## MASTERS AND SEAMEN

### THE MERCANTILE SERVICE.

NOTICE is again hereby given, that the undersigned is duly authorized to carry into effect the British Act of the 5th and 6th of William the 4th, respecting Masters and Seamen in the Merchant Service.

To enable the Masters to receive the necessary Documents—that they are, by the said Act, to take home all balances of wages due to the crew, either on shore, in hospital, or elsewhere, and that the said duty, must be paid into his hands, and that the same can, on any account, lawfully remain in the hands of any person, that all Seamen who may have been left on shore, and unable to do their duty, will be furnished with information how to act in such cases. And that the Master that will give a passage to England to such seamen, will be furnished with Documents to enable them to receive the amount of their wages, on their arrival, from the Agent and Governors of the Corporation for Relief and support of sick, maimed, and disabled seamen, and the widow and children of any that shall be killed, slain or drowned in the said service, and for other purposes.—1st of the 4th and 5th of William 4th, cap. 52.

For these circumstances, it is to be hoped few seamen will remain in Canada, during the winter, in a state of destitution.

## A THRILLING STORY.

A thrilling story is going the rounds of the papers, taken from the "Naval and Military Magazine," which stripped of all embellishment, is to the following purpose:—On the day of the ever-memorable battle of Waterloo, Captain Walter Leslie's young bride, Helens, with feelings more easily imagined than described, took her seat at a window overlooking the field at that dreadful conflict; but being within reach of random shot, she with the other inmates, retired to a barn as a place of more safety, and there remained in an anxious suspense during the whole day. Some time in the night, Capt. Bryan was brought to the barn, badly wounded. Helens, with the necessities which her forebodings had suggested, tenderly dressed young Bryan's wounds, and after his revival, ventured to inquire after her Walter. Bryan's evasive answer but too fatally portended the worst. She begged him to tell her the circumstances, for she knew her

husband was dead. Bryan then stated that just before going into action, Capt. Leslie thrust a small Bible into his bosom, charging him that if he felt in action, faithfully to deliver the sacred relic before he did fall. A few moments elapsed before he did fall. After learning from Bryan the spot at which Walter fell she went alone in the night, lantern in hand, into the field of the dead and dying amidst the plunging of wounded horses and other frightful sights in search of the remains of her beloved. On the point of returning in despair of finding the object of search, among such a mass of carnage, her attention was drawn to an outstretched hand, on which was found the well known ring of her husband who was partly buried beneath a pile of other bodies. Whilst alone engaged in the release of the object of her affections, two soldiers, sent by Cap. Bryan, came to her assistance and bore "Acator's dear remains" to the same room of the wounded Captain. The surgeon applying a glass to the lips of Leslie, declared that he yet lived. The shock of joy was too great for the delicate system of Helens; one vacant stare, and she fell lifeless on the floor, several hours being spent in restoring her to sensibility, and the embrace of her fond Walter.

The small Bible was presented to Leslie by Helens on their wedding day; neither of them dreaming that the Holy Book was to be the salvation of the Captain's temporal life. The Bible aimed at his bosom spent its force in the folds of the Bible, which is now religiously preserved in the family, as a perpetual memorial of that extraordinary Providence.

## FROM LATE ENGLISH PAPERS.

Among the fashionable equestrians in the Parks on the 2nd July, the party which attracted the most attention was the Earl of Durham's family, the young Viscount Lambton, and his younger sister Lady Alice Lambton, about seven years of age, being mounted on mousy coloured ponies of the Shetland breed.

A grave writer on the laws of England says that "when a jury of matrons is impanelled the first man ought to be a woman of known and good repute."

Yeomanry of Ireland.—The Irish yeomanry having been disbanded on the 31st March, 1834, the only expense which has been incurred since the date of the last return made to Parliament, viz. 28th May 1838, has been for gratuities to the reduced permanent sergeants and drummers, amounting to £46 16s 6d.

