved the way for the introduction of Christianity to the natives in these benighted regions, this memorial is affectionately inscrbed." After many years spent in the pittless climate of bleak Labrador, the broth-After many years spent in the pitiles climate of bleak Labrador, the brothers returned to their native Notting hamshire to die.

HEALTH AND EXERCISE

Putting the "Fizz" in Physical Culture.

A newspaper man who was once under my care flatteringly described me as "The man who puts the 'fizz' in physical culture." It would be highly immodest in me to mention this circumstance, except that the phrase so aptly describes the quality needed in exercise, whether at home or in a "sym," Physical training must have "fizz," life, vivacity and what the French call esprit, to be fully effective. Mechanical motions, repeated over and over again, lack of effectiveness, and soon degenerate into mere drudgery. Heavy work makes a man and develops certain muscles at the expense of a general development. Very light work, while necessary to the weak and undeveloped "new beginner," is good up to a certain point, and after that it is worthless. Some people take up a home course in physical training and experience great benefit at first. But they continue the same exercises week after week, month after month, and are surprised that the gain in health and development ceases. If a school teacher taught a child to say "a, b, c," indefinitely, the pupil would become so familiar with those letters that he would become indifferent, and intellectual stagnation would set in. Of course, no teacher would do that, but, after the first three letters were mastered would continue with the remainder and would then instruct the child in the formation of the letters into words. It is the same with physical education. 


