To the Editor of The Advertiser: As this is the day when so much is! either by board of control or commission, I do not think it would be out of place for me to say that in my opinion the ward system of representation is the only one that will give satisfaction There are districts in the city that have been without representation ever since the change to the popular vote, and quite likely to be, as long as the present method is continued.

All cities of importance adopt the ward system. Toronto, Hamilton and Ottawa make no change, County councillors are elected from districts. Another feature which is decidedly in favor o felection by wards is that people generally like to record their votes for candidates living in their wards. When an elector goes in to record his vote, he looks over a list on a ballot paper, from 25 to 30 names, and they may be all good men, but as he is not fully acquainted with them, he is not in a position to record to the best interests of the city. There is not a single reason to be advanced for a salaried board of control for London. The city is not large enough, and if they were appointed, what would there be for them to do, with all the other boards now existing. A board of control is ward representation. CHARLES G. MOORHEAD.

Not until all the women and children had leftand there were 56 on poard-did any of the troops move from their place, and then only when the order was given for each man to do the best he could for himself.

"I was still standing on the paddlebox," says Tuck, "at the time the ship's foremast went over the side with a crash into the waters. When the ship went down, and the sea came in aboard, I jumped overboard.

"For a time I swam about, and then, seeing the foremast just out of water, I held on to it for a time and Then I saw a plank, swam to it, fetched another plank alongside it. and made a raft. By this time a sailor and made a raft. By this time a sailor had joined me, and together we made the shore two miles away using Do You Need pieces of timbering as paddles and swimming a good deal as well.

"We had a lot of trouble to reach land because of great weeds which clung round our raft. We had to keep cutting them away. It took us fifteen hours to reach land, working against currents. Once ashore we made for

the woods.

"Meeting some gypsy people, they gave us firing, by which we dried ourselves. On the following day a wagon picked us up, and took us, with other survivors, to an inland farm, where they looked after us splendidly." Tuck left the service on a pension n 1867.





WHAT IS SOLID ROCK

Ottawa, March 18 .- The point at isue between H. D. Lumsden, C.E., and ais subordinate engineers was further llustrated yesterday morning when the former chief engineer admitted once more that the question at issue is one of engineering differences of opinion rather than of bad faith on the part of the engineers.

This was proved when R. C. Smith, K.C., counsel for the Transcontinental commission, read an opinion by Donald MacMaster, K.C., to the effect that rock found in ledges in masses more than one cubic yard should be classed as solid rock when it had to be removed by blasting. Asked his opinion on that opinion, Mr. Lumsden said that if a contractor

lost much in blasting it would not make the substance solid rock. Mr. Smith next read an opinion from Wallace Nesbitt. K.C., to the effect that stones and boulders found in masses formed conglomerate and was- more difficult to deal with than solid rock Mr. Lumsden agreed that in such case it should be classed as solid rock. Mr. Nesbitt further expressed the view that solid rock in a commercial sense was material in mass which required blasting to remove, but Mr. Lumsden declined to accept that