From a return to an order of the House of Commons dated June 4, 1839, it appears that the number of troops of effective Yeomanry in Great Britain is 244 consisting of 836 officers and 13,204 men for the support of which in 1838 Parliament voted £80,289 5s 10d; the probable charge against this vote is £79,664 3s. 4d.

The Hon. Henry Blackwood, Patrick McCormick, Thomas Green, and John Carroll, officer and men of the 84th regiment have been convicted at Portsmouth, by the civil authorities, of false imprisonment of several policemen, each sentenced to a week's imprisonment.—The Recorder, in passing sentence acquitted the parties of moral guilt, though not of legal guilt, and stated that he could make no distinction between the parties.

At an inquest held on the bodies of the unfortunate sufferers by the late explosion at South Shields the following verdict was rendered:—

"Accidental death, with a special recommendation from the jury that the practise of working coal mines with candles be abandoned and lamps be adopted in their stead, as from the evidence taken at this inquest, it evidently appears that the explosion has been caused by the incaution of one of the men going with a lighted candle into what is termed the tenth board of the mine, which had been foul."

During the last year 1,044 patients were admitted to the London Fever Hospital; an additional wing has been made to the building.

Ashton under Lyne July 4.—in consequence of the disturbed state of the manufacturing districts, a large cotton mill, at present occupied by a portion of the 20th regiment, has been fitted up for the reception of 600 infantry, and a number of cavalry. Also, at Bury, two large warehouses have been adapted for the accommodation of about 500 infantry.

Lieut. Franklin, R. N. who for several years past commanded the coast guard stationed at Hove, has been appointed second in command of the British Queen, steamer.

Lieut. Genl. Lord Charles Somerset Manners, M. P., brother to the Duke of Rutland, has been appointed to succeed the late lamented Genl. Lord William Bentinck as Colonel of the 11th Light Dragoons, quartered in Canterbury Barracks.

We regret to announce the death of the Earl of Luau. He was in his 74th year.

The lease of the Olympic Theatre, London, for 27 years, was sold at auction by George Robbins on the 20th June, for 5,850 guineas.

What next.—The yeomanry of West Pennington have it in contemplation to present Her Majesty with a cheese of 1,000 pounds weight made from the milk of 700 cows.

A raffle and ball, for a live pig was advertised to take place on the 20th June in honour of Her Majesty's Ascension to the Throne!

A type founder of Clermont, named Coulson, has obtained a patent for a new material for printing types which is harder, capable of more resistance, and yet less expensive than the ordinary composition of lead and antimony.

A great explosion of fire-damp has taken place at South Shields; 150 persons killed and wounded.

There have been several deaths by lightning in England.

The crops all over England are most abundant.

The Thames Tunnel is to be open for foot passengers in about fifty months.

The Irish Poor.—The poor of Ireland are in great distress, owing to the scarcity and dearthness of potatoes.

There had been another most destructive fire in Dublin.

A severe snow storm occurred in England on the 27th June.

All the prisoners tried have been found guilty of the great Gold Dust Robbery. A reward of \$3,000 is offered for the Jew, Davis, who had sailed for New York.

From a Parliamentary Report it appears that the total number of steamboat accidents of consequence during ten years is 92 and loss of lives 634.

A field of coal in the county of Fife, Scotland, which was purchased half a century ago by Sir John Henderson for one hundred pounds was on the 19th June last valued at the sum of one hundred and twenty thousand pounds.

All the berths for the August trip of the Liverpool steamer were engaged before the 1st July. Chs. Keane, Vandenhoff, and eleven other lesser "stars" will be among the passengers.

Hobart Town, Feb. 3.—Lord Glenelg has announced to Sir George Gipps that in future no ecclesiastic is to have a seat in the council.—Australasian Review.

The public may judge of the destitution amongst the population of Eomis by the fact, that seven hundred and fifty seven persons were fed in the House of Industry on Thursday last.—Limerick Standard.

