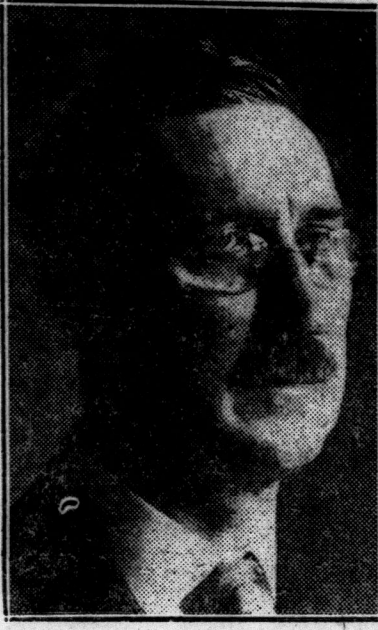

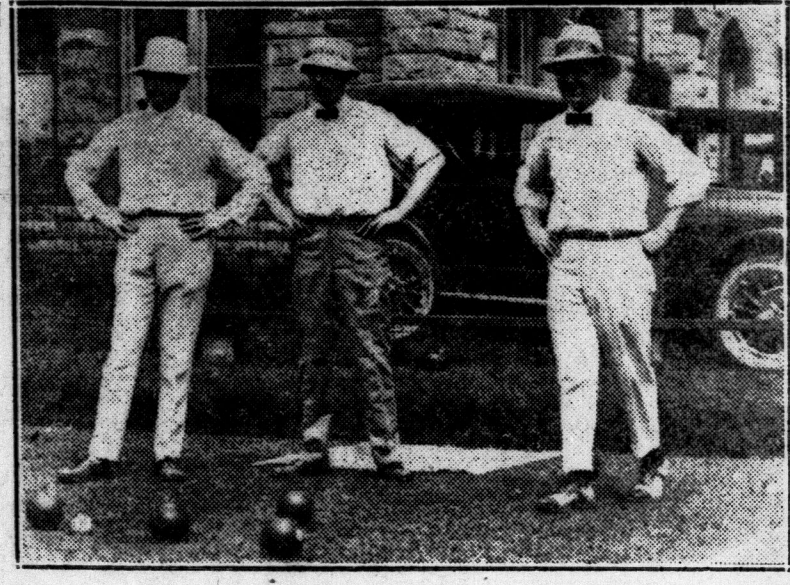

FLAMES LIVE NORTH ONTARIO SETTLERS FROM HOMES

North Ontario Settlers Crowd Trains to Escape Fires, Deserting Homes

Slackening of Wind Gives Rangers Chance To Check Flames and Save Town of Moneta.

North Bay, June 20.—Every train from the north is filled with begrimed settlers, men, women and children, and individuals and families, who have forsaken their farms and the various small settlements in the path of the forest fires in the Porcupine district, around Timmins and Porcupine Junction. It is stated that scores more are waiting at Timmins in the special train that was chartered to bring them out, but which has orders not to start unless the emergency justifies the clearing of the country.

About midnight last night a slackening of the gale that was blowing fire and destruction over the territory and the fire-fighters were able to work with more effect on the terrific blaze. Temiskaming Railway officials today say that the immediate danger in the Timmins and South Porcupine districts is past.

Worst in History.
According to those who fled, the situation at Timmins and South Porcupine on Thursday night and Friday was the worst since the fire that country since the disastrous Porcupine fire of 1911. Scenes reminiscent of that time were being witnessed on October last occurred in Timmins up to almost midnight on Thursday, when it was discovered that the ground fire had been smoldering slowly for a month and a half had suddenly burst into fierce activity and was threatening the towns of Moneta and North Bay.

Sparks on Streets.
Smoke, dust and cinders poured in from the north as the wind died.

