—The Kakabeka Falls, twelve miles from Fort William, Ont., have been purchased by Montreal capitalists, who will develop 30,000 horse-power. The waterfall is 125 feet.

—The Winnipeg Electric Street Railway Company and the Winnipeg General Power Company have amalgamated and will in future be known as the Winnipeg Electric Railway Company. The capital of the new company is \$4,000,000.

—The workshops of the New York & Ottawa Railroad are being moved from Santa Clara, across the border from Ogdensburg, N.Y., to Ottawa, which gave a bonus of \$75,000 as an inducement for the location of the shops there.

—The large extensions to the Grand Trunk Railway shops at Stratford, Ont., which were begun six months' ago are nearing completion. The extensions to the blacksmith shop, the new wheel shop and the brass moulding shops are finished and men are at work. The first tenders were turned out there last week. The staff of employee number about one thousand.

—Madrid advices state that the Finance Minister introduced a bill in the Chamber of Deputies recently imposing eighty cents duty on imported corn (per 100 kilos), and \$1.40 on imported flour (per 100 kilos), wherever the price of Spanish wheat exceeds \$5.60 per 100 kilos. The new duties will become effective immediately after the bill is approved by the Cortes.

Canadians supplied 333 per cent, less than other countries.

—The customs revenue of the Dominion for November was \$5,358,267, being an increase of \$162,952 over the same month last year. For the three months the increase was only \$311,033 over the same period last year.

—The Cornwall, Ont., High School Board is asking the Town Council to provide \$8,000 with which to enlarge the school to double its present size. When the proposed improvements are effected the school will become a collegiate institute.

—Mr. J. Sweet, druggist, St. Catharines, Ont., suffered over \$2,500 loss by fire on the 5th instant. Caused by explosion of carbolic acid.—At St. John, N.B., on the 5th the printing plant of J. & A. McMillan was destroyed. Loss over \$40,000; insurance, \$38000.

—Albany, N.Y., advices state that among the stock companies incorporated some days ago was the Inter-Borough Telegraph and Telephone Company, to operate between Philadelphia, Trenton, N.J., New York City, and Orient Point, L.I., and from New York to Montreal, with a capital of \$100,000.

—The total number of vessels on the register books of the Dominion the first of the year was 7,020, being an increase of 184 vessels, and an increase of 30,534 tons register, as compared with January 1st, 1903. The number of new vessels built and registered in the Dominion of Canada during 1903 was 328, measuring 30,323 tons register tonnage.

—We learn from Hamilton that the arbitrators in the matter of fixing the price which the city of St. Thomas should pay for gas and electric lighting utilities, in connection with that city's municipal ownership move, fixed the price at between \$240,000 and \$250,000, and the ratepayers of St. Thomas will have an opportunity of voting on the question next January.

—A bulletin on the peat resources of Canada has been issued at Ottawa. It gives the total known peat areas of the Dominion at 37,000 square miles, but one authority considers that future explorations will show a much greater area. The bulletin describes the different manufacturing processes which are being used throughout the Dominion, and the best known deposits.

--St. John, Nfld., advices state that bitterness prevails at St. Pierre and Miquelon over the prospect of the ratification of the French shore treaty, coupled with the depression conquent on the failure of the fisheries. Official statistics show that the exports of fish from St. Pierre for the nine months ending September, 1902, were 22,584 tons. For the same period of 1904 the exports were 4,065 tons.

—The Customs receipts at the port of Montreal during the present season show a remarkable decrease. For the seven months, May 1st to November 30th, the Customs collections amounted to \$7.081,782, as compared with \$8,006,724 for the same period last year, a decrease of \$925,991. The collections for November amounted to \$974,749, as compared with \$1,040,103 for last November, a decrease of \$65.353.

—The Aberdeen Chamber of Commerce passed a resolution urging the Government to remove the restrictions on the importation of Canadian cattle. One of the members stated that at one time this was a Canadian question, but now Canadians were not pressing Great Britain to admit their stock. Canadians now got the advantage of finishing their cattle, and derived the profit which the home farmer formerly had.

—The Militia Department, Ottawa, has arranged for the expropriation of a hundred acres of Hudson's Bay Company land at Victoria, B.C., which will be used for the

erection of a magazine. The price demanded of the War Office was \$1,000 an acre. It is only a short time since the militia authorities secured Signal Hill for the War Office, and now big guns are mounted there to guard the Esquimalt dockyard.

—A wholesale house in the lower streets of the city which had the misfortune to be burnt out last summer has not been in wonted shape latterly.—Although the insurance was largely adjusted, one of the partners felt warranted by ill health in withdrawing his money from the business, thus leaving the concern deprived of their usual facilities. It is believed that further accession of capital will be needed, and it would in all probability be well invested.

—A comparative statement furnished by a well-known lumber exporting firm shows a shrinkage of 34 per cent. in the aggregate of lumber shipments, this year, as compared with 1903. The decrease is due to the continued depression in the British market, which set in before Easter, and is only now showing signs of giving place to an easier feeling. In 1903 the total shipments from Montreal to the British market reached 219,256,683 feet, as compared with 143,250,921 feet this year.

—Definite announcement is made at Winnipeg of a new union depot for Emerson, Man. Four of the five railroads entering the town, viz., the Canadian Pacific, Great Northern, Canadian Northern, and Minneapolis, St. Paul and S. S. Marie Railway, will construct a new international union depot on the border where the four lines intersect. Owing to the fact that two of the companies interested are American and two Canadian a like portion of the depot will be placed on each side of the international line.

—If the wheat won't come to the mill, the mill must go to the wheat. That is the logic of the Canadian Northwest situation with regard to hard spring wheat and the big U.S. spring wheat millers. The time is within sight, adds the Buffalo Roller Mill, when they will have to grind Canadian northwest wheat or none at all, and if our tariff laws cannot be so amended as to enable them to grind it profitably on this side of the border they will move to the other side and establish mills to compete with American flour in foreign markets.

