




SENT ADRIFT AFTER VEDSEL WAS TORPEDOED

On the Finland, which arrived in New York last week from Liverpool, were Capt. Henry McKesg and thirty-eight men. composing the crew of the British steamer Industry, of the Guif Transport Line, which was torpedoed by a German submarine on the morn-ing) of April V?. The Industry, ac-cording to Capt. McKegg, was 120 miles west by south of Fastnet when she was picked up by the submarine. The vessel was torpedoed at six o'clock in the morning, and its crew was addrift in three small boats until 9.30 that night, when they were pick-ed up by the Finland.

Capt. McKegs said today that the weather was very hazy at the time, and that he came upon the submarine inex-nexpectedly. The submarine imme-diately fired three shots across the bow of the Industry, and as the ves-sel was unarmed Capt. McKegs said there was nothing for him to do but the surrender.



Then the submarine, which displayed no name nor number, sailed off." Capt. McKegs said that sails were then raised in the small boats, and they headed for the nearest land, about 120 miles away.