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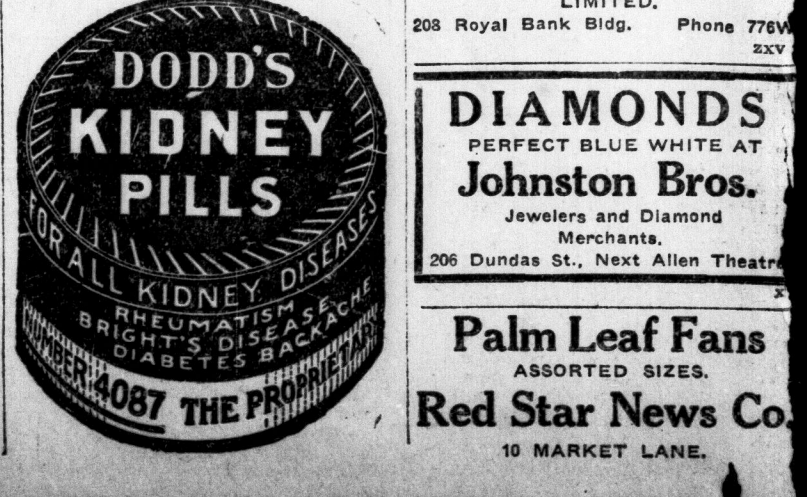

What a Change—1919 to 1923.

The Toronto Globe claims "there is efforton in the Ferguson party's claim to the sole credit for the progress of hydro-electric and in its attempt to capitalize for party purposes the achievements of Sir Adam Beck."

Take the steps as the people of London have watched them during the last three weeks. Sir Adam Beck, in the first place, was not anxious to run in London, and if there were one thing that would have brought him into the contest it was the desire to remove the stigma of defeat he suffered at the hands of Dr. H. A. Stevenson in 1919.

The Conservative politicians in London were quick to see that by getting Sir Adam Beck they would be able to lay claim to hydro as a Conservative platform headline.

"Sir Adam's Hydro Policies are Big Factor in Connection With Election."

In fact, speakers at the Conservative nomination meeting could not disguise their plans for using Sir Adam Beck's prestige in their campaign, for the president of the Western Ontario Conservative Association said at that meeting:

"We are going into action with Ferguson, Nickle and Beck as our heavy guns."

Today hydro is in politics, taken there by Sir Adam Beck, used by the Conservatives all over the province. They saw in it their one chance of an appeal to the electorate.

Again, why is it that there is the right-about face by Sir Adam from the election of 1919? And why is there the right-about face of the Globe from its position of 1919?

The Globe at that time said: "Hydro must be kept free from party politics if it is to prosper and expand as it should."

Those were plain words, and they were good words, but not one bit more so than the statement of Sir Adam himself when he spoke in Masonic Temple, London, on October 16, 1919.

"Only as an independent can I look after the interests of hydro for the people of the province in the most efficient way."

Today the whole thing has been turned upside down. Sir Adam is a straight Conservative candidate; the Conservative press announces that "Sir Adam's Hydro Policies are Big Factor in Connection With Election."

And while all this is going on the Globe is prepared to stand to one side and tell London Liberals, despite its 1919 cry of "Hands off hydro," to get out of the road and leave Sir Adam and the Conservatives alone in riding through the election on a hydro issue.

Miss Armstrong a Good Campaigner. Few candidates have ever from a last-minute start made such a showing as Miss Isabel Armstrong, the Liberal standard-bearer in London.

Mr. Wellington Hay, Liberal leader, has sent his unstinted sanction, and Miss Armstrong has the united approval of many of the women's organizations in London, who are working for her because they believe that in her campaign for "better homes" she has struck a note that has been too long silent in provincial matters.

Better homes and better home conditions for the people is a platform bigger than any political issue. It takes in all the people, and therein lies the strength of Miss Armstrong's appeal.

Smooth Words for Smooth Candidates. The Mail and Empire likes to speak well of the Conservative party. It has nothing but good to say of it.

"Those who belong to it (the Conservative party) have good reason to be proud of it." Say, isn't that the way to talk to the boys in hot weather, with elections only a day or so away?

Then, again, "The Conservative candidates in this campaign are well content with their party auspices." That's good, too, and will make any who have to work for the next two years to pay their election expenses feel better about it.

Not content with those flowery phrases, the Mail and Empire reaches over for the trowel and lays it out thick: "There are none more honorable or more inspiring in party politics." At this Col. Currie, the letter snatcher in Toronto, is supposed to rise and make a bow.

What the 1919 Voting Showed. In order that there may be some certainty in regard to statements about temperance legislation and voting in Ontario, it is well to review the questions and votes in the referendum of 1919.

No Good Objection Advanced. The strength of the contention of Mayor Wenige that work on the new city hall should be started rests as much in the weakness of the opposition to it as in anything else.

