A GOOD HOTEL AND WELL KEPT

Commissioner Martin Asks That Politics be Laid Aside in Considering Mr. Pleasence's Case.

Decisions of the New Board at Their Meeting Yesterday—Discussion as to the Hotel Rankin.

The new Board of License Commis sioners for West Kent sat vesterday afternoon until nearly six d'eleck and went earefully over all the licenses that had not been granted for the full year by their predecessors. So far, however, practically no changes have been made in the man-

ner of dealing with them. It was decided to lay the Slocum application from Tupperville over for future consideration and lay the legal phase

consideration and lay the legal phase of it before the Government for instructions; the Park House license was extended for 30 days with the definite understanding that in default of a settlement among the parties the license will then lapse; the D. M. Martin house was declined a further extension and the house closes to day; it he Mount house license was extended 30 days in deference to the desire of the City Council with the understanding that the house then closes; the agreement for the Glassford license was confirmed; the shop license of W. D. Sheldon was extended one month to give proprietor opportunity, if he so desired, to sell his stock and transfer his license, and the license of John Pleasence, of the Hotel Bankin, after an animated discussion, was included by a majority of the Commissioners in the motion dealing with the Sheldon case.

case.
Yesterday the Board inaugurated a new era in throwing their meeting open to the press and public along the open and fearless lines of the East Kent and other Boards, and there was no "excluding of the papers."
The question of the Bacuse of the Hotel Boaltin was the one in which

there was no "excluding of the papers."

The question of the license of the Hotel Rankin was the one in which public interest was most largely centred and the only one in which any difference or argument among the Commissioners resulted. On reaching Mr. Pleasuages application, Commissioner Mamis moved that it be granted for the full year. In so doing he pointed out that Mr. Pleasuage kept one of the largest and best notels in the district and has, so far as he knew and the records showed endeavoired to keap the law. "He may have been a bit of a stormy petral at election times," he added, "but apart from politice there's nothing against him."

Neither Dr. Mitchell or Chairman Smith was disposed to support the resolution.

THE RUSSIAN LOSS TWENTY-TWO SHIPS

Togo Reports Capture of Rojestvensky, Severely Wounded.

But St. Petersburg Reports That Russ Admiral Rasched Viadivostock on Destroyer Buiny, With a Waund in the Head Further Details of the Rout of the Russians By the "Nelson of Japan."

Washington, May 31.—The Japanese legation last night gave out the following callierant from Tokio:

Tifth report from Tokio:

The main farce of our combined fleet, upon accepting surrender of the remaining Russian main force, near thacourt Rocks, on the afterneen, of May 25, as sleenly reported, stopped pursuit; and while engaged in the disposition of surrendered ships found in a southwester, direction the Admiral Ushakoff, a coast diffence skip. Thereupon Iwate and Takume were immediately despatched in pursuit and invited her. to surrender, but she refused and was sunk at 6 p. m. Her crew of over 300 men were resqued.

"Our destroyer Sazanami captured toward the evening of May 27 in the south of Uricung Island the Russian destroyer Biedovy, wherein were found admiral Rojestvensky and another admiral both severely wounded together with eighty Russians, including staff officers from the flagship Kniaz Souvaroff, which was sunk at 5.29 D. m. on May 27. They were all taken prisoners.

"Our cruiser Chitose, while cruising to the northward on the morning of May 25, found and sunk another Russian destroyer. Our cruiser Niyitaks and destroyer Murakume attacked also at noon on May 25 a Russian destroyer, which finally went aground."

"Results of the Fight.

"According to various reports hither-to received and statements of prisoners, the result of the battle from May 27 to May 28 is as follows: Knais Souvaroff, Alexander III., Borodino, Dmiti Donskoi, Admirai Nachmoff, Monomach, Jentechung, Admirai Ushakeff, ene converted cruiser and twe destroymach, Jemtchung, Admiral Ushaken, one converted cruiser and two destroyers sunk Nicholas I. Orel, Admiral Apraxins, Admiral Seniavin and destroyer Bledovy captured. According to the prisoners the Osliabla sunk about 3 p. m. and the Navarin also was sunk. Almaz on May 27 was observed in a disabled and sinking condition, but her final fate is yet unknown. The full particulars regarding the injury to our ships are not yet in hand, but so far as I could ascertain none was seriously injured, all being still engaged in operations. The whole casualties are not yet ascertained. Casualties of first division are little over 400.