Pawnbrokers' Profits.—At an inquest held on Saturday, on the body of an unknown infant that had been found dead at a pawnbrokers' shop in Tottenham-Court-road, Mr. Wakley observed in the course of conversation with the jury on pawnbrokers' profits, that he had read in a "Report" of a committee of the House of Commons, that one blanket had been pawned 285 times in one year. It was regularly pawned in the morning, and redeemed in the evening. The parties pledging it had paid, it was calculated, on all the moneys obtained on it, at the rate of £2,000 per cent.

The Chartist Whistle.—An ingenious little plaything under this name has been sold freely in this town during the last few weeks. It is made of tin, and in the interior is formed a

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small reservoir for flour or ink, or some other dust or fluid; the blow pipe communicates with the reservoir, and of course the unexperienced operator is sure to receive the contents in his eyes the moment he attempts to blow the whistle. The whistle itself is a practical joke and a good one. The ingenious mechanic, however, who invented it, no doubt intended it to convey an important moral lesson, viz:—that the leaders of the Chartists are throwing dust in the eyes of their followers, in order to secure some advantage to themselves. We understand one of the whistles was exhibited to the bench of Magistrates the other day. The name was stated—but the *modus operandi* was not. One of the worthy justices, eager to hear the terrific sound, immediately put it to his lips, and as quickly received part of an ounce of flour in his eyes. It is unnecessary to say that the incident was too much for the gravity of the court, and it was some time before it could be sufficiently restored to allow of a dignified procedure with judicial business.—*Bradford Observer.*

**State and Prospects of the Iron Trade.**—We learn from a very elaborate paper read by Mr. J. Johnson before the Liverpool Polytechnic Society, that there are at this time in Scotland 50 furnaces in blast, five out, seven building, and 91 contemplated. In 1740 the annual produce of the kingdom was 17,350 tons cast iron. Mr. Johnson thinks it probable, from the above date, that in 1842 Scotland alone will produce upwards of 360,000 tons, and that within five years 1,000,000 tons will be produced annually in South Wales.

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QUEBEC, WEDNESDAY, JULY 31st, 1839

The latest New York papers that we have, are of Thursday last, there being no American mail this day. The *British Queen* steam-ship was hourly looked for, at New York, on Thursday last, and intelligence of her arrival may be expected here, by steamer from Montreal, in the course of to-day.

Since our last, there has been nothing new from Upper Canada or the Lower Provinces.

Among the presentations at the Queen's Levee, held at St. James's Palace on the 26th June, we observe the following:—

Captain Boulton, of the Upper Canada Militia, by the Marquis of Normandy.

The Hon. Alexander Stewart, and the Hon. L. M. Wilkins, members of the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia, by the Marquis of Normandy.

Dr. T. Murray Peters, and Mr. John L. Wilmot, of New Brunswick, by the Marquis of Normandy.

Mr. William Young, member of the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia, by the Marquis of Normandy.

Major General Wright, Royal Engineers, on appointment, and return from Canada, by Sir Hussey Vivian.

The Earl of Gosford, Mr. Robinson (Chief Justice of Upper Canada), Dr. Strachan, Mr. Stuart, and Mr. John Montague, had interviews, on the 3rd July, with Lord Normanby, at the Colonial Office.

Mr. S. Revans—of rebel notoriety—had an

interview with Lord Normanby, at the Colonial Office, on the 29th June.

UNION OF THE PROVINCES.

The bill "For re-uniting the Provinces of Upper Canada and Lower Canada, and for the Government of the United Province," introduced in the House of Commons by Lord John Russell, has been received in this Province, and is published in the *Montreal Gazette* of Saturday last. It occupies six columns of that journal, and is, consequently, too long for insertion in the *Transcript*. The following *precis*, however, which we have prepared, will enable our readers to make themselves acquainted with the prominent features of the proposed enactment. We have already stated that the bill will not become law during the present session; it is proposed that the law shall come into operation on the 1st of January, 1842.

**Preamble.**

1st clause. Repeals all such acts and parts of acts as may be inconsistent with this act.

2. The District of Gaspé and the Magdalen Islands to be annexed to New Brunswick.

3. Upper and Lower Canada to be united under one Legislature, and be called the "United Province of Canada."

4. The United Province, with the exception of Quebec, Montreal, Toronto, and Kingston, to be divided into five Districts, each with a "District Council."