At the meeting of council on Monday evening opponents of the idea did not bring up any good reason why work should not be started. There can be little doubt that the people by their votes have shown that the Federal Square is the place they want the city hall erected. The Advertiser at one time doubted the wisdom of this move, but the people voted against any alternative course, and the wish of the majority must be respected.

There is no demand and no reason for talking of an injunction against the commencement of the work. The people want none of this or any other kind of obstructionist work. They want the council to go ahead as one man and give the city the best building that can be secured by the expenditure of the money now in sight and any reasonable addition to it that may be required.

Let the city council sit down as reasonable men, willing to do what the people have said they want done. If they desire to take out injunctions then let them proceed against those who want to keep the project in a state of suspended animation.

Children and Apartment Houses.

A wealthy Mobile business man has erected a row of fine apartment houses. He shows a peculiarly fine view when he attaches the following conditions:

"That premises are only to be rented to newly married couples and to couples having children."

He also insists that if there are no children to newly-weds at the end of a year or so they must vacate the premises.

A big company in Paris did a similar thing with a fine apartment. They allowed only those in who had children, and set to work to reduce the death rate. They insisted on absolute cleanliness and ventilation, and assistance was given to mothers in the care of young children. The result was that the death rate in that building was 40 per cent lower than in the rest of the district.

These cases are in pleasing contrast to the most of the 1923 apartment houses, where they turn a big key against the greatest asset of the nation—its children.

Note and Comment.

Douglas Fairbanks, junr., gets a contract for \$1,000 per week "with chances of advancement" to go into the movies. Seeing that the youngster is all of 13 years old, he will need these "chances of advancement."

Liberals of London should remember that elections are won by the ballots that are placed in the box. Clapping of hands and good wishes must be supplemented by some good hard work between now and election day.

In London last year 3,000 women changed their minds after a license had been granted and refused to get married. We hasten to remark that this took place in London, Eng., as no London, Ont., girl would think of doing such a thing.

There will be some new zones fixed in London for express delivery and collection. It is high time this was done, as there is street after street in this city that might just as well be out in the country as far as express service is concerned.

The Hamilton correspondent of the Globe brings forth a cheerful bit of news, sandwiched in with the week-end accidents. It is to the effect that a man struck by a car will "have to have a new pair of trousers." If a driver gets out of an accident at \$2.98 he's doing very well.

A young man from Hamilton, working in Detroit, is coming back home because they don't know how to cook porridge there. We could well imagine residents of Lobo or West Williams townships being fussy on this point, but a Hamilton youth complaining of fussyness oatmeal is a new one.

Ottawa claims to have been as hot as London on Tuesday. Well, we're going to see about that. People here are thoroughly convinced that they were hotter than any place in the country. With the weather man doing his worst, and four candidates doing their best, why shouldn't we feel the heat?

Mr. Haney, the youthful Conservative candidate in West Lambton, got quite excited in his nomination speech because some person had attacked the character of Mr. Ferguson. Is Mr. Haney blinking at the fact that Mr. Ferguson has referred to the provincial police as being drawn from "the gutters of immorality," and that 90 per cent of these police are returned soldiers?

Dr. Forbes Godfrey of West York has come out with a new one. Mr. Ferguson some time ago came about as close to being famous as he ever had a chance to do by saying he was out to get the hides of his opponents and tan them on a fence. Dr. Godfrey has taken a different angle, and at Weston declared "he would get every tooth in Raney's head." Such is statesmanship.

What the Lime in Milk Does to Build Strong Bones. By ROYAL S. COPELAND, M.D., United States Senator from New York. Former Commissioner of Health, New York City. Lime makes up two per cent of the weight of the body. If you are a hundred and fifty pounds, you should have three pounds of lime in your system. Most of the lime is found in your bones, and without it your bones are weak and rickety. The bones make up the framework of the body, and unless they are strong and well developed, the body is small and lacking in strength. One reason why some children do not grow is because they lack lime.

Looking Abroad

In the many journeys the Prince of Wales has made to various parts of England and to distant regions of the empire, it is doubtful if he has seen a more beautiful sight than that of the golden sunlight streaming through the wonderful stained glass windows of the venerable York Minster windows, the value of which has been estimated at the amazing sum of \$350,000,000. They are the finest in all England and some respect the most gorgeous in the whole world. The prince recently has made a short visit to the Yorkshire country and devoted the greater part of a day to going through the ancient cathedral which is the proudest possession of a city which has figured so prominently in English history.

