**55TH BATT. WANTS  
250 MORE MEN**  
Will Not Move From Sussex to  
Valcartier Until After  
July 15th.

During the past few days numerous  
conflicting reports have been current  
regarding the date of departure of the  
55th New Brunswick and P. E. I.  
Battalion from Sussex, and relatives  
and friends of local members of the  
corps have been busy endeavoring to  
ascertain the correct date, being de-  
sirous of bidding farewell to the vol-  
unteers as the trains conveying the  
55th passes through the nearest town  
enroute to the mobilization camp at  
Valcartier.

The latest reliable information re-  
ceived is to the effect that the Batta-  
lion will remain at Sussex until after  
July 15th, and as the 55th is still  
about 250 men short of the required  
number, a special effort will be made  
during the next few days to secure  
enough recruits to bring the force up  
to full strength.

During the past week Lieut. O. J.  
Larzen has been very successful in his  
recruiting signing on fourteen re-  
cruits, which brings his total up to 73.  
This is a splendid record for this dis-  
trict and if all the towns had gone in-  
to the business of recruiting satisfac-  
torily as was done here, there would  
be no need of extra efforts being made  
to stimulate recruiting.

Last Friday morning three men en-  
listed from Dalhousie, were sent to  
Sussex and on Friday or Saturday an-  
other batch will go under the charge  
of Lieut. O. J. Larzen. At present  
eleven men are ready and Lieut. Lar-  
zen hopes to have four more ready  
for going at the end of the week.

**FIVE FIRES IN TOWN  
WITHIN THREE DAYS**  
Fire Brigade Having Busy Time  
This Week.—Two of the Fires  
Double Headers

The local fire brigade have had a  
busy time this week handling five  
fires between Monday night and this  
morning.

On Monday evening about 11 o'clock  
an alarm was rung in from Box 31  
for a slight fire at P. O. Lebons on  
Rosebury Street. On their way to the  
outbreak, the firemen noticed a fire in  
the shack owned by Mr. J. Sharpe on  
Water Street, occupied by J. P.  
Shalala as a dry goods store. A line  
was promptly run out and a detach-  
ment left while the others proceeded  
to Lebons. The fire here was very  
slight having caught near the centre  
of the carriage shop and was exting-  
uished without much difficulty. The  
blaze at Shalala's had started some-  
where underneath the counter and was  
easily got under.

Two hours later when the firemen  
were leaving the station, a second  
alarm was rung in for Shalala's, and  
on the arrival of the brigade they  
found the building blazing from the  
upper storey. This time the damage  
done was considerable, part of the  
roof being burned off and the inside  
and stock damaged by smoke and  
water.

On Wednesday afternoon the brigade  
were called out to a fire at the  
house occupied by Mrs. Dobson on  
Hillside St. Here the fire had started  
in the attic and burned through the  
ceiling, but was easily got under. At  
three a.m. this morning however, the  
brigade were called out again to the  
same house, where the fire had started  
down stairs and burned up the stair-  
way. This time the house was badly  
gutted and practically a total loss.

Mr. Sharpe carried no insurance on  
his building, but the stock of Shalala  
was insured. In Mrs. Dobson's case,  
both building and contents were parti-  
ally covered by insurance.

The insurance adjusters are now  
working on the losses of Shalala and  
Dobson.

#### PROVINCIAL METHODS OF RE- CRUITING

From local exchanges we ascertain  
that the young manhood of this pro-  
vince is to be stirred up and aroused in  
a great effort to bring the 55th Batta-  
lion up to full strength. The methods  
adopted in this case are fast becoming  
as far as possible as those in the case  
of the 26th. We venture to state that if  
the numbers from the various recruit-  
ing stations were added up, the total  
would be considerably in excess of  
what was needed. Where then does  
the trouble lie? It seems that at var-  
ious times considerable drafts have  
been taken from this Battalion for  
other purposes and the possibility of  
ever having it fully enlisted seems  
just as hopeless as trying to fill a  
sieve with water. Would it not be in  
the best interests of the Battalion to  
have it completed as a unit and put  
into training as soon as possible? It  
is not fair to the men who have al-  
ready joined; much less is it fair to  
the recruiting officers who in most  
cases are anxious to get into training  
along with their men and proceed to  
the front as soon as possible. If the  
military authorities intend to have  
permanent recruiting officers at these  
stations, they ought to make them  
plain and it ought also to be made