5. Such five Districts to be formed and bounded by arbitrators; they are to be formed so as to render the number of electoral divisions as nearly as may be, equal in Upper with Lower Canada.

6. For the purpose of electing members of the Assembly and the District Councils, each of the Districts to be subdivided into nine electoral divisions.

7. Regard to be had, as far as practicable, to the Upper Canada act "for increasing the Representation of the Commons in the House of Assembly," in forming the electoral divisions.

8. It shall be lawful for the Legislature of the United Province to alter the boundaries and number of the Districts and Electoral Divisions; any bill to such effect to be reserved for her Majesty's pleasure, and before her Majesty's assent can be signified, the bill must lie before both Houses of Parliament for at least thirty days.

9. All powers and functions vested in the present Governors of Upper and Lower Canada, to be vested in the Governor of the United Province, as far as consistent with this Act.

10. The Governor, a Legislative Council, and a House of Assembly to constitute the Legislature of the United Province.

11. Provides for the summoning, before the meeting of the Legislature in 1842 and thenceforth from time to time, of persons to be Legislative Councillors in the Legislative Council, which is not at any time to consist of less than twenty Councillors.

12. Only such persons eligible as Legislative Councillors as shall have been or shall hold at the time the office of Colonel of Militia, Executive Councillor, Member of the House of Assembly, Legislative Councillor, Chairman of a District Council, or Mayor of a town, in either, or the United, Province.

13. Legislative Councillors to remain in office eight years only unless re-appointed.

14. Legislative Councillors may resign. On becoming bankrupt, or on being attainted of treason or felony they cease to be Councillors.

15. Five, a quorum in the Legislative Council.

16. President of this Council to be appointed by the Governor,—removable at pleasure.

17. When a division is equal, the President to have a casting vote.

18. The Assembly to consist of ninety-eight members, viz: two for each Electoral Division, and two each for Quebec, Montreal, Toronto, and Kingston.

19, 20, 21, 22. These four clauses enact that until provision be otherwise made, the mode of convening the Legislature, returning of members, &c. shall be the same as heretofore.

23. Twenty, a quorum in the Assembly.

24, 25, 26, 27. Relate to the passing of laws, their disallowance by the Queen, &c., in conformity with former practice.

28, 29. No act to be valid which shall be inconsistent with the provisions of this act or any act of the Imperial Parliament relating to

commerce; or should it affect the relations of the empire with a foreign state.

30. To any bill passed by the Legislature, affecting a local division of the Province in any way, the Governor shall reserve his assent for at least twenty-one days; and should a District Council, within that period, request that such bill be reserved for the signification of her Majesty's pleasure, the Governor shall accede to the request—and the bill shall remain for at least thirty days before the Imperial Parliament, before the Queen can signify her assent to it.

31. In every District there shall be a Representative Council called a "District Council."

32. Every such Council to consist of twenty-seven members.

33. The Governor to instruct the Returning Officer in each District, to summon a District Council to meet on some day in 1842.

34. Returning Officer to cause a proclamation to be made, convening the District Council, at least twenty days before the day fixed for meeting; and shall send to the Returning Officer of each Electoral Division a Writ, returnable within fourteen days, for the election of three persons to represent the Division in the District Council.

35. The same laws made applicable to the conducting elections, qualification of voters and members, &c. as in elections for the Assembly; the expense of elections to be paid by the District Council out of monies raised by them.

36. A person elected a member of the District Council, and refusing to serve, shall be fined £25 stg.; no person obliged to accept the office, however, who shall be permanently disabled in body or mind, or above 65 years of age, or has already served in such office, or shall have paid the fine within five years.

37. On 1st Jan'y, 1843, one-third of the Councils to vacate their seats—to be determined by lot in this and succeeding years; in after years, the third part who have been longest members are to vacate their seats—Every one so going out of office eligible to be forthwith re-elected.