Some idea of the immense size of the windows may be gained by the fact that months are necessary to clean and relaid the stained glass windows, some being as large as a lawn tennis court. The survival of this priceless stained glass of York Minster is due to the fact that, because, several times in its long existence, the historic facade has been badly damaged by fire. The citizens of York have been invariably proud of their marvelous stained glass and when, during the civil wars, the city surrendered to parliament the Saxon cathedral, with its windows of the cathedral should not be damaged.

The cathedral of St. Peter, commonly known as the minster, has no superior in general dignity of form among English cathedrals. It is in the form of a Latin cross, consisting of nave with aisles, transept, choir with aisles, a central tower, and two west towers. The cathedral occupies the site of a wooden church in which King Edwin was baptized by Paulinus on Easter Day, 627. After his baptism Edwin, according to Bede the historian, began to construct "a large and more noble basilica of stone," but it was partly destroyed during the troubles which followed his death, and was repaired by Archbishop Willfrid. The building suffered from fire in 741, and was rebuilt by Archbishop Albert who made of it a magnificent basilica. At the time of the Norman invasion the Saxon cathedral, with the library of Archbishop Egbert, was swept away in the fire by which the

SEEKS TO COLLECT RAOUL DELORME LIFE INSURANCE

Trustee For the Accused Abbe Starts Action in Montreal Courts.

AMOUNTS TO \$28,000 Companies Have Refused To Pay Money, Although Requested To Do So.

Special to The Advertiser.
Montreal, June 20.—Legal action to collect insurance policies on the life of Raoul Delorme was instituted yesterday in the practice division of the superior court by Adelard Tetraault, trustee for Abbe Delorme, in whose name the policies are left, according to deceased's will.
The first procedure is against the Sauvegarde Assurance Company, which holds a policy of \$25,000, while the other is against the London Guarantee and Accident Company to collect \$3,000 in an accident risk. Tetraault, as trustee of the abbe, named in pursuance of judgment of the superior court, there interdicted Delorme for insanity, cannot proceed in his name without obtaining judicial authorization. Hence the two present actions, both were adjourned by Mr. Justice Brunus until tomorrow morning, when the defendants will reply.
Tetraault alleges in both motions that he is trustee of the accused, whose trial begins tomorrow for murder. The abbe is legate of both insurance policies under the will of Raoul, who was killed on the night of Jan. 6, 1922. The first policy with the London Guarantee was taken out July 9, 1919, for \$3,000, to cover accident, sickness and death, the second with the Sauvegarde for \$5,000 was taken out Jan. 1, 1922, and the premium had been paid, amounting to \$736.25. Both policies and will have been in the hands of the high court, Tetraault says, hence the delay in acting.
Moreover, the law prescribed procedure to collect insurance until after one year of the death. In asking to be allowed to institute action to collect Tetraault said that the companies have refused to pay the amounts, although requested to do so. As justification of the demand for payment of the accident claim, he alleges that Raoul died as the result of six revolver shots in the neck and face.

He was connected with the Masonic Order there and in politics was a Liberal. His wife predeceased him about three years ago. He is survived by the following family: Mrs. S. A. Litchman, Detroit; Mrs. Florence Agar, Harriston; Mrs. C. A. Rogers, Toronto; Mrs. B. M. Metcalfe, Toronto; G. E. Bingham, London, and Frank at Harriston. The funeral will be held at Harriston.

OIL BOUNTY REMOVAL WILL SPELL RUINATION

Is Opinion of Petrolia Oil Men Regarding Hon. W. S. Fielding's Threatened Action.