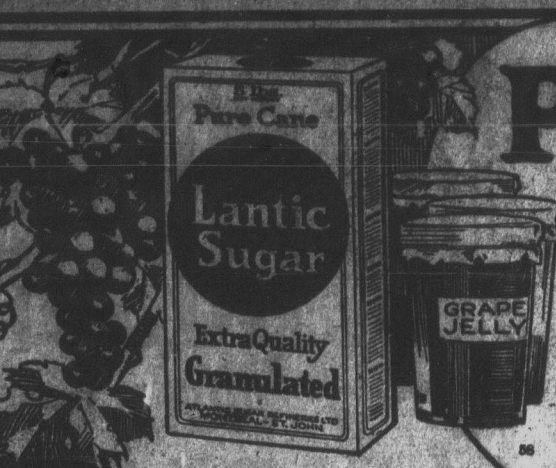

HOW TO BE GOOD CANADIANS

Story of One Canadian Boy.

Perhaps a short story of one of our Canadian leaders who helped very much in the founding of the Dominion of Canada would be as good a way as any of answering the question, how to be good Canadians.

About a hundred years ago, there lived in the province of New Brunswick a boy whose name was Samuel Leonard Tilley. He lived with his parents in the country until he was thirteen years old, going to school part of the time as soon as he was old enough to walk the long distance he had to go to school, and learning many things that helped him to be a good Canadian, both at home and at school, and also at the church, which he regularly attended every Sunday.

At thirteen he went to the city of St. John and began to earn his own living, first as an errand boy, then as a clerk in a drug store.

But before leaving home he had made two important promises which he kept throughout his whole life. One was to read his Bible every day, and the other was never to taste intoxicating drinks. He also made up his mind that he would try to be a good public speaker, so he joined a Temperance Society and took part in discussions and in public speaking whenever he had opportunity.

After a time, he was so well known and trusted by the people, and such a good speaker, that he was elected as a member of Parliament, and later, he was one of those who were chosen to draw up the agreement for the provinces which united to form the Dominion of Canada, July 1, 1867.

It is said that he first suggested the name "Dominion" to the committee which was meeting to decide on a name. That evening his daily Bible reading was Psalm Seventy-two, and at the eighth verse he read: "He shall have dominion also from sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth." This verse so fittingly described the Canada that was to be, that the committee agreed to call it the "Dominion" of Canada.

It is also said that on one important occasion when he was in London, England, on public business, he was invited to dine with Queen Victoria and, as was the custom then, every guest was offered wine at dinner. This he declined much to the dismay of all the other guests, who thought that out of loyalty to Queen Victoria he should do as the others did at her table.

But when the Queen herself heard of it later, instead of being offended, she congratulated him on being true to the pledge which he had made when he was a boy, for that was the best kind of loyalty to one's country and Queen.

For his many distinguished services to his country he was knighted, and so became Sir Samuel Leonard Tilley. Later in life he was further honored by being appointed Lieutenant-Governor of his native province of New Brunswick.

Not only in that Province, but all over Canada and the British Empire he is remembered and honoured as one who was a good loyal Canadian and a fine Christian gentleman.

He himself often told groups of boys and girls, when he was always glad to address, that very much of his success was because he made and kept faithfully all his life those two promises of his early boyhood days.

**A WORD ABOUT "SWEARING"**  
A traveller in an unfrequented spot received great kindness from a roadside acquaintance. The kind man was most profane in his conversation. But profanity was ignored for a time, as the traveller was loath to take exception to anything said by the wayside Samaritan. At last he gathered courage and said, "I hope you won't mind my saying it, for I'd hate to give offense to a man who has been so good to strangers as you have, but I wish you'd cut out that cursing; it hurts my ears."

For a moment the stranger was silent. Then he said, humbly: "Maybe you been kinder to me saying that, than I been to you. That's the first time I ever been called down for cursing. I'm going to try to cut it out." It is always possible to deliver to others the message God gives us for them. But there is a courteous way and an ungracious way to deliver it. There is small wonder if an ungracious delivery is resented, but the courteous delivery may be gladly accepted.