—A report has been sent to the Department of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa, on the destruction of the sock-eye salmon,

by Indians, in British Columbia. A meeting of the Fraser River Calners' Association will be called shortly to consider the matter. It is said if the Indians are permitted to continue salmon fishing will shortly be a thing of the past in British Columbia waters. The canners, who have \$4,000,000 invested, are anxious to discuss what steps shall be taken to obtain immediate action on the part of the Government to prevent the depredations.

—We learn from St. Thomas, Ont., that the superintendent for the Chicago construction company has finished the erection of the machine shops and power station there for the Pere Marquette. The buildings cost \$50,000, and the equipment will cost as much more. An equal sum will be expended later. Since June a force of 275 men have been employed in the erection of these buildings, which will be the main shops on the Canadian side of the line. It is said that negotiations for the purchase of a considerable tract of land adjacent to the new shops for yards and sidings have been quietly under way.

—Berlin advices state that the Reichstag, after two days' delate, adopted a resolution asking the Government to introduce a bill for the protection of the middle commercial classes against great accumulations of capital in the retail trade. The resolution contemplates a further extension of the law against against the unfair competition and the regulation of closing out sales, so as to prevent bogus advertisements, and also seeks a remedy again the hardships caused by sales on the instalment plan. Finally, the resolution demands the prohibition of government officials, including army and navy officers, from running co-operative department stores.

—The Civic Railway Committee, Ottawa, decided upon a recommendation to the City Council for the submission of a by-law to the ratepayers in January providing for the purchase by the municipality of the Ottawa Electric Railway, at the price of \$3,000,000. A report of the sub-committee to that effect was adopted with certain amendments. The sub-committee presented a lengthy report, giving a resume of the statements furnished it by the civic officials with reference to the proposal, and went on to state that from the auditor's statement it appeared that on the basis of the present market value of the stock and bonds, the valuation of the Montreal Street Railway is \$141,587 per mile, of the Toronto Railway, \$100,915 per mile, while on the basis of the present offer the value of the Ottawa road is \$71,428 per mile.

—Newly incorporated Ontario companies are given as follows: Commercial Art Co., Toronto; capital, \$40,000. Provisional directors: Jas. Milne, J. L. Ross, A. W. Bassett.—Western Coral Marble Co., Chatham; capital, \$40,000. Provisional directors: B. Blonde, W. M. Drader, C. R. Charteris.—Ontario Cereal Co.; capital, \$15,000. Provisional directors: C. Taylor.—The Newell Hijel Co. has been permitted to change its name to the Otto Higel, and permisssion has been given to the Roofers' Supply Co., to increase its capital stock from \$20,000 to \$60,000.

Ottawa reports the presence there of a visitor from Ja-

chief of the dairy branch of the Agricultural Department, the visitor said that increasingly large quantities of Canadian butter are being consumed by the Japs but they have no use whatever for cheese.—The Department of Trade and Commerce has received a report from the Canadian agent for Japan, who notes a great increase in the imports of flour from Canada. The imports for the present year are placed at 7,405,910 pounds, as against 4,826,452 pounds imported last year. Referring to the fact that there is no market for ready-made clothing, he observes that all the clothing for the army is made from cloth imported by the Government and made up by Japanese labor. "They take pride," he adds, "in the statistical statement that 86 per cent. of the cost is expended amongst their own people." It is also reported that the duty upon flour is 35 cents per 133 pounds, and not 30 cents, as preously stated.

Impressed by the need of an institution where money may be obtained at any hour, prominent New York financiers and commercial men have organized the first night and day bank and safe deposit company. The names of the men are prominent in the social world. Capital stock of \$250,000 already has been subscribed. The concern also will have a working surplus of \$250,000. The plight in which many travellers of wealth often find themselves because they are unable to draw cash in cases of emergency suggested the organization of the brnk. Troubles experienced by a well known man, who recently required \$2,200 before 11.30 p.m., started the work of organization. The man in question had \$27,000 deposited in one down-town bank, but only succeeded in raising the sum be needed by the assistance of cashiers in two large up-town hotels. 



-At the meeting of the Western Ontario Commercial Trav-Association, at London a few days ago, the officers were elected by acclamation, as follows: President, W. R. Grant; vice-presidents, C. W. The annual statement showed receipts of \$36, 760.83, with a balance over disbursements of \$3,463.04. There is a balance of assets over liabilities of \$106,624.85.

-The dairy division of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has again this year operated a number of creameries in the Northwest Territories, so that farmers in districts adapted to dairying might be able to obtain a cash income from their cows until such time as they are able to carry on the work for themsevles. Despite the fact that the price of butter in eastern Canada has been lower this year than last, the patrons of the Northwest creameries have received an average net price of 20.98 cents a pound for the butter manufactured from the cream supplied by them, over a cent a pound more than in 1903, and the highest price ever obtained for the season's output of the government creameries. British Columbia has naturally been the chief market for Territorial butter, but some 34,000 pounds have been shipped to Japan during the first ten months of this year. The Yukon butter trade is also being recovered for Canada. The total amount consumed in that territory annually is over 500,000 pounds, of which acarly 260,360 pounds has this year been contributed by the government creameries in the Northwest Territories.

—An extensive scheme of railway development by the C.P.R. in western and eastern Ontario is foreshadowed by official notices. One states that the Ontario & Quebec Railway Company, otherwise the C.P.R., will apply to the Parliament of Canada for authority to build and operate a branch line from a point on its main line west of London to some convenient point on the St. Clair River between Sarnia and Lake St. Clair. The second notice announces that incorporation will be sought for the "Georgian Bay & Seaboard Railway Company," with power to construct and operate a railway from a point on the Georgian Bay between Port Severn and Penetanguishene, in a southerly direction through the counties of Simcoe, Ontario.

Victoria, Peterboro'. Hastings, Lennox, and Addington, Frontenac, and Lanark, or any of them, to a point of connection with the Ontario & Quebec Railway between Cavanville and Maberly, with such powers as are usually given to railway companies incorporated by the Parliament of Canada, and that the said works be declared to be for the general advantage of Canada.