Petrolia, June 20.—"The oil bounty must go," insists Hon. W. S. Fielding, although producers of oil have been made by the oil producers of Lambton and Lambton's member of parliament, R. V. Lesieur, of Sarnia. What will the removal of the bounty do to all the other oil-producing counties? Will the oilmen continue to produce oil without this help?
In conversation with one of the leading producers of the district The Advertiser was told that the lifting of the oil bounty spells ruination to the oil business of this county. Why? Because that is all that is keeping the oil business going today. The wells in this district are not oil rushers, but pump very slowly, and it would be useless to keep them running if it wasn't for the inducement of the bounty. This bounty taken off will mean that the oil business comes to a standstill in Petrolia and district. This will cause a great deal of unemployment throughout the whole county.
Over 2,000 men are employed in this business or earn their living from the oil, and yet this inducement which keeps the oil business progressing is to be removed.
This county produces an enormous amount of oil, and helps supply the refineries at Sarnia and Petrolia. This will be a serious blow to have had effect on the refining industry also.
In one way the government has no right to pay this, but it helps the small wells in Ontario.
When an oil gusher is struck up in Alberta, which pumps about 1,000 barrels, an enormous sum of money is paid out by the government to this one well.
There should be some definite average for a well that the government should help to support.

Majestic After Fast Trip Arrives At U. S. Bone Dry

Liner Has Only 36 Gallons of Brandy For Medical Use On Board When It Reaches New York—Complies With New American Law.

Associated Press Despatch. New York, June 20.—The liner Majestic arrived yesterday after a record run from Cherbourg, bone dry except for 36 gallons of brandy, required by British law for emergency medical use.

Although she had started with her usual smoke room supply of liquor and, in addition, private stocks which some passengers had ordered in England, the entire supply was gone at 11:30 last night before the three-mile limit was reached, and there was none to be thrown overboard.

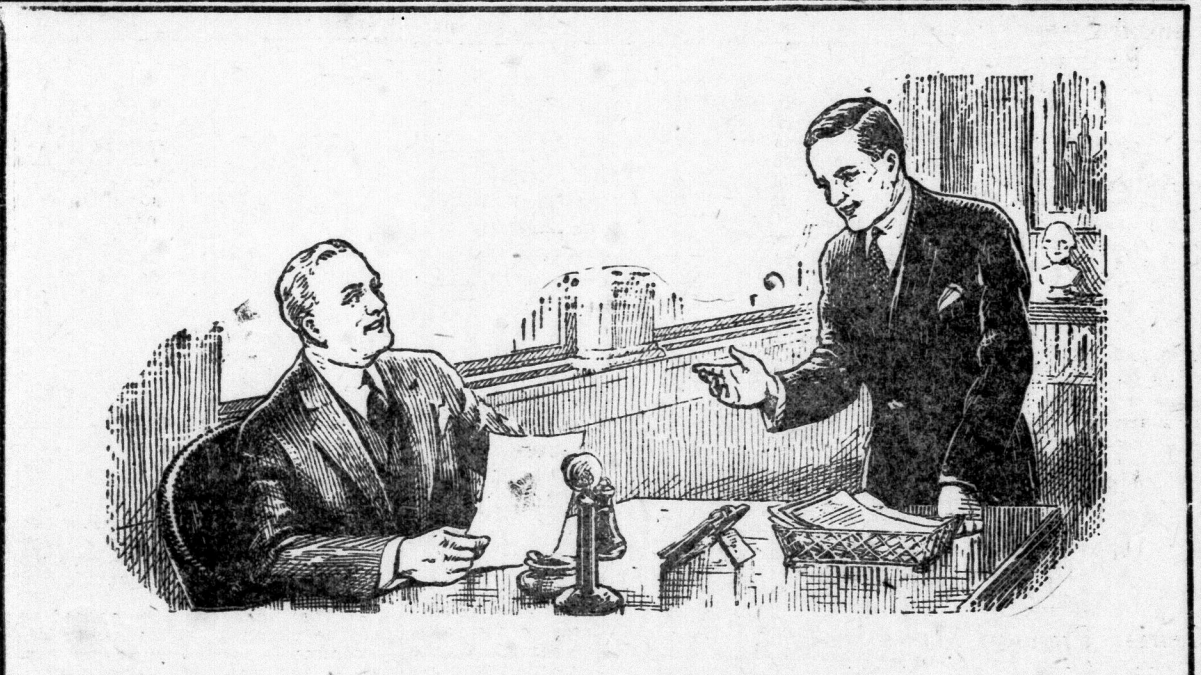

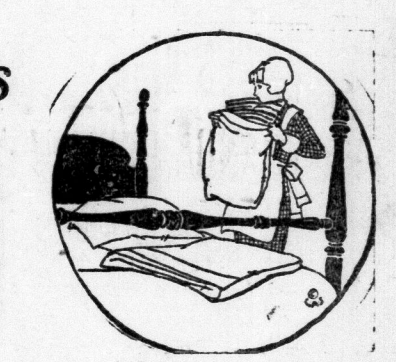

LAVA FROM ETNA CONTINUES TO PERIL TOWNS

MIGHTY STREAM OF LAVA CONTINUES TO BEAR DOWN ON LITTLE ITALIAN TOWN

Some Believe That the Fury of Etna Has Passed Its Greatest Intensity—Crater Enlarged During Night by Renewal of Terrible Convulsions at Lip—Entire Landscape Buried in Powdery Blanket of Ash.

