Apt, a prominent North End grocer, that he is the much sought after man who was seen running past those working at an automobile on Lansdowne avenue the night of the murder. HUNS BOMBARD STRICKEN CITY OF LENS AGAIN

Two Civilians Killed and One Wounded-Enemy Beater Back Near Lake Doiran.

Paris, Aug. 12—The communication issued by the war office this evening says:

"Today the cannonade assumed at times rather considerable violence in Belgium, in the sector of Hurtehise (Aisne) and on both banks of the Meuse (Verdun region).

"The Germans have directed a scattered artillery fire all over the city of Rheims. Two civilians were killed and one civilian was wounded. "The day was quiet elsewhere.

"On the night of August 10-11 and during the day of the 11th our aviators on the front in Belgium bombed enemy encampments to the north of the Houthulst Forest and also the stations at Cortemarck and Lichtervelde. A fire was started and violent explosions were observed at Lichtervelde. The aviation ground at Colmar (Upper Aisace) also has received many projectiles.







RETAKES ITS LOST, GROUND

British Headquarters in France and Belgium, Aug. 10—Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig's forces at daybreak this morning attacked and captured virtually all the German forward positions east of the Belgian town of Hooge on the battle front between Frezenburg and the Ypres-Menin road.

The assaulting forces gained virtually all their objectives to the depth of several hundred yards in the first

Large Railway Car Industries, but Very Few Made-in-Canada Automobiles -- Carriage Factories Increasing Output --- Canadian Plants Making Cars for Transportation of Men and Munitions and and Stores in Russia, France and Belgium

The manufacturing industries of Canada are divided in the census statistics into fifteen classes. One of these classes is under the heading "Vehicles for Land Transportation." This class includes railway cars as well as automobiles, carriages, agricultural wagons, etc. This is a very important industry in Canada, with an output in one year valued at nearly \$75,000,000.

The postal census taken in 1916 showed that there were 464 companies in Canada making vehicles, their total capital being \$125,965,499 and their output worth over \$73,800,000. These industries employed nearly 37,000 hands and paid out over \$21,000,000 in salaries and wages.

Since 1910 the capital in such industries has increased about three hundred per cent and the value of the output has increased by about \$5,000,000. Included in the output of these industries are automobiles, bicycles, carriages and wagons, cars and car works, and carriage and wagon materials.

The automobile industry in Canada has shown considerable increase; but while many of the United States manufacturers have opened branch factories in Canada, most of these branches are assembling plants. The number of firms actually making automobiles in Canada is comparatively few, but a large number of firms are assembling automobiles in Canada. One or two Canadian manufacturing plants have ceased making automobiles chiefly because the larger production of the United States manufacturers made it impossible for Canadian makers to compete with them in prices. Also since the outbreak of the war the Canadian manufacturers have found it more profitable to make other steel products.

One or two automobile manufacturers in Ontario and in the Maritime Provinces

have ceased making cars, but the big assembling plants now located in the Dominion have resulted in greatly increasing the automobile in use in every part of Canada.

The making of carriages and wagons has been a very prosperous industry in ada. There are large factories making these in Ontario and Quebec and in the Maritime Provinces. The output of carriages and wagons from these Canadian factories is around \$15,000,000 annually, and the pay roll is around \$5,000,000 annually. In addition to some dozen large factories there are large numbers of smaller factories scattered throughout the provinces, numbering altogether about 300 industries. Despite the increases in the use of automobiles, there has been a continued demand for carriages and wagons, the demand being chiefly from rural

Canada's car works represent one of the most important manufacturing industries of America. Nearly \$50,000,000 capital is represented in the various car works of the Dominion and the output is valued at from \$25,000,000 upwards annual y. A large percentage of the cars used for passenger and freight transportation over the Canadian railways are made in Canada as were also a majority of the street cars on the various urban and rural electric railroads. The car companies of Canada have been increasing their foreign trade more rapidly than almost any other one department of the manufacturing industries and large orders have been given in Canada for cars from such countries as Russia, France and Great Britain. The car foundries of Canada already have peace orders for cars on their books totalling millions of dollars. These foundries have also contributed to the success of the Allies in the present war. by supplying at unusual speed hundreds of cars for use in transporting men and munitions through different parts of France and Belgium.

The bicycle industry suffered a relapse for a time, but there has been a considerable revival in the past year or two. Canada imports a large number of bicycles every year so that the actual output of Canadian-made bicycles is not very large. Most of the imported bicycles comes from the United States and England.

The importations of carriages and bicycles, etc., into Canada in 1916 were valued at \$10,000,000, - evidence that Canada still buys almost as many imported vehicles as are made in Canada. This condition continues to prevail in spite of a high tariff on these products. The automobile imports have increased by leaps and bounds and the establishment of the various assembling plants has also increased the imports of automobile parts and accessories.

The total imports of vehicles into Canada in 1915 were valued at \$8,500,000 as compared with \$20,000,000 in each of the two previous years. The chief falling off, due largely to the war, was in automobiles and automobile parts. Import of automobiles fell off almost \$3,000,000 and of automobile parts over \$1,000,000. Imports of cars for the railways fell off from nearly \$7,000,000 to less than \$600,000. The following table indicates how the war affected the trade in vehicles.

1913 and 1914 were the largest years in the history of Canada in the total value of imports of this kind, exceeding \$20,000,000 in each year. In 1911 such imports were valued at less than \$8,000,000

The exports of automobiles from Canada are valued at around \$2,500,000 annually, while the exports of carriages, carts, bicycles, etc., are worth less than \$500,000 annually. There have, however, been large exports in the past two years

in cars, these being chiefly to Russia and France.

The war trade in vehicles for land transportation is larger than Canada's whole exports in vehicls were before the war. The war trade in vehicles in 1915 was valued at \$16,955,000, being for that year one of the three largest of sixteen departments of manufactures in war trade





3,637 CANADIAN JULY CASUALTIES

Recruits Total 4,267, But Only Percentage Are for Infan-

Ottawa, Aug. 6.—During June and July, while the conscription bill was going through the Commons there were 10,698 enlistments in Canada and 7,894 casualities of all kinds at the front. Of the easualities something over sixty per cent., according to the average of the past year or so, returned to duty again after being fixed up in hospitals.

In June recruits totalled 6,347 and casualities 4,351. In July, the recruits totalled 4,267 and casualities 3,637. Is must be noted, however, that of the new recruits only a comparatively small proportion are entering the infantry ranks, while the casualities are heaviest in that rank of the service.