The land sales of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company in the month of November aggregated 23,392.88 acres, for which they realized the sum of \$112,261.70, an average of about \$4.80 per acre. The total land sales of this company from January 1 to November 30 amounted to 488,468.74 acres for the sum of \$2,097,946. This is a much better showing than sales at the beginning of the year would have led one to anticipate, and in addition to the figures showing a very active season, there is the more gratifying fact that nearly all the purchases were made by actual settlers, which means that the land will be cultivated. — The sales of the Canadian Northwest Land Company in November aggregated 6,100 acres, which brought an average of \$6.63 an acres, or a total money consideration of \$40,420. During the ten months of the current year from January 1 to November 30, this company sold 50,440 acres of land for which they realized \$331,240. In the case of this company, as in the case of the C.P.R., all land they sold this year was to actual settlers so that the showing made both with respect to the amount of land disposed and the price obtained is a pleasing index of the progress and prosperity of the country.



The friendly greeting of the discount clerk or the branch manager is looked upon from a personal point of view rather than from that of the shareholder anxious for dividends. Now is the time to pull up, but it is not so easy to east off the expensive habits of many months or a few years' cultivation. general conduct of the young partner with all the crowning of the merry god, cuts quite a figure in a man's career, and makes or mars his prosperity. Many a man in our large cities could preach eloquently on this subject; and what Matthew Arnold in his tour through Canada, some years ago, mentioned, too unjustly, we believe, as the chief characteristic of a portion of our race population, could be applied almost as fully to the English portion. Whether the comparative success in business of the two races is due to this propensity, or whether athletic sports have their influence upon it, is a question for those who can spare the The wisest lines in the Engtime for philosophizing. lish tongue—as it is sometimes printed north of the Tweed-were addressed to a "youthful friend" by one who could surely speak from experience. It may not be inappropriate to quote here Lord Strathcona's axiom added to a recent address in London, namely, that "In assiduity and concentration lie the secrets of success."

RECIPROCITY WITH UNITED STATES.

An advertising cartoon shows a child in a bath struggling to seize a cake of soap, the legend attached being, "He will never be happy till he gets it." This is an analogue of the situation in the United States, the people of which country have long been reaching out to seize reciprocity in trade with Canada without any success. We fear if they will never be happy till they get reciprocity their days of disappointment will be long and wearisome.

Our good friends to the South have allowed the summer of golden opportunity to pass without securing their fiscal salvation—so far as reciprocity with Canada has any salvation in it for them. Now that the door had been tightly closed there is rising up a movement to secure this boon for the United States, the advantages of which were decried a few years ago. In this business

our neighbours damaged themselves by being too smart. They imagined that, by holding back from Canada, by be littling the benefits to be derived from reciprocity with this country, by following the example of the biblical bargainer, saying to what was offered, "It is nought—it is nought!" we should fall on our marrow bones implicing them to give us reciprocity on their own terms.

This style of diplomacy is astute, but not sufficiently so to draw Canada into a fiscal trap. We left the American producers to make a further study of the situation, as their lesson had been only half-learnt, while we turned to the markets of Great Britain, where large openings were found for Canadian exports.

The following shows the extent of the exports to the United States and Great Britain from Canada in and since 1895, when the reciprocity agitation was active, also the imports from Great Britain and the States in the same years:

The exports from Canada to the United States between 1895 and 1903 increased by \$37,045,400 and exports from Canada to Great Britain by \$69,345,100, so the attention we gave to the British market had very satisfactory results. As, too, we managed in the same time to more than double our exports to the United States, the increase being \$37,045,000, or 108 per cent., it is evident that we did not suffer from the lack of reciprocity with our neighbours. In the period under notice, 1895 to 1903, our exports of home produce to Great Britain increased in its ratio to the entire exports, while the ratio of our home produce exports to the United States to the entire exports was reduced, which facts clearly prove, that Canada was more than making up for any restrictions on her export trade with the United States.

Our American friends need to get this into their heads as an unalterable condition. Canada will never reduce her tariff so low on manufactured goods made in our own country as to admit those made in the United States into dangerous competition with our native goods. The same may be said regarding our goods entering the States. We want no "dumping", nor do we wish to "dump."

A prominent American has been "talking out in meeting" about reciprocity in a most refreshing style.

He has given his views to the Boston Herald, which are worth republishing:

"To my mind, Canadian reciprocity means much more than an exchange of commodities. It means the good will and the friendship, (and, of course, the trade), not only of Canada, but of Great Britain as well.

"When we consider that two-thirds of our foreign trade is with England and her colonies, we should see the importance of not permitting the Chamberlain propaganda to go into effect against us.

Now, the only way that we can head off Chamberlain and his growing movement is by taking the initiative and making a reciprocity treaty with Canada, for without that great colony the late colonial secretary's scheme must fall to the ground.

"America has not yet realized what a blow this preferential scheme, with a consolidated British empire, could inflict upon the United States. Our farmers, in particular, would be badly injured in the important matter of wheat, and still greater throngs of our people would flock over the border into the rich lands of Westere Canada. That country would be built up at the expense of our own."

Such frankness is delightful. Mr. Foss wants our good will and friendship—to which he is very welcome, but with them he wants "the trade of Canada and of Great Britain!" Well, he will have to wait awhile before these are captured. Evidently the Chamberiain scheme for binding the British Empire together by fiscal bonds is giving Americans a scare. But, is it not absurd to suppose that Canada will adopt any policy to prevent our country being built up at the expense of the United States? It is a hard hearted saying no doubt but we are not ashamed to avow a strong desire to see this accomplished by tens of thousands of farmers leaving the Western States of America and settling upon our "rich lands" in the North-West.

The necessary conditions are lacking for an equitable scheme of fiscal reciprocity between Canada and the Utified States. We both want the same thing, so it would be impracticable to arrange a swap.

BANK BUILDINGS.

Thy number of buildings erected and commenced within the last few years in this and other cities in Canada to be used by banks for their own business and in part to be let for offices exceeds those built for these purposes in former years.