ENGINEERS FIGHT TO SAVE LINGUAGLOSSA

Associated Press Despatch. Catania, June 20.—Some of the latest reports from the countryside stricken by Mount Etna's eruption give rise to the hope that the fury of the mountain may have passed its period of greatest intensity. However, the situation is generally regarded here as being practically unchanged by the mighty stream of lava bearing slowly but inevitably upon Linguaglossa.

During the night the mouth of the crater was enlarged by a renewal of the terrible convulsions, and its lip slipping into the seething interior was hurled to the skies, tumbling down the sides of the mountain with a tremendous clatter. The lava has now submerged the station at Cerro and blocks the road between Castiglione and Linguaglossa.

The quantity of ash emitted by the crater is now more abundant than ever. It resembles gray face powder, covering everything, penetrating everywhere, and burying the entire landscape under a powdery blanket. Indeed, the whole region has taken on a note of mourning and sadness, which together with the oppressive heat gives the country the aspect of a dead land.

Towns Evacuated. One by one the little towns that cling to the mountain's outermost flanks have been evacuated, their inhabitants fleeing with such of their household possessions as they can carry. However, the roads to the towns more remote from Etna are still open, and the thousands of refugees are already being cared for by Red Cross units.

Up through the heavy smoke and ash clouds an aeroplane occasionally works its way, reporting back to the threatened villages the passage of the eruption.

POLICE KEEPING SHARP WATCH FOR NEGRO STRANGER

Search For John Whitfield of Cleveland Being Sharply Prosecuted.

UNKNOWN IS TAKEN

His Story Investigated and He Regains His Freedom.

Local police are keeping up the search for John Whitfield, negro murderer, who is wanted for the slaying of a Cleveland policeman and who was reported to be in hiding on the outskirts of London.

This morning Detective Walsh questioned closely a man picked up in the district who arrived here within the past few days. A full history of the man was taken after which he was handed over to the police to be kept until his story could be verified. The detective stated that he had told a straight sounding story but that he considered better to verify any tales told by strangers. He was allowed to go early this afternoon, his story having been proved correct.

It was first reported that Whitfield was in London by a Petrolia negro who stated to Port Huron police that he had seen him and identified him as the man for whom the Cleveland police were looking. Although supposed to be in hiding in a shack here, local police visited the colored district but were unable to find any trace of such a man as was described. Failing this they adopted the method of picking up all who could not give an account of their actions for some time past, at least since the murder, which occurred several weeks ago.

"We have nothing at all on this man," declared Detective Bolton, "but it is better to be on the safe side. He told us a straight story and I think it can be verified alright but we won't let him go until we find it is true. If he has nothing to fear he won't mind being kept here for a couple of hours, whereas if any that we might examine proved to be the man who we are looking for, he will discover it after we believed his story and let him go we would probably never get him again."

ASSERTS BULGARIANS WILL OBSERVE TREATY

Zankoff States Reparations To Be Paid and Army Limited.

Associated Press Despatch. Sofia, June 20.—Premier Zankoff emphatically stated to the correspondents last evening that Bulgaria would observe the treaty of Neuilly, both as regards payment of reparations and the limitation of her army.

Mentioning reports that Serbia was planning intervention, the premier said the accusations in the news against Bulgaria were utterly unfounded, and that there had been no mobilization or move to increase the strength of the country's armed forces.

PLEADS FOR DEVOTION TO THE FATHERLAND

German President Makes Stirring Appeal to School Teachers and Pupils.

Weimar, June 20.—Unfettered devotion to the fatherland was the keynote of an address by Franz Ebert, the German president, to 1,000 school teachers and pupils assembled here from all parts of the country, including the Rhineland and the Ruhr, for the national festival play.

