LAURIER HAS NO

Tarte Has, and Has the Courage to Avow it-Hence They Couldn't Agree.

Hon. Mr. Borden Deals With the Quarrel in the Grit Party in a Speech at Montreal.

Montreal, Oct 26 .- Mr. R. L. Bord n. the Conservative leader, was enertained to a complimentary lunchon on Saturday by the members of the Junior Conservative Club, on the occasion of his return from his tour in the west. The affair was attended by a large number of Conservatives, and was very enjoyable.

Mr. Borden received a very cordial reception and in reply to the toast of his health, made a long speech, in which he told of his trip to the Northwest, which he said, had been a great success. He also advocated a policy of protection for Canadian industries, and said the outlook for the Conservative party was bright. Mr. Borden also took occasion to refer briefly to the Tarte incident. Mr. Borden said he would not like to say much about the incident, as it was in the nature of a family quarrel. He had read the letter addressed to Mr. Tarte by Sir Wilfrid Laurier .He expressed pleasure that the Premier's health had much improved. He had opposed Sir Wilfrid in the house, but had never met with anything but courtesy from that gentleman, and wished him all good things. He drew attention to the fact that in Sir Wilfrid's letter there was no definition of the Liberal policy on searching for greater areas of knowl- the tariff. age to avow his own policy. THE DECREPIT GLOBE.

It is only a few weeks ago that the Toronto Ghobe came out editorially in denunciation of the miscarriage of justice in the Montreal election case. At the time the Ottawa Citizen suggested that the Toronto organ might save its virtuous indignation for the Ross Government's disgraceful acts of corruption near home. When in the South Oxford election trial Judge Street indulged in some of the most scathing comments ever delivered from the bench, the Globe not only did not comment on the casesbut suppressed what the judge said in the report of the trial published in its columns. The Hamilton Spectator thus twits the unfortunate old party hack on its shameless sacrifice of

The Toronto Globe is sixty-three years old. And, although many newspapers equally as old show great vigor, and evidence a keenness of the senses which is quite youthful, the Globe is manifesting strong symptoms of growing deafness. At the South Oxford trial Judge Street felt compelled to denounce in the strongest terms the tactics of the Grit party in bringing a lot of penitentiary birds and general scoundrels to give false evidence against the respondent, that he might be unseated and disqualified. It was the culmination of a long series of the most shameful proceedings ever known in election contests. Judge Street has a good voice, and he spoke sharply; but the Globe couldn't hear what he said. The representatives of all other papers, present at the trial, heard distinctly, and were able to reproduce what Judge Street said, word for word. But the Globe's ears were unequal to the task, and those Grit gentlemen who read the Globe only are without knowledge of one of the most remarkable speeches a judge ever made, brought out by the exposure of the plot of scoundrels to unseat a man by systematic perjury who had been elected by the people to represent them in the legislature. The Globe thus refers to its unfortunate hardness of hearing:

"It is of the essence of our legal system that trials should be public. The decisions and comments of the judges, particularly on matters that affect the welfare of the state, should be given the widest publicity, and, as they become virtually a part of the law, accuracy in recording them is of vital importance. It is to be regretted that many of the ablest judges on the beach deliver their verbal judgments and make their comments during the progress of a case in such a low voice that they cannot be heard ten feet away. Under such circumstances it is a physical impossibility for either counsel, litigants or reporters to acqurately catch words on which a great deal may depend. In such cases as election protests, where party feeling is often more bitter even than in the election contests, newspaper reporters, who are, in a sense, the agents of the public, may reasonably ask to be relieved from the necessity

THE LIBERALS

Hon. Mr. Tarte's Act has Badly Disintegrated the Party.

Laurier's Task to Save it From Shipwreck no Slight one-Tarte a Free Lance.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Detroit Tribune, independent, wires as

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 25. - Sir Wilfrid Laurier may be a sick man, and he looks it, but he is full of work and the busiest man in Ottawa these days. Mr. Tarte's kick over the traces has strewn broadcast "the seeds of party disintegration and the premier is having a hard time bringing discordant elements back into line. Tarte's organs in the province of Quebec charged Fitzpatrick, Bernier, Blair, Mulock and Fisher, to say nothing of Sifton, Cartwright and Sutherland, with personal animosity. Bernier is described as a "plug, full of gall and envy;" Mulock and Fisher as small men, jealous of Tarte, and for the rest their attitude of ceaseless hostility whilst Tarte was in the cabinet is too well

known to require comment. The effect of the revelations of strained relations in the cabinet i felt most of all in the province of Quebec, which did more than all the rest of Canada put together to turn the Conservatives out and put Laurier in power, but Ontario and the west are badly shaken up as well, and Tarte's speeches on tariff reconstruction have introduced divisions in the ranks which the premier will find it more difficult to patch up than anything he has had to tackle since he became liberal leader and prime minister of Canada. Resignations of individual ministers may be remedied by the introduction of new blood; broken cabinet may be reconstructed, but a whole party divided against itself is a differenmt matter.