THE WEST KENT LICENSE SITUA TION

It was perhaps inevitable that the Government, in view of its vigorous and righteous stand on the matter of the administration of the license department, should have felt called upon-in the light of the recent investigation-to ask the retirement of two of the Commissioners. That no-thing dishonest was proven against either of them was a source of genuine satisfaction to all their friends, but it was generally felt that they had failed to interpret plearly the policy of the new Gov-ernment. The admirable letter of the Honorable the Provincial Secre-tary was not sent forth with a wink. It was to be interpreted literally and fully, and to be acted upon in

its entirety. The new Board is composed of men of long and honorable public experience, who will, it is confidently expected, fulfil in the highest measure the hopes and confidence of the Government. Mr. Martin, who remains with them, is a man of excellent judgment who has earned the confidence and esteem of the com munity.

The brief, inaugural address of Chairman T. A. Smith will strike a responsive chord with the entire community irrespective of political inclinations. A non-partisan policy of hotel-keeping-in the fullest sense which Hon. Mr. Hanna put upon the words—is in complete accord with the principles of the Whitney Government and will do credit to the administration. In so far as the Commissioners live up to the standard of this worthy inaugural will they grow in the confidence and esteem of The community.

It is to be hoped that with this policy in view the Board will grant the license of Mr. Pleasence, of the Hotel Rankin. The Planet is in accord with the view of Commissioner Martin, that this license must be freely granted unless some adequate reasons otherwise are advenced. That the license of a man who unquestionably keeps one of the largest and best hotels in the west, and who for years has never had a complaint lodged against him, should be out off without reason being given savors in the public mind of political persecution and is, of course, in direct antagonism to the Government's policy and the Commission's inaugural. We sincerely regret that the Board yesterday did not look more fully into this matter in their desire, as far as possible, to validate the action of their predecessors. And the same may be said of the shop license.

We have confidence, however, that Mr. Smith and Dr. Mitchell will take the matter into their immediate and careful consideration, and at an early date deal with it upon its merits windicating the splendid policy inaugurated by Hon. Mr. Hanna and so heartily endorsed by Chairman

Tartara Massacre Armenians In the Government of Frivan.

Nakhichevan, Government of Frivan, Transcaucasia, May 20.—This Govern-ment has been almost in a state of Transcaucasia, May 30.—This Government has been almost in a state of anarchy for days. A massacre of Armenians by the Tartar population is preceeding here and in the surrounding villages. The streets are filled with dead and wounded. The Mussulmans not only attack but pillage and burn the houses of Christians. The number of victims is not established but exceeds 100 dead, including a priest. The butchery is reported to be still more dreadful in the villages. It is feared that the Fersian fords will join the Tartars. The authorities are powerless to cope with the situation. Nakhichevan is a very old town, datting from the sixth century S. C. The population of Nakhichevan numbers about 7,000 souls.

T. H. LLOYD COMMITTED.

Released On Sail to Await Trial in the Fall—No Assignment Yet.

Newmarket, May 30.—J. J. Warren, barrister, of Terento, appeared for T. H. Lleyd before Police Magistrate Col. Lloyd and T. J. Woodcock, JF., yesterday morning, to enter a plea to the three charges of misappropriating trust funds of the Weddell estate, aggregating \$4,612. Mr. Warren said his client has decided to waive examination and consent to a committal for trial. Arthur G. Singht appeared for the Crown, and accepted the plea, liberating the prisoner to bail in the same sureties as had been given for his appearance at the trial: David Lloyd \$1,250. Jesse Walton \$1,250 and himself in \$1,000. The Crown relieved the magistrates of any further responsibility in the case, and the prisoner will come up for trial at the September sessions, or, should he so select, can be tried by Judge Winchester at any time.

W. S. Cane, to whom Mr. Lloyd was to assign for the benefit of his creditors, was asked yesterday if an assignment had been made, and he answered: "Not yet."

Preservation of Meat.

Meat is commonly preserved by steeping it in brine. This method however, has the undesirable effect of extracting from the meat much soluble autritious matter besides rendering the meat harder and less digestible ether way of preserving it is in air-tight cases. The cases are packed with neat and filled up with gravy and are then hermetically sealed except at one point. They are then exposed to heat above that of belling water for several hours, thus destroying all the existing germs and driving out all the air con-tained in them. The epen part is them soldered over. If by any accident the tin is not hermetically sealed the meat

will spoil. Kneeling Horses.



NOT TO BLAME

Blenheim Magistrate Acquits Wm. O'Brien of Intent to Break Law-Fine of \$25 Imposed.