"You are the hope and the future of the fatherland for whose sake we are bearing the burdens of the present in patient perseverance," President Ebert told the children in his address. "Hoch Deutschland" and in the singing of "Deutschland Uber Alles."

DELORME PREFERS TRIAL FOR MURDER TO INSANE ASYLUM

Unusual Pomp and Ceremony Marks Opening of Proceedings at Montreal.

PRISONER IS CALM

Accused Is Amused by Counsel Insisting He Is Mentally Unsound.

Montreal, June 20.—Attempts made at the opening of the trial this morning of the late Father Delorme, charged with the murder of his half brother Raoul on the night of January 4-7, 1922, have the question of the state of Delorme's mind as the chief issue. The case was ordered by the court to proceed on its merits.

EAST LAMBTON LIBERAL URGES STRICT ECONOMY

W. G. Connolly Gives Rousing Speech Before Packed Audience at Wyoming.

GIVES PLATFORM

Special to The Advertiser. Wyoming, Ont., June 20.—W. G. Connolly the Liberal candidate for East Lambton, speaking here last night before a crowded house explained his stand and outlined his platform as follows:

Strict economy in every angle of public expenditures that was consistent with safety and progress. He stated he was in favor of extending the rural hydro lines and said that this was the best sense the trustees economy provided proper care was used in arranging, carrying out and distributing the work. Several hecklers who attempted to assail his character were dealt with in summary fashion, and Mr. Connolly proved conclusively these stories were false and unavailing.

Scores Extraneous. He criticized the absurd extravagance of the late government, stating that the debt that overweighs the province today was only partly due to the amount that was carried over. He scored the way in which redistribution had been handled, and remarked that this one of the admitted vital features of Ontario's political life had been neglected to such an extent by the government.

Class government Mr. Connolly was strongly opposed to. "No matter he said what the party may be no one party in power has the right to represent any one class. You representatives," he said, "who my return to Toronto are there for the purpose of seeing that you get a fair answer to all your problems, that is to the community of service with the best interests of the whole community."

Loudly Applauded. "Neither Labor nor the U. F. O. could properly represent the men and women in the province, and he asked them for their support in returning him as the member for East Lambton, a request that was received with continued applause and cheers.

Dr. Rogers of Ingersoll gave an unusually forceful address on the value to the community of service as the watchword of every member who sat in the House. "You can't expect heads," because of the farmer government, and as proof of this look at their enormous list of expenditures for the time they have been in power."

The doctor gave a number of concrete instances of what he called "the absolutely reckless extravagance" of the late government, and in reply to a heckler on the cattle embargo question showed that less money had been spent on agriculture than by the U. F. O. than by the government which had preceded them in office. There was a large turn out of ladies and both speakers were favored with keen attention.

CLAIM FOREIGNERS TELL WHERE STILLS REMOTE

Canadian Press Despatch. St. Catharines, June 20.—Federal officers operating in the Niagara district are quite aware that jealousy and vengeance have been wreaked on bootleggers and moonshiners in the district by foreigners in the know. Stills have been unearthed in certain houses in this city and district, the discovery of which has startled next-door neighbors.

"Tipped off" is the answer for the majority of these discoveries, and the information generally comes from a foreign source.

RUSSIA AGREES ISSUE ON PROPAGANDA ENDED

Agent Against Whom Britain Protested Removed From Office.

Associated Press Despatch. Moscow, June 20.—Foreign Minister Tchicherin, replying to the British Government's note of June 13, terminating the Russo-British dispute, agrees to consider the propaganda issue closed. He refers to the removal of Lieutenant Raskalnikov from Kabul, Afghanistan, as an internal affair of Russia, which neither gives nor demands one-sided obligations regarding her representation in a third country. Tchicherin asserts, however, that the Soviet's Persian representative will be given such instructions on the condition that a similar notice is served on British agents.

USE OF LEFT ARM. During the past few months I have been experimenting with one arm, but in my case I have used the left arm only. This, I am convinced, is an easier proposition than that with which Scott has to contend.

Further experiments proved that these appalling "pulls" were caused by loss of balance. The weight was thrown back on to the right leg at the moment of impact instead of being transferred to the left leg at that point of the swing. This faulty action prevents the left side of the body from doing its work, and leaves the left arm from the shoulder downwards entirely unassisted.

