

Hugh McKay Died at His Home At Ingersoll After Brief Illness.

MORE MONEY FOR TEACHERS

Education Agree on Increases for Males and Females.

ORANGEMEN FOREGATHER.

The Orangemen of Ontario West are gathering in the city for their annual meeting, under the presidency of an employee of the Whitney Government. Here and there a few Liberals may be humbugged into joining the order by the pretence that it is not a political organization, but it remains, as it has always been, the most militant wing of the Conservative party.

The Grand Lodge of Ontario West will discuss bilingual schools, the Ne Temere decree, and other politico-religious questions, but with the Conservative party in power at Ottawa and Toronto the debates will be robbed of their wonted fervor. Without a Liberal Government at hand to harry, the average Orangeman's occupation is gone. The home rule issue, in the circumstances, will be a special providence to the Grand Lodge. The brethren can dress up the Asquith Government in clerical robes and punch it to their hearts' content. The Black Knights have already finished the first round.

Some of our Roman Catholic fellow citizens take the Orange order too seriously. It is not so much anti-Catholic as anti-Liberal. In this country it dislikes Sir Wilfrid Laurier a greal deal more than it dislikes the In the last election it stood shoulder to shoulder with Bourassa and Lavergne, who represent the ultramontane element in the Province of Quebec. The Orange Sentinel and Le Devoir were the heavenly twins of the anti-Laurier press. White the Sentinel shrieked against him as a tool of French clerical aggrandisement, Le Devoir painted him in Orange colors. In this co-operative enterprise the Orangemen and Nationalists have been engaged for many years.

One thing must be said of the Orangeman: You know where to find im. He is not weak-kneed in his party allegiance. He is "agin the Govern ment" providing it is a Liberal one, and he has no prejudice against the company of his Catholic fellow-citizen, French or English, from Quebec or elsewhere, who are marching in the same direction.

UNION LEADERS MUST STAND TRIAL

Efforts To Have Dynamiting Indictments Quashed Unavailing.

ALL PLEAD NOT GUILTY

the Alleged Compatriots In the Explosion Cases Arraigned at Indianapolis.

Indianapolis, March 12.-One hour before the time for entering pleas to the dynamiting indictments, the federal courtroom was packed with persons who wanted to hear the proceedings, and when the 46 defendants and their attorneys entered it was with difficulty that room could be made for

As soon as the sitting of the court was announced, Judge Anderson asked if the indicted men were ready to Their attorneys at once offered motions to dismiss the indictments, basing them on the alleged fact that there were many duplicates of the charges, that there were so many statements of the same fact and so many different ways of stating it that no man could plead intelligently. One after the other the court overruled the motions till all has been dis-

With the close of the arguments for of Carpenters and Joiners,

the defendants, District Attorney Miller went over the ground, but the court had indicated its mind in nearly every instance and there was little need of further argument. The defence asked leave to prepare and file exceptions to the ruling of the court and this was

The defendants were then ordered to stand up and plead to the indictments, and each pleaded not guilty.

Most prominent among the indicted men here today were Frank M. Ryan, of Chicago, president of the Ironworkers' Association; John T. Butler, of Buffalo, first vice-president, and Herbert S. Hockin, of Detroit, second vicepresident and acting secretary-treas-

In the confessions of McManigal, Hockin appears as travelling superintendent of the "dynamiting squad" and custodian of the depositories of explosives in Western Pennsylvania, at Tiffin, Ohio, and in this city. Hockin, cording to McManigal, was the man that engaged him to do the actual work of dynamiting, and laid out his itinerary before he became acquainted with the McNamara brothers.

With the indicted ironworkers' officials from various parts of the country were four men connected with other labor unions, alleged to have implicated in the conspiracy. They were William K. Benson, former president of the Detroit Federation Labor; Clarence E. Dowd, of Rochester, N. Y., formerly a national organizer of the International Association of Machinists; Hiram Cline, of Muncie, Ind., a national organizer for the International Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, and Spurgeon P. Meadows, business agent of the In-dianapolis district of the Brotherhood

Municipal Liberty Threatened. the Editor of The Advertiser:

I desire to say a few words concerning a proposed act of our Legislature which I deem more subversive of constitutional rights as well as of natural human rights than any other legislation ever proposed in Canada. No such stroke has been aimed at the liberties of the people for

The first amendment of the power act is intended to enable the commission to monopolize all water powers in the Provwhether developed or not (e. g., Hunt's dam, in London), and to enable the commission to rent the same out to municipalities and others at whatever price the commission might see fit to charge. It has been discovered by certain wise men that the municipalities do not know enough to buy, own or operate rower plants to their own advantage. When all water powers are in the hands of one monopoly what competition will there be? Who will tell whether the amount charged is cheap or dear? And once a grasping monopoly like the power nission has the power by law to take the results of one's enterprise, by its mere ipsi dixit, who is going to put his means into improving water powers, merely to put his money at the mercy of such people as do, and are likely to constitute this commission? One would suppose all the brains and most of the world's integrity was bound up in this precious commission!

Then, since our municipal councils are ch "dunderheads" that they cannot expropriate any light or power plants in town where the commission supplie ower, and as they have no judgment as when it is expedient to expropriate le great commission takes power in its cond amendment to do this work for he unfortunate councillors and to hand expropriated plants over to the council, charging the council for doing

One is at a loss to know what muniipal councils are thinking about in alowing mere arrogance to push then aside, to assume to exercise their functions and to shear them of their powers as if they were a set of fools or knaves. 