In Gilbart's well known, but somewhat out-of-date work on banking, he commends the practice of a bank's occupying a prominent structure, as it helps to give prestige to the institution and an assurance of its stability and permanence. There is much sound sense in this remark, as there is in other portions of that excellent treatise

When Gilbart wrote and for many years afterwards, however, it was customary for banks to erect only such buildings as were needed for their own business, including house accommodation for the manager, or some prominent official.

In recent years, in the larger cities, the provision of a manager's residence in connection with the bank office has been abandoned, but the arrangement still is observed in some smaller towns. In some of these com-

posite buildings, cases of which could be referred to in Canada, and many in England, the manager was compelled to occupy a residence wholly unsuitable for an officer on a moderate salary. One we have in view had a drawing-room and dining-room capable of holding three or four times as large as any gathering ever likely to be entertained by the tenant-manager, with other rooms on the same scale of excessive amplitude, large enough indeed for a man of large means and large family. Instead of such a house rent free being a saving it was a greater expense than the ordinary rent of a suitable residence.

Owing to land being so costly in the larger cities and towns, bank began a few years ago to erect office premises, or enlarge existing ones, so as to provide offices for renting in storeys above their own offices. This is new so general a custom that, with an exception, all the new buildings erected for banks in this city and other cities have several flats devoted to offices rented to independent tenants. The in-urance companies have fellowed their example, so that we have a large number of very handsome structures owned by banks, of which they, the proprietors, only occupy the ground floor, rarely a few rooms overhead.

This change has caused a number of banks to become owners of real estate for renting, a practice which is quite at variance with earlier ideas as to the uses to which a bank may put its resources. Since 1884 the Bank Premises item in the monthly returns has risen from \$8.184,000 to \$10,336,000.

As a rule, the large section of a bank building devoted to rented offices does not return as good interest on the money invested as do high-class securities. All who know anything of office property admit, that the owner rarely realizes a net return of 3 per cent.; indeed, it is not an uncommon experience for the rented part of a large office building to yield only $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., or less. It is no secret that one of the largest office-buildings in Canada, which was expected to pay interest on the mortgage, which was at an unusually low rate, and leave a margin towards paying off the principal, fell so far short of this expectation as to bring very considerable trouble to the public body by which it was owned.

Another office-building could be named which, expected to pay, at least, the ordinary rate of a good mortgage, fell fully one (1) per cent, below this, so that the investment did not net as high a rate as could have been reaped from municipal, or government, or railway bonds. This, too, without any allowance being made for depreciation and cost of collecting rents.

When the proprietor of a composite building occupies a section for his own business he is apt to forget what he would be obliged to remember if he were merely a tenant, for being his own landlord, he spends money far more freely in the portion in his own occupancy than he could get any independent landlord to do. Those who occupy their own house know only too well what this means, for it often involves them in outlays that offset the saving of rent.

It becomes, then, a question how far it is wise for banks to erect extensive office buildings for renting purposes in competition with the capital of private persons who go into that form of investment. It would be prudent for banks that have this class of property to lay aside a liberal sum towards building up a depreciation fund, or, to charge yearly on the gross profits a percentage to cover depreciation and all the costs of renewals, repairs, &c., which are so generally underestimated.

It must be admitted that some banks office property considerably exceeds in value the amount set down in their statements. In such cases the rental charges they are practically under are very small indeed, and a large angin is left for depreciation.

That the leading banks in Canada have already, or are soon to have magnificent office premises in this city which add much to the architectural adornment of our principal business thoroughfares is a tribute to the metre olitan rank of Montreal. Still, as investments, it is doubtful whether they yield a satisfactory return. But the country is steadily advancing in presperity, and it is probable that within a few years these great structures may not be found excessive.

BELLIGERENTS IN THE EAST--(2).

As for Russia's gold standard, it is in no danger yet, because most of the expenses of the campaign are being paid in silver and paper. It is not the cost of the war at the present stage of hostilities therefore which could imperil the metallic standard, but a serious disturbance of the balance of trade; and of that there is at present no likelihood. Last year Russia's exports exceeded her imports by nearly \$200,000,000, thanks to causes which are largely artificial. That balnice to the good enables her to buy gold in the open market which she then hoards as unproductively as the French peasant hoarded his savings some sixty years Having issued a loan the interest is paid upon it by wheat which the peasant is forced to sell to the exporter. For after the ingathering of the harvest his axes must be paid, and the low railway and river freights act as a steep incline down which the cereals roll onward to the sea ports. Therefore it is only when Russia's exports become less than her imports, as might perhaps happen were the peasant well fed, or else after the war has gone on for a considerable time longer, that any outward signs of financial exhaustion can become visible. Economic exhaustion is manifest enough, but it has no immediate effect upon the Treasury. If it is acting, as some maintain, like a poison, its operation is slow, too slow perhaps to affect the course of the present war, which will not go on forever. Few people seriously believe that hostilities can be carried on longer than for another eighteen months at the very most, and the majority assume that peace will be concluded much sooner. And in either of these alternatives, Russia will be able to meet all demands upon her purse. If the unexpected were to happen and the struggle were to be be protracted, say for another two years, then even the finances of the Csardom would not stand the strain, and the gold itself would probably give place to a debased paper currency. But what, people ask, would have meanwhile befallen Japan?

That the entire financial and economic system of Rus-

sia stands in need of re-organisation is admitted on all The burdens on land and on labour, the incidence of taxation, the drawing off of the resources of the centre to the extremities of the Empire, where they are spent in unprofitable enterprises, and even the fundamental aims of her fiscal policy call for revision and reform. But the fruits of the wasteful methods of the past and present will in any case mature in the near future. No reform, however radical, or timely, can arrest their development. All loans, for instance, seem to be issued in conformity with the principle that the present generation has a right to live at the cost of the future, and that the present generation means chiefly the State. Hence the expenses of to-day are the burdens of to-morrow. The last issue of treasury bonds for 150.000,000 roubles is a case in point. The Minister of Finance might have contracted a foreign loan without serious difficulty. The rate of interest would perhaps have been higher than the Government cared to pay and the other terms correspondingly distasteful. But drawbacks of that kind are more than outweighed by the advantages which a loan raised abroad offers over a loan fleated at home, and it was in any case open to the Government to reserve its right to pay back the capital or effect a conversion within a very few years. As money is scarce in Russia and trade and industry are consequently slack, to withdraw part of such capital as is still available for home enterprise seems contrary to the principles of cautious finance. That there is no demand at present for investments in Russia is shown by the fall in the prices of government stock and by the fact that the savings banks figure among the subscribers to the new loan, although it brings in only 3.6 per cent., which is about what the bank itself pays to depositors. What makes the measure stranger still are the circumstances that the Government, according to own showing, has no immediate need of money and can according to all present indications obtain all the funds it will need for next year's campaign by the loan to be floated in Germany before next spring.