These experiments have convinced me of many points. First, it has been brought to my notice more forcibly than ever that when the left arm is kept straight throughout the playing of a shot with wooden club, there is very small margin for error, and the ball invariably has a straight flight. Second, there has been much controversy as to whether the left arm or the right arm is the chief factor in a full shot. This new study has made me more certain than ever that the left does the lion's share of the work, but in the playing of a firm iron shot, the left arm is of little use without the assistance of its fellow.

For mashie shots also, it is a severe handicap to be without the use of the right arm, as perfect control is essential and the sharp snap necessary to throw the ball in the air is difficult to acquire with a single hand. Although strength does not come into putting, two hands are undoubtedly better than one. There are, of course, some golfers who prefer to put with one hand only, but they generally adopt very unorthodox methods. For instance, Miss Macfarlane, secretary of the British Ladies' Golf Union, uses the back of her club and takes up a stance facing the hole. She is a remarkably good putter, and quite unaccustomed to such deviations, but the great majority prefer to use both hands.

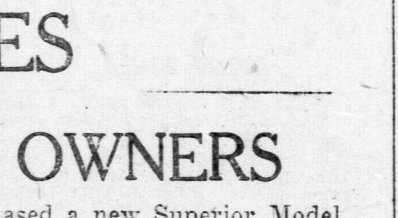

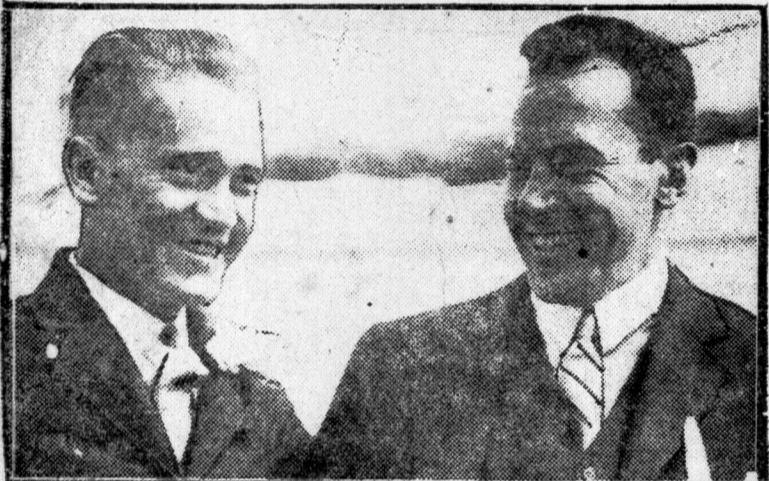

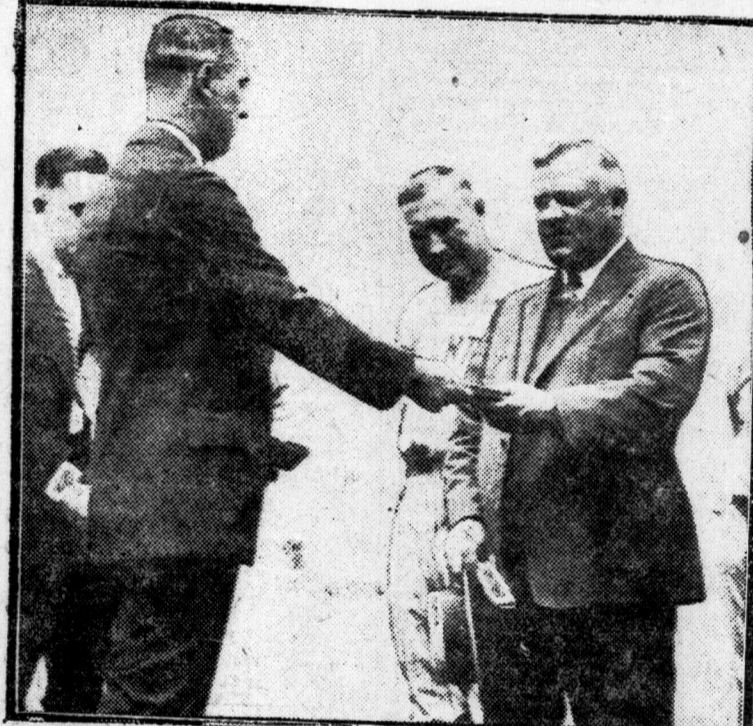
