plied to Liquor. Mr. Fanning Shows the Fallacy of the Idea That Abolition of the Liquor Traffic Will Throw Men Out of

Imployment. Mr. M. J. Fanning, of Michigan, de-

Mr. M. J. Fanning, of Michigan, devilvered his third speech in the pleblecite campaign at the City Hall last evening. During his first effort he refuted the idea that prohibition was an interference with personal liberty. In his second address he showed that the lawsunder which the liquor interests are guarded are class legislation of the most unjust chiaracter. Last night he plainly demonstrated the prosperity which would result from total prohibition.

In beginning his remarks Mr. Fanning said that he wished those present to take a trip with him to Bayonne, in New Jersey. This place was founded on a sand heap. The man who originally owned the location could do nothing with it, and decided to lay it out in town lots. No person wasted these. The founder then thought of incorporating a prohibition clause in every incorporating a probibition clause in every title deed. This advertised the place far and wide. People settled to large num-bers. The city now numbered 20,000, and

and wide. People settled to large numbers. The city now numbered 20,000, and there poverty was not known. No liquor was sold. The police force only cost 875 annually. This condition of affairs could be traced to the absence of King Alcohol.

Taking Horace Greeley's advice, continued Mr. Fanning, they would "go west," to a place in Colorado which had a population of 3,000. This was a prohibition on municipality; It had no use for a police torest and for aeveral years only 87 had been espent in relieving the poor out of a fund established for that purpose.

Mr. Fanning then showed that in a prohibition seaport village in Bootland the people got higher wages as sailors than their neighbors, mainly because of their reputation for sobriety.

-Dr. William Erb, the famous psychologist, of the University of Heidelberg, has just delivered, on the occasion of the anniversary of that institution, a lecture dealing with the question why growing nervousness is one of the features of our century. Prof. Erb said:

"As the nervous system represents the basis of the whole vital energy, it is natural that all the events of life must affect it, and the great revolutions in political and economical, in social and religious life, and in scientific and artistic aims, could not fail to have a strong influence on the mind and brain of man. The most intense and common forms of nervousness are hysteries which is also increasing among the male sex—hypothrondria, and, above all, neurathenia. No organic or anatomic change in the nervous system has been proved by these diseases. They only represent abnormal conditions of the mind and brain. Neurasthenia is a disease peculiar to the educated classes, originating in over-exertion of the brain. Overburdening of the mind begins in the grammar school and is increased by the method of teaching employed by philologically rather than on forms of nervousness are hysteries-

pedagogically educated masters. Added to this, the time necessary for reating the mind and for the development of the beddiy health is much too short. Youth enjoys too early the pleasures of society life, which more and more tend to over-excite the nervous system. Poetry has deteriorated to gross materialism, music has become too loud, even painting does not hesitate to show us the ugliest sides of human life. The pursuit of science is now exhausting by its being split up into so many branches. The trader and merchant is exposed to all sorts of excitements and shocks. Added to the excitement of one's profession are the hurry of iffe, the restlessness which finds expression in traveling, and, above all things, the greater part of the population is engaged in political, social and religious struggles.