A very interesting case involving the question as to whether two parties who secured flower appeared to be under 21 years of age—was tried at Blenheim yesterday.

The charge was laid against William O'Brien, under the Act prior to the amendments introduced at the last Legislative session, the new Act coming into force the day after the offence occurred.

THE RUSSIAN **GREAT LOSS**

chorage here Monday evening, bears scars of the battle. Her mizenmast is shot sway and one of her smokestacks is pierced by a cannot shot. But the Grozny, though engaged for several hours in a running fight at short range with a large Japanese destroyer, shows no signs of the fray.

When the Almas steamed into port the vessel wreathed itself in smoke—it was an admiral's salute in honor of Rear Admiral Von Jessen. Scarcely had the boom of the last cannon begun to echo from the surrounding hills, when Von Jessen's flagship, the cruis-sr Rossia. answered the salute, and a minute later the guns of the fortress minute later the guns of the fortress took up the cannenade. In a trice the beats were dropped from the dayles, and in a moment the officers of the cruisers and torped beats in the harbor, and the military efficials from the fortress, were swarming on board the

fortress, were swarming on board the Almaz te learn news of the fight.

Stery of the Fight.

The stery was short. According to the officers of the Almaz, the fleet under Rojestvensky met the Japanese in the Straits of Corea near Tsu Island, and the opposing fleets immediately closed in. Being lightly armed, the Almaz are bad hear oversed by Admiral

closed in. Being lightly armed, the Almaz, as had been ordered by Admiral Rojestyensky before the battle, separated itself from the main fiset at the first opportunity and headed for Vladivestock soon after the commencement of the action.

Early in the battle, an officer of the Almaz, while watching Rojestvensky's flagship, the battleship Kniaz Souvaroff, for a signal, saw the flagship shudder from stem to stem, as if under a blow from a rigantic hammer, and heatiate in her course, while the waves rose digh frem her armored sides. Then she commenced to list and sink. The officers believe that the debut of the submarine boat as an effective agent in naval warfare, or perhaps a large in naval warfare, or perhaps a large mine, caused the disaster to the Kniaz mine, caused the disaster to the Kniaz Souvaroff. The damage, however, was so extensive that the flagship seen went down, leaving the deck officers and many of the crew straggling in the waves One of the Russian torpede boats, either the destroyer Bulny or the Bravi, ran in and picked up a number Bravi, ran in and picked up a number of the swimmers, she of whom was relognised through a glass as Admiral Rojestvensky. Under a duelling attack, the Japanese warships, aided by
torpede beats, mines and submarines,
the Borodino, Osliabia and Ural were
placed, out of action and followed the
flagship to the bottom.

Positive of Jap Lesses. The fog which had raised and lowered intermittently during the morning
now began to settle down again, and
the distance of the Almas, which had
now succeeded in disengaging herself
in the combat from the struggling ships,
made it difficult for her to see clearly,
but the efficers are positive that they
saw two Japanese battleships disappear beneath the sea before their eyes,
and that two Japanese cruisers appeared on the point of sinking.

ROJESTVENSKY SAFE.

Reported From St. Petersburg to Have Arrived With Wound in Head, at

Vladivestock in Destroyer Buiny. St. Petersburg, May 31.—Admiral Rojestvensky has arrived at Vladive-stock on board the terpedo boat destroyer Buiny. During the battle, he sustained a wound in the head. Admiral Durnovo has received a despatch from his son, who is in command of Buiny, describing fully how his commander-in-chief, Admiral Rejestvensky, was saved. The admiral was washed off the deck of the Eni-

as Souvaroff Just before the flagship foundered, and was picked up by the torpede boat destroyer Buiny.

Other private despatches from Viadivostock say the Russians lost 12 warships sunk and captured during the engagement.

Fight For Honer.

Admiral Nebogatoff's battered remannt surrendered off Liancourt Rocks, while Rojestrensky, with the best remaining battleships, fought on for the honor of the Russian navy. The Admiraity learned with a sense of relief that the flagship Kniaz Souvaroff sank under the feet of the Russian commander-in-chief.

The surrender of Nebogatoff's twe battleships, even though the circumstances are not known, is regarded as a disgrace. The ships still unaccounted for here are the battleship Navarin and the protected cruisers Gleg, Aurers and Izumrud.

GROMOBOI SINKS.

Strikes Mine and Goes Down With St. Hands—Admiral Skrydioff Bo-lieved to Be a Vistim.
