DENNIS DOYLE IS NOW CHIEF WARDEN

Was Sworn in At Fredericton Yesterday Afternoon Appointment Opposed.

FREDERICTON, April 5.—Dennis Doyle, of Newcastle, is in the city and will this afternoon be sworn in as Chief Warden of the County of Gloucester and Northumberland counties, to which office he has been appointed. It is understood that there was considerable opposition to the appointment by a certain number of Hazen supporters in Northumberland county headed by Commodore Stewart of the Chatham World, but as usual, Hon. Mr. Morley, who holds a trump card in the Hazen cabinet and who is supporting Doyle for the position won out. He went to Newcastle Saturday and returned today with Mr. Doyle.

INDIAN MOTHER FED STARVING CHILDREN

Cut Strips of Her Own Flesh to Keep Children Alive.

A GRUESOME STORY.

DETROIT, Mich., April 5.—A horrible story almost incredible in its barbarity and gruesomeness is told by H. G. George, an employee of the Hudson Bay Company in Algoma district, who arrived at Traverse City, Mich., yesterday to visit relatives. George, who has been with the Hudson Bay Company for four years, and is in charge of an important post near Lake Nipigon, says he was told that a family of Indians living in an out of the way spot was in imminent danger of starvation. He immediately started out on snowshoes with a dog team carrying supplies for the beleaguered ones. When he reached the Indian village in the wilderness a horrible sight greeted him. The mother, knowing that assistance was on the way, had doled out provisions carefully, but the delay was too long and the children were crying for food. Taking a keen hunting knife from his sheath the doctor cut several strips of flesh from her own body and upon this she fed the little ones. George immediately helped the suffering mother and her family conveyed to the nearest post where the woman is now making a brave fight for life. The children are well and strong.

BRAKEMAN DECLARES HE SAVED CHILD

But That Detective Williams Was Awarded Medal for the Act.

BURGLARY CASES.

MONCTON, April 5.—There has been quite a sensation among here since the presentation of police inspector G. E. Williams with the medal for bravery on his rescuing a small child from death in front of a locomotive at the C. P. R. station here. Mr. Geo. Mills, a brakeman on the I. C. R. and well known here, where he lives made a statement to a St. John Times reporter, Thursday that he had not Williams saved the child's life. He gave a full account of the affair and gave the names of two or three persons who saw the rescue. It also seems that there are others among whom is one Mr. Hard a young man who said at the time that it was Mills who rescued the child, and when it appeared in the newspaper he said it was not Williams but Mills who did the act. On the other hand those who know Williams say he would not accept a medal or even a word of praise when he was not entitled to it. The doctor by whose order the medal was presented will surely hold an investigation, and all witnesses. The affair has set everybody wondering as Mr. Mills is also an unassuming person and would not claim the doing of an act he did not perform. It will be remembered that some months ago a number of burglaries were committed here, and no trace of the burglar could be found. One Jas. V. O'Brien has been arrested in Fredericton, and has been committed for trial. It seems that O'Brien was trying to dispose of some silverware which has since been identified as the property of Theo. R. Wilkes of this place. O'Brien is also charged with stealing jewelry at Port Elgin and the property secured from Detective St. John by Chief Ridout and identified by Miss Chouveau of Port Elgin as her property. Chief Ridout certainly deserves credit for the energy exhibited in this case.

WOULD SUPPORT GOVERNMENT.

FREDERICTON, April 5.—The house went into committee and proceeded with the consideration of the Liquor License Bill, Mr. Barrhill in the Chair. Mr. Currie said that for many years there had been a great agitation amongst all classes in the community for the abolition of the saloon, and he felt that there was a very large majority in favor of its abolition. A few years ago a commission had been appointed by the late government to inquire into the matter, and although the report they made did not please everybody, it contained very strong evidence in favor of the abolition of the saloon. He would like to see the temperance people expected the late government to take a stand in the matter, and he would like to see the government in this regard. The bill then under consideration although a step in the right direction, was but a short step. There were nine counties in the Province where the Scott Act is in force where the bill would not touch, four counties where the bill would probably not carry, and in the remaining two counties only in some parishes. THAT FAMOUS ASSAULT CASE

Witness Declares Hanson Said He Would Slap Crockett's Face—So He Did.

CASE ADJOURNED.