Ministerial supporters affect to make "light of the difficulties and claim they have been exaggerated for political purposes, but those who are familiar with Canada's political history recognize in the visible symptoms the conditions that have always preceded party shipwreck.

TARTE A POWERFUL LEADER. No matter what the immediate outcome of the ministerial tangle may be, eventually Mr. Tarte must become a free lance in parliament, and freed of ministerial responsibility, a powerful leader of dissatisfied units capable of being easily welded into an irregular political organization holding the balance of parliamentary power. The part he played in smashing the Conservative party and bringing the Liberals into office in Ottawa, his intimate knowledge of all the secret springs of ministerial action, and his fixed resolve to carry his transportation and tariff policy, render him, out-side the cabinet, a standing menace to the party leaders who have frustrated and thwarted his plans.

Mr. Tarte says Sir Wilfrid Laurier is not so ill as he looks, and with care may remain in public life for some years yat. Although the premier has lost flesh and is pale and careavorn in appearance, his energy is apparently undiminished and he has thrown himself into the duties of the hour with a vigor that astonishes everyone. How long he can last under the strain is the problem that worries his intimate friends. What they most fear is that he may suddenly break down, and in that case the question will be, who is there to take up the burden?

WHO WILL LEAD ! -Mr. Fielding, Minister of Finance seems to be regarded as the most promising compromise between conflicting claims for the leadership. Sir Richard Cartwright is out of the question. He is physicially unfit for active work, and has made many bitter enemies who dislike his ways. The Liberal imperialists distrust him too much to tolerate him as their chief, in spite of the speeches in which he has attempted to reconcile his known opinions with existing conditions. He has put himself on record so ineffaceably as a free trade extremist as to make it impossible for the influential classes to which protection for Canadian industries is the breath of life, to but up with him as the head of the Government. Mr. Sifton is a man of force, but pledged to sectional interests, which rule him out everywhere except in Manitoba and the Northwest, and he holds the favor of his constituents even in that part of the country by too uncertain may be a tenure to gain the confidence of the party outside these limits. Blair, Stuar Mulock, Fisher, Paterson, Fitzpatrick, Sutherland and Borden are all handicapped with entanglements of one sort or another, that place them on the shelf. Fielding, then, is the last resort, and if he becomes Prime Minister his term of office is scarcely likely to last long enough to show the stuff he is made of. Taking one thing with another, the ministerial party is among the breakers, with prospects none too bright to justify expectations of their surviving another general election.

ing Their Feeding Beds. The German carp, against whom the hand of every fishermen is raised because of his displacing better fish, is accused of one more and still worse crime by O. B. Sheppard, Dominion inspector of fisheries for Ontario, to wit, that of driving out our

best wateriowl by eating their food.

Mr. Sheppard, after his return from an inspection trip, stated that the problem of getting rid of or keeping under the carp was now facing the fishery authorities on both sides of the line. From all he could learn the carp was in Germany a fine-grained and delicate fish, but its transplanting to America with its new variety of food had caused it to slide down the scale until it was about the least desirable of our food fishes. Its chief fault was its driving away of other fish and gradually exterminating them by eating their

Latterly, however, it had been noticed that the carp were destroying the beds of wild rice, which forms the chief food of wild ducks, geese

and other aquatic birds. Upon the trip from which he was just returning, Mr. Sheppard had noticed that in Cook's Bay, Lake Simcoe, where there were formerly hundreds of acres of wild rice, there was not to be seen a spear of that plant to-day. The same was true of the Holland river, where there were at one time fifteen hundred acres of rice; now the carp have eaten it literally root, branch and seed. These places were once the very best duck grounds in the province, and now the ducks avoid them.

The carp were not introduced originally into Lake Simcoe, but were confined in the mill dam at Newmarket. The dam broke, and the carp got into Lake Simcoe through the Holland river. How to get them out or destroy them passed any man's knowledge, as they were the most tenacious of life under hard conditions, and defied the best laid traps, So far as he knew there was no carp in any of the Muskoka lakes.

As to the chances for black bass in the lakes where carp abound, he thought they were better than those of any other fish. The carp was not a fish-eater like the pike, his mouth not being so placed that he could enjoy this diversion. He was of the sucker variety, and destroyed other fish tribes by eating their eggs. The black bass was well armed to fight Only eight days elapsed between the laying of bass eggs and the hatching out of the young fry and during this critical period and while the fry were too small to get out of the way of the carp, the parent hass remained on guard and rushed bull-like at everything that threatened their progeny.