38. The mode of determining by lot.

39. On the 15th Jan'y, elections to be held for filling the vacated seats.

40. The Governor empowered to cause vacancies occurring in the Councils before the annual election, to be filled up; in case of the vacancies exceeding six, he is required to do so—provided that no such writ shall issue later than the 29th September.

41. Four quarterly meetings of each District Council to be held every year; due notice to be given of other meetings that may be required.

42. Councils to elect their Chairmen, and remove and replace them when necessary.

43. Ten to be a quorum.

**CANADA TIMBER TRADE.**—In the report of the proceedings of the House of Commons, on the 3rd July, we find that Mr. G. Palmer gave the following notice:—

"That he should, to-morrow, bring under the notice of the House the Report of the Committee on shipwrecks, and move for leave to bring in a bill to prevent vessels loading their decks with timber, on coming from British North America, after the 1st of November next."

It would appear, however, that Mr. Palmer was prevented, in some way, from fulfilling his intention, as the reports of the next day's proceedings in the London newspapers of the 3rd July, make no allusion to the subject.

A letter from Henry Bliss, Esq. to G. Pemberton, Esq. Chairman of the Committee of Trade of Quebec, has been laid upon the table of the Exchange Reading-Room. It is dated London, 29th June, and contains the following among other information:—

"I find, upon inquiry at the Office of Trade, that it not the intention of Her Majesty's Government to bring in, this year, any Bill in amendment of the Laws of Customs. The application, therefore, for an alteration in the wine duties must stand over till another session. The repeal of duties on flour and provisions in the Lower Ports will also, of course, be postponed; and as the House of Assembly in New Brunswick objects to that repeal, it is not likely to be carried till these objections are withdrawn."

Upon the question of disputed boundary with the United States, negotiations are still pending which are expected to lead to a fair and amicable adjustment of the whole difficulty."

Monsieur Signay, the Roman Catholic Bishop of Quebec, returned to town yesterday afternoon, after an absence of about two months, on a pastoral visit throughout the diocese. The bells of the different Roman Catholic churches rang their welcoming peals on his Lordship's arrival.

The second centenary celebration of the founding of the Ursuline convent of this city will take place to-morrow, in the church of the Convent. We understand that preparations have been making for the last two months in order to render the ceremony as imposing as possible. Grand mass will commence at half-past nine in the morning.

It is said that a similar ceremony will take place, on the 6th proximo, at the Hotel Dieu, in celebration of the two-hundredth anniversary of that institution.

COURT OF APPEALS.

Tuesday, 30th July.

This being the last day of Term, there was a full attendance of the bar, and other parties interested in the judgments to be pronounced on the cases heard during the term. We subjoin a list of the judgments delivered, from which it will be perceived that the Court has not been idle during the seven or eight days which it sat, and that the proceedings of the Court are not calculated to divest the Law of the reputation for "glorious uncertainty," which it has so long enjoyed.

*Appeals from Montreal.*

Mr. Justice Rolland spoke at some length, and with much clearness of argument on this point, showing the injustice of a possible case that a workman might, under colour of this lien, come upon a purchaser of a raft, years after the original transaction. It was the business of the workman to see himself paid in the first instance by the person who employed him.

From a "Bill of Mortality," published in a late New York paper, we gather the following particulars respecting violent deaths in that city:—

The total number of inquests for the year ending 31st December, 1833, was 643, of whom 410 were males and 193 females. The causes of death were—Suicide, 55; Murder and violent death, 15; Involuntary Killings, 6; Accidents, 75; Causes unknown, 164; Debility and Exhaustion, 14; Burned and Scalded, 24; Dolorific Tremors, 8; Strangled and Suffocated, 11; Stillborn, 11; Drowned, 98; Intemperance, 33; Visitation of God, 23; Drinking Cold Water, 7; Apoplexy, 54; Total 633.—The modes of suicide employed were—By Hanging, 9; Poison, 30; Cutting the throat, 6; Shooting, 6; Drowning, 4.

From the London Court Gazette 1st July. The week has been unpropitious for the display of gay attire, having been marked, by showers and thunder storms.
