

The Colorado Potato Beetle. HOW TO DEAL WITH IT.

(Col. Standard, Picton.)

The following formula is given for its use: "Mix into paste and them add water in the proportion of three gallons to each ounce or 48 gallons to each pound. Rev. Robt. Duncan entered into a HISTORY OF THE CHURCH from the time the first church was built in 1790. That church, he said, was torn down to make room for a more commo dious structure, in 1806, which remaine until 1869, and was then removed to Water street, where it was utilized as a furniture factory, and was afterwards destroyed by fire on the 14th of May 1877, during what is known as "the great conflagration." As soon as the old build

ing was removed, the congregation en tered upon the erection of A HANDSOME BRICK EDIFICE, which was finished in 1870 or 1871, cost ing \$20,000. This church remained unti the winter of 1876, when a fire broke out in a store near by belonging to the late George Maxwell, from which the church caught, and was destroyed, nothing being saved, a portion of the walls only remaining. Among the furnishings of the church then destroyed was a very fine pipe organ imported from Boston at a cost of \$2,000, under the direction of Prof. Adams, an Englishman. There was no insurance. This was a great blow to the congregation; the church being almost clear of debt, but with a zeal and an enterprise which speak volumes for the liberality as well as the determination of the people, work on a new church was commenced almost before the smoke of the ruins had disappeared. 