These analogous short-sighted measures are all sins which will be visited on the children even unto the third and fourth generation. But on the course of the war they will have no effect whatever, unless the campaign be protracted beyond January, 1906. Whatever therefore the real expenses occasioned by the struggle may be, and they are certainly in excess of the actual outlay, Russia will readily find the wherewithal to pay them. Financial exhaustion therefore is not likely to change the present warlike temper of the Russian Government, and if the Japanese put their trust in that they are leaning on a broken reed.

We have availed ourselves here of a very impartial paper in the Contemporary Review for October from the pen of Dr. E. J. Dillon, who does not allow his sympathies to run away with his judgment.

-London Clearing House--Total clearings for week ending December 1, 1904, \$906,334.

Mr. Thomas Wagner, manufacturer of boots and shoes, Quebec, has assigned. Assets \$29,178 and liabilities \$46,370. The former consist s of stock-in-trade, \$9,649; machinery, \$9,780; factory, \$6,000; private residence, \$1,500. The principal creditors are in Quebec.

THE BANK OF MONTREAL MEETING.

The 87th annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal was held on the 5th inst., when the Vice-President, Sir George A. Drummond, took the chair. The attendance of shareholders was small, as is usually the case when a bank is known to be moving along prosperous lires.

Those present who exchanged views all expressed great satisfaction at the statement that had been issued. The magnificence of the new offices was commented upon and pride expressed that when complete the Bank of Montreal will have one of, if now the most beautiful and imposing banking rooms in the world.

The net profits last year were \$1,609,207, out of which \$1.400,000 was distributed in two 5 per cent. dividends. There was \$583,196 carried forward of undistributed

profits to next year.

The falling off in profits, though quite insignificant, was discussed by both Mr. E. S. Clouston, General Manager, and Vice-President Drummond. The former laid stress upon the low rates ruling for money in centres where their reserves were utilized, while the latter spoke of the greater competition prevailing which reduced the business revenue. All the banks are finding that banking is amenable to the same laws as other forms of business, over supply leading to reduced prices and profits.

Mr. Clouston spoke of lumber and dairying as having teen depressed but trade generally prosperous. One portion of his address we prefer to give in his own words, as follows:

"The trade of the past year, both domestic and foreign, has been well maintained. Domestic trade shows ·a slight increase, while foreign trade, omitting specie, reached a value of \$454,642,000, as compared with \$450,040,000 in 1903. One feature of foreign trade may be noted. Exports of domestic products declined in value \$16,000,000, while imports for consumption rese \$18,776,000, making a loss in balance of trade of nearly \$35,000,000 from the preceding year. In the seven year period, 1896-1902, inclusive, the very exceptional condition existed of an excess of domestic exports sover imports for consumption, the actual balance in fayour of Canada in this period having been \$1,428,000; but in the last two years the condition has changed, and since 1902 imports have outrun domestic exports by \$55,600,000. In itself this excess may be of small concern. It has probably been much more than overcome by the introduction of capital brought by an increasing volume of immigration, by investments of foreign capital, largely from the United States, in our virgin lands, water powers, forests, and in many other Yet the fact remains that considered alone, the foreign trade balance has turned against us, and to this cause the somewhat less abounding activity of domestic trade may, perhaps, be traced."

The increase of imports was probably caused by the prospect of the Grand Trunk Pacific being built, which was and is expected to cause quite a boom in trade. This was the case when the railways and canals were in progress and out of this came considerable trouble when a reaction came after they were completed.

Mr. Clouston's whole address was, however, quite op-

timistic; he thought Canada was entering upon an era of great prosperity.

Vice-President Drummond alluded to the handsome and commodious premises occupied by the bank, work on which was near completion. He urged more expedition being shown in pushing on the harbour improvements and regarded the ice-breaking steamers as entering upon an interesting experiment, which will be watched with an interest commensurate with its importance to the country.

The annual meeting closed with a few remarks from a shareholder and the usual votes of thanks and election of directors. In a later part of this issue the above meeting is reported in full and a statement given which shows the Bank of Montreal to hold a splendidly leading position amongst the banks of Canada, and to be high in rank amongst the world's great banks.

HOLIDAY TRADE.

The show-windows of the large retail stores in Montreal have taken on a Holiday attire and passers-by are seldom in too great a hurry to pause for a brief glance at the latest creations in all that go to make up the choicest articles to be sought out a little later as Holiday presents. No better advertisement could be given a prominent retail establishment than the placing in the windows of that which attracts, for all who notice will recall the particular store, and, as a consequence, that place of business is remembered and spoken of in a favorable light.

This is the season when the village storekeeper is needed most behind his own counter, for the reason that it is the late settling time of the year, when customers who come to square up their accounts require a little more personal attention than those who make it an aim to pay as soon as money is received. Consequently the ideas that prevail in the large centres of trade are less likely to be noticed during the present month by those living at a distance, than at any other time of year.

