AN UNENVIABLE CAREER. Hooney, the Bynamiter, and his Doings in the Past-Did He Blow up Andre's Statute and Fire the Gnyandotte?

Who is Thomas J. Mooney?
This is a question which, cannot be answered by many. All the average reader knows about him is that age reader knows about him is that he attempted to blow up the British steamer Queen, and that he is a friend and co-laborer of Jeremiah O'Donovan, commonly called Rossa, and generally teferred to by that nickname of terror. Mooney's antecedents, as far as he is connected with Irish organizations, were learned lately. Five years ago, it will be remembered, a man was arrested in Flushing for experimenting with dynamite on a boulder, but for the reason that he failed to

Then Kearney, with others, left for England. Kearney got a place as switchman on a railroad running into Glasgow, and his object was to destroy the city. He only destroyed a gas meter. Previous to this Mooney had arrived in Glasgow and fastened himself on Kearney and his companions. They doubted him, and took him to the railroad where Kearney worked, with the intention of first killing him and then placing his body on the rails. Mooney proved his sincerity and saved his life by describing the self-