FREDERICTON, April 4.—The case of O. S. Crockett against A. E. Hanson for assault, was taken up yesterday afternoon before Col. Marsh, and drew a large crowd. The hearing at times was a lively one and more than once magistrate found it difficult to keep order. Mr. Crockett was represented by R. B. Hanson while the defendant had as his counsel R. W. McMillan.

The plaintiff was the first to give evidence. He told of being assaulted on Queen street and described in detail of how Hanson met him on Queen street and struck him in the face. Col. Logie, deputy surveyor general, gave testimony to the effect that a week previous to the assault Hanson had said to him that when he met Crockett he was going to slap his face. This concluded the afternoon testimony and the court adjourned until Monday morning. The case will probably be concluded tomorrow.

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Yesterday afternoon Mr. Currie took advantage of the introduction of the amendments to the license act, to answer Mr. Maxwell's statements, which he characterized as incorrect and misleading. In effect Mr. Maxwell said that in 1907 he introduced a resolution favoring prohibition, which Mr. Currie was to have seconded and failed to do so because he preferred party to prohibition. Mr. Currie flatly contradicted this statement and said that he not only told Mr. Maxwell that he would support the resolution, but it was well understood by government supporters at the time that he would second the resolution. The reason he did not do so was that the resolution was ruled out of order. Mr. Maxwell had nothing to say when Mr. Currie had finished. He was dumb as an oyster. But what was worse than all he challenged Mr. Maxwell, as a member of the government to introduce the same resolution. If he would do so, Mr. Currie said he would not only vote for it, but would take his seat on the government side of the House, if it carried. But this liberty given on the part of Mr. Currie did not induce Mr. Maxwell to break his silence.
Now that Mr. Currie has stated his position on the temperance question so clearly and emphatically, and exposed the unreliability of Mr. Maxwell's statements, it is due that the government organs should apologize to Mr. Currie for the unfair strictures they have published concerning him. Such a course, however, is not to be looked for. The stock in trade, not only of members of the government, but of every newspaper supporting them, is misrepresentation. This has been the policy of the government, its supporters and newspapers, and the only policy they seem to have. Mr. Maxwell has always posed as the friend of temperance and a reformer. When in opposition he was most anxious for prohibition. Now, when he has the opportunity to move the same resolution as he moved two years ago, he is silent. He pretends the leaves and fishes, the crumbs that fall from the tables of his colleagues with portions to the principles he has expounded from a hundred platforms. It is no wonder that he was silent under the charges of Mr. Currie. What could he say?—Frederick Herald.

MR. COMEAU CALLS ATTENTION TO VARIOUS DALHOUSIE MATTERS

Alderman Sells Groceries to the Poor Committee and His Check Renders the Bill-Is Contrary to Law.

To the Editor of the Graphic,
Dear Sir—
The columns of your valuable paper have been used previously to publish statements conducive to the public welfare and I would feel greatly obliged if you will carry on the good work by publishing this letter in the Graphic.
I wish to call the attention to our taxpayers to items of expenditure in the Town Poor Department, as they appear in the official book recently published. The following items I refer to are for H. McLean, groceries \$28.25 and \$42.56, and I would like to know who this H. McLean is, as there is only one person of that name in Dalhousie—Mr. Harold McLean, a clerk in the store of Mr. Daniel McDonald, one of our respected aldermen and a church officer. If this is the H. McLean referred to, then I find it my duty to enquire into the circumstances which led to his being the purveyor in this case.
Clause 19 of the Town's Incorporation Act 59 V. C. 44 s. 1 makes it illegal for any officer of a town or his employee to sell or contract with his own town for supplies or work and here we have the employee of one of our aldermen acting in the town expenditure lists. This looks like a conspiracy to enable aldermen of our town to reap illegal benefits from their official positions, and seems to me to be the straw which shows how our municipal wind blows.
If I have managed to place my finger on one irregularity how many might there be which are subtly enough hidden to escape detection?
If my surmise as above is correct I cannot find it in me to uphold Mr. McDonald in his subterfuge, but find it my duty unhesitatingly to denounce the Mayor and Council as a body for incompetency or neglect, as being either accessories or careless observers of such irregularities, and while I will not raise the phrase "municipal corruption" for the present at least, it will require a full and completely satisfactory explanation to change my ideas on the subject.
The writer is making a fight for purity and tranquility in our town affairs, and trusts that the taxpayers will stand by a policy that looks towards an end giving perfect satisfaction and which carries a death-blow to such excess.
