



Highly elated over successfully cluding two British cruisers that were searching the sea for his ship, Captain Thierfelder piloted the German auxiliary cruiser Kronprinz Wilhelm through the Virginia Capes and dropped anchor at Newport News in almost the exact spot occupied by the Prinz Eitel Friedrich until the laties's interming.

The record of the Kronprinz surpasses even the amazing record made by the Prinz Eitel. The vessel had not touched port since leaving her pier, at Hoboken, N. J., on August 3, 1914. During the two hundred and fifty-five days at sea she sunk fourteen vessels of the Allies, allowed one to proceed to a home pert with more than three hundred persons taken from other ships, and destroyed one Norwegian steamship, the Semantha, for carrying alleged contraband.