An early awakening to the full importance of the Holiday trade is of pressing necessity to all retail storekeepers, no matter how far removed they may be from what they might term transient or passing trade. village storekeeper doing business with a regular run of customers the year round is quite apt to overlook the fact that the approaching holidays mean anything more for him than some extra handling of dried fruit, spices, and a few other seasonable goods such as the festive season calls for, This should not be allowed. Times have changed from what they were when many a country merchant now in business greeted his New Year's customers for the first time. The clearest argument for this is seen in the way large city stores are reaching out for country trade, as it is likewise seen in the facilities now offered many people far out in the country for reaching the cities both cheaply and speedily. telephone, the electric railway service, the bicycle, the doing away with annoying and costly toll roads, the introduction of the country daily into farm homes, and the comparatively high cash prices obtained for all farm products in the city markets, have each and all influenced the cu

But, on the other hand, if the village merchant had no advantages to offset these it might naturally be inferred that the city stores would shortly draw away the greater portion of the trade. Yet such is not proving the case. The same changes which the general adcancement of the country brought about have resulted profitably for the village storekeeper as for his cus-Better roads and reduced expenses are alike 10 his advantage and, through being a regular visitor to the city, he is in a better position to secure the highest each price for the produce he receives in exchange for his goods. In this way he is placed in a position where he can offer highest city market prices for most farm products, saving the customer the expense, and time of driving to town direct. Then comes the main point, on which the country merchant can always win out, providing he is alert and understands the value of strewd, careful buying and has the necessary experi-The net profits of any line of business are largely controlled by the fixed expenses. These expenses are really nothing to the country dealer as compared with the city merchant. Therefore, a village storekeeper who buys carefully and whose credit is good can undersell the city dealer on an average of eight times in ten and come out with a larger proportion of net profit. The city dealer is compelled to exact a good rpofit on seven-eighths of his sales or lose money.

At the time when most money is circulating in the country and more particularly during the coming weeks when all are expected to be more free in purchasing, country storekeepers should use every possible endeayour in making their places of business invitingly attractive. No merchant has as good an opinion of the appearance of his store-providing it is kept tolerably well arranged—as those who visit it occasionally. It is for this reason that a little alteration here and there is more noticeable to customers than to the owner; and for this reason, also, that every endeavour should be made during the present month by country storekeepers to make their stores as much like the appealing bargain emporiums in the cities as possible. No dealer in the cities has a better chance to display his wares to advantage and, as a consequence, no square foot of available space should be permitted to be wasted during the month of December.

On entering a store about the Holiday times few persons know how much they are going to purchase. That depends very largely upon the attractions displayed there. Everything suggestive of a holiday purchase should now be shown conspicuously in the store and price tickets plainly attached. These tickets serve as salespeople during December because while customers are waiting to be served they are deciding for themselves, provided taste and attractiveness are apparent. Give the store a generally holiday appearance, both inside and out, and the extra labour will be repaid, not only by increased sales for the time but by a better impression created in the minds of all in the vicinity.

Every extra dollar taken in as profit during the holiday season will be that much extra working cash capital in the interests of the business so long as the store contiues. Then brighten up the store, make the goods appeal to the public, and note results.

THE NOVEMBER FIRE LOSS.

The fire loss of the United States and Canada for November, as compiled from the New York Journal of Commerce, shows a total of \$11,515,000. This is about \$2,000,000 less than the sum chargeable against the same month of last year, but about \$1,000,000 more than the figures of November, 1902. The following table shows the entire years 1902 and 1903, and also the first eleven months of 1904:

It will be seen that even were the Baltimore and Toronto fires deducted the 1904 aggregate would still heavily exceed that for 1903, but, notwithstanding the serious drain on underwriting capital, quite a number of fire insurance institutions will close the year with as large surpluses as at its beginning, because of a fairly good underwriting experience during the latter balf of 1904, coupled with increases in security values.

THE EASTERN TOWNSHIPS BANK.

This progressive, enterprising and very prosperous bank held its 46th annual meeting on the 7th instant, at Sherbrooke. To the report and statement, to be found on a later page in this issue, we invite attention.

The Eastern Townships has made its mark in this city very rapidly. It was already favourably known to most of the citizens, our trade with the Townships being quite extensive. The sound judgment shown by Mr. Austin, who was placed in charge, and the courteous treatment of customers by the staff soon won a good measure of business and made the Bank a tayourite.

The business last year yielded \$306,968 in profit. The sum of \$22,995 was also received from premiums on new stock. Two half yearly dividends of 4 per cent. each absorbed \$197,393; \$50,000 was added to Reserve Fund, \$40,000 was applied to reduction in value of assets and \$40,000 to reduction of bank premises' account.

The growth of deposits last year raised them to \$9,821,026, and the loans are close upon 11 millions, thus showing an active business that utilized the resources.

During the year Branches have been established at Cookshire, Lake Megantic, Lawrenceville Mansonville, Roxton Falls and Thetford Mines, also Sub-Agencies at Stanstead, Charenceville, Valcourt, and Beloeil, being points in the Townships considered necessary by the management to retain the business they have been so many years in building up. This makes thirty-eight offices altogether now operated by the Bank.

An unfortunate burglary at the West Shefford branch lost the bank \$7,970, which will be a cheap price to pay if it results in such measures being taken by the authorities as will clear out such miscreants who are much too leniently dealt with.

The Eastern Townships owe a large measure of their development and prosperity to the local bank which in branching out into a wider field is achieving very gratifying success.

ATLAS LOAN COMPANY.

All difficulties in the settlement of the affairs of the Atlas Loan Co. were, we learn, removed at the recent meeting. A compromise proposed by the currency debenture-holdrs was ratified by the Mester-in-Ordinary at Toronto. According to this agreement, they are to forego their claim to rank ahead of the depositors. Instead they are to receive 37 cents in the dollar, which will leave about 32 cents in the dollar for the latter creditors. The liquidator announced that a first dividend of 20 cents would be paid to all the creditors before the end of the year.

CANADIAN FAILURES.

Commercial insolvencies in the Dominion of Canada during the month of November, as reported by Dun's, were 99 in number and \$649,757 in amount of defaulted liabilities, which slightly exceeded the 89 failures for \$620,513 in the same month last year, and compare with 89 failures and \$460,984 liabilities in 1902. Manufacturing defaults numbered 25, and involved \$198,484 liabilities, against 20 failures for \$280,494 last year. while trading suspensions amounted to 74 with debts of \$451,-273 as against 67 for \$316,969 a year ago. There was no especial feature in the November statement of failures in Can-No single concern suspended for as much as \$100,000. and the only class with that aggregate was general stores, where 24 firms owed \$106,789. It was an unusually satisfactory month in the Dominion as well as in the United States.