The bass, Mr. Sheppard said, was the only fish which protected its young in this way, and it was this pugnacity which made them such an easy prey to the angler during the spawning season. At everything that looked unusual or dangerous the bass rushed pell-mell, and consequently was impaled on the first hook which came within reach. On this account the bass were particularly protected by close season during the spawning

The carp need no protection, jocu larly remarked Mr. Sheppard. It had got into international waters and become an international question for fishery experts, and lucky would be who could devise some means of getting rid of the carp family without destroying other varie-



COLLISION WITH A COMET.

What Such a Catastrophe Would Mean For the Earth.

Although it is exceedingly improbable that the earth may be destroyed by collision with a comet or some huge meteor, still the fact that such a contingency is possible is sufficient ground for discussion on the subject and for imagining what the result might be, says the Woman's Home Companion.

The earth is moving around the sun at a velocity of eighteen miles a second, while the sun, with all its attendant planets, is being hurried on toward the great fiery constellation of Hercules at a far greater velocity. The very fact that small meteors exist proves the possibility of the existence in space of meteors of inconceivable magnitude. Even great black dead worlds may lie in our path, like breakers in the path of unusual velocity for heavenly bodies, and some are known to move at a speed even in excess of a hundred miles a second, five hundred times the speed of a rifle ball. Small meteorites, which reach the earth at a velocity of from twenty to thirty miles a second, are instantly consumed by the friction generated with the atmosphere. Large meteors, however, occasionally reach the earth, escaping destruction from their size, but are found to have their surfaces fused from heat generated by the passage through the atmosphere.

Although it is not probable, still it is possible, that the earth may some time encounter such a shower of small meteors, perhaps in the form of a comet, that the heat of combustion from friction with our atmosphere and the poisonous gases thereby generated might destroy all terrestrial life.

Ancient Lightning Rods,

The ancients did not have lightning rods constructed as ours are, but they had lightning conductors, which shows that they knew how to protect themselves from the danger that lies in a thunderstorm. Even so long ago as the tenth century lightning was diverted from fields by planting in them long sticks or poles, on top of which were lance heads. It is said that the Celtic soldiers used to try to make themselves safe from the stroke during a storm by lying on the ground with their naked swords planted point upward beside them.

There was long ago on the shore of the Adriatic sea a stronghold known as Dunie castle, on the highest tower of which there was an iron rod that was used as a means of telling when a storm was approaching in sammer. A rod when the sea had a threatening look, and it was his duty to frequently to the rod, watching for the spark that would tell him it was time to warn the fishermen by ringing a big bell.

Their Teeth Betray Them "There is only one feature of an actor which will 'give him away' when disguised in a perfect makeup," remarked a young actor, "and that feature is the teeth. Let a man do what he will to his face, let him cover it with all kinds of paint, beard, whiskers and what not, but the teeth will disclose his indubitable indentity directly he opens his mouth to speak a line or to emit a laugh.

"I myself, when sitting in the front of a house watching other people's performances, have frequently been puzzling myself as to the identity of a cleverly made up player, but no sooner has the said player disclosed his 'ivories' than I have at once spotted him, provided, of course, he has chanced to be a man whose face I know moderately well. Strangely enough, hardly any one is aware of this curious truth, but it remains an undeniable fact all the same."

Raising the Wind. It seems incredible, but is nevertheless a fact, that as late as the year 1814 an old woman named Bessie Millie of Pomona, in the Orkney islands, sold favorable winds to seamen at the small price of sixpence a vessel. The Rainbow. When a ray of sunlight falls on a raindrop, it is refracted; then part of the light is reflected from the internal surface and again refracted on leaving the drop. The white sunlight is not only refracted when it enters and leaves the drop, but dispersion also takes place. The eye sees bright circles of light for each kind of light, and since sunlight is made up of different kinds of homogeneous light we get a series of circular arcs, showing the spectrum colors, the red being outside and the other colors following in the order of descending wave length. The whole constitutes a primary rainbow. A secondary bow is sometimes seen outside the first. This is formed by the light being twice reflected inside the raindrops. The less refrangible rays are on the inner side. Rainbows due to still more internal reflections are too feeble to be observed. It is possible to get a white rainbow if the sun is clouded or if there is a mixture of raindrops of very different sizes.

Lightning Precaution. An electrical engineer declares that

the center of the room is the safest place from lightning. "There is a constant tendency on the part of the electricity in the sky to reach the ground," he says. "To do this it must have a conductor. Atmospheric electricity always follows the outside of the conductor or agency ness and the form of its fairness. As that leads it to the ground. That's why the middle of the room is safest

during an electrical storm. "I know of a number of instances where a bolt of lightning followed the walls of a room, burning it on all four sides, while the people in it, being away from the walls, were only slightly shocked. That is the only safe precaution known to science."