CANADIAN EXHIBIT AT LIVERPOOL.

Arrangements are being made by the exhibition branch of the Department of Agriculture for a Canadian representation at the Colonial Products Exhibition to be held in Liverpool on Jahuary 10th to 19th, 1905. The exhibition is the second of its kind, one having been held in January this year. and was such a success that it was decided to double the period for the coming exhibition. The exhibits for Canada will be chosen from those shown at the recent trade exhibitions at Islington, London. It is possible that some of the Canadian exhibits, at St. Louis, Mo., will be sent to Portland, Oregon, to be shown at the Lewis and Clarke Centennial Exhibition. Preparations are being made for a good Canadian exhibit at the Belgian National Exhibitiion, that opens at Liege in April, Some of the exhibits at the St. Louis Fair will be utilized. The Liege Exhibition will be upon a very attractive scope. comprising some 200 acres.

ELECTRICITY IN WESTMOUNT SUBURB.

Westmount is taking the bull by the horns by undertaking to supply electric light and power to the citizens of that suburb, and probably to other outlying municipalities, possibly even to all whom it may concern in the city of Montreal. It is "a far cry to Loch Awe," but the energetic promoters have sufficient time to make their preparations. Modern improvements have not all been exhausted, and with millions of horsepower pouring down the Laurentian highlands and much more on the other side of the height of land towards Hudson Bay, there need be no scarcity of driving power, and it is needless to say in the electric current the effect of distance is gradually being eliminated. There are many citizens who do not how little their luxurious electric lighting realize costs them; but what they will not forget is the advance in price-or rather the disallowance of the discount-following the purchase of the Lachine Company and works, a year or two ago. There be those who think that in making the then advance in rates the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Co. began "to kill the goose that lays the golden eggs." Economy in production and management would have doubtless proved a wiser alternative.

BUCKINGHAM PROGRESS.

There seems to be something in the air which causes perpetual vigor to pervade certain localities and assist their steady growth under all circumstances. Buckingham, Que., seems to be thus favored, as will be seen by the following from our correspondent there under date 5th instant:

The improvements accomplished at Buckingham, in the course of the present year should be worth mentioning. The roads, namely, the one leading to the C.P.R. station, at Masson or "Buckingham Junction," about three miles from here, which was in bad condition up to June last, is now one of the best and finest carriage-roads in the province. The cost was \$14,000. The drainage of the streets cost \$40,000. I will enumerate those recently macadamized, and the money paid for same: Main street, \$20,000; Joseph street, \$6,000; Denis street, \$6.000; East street, 3,000; Charles street, \$1,000; Dorchester street, \$2.000; James street, \$2,000, Buildings recently erected, or in course of construction, with the most approximate cost of same are: The town "Market Hall," including scales, \$3,000; Martin's block, \$3,500; Cosgrove's bleck, \$3 000; Bernardin's block, \$4 000; McCallum & Lahai'es, \$25 000; Parker's dwelling house, \$5,000; Souvereign Park hotel, \$10,000; repairs to Marineau's hotel, \$8,000; Mrs. Labelle's dwelling and laundry, \$4,000; total, \$159,500. Hope my next report will show many improvements.

THE GENERAL MANAGER.

The General Manager then spoke as follows:

Referring to the statement laid before you the principal changes as compared with last year are, an increase in the deposits bearing interest of \$13.265,000, in the call loans of \$9,143,000, in the current loans of \$6,699,000, and a decrease in the balance due by our own agencies and other banks outside Canada of \$4,114,000.

There is nothing that calls for any special remark in connection with these amounts, except that in the case of the loans and deposits a certain amount of the increase is of a temporary nature, and will disappear shortly, but there will still be a sufficient amount to show that our business is steadily progressing. The diminution in our profits is largely accounted for by the low rate of interest ruling in the foreign markets, where we have to loan most of the money we desire to hold readily available. I saw a statement the other day, that in New York not in a quarter of a century has money ruled so low as it did a portion of this autumn.

On the whole it may be said that the past year has been a prosperous one for Canada, though there have been special industries which did not participate. Lumber markets have been very disapprointing, and the prices for dairy products

unsatisfactory. Certain industrials have suffered from foreign competition, but on the other hand, some of our important industries are now reviving under more experienced and intelligent management.

The trade of the past year, both domestic and foreign, has been well maintained. Domestic trade shows a slight increase, while foreign trade, omitting specie, reached a value of \$454,642,000, as compared with \$450,040,000 in 1903. One feature of foreign trade may be noted. Exports of domestic products declined in value \$16,000,000, while imports for consumption rose \$18,776,000, making a loss in balance of trade of nearly \$25,000,000 from the preceding year. In the seven year period, 1896-1902, inclusive, the very exceptional condition existed of an excess of domestic exports over imports for consumption, the actual balance in favor of Canada in this period having been \$1,428,000; but in the last two years the condition has changed, and since 1902 imports have outrun domestic exports by \$55,000,000. In itself this may be of small concern. It has probably been much more than overcome by the introduction of capital brought by an increasing volume of immigration, by investments of foreign capital, largely from the United States, in our virgin lands, water powers, forests, and in many other ways. fact remains that considered alone, the foreign trade balance has turned against us, and to this cause the somewhat less alounding activity of domestic trade may perhaps, be traced. In the two months of the current fiscal year, for which returns are available, July and August, domestic exports were less in volume by \$4,200,000, than in the corresponding period last year and imports for consumption show a decline of about \$530,000.

Taking a broad view of Canadian commerce, the future is bright with promise. Our population is fed now by an immigration of upwards of 100,000 people annually, and the stream appears to be well turned towards Canada. Production in the Northwest grows apace, the railways are prosperous, a second transcontinental line is on the eve of construction, the reports from the mining districts of British Columbia are more encouraging, a spirit of abiding confidence in Canada pervades our people; and despite temporary checks in the progress of material developments, there is increasing belief that this country has entered upon an era of great and enduring prosperity.

VICE-PRESIDENT'S REMARKS.

The Vice-President, in moving the adoption of the Directors' report, said:

The statements submitted by the General Manager and in the Directors' report so fully place before you the position of the Bank that it is unnecessary I should trespass on your patience for more than a few moments with some general remarks.

The handsome and commodious premises in which we are now assembled, and which are now close to completion, have, I am sure, met with your approval as furnishing a worthy and convenient home for the headquarters of the Bank for many years to come.

The General Manager has referred to one cause of diminished profits, to which may be added the fact that to earn dividends now a days a much larger volume of business must be done, though that is only another way of stating the great reduction in the rates for money, and in the charge for banking services which has been going on.

I may again draw your attention to the fact that in 1847, when the Bank first occupied the premises on this side, its total assets amounted to \$7,110,000, and this year they reach \$131.160.000.

In reviewing the general condition of the country, it may be noted that the Stock Exchange, reflecting as it does the views of investors, has apparently entered on a period of revival; securities have now a higher range of value, and confidence in the lasting character of this improvement appears to be spreading.

It is evident that any marked increase in immigration, or in the production of cereals, must come from the Northwest. We have there an immense territory, of which the area stated in figures conveys no adequate idea; but taking only that portion to the south of the fifty-fifth parallel of latitude, which, as you know, passes through the north of England, the Government expert estimates that the portion "suitable for cultiva-

ration, or lorthwest. rea stated only that ide, which, ie Governor cultivation," in Manitoba, Assiniboia, Saskatchewan and Alberta, that is from Manitoba to the mountains, reaches an extent considerably exceeding the total area of the Empire of Germany, while referring to the much larger extent to the north of the fifty-fifth parallel, he says: "What proportion of these vast districts will be capable of the profitable growing of crops is as yet a matter of conjecture."

You are all aware, of course, that the isothermal lines do not necessarily coincide with the parallels of latitude, and these latter only approximately denote the climate, but the fact of the production of the finest qualities of wheat in our territory, as above defined is established beyond question. You will be able to form some estimate of the possibilities of the future, when I add that as yet less than 4 per cent. of this land has been brought under crop. It is worthy of note also, that the yield per acre in Manitoba, and the Territories exceeds that of every one of the North-Western States of the American Union, Montana alone excepted.

Striking proofs of progress in this part of the Dominion are everywhere visible. The population of Manitoba and the Territories, which in 1901 was 422,000, became in 1904 870,000.

The homestead entries, which in 1901 numbered 8,157, and represented 1,305,120 acres taken up for cultivation, had, in 1904, reached the number of 31,383 and covered an acreage of 5,021,291; and to this may be added land sold for settlement by companies, bringing the total up to 9,387,501 acres.

The number of immigrants, which ten years ago, in 1895, was 25,788, and for years made little progress over this figure, last year reached 130,329, and is believed during the present year to have largely exceeded that number; but statistics are not yet attainable.

While the evidences of progress are, as already said, most marked in our western territories, the rest of the Dominion has not been standing still. One feature is noteworthy the number of new manufacturing enterprises springing up all over the country; some of them are essentially Canadian, others are branches of important American industries. It is impossible to give data, even approximately correct, of their extent, or number, but I hold in my hand a list of over thirty in Ontario and Quebec, and may say that for three only in this city and neighborhood, sites have been secured averaging about fifty acres each.

OLDER PROVINCES.

Of trade in general, I submit the following brief summary. which, taken in conjunction with the remarks of the General Manager, may be useful:

DRY GOODS.—A fairly good year's business, the woollen industry somewhat better, collections good.

LUMBER-Not so good; the production this year will be reduced, and better prices expected.

PROVISIONS—The export of bacon shows large increase, and considerable quantity of provisions is going to South Africa.

LIVE STOCK—Exports show large decline, prices of cattle being very low.

LEATHER—Good year's busines at fair prices.

BOOTS AND SHOES—A very unsatisfactory year, consequent on labour troubles and high prices of materials.

GROCERIES—Business reported good and fairly profitable; the farmers reported prosperous everywhere.

DAIRY PRODUCE — Cheese has been disappointing, but butter has been satisfactory; upon the whole fairly good. The grain trade of the port shows a marked falling off.

The hay crop of this province has been exceptionally good, and exports fetched remunerative prices.

IRON AND HARDWARE—Not so good as last year, which was phenomenal.

The construction of another line of railway across the continent, about to be undertaken for the Grand Trunk Railway Company, is an event of the first importance.

TRADE OF THE PORT.

The steamship lines have suffered from various causes, the reaction due to the close of the South African war, and the keen competition in rates inaugurated by the continental lines, which largely reduced earnings. This warfare is believed to be over.

The import trade and the passenger business to this port have been up to the average in volume.

The exports of grain and timber show a reduction of onethird to one-half.

The inland craft coming to this port show a heavy decline. Ship-owners, however, look for better trade next season.

It ought to be noted that importers complain that considering higher freights and insurance and port charges in the St. Lawrence, as compared with Atlantic ports, there is little inducement to bring goods this way.

The prompt completion of the long-talked-about harbour improvements, with modern facilities for handling goods, the reform of the pilotage and improvement of lighting, are urgently called for, if the advantages due to our geographical position are to yield their due results. In this connection, a point of interest is the announcement of the construction of one or more ice-breaking steamers. About these comparative ly little is known, but any experiment bearing on the pro.ongation of the season of navigation if seriously entered on, will be watched with an interest commensurate with its importance to the country.

The continuance of the sanguinary struggle in the Far East is, of course, a menace to the general prosperity, but as regards our own country, surveying the whole field, I can see no reason to doubt that, given normal conditions and favorable weather, we are about to enter on a prosperous year.

This was seconded by Mr. R. G. Reid, and was unanimously carried, the General Manager acknowledging the same.

Mr. Angus W. Hooper moved, seconded by Mr. James Skeoch:

"That the ballot now open for the election of directors, be kept open until 2 o'clock, unless fifteen minutes elapse without a vote being cast, when it shall be closed, and until that time, and for that purpose only, this meeting be continued."

This was unanimously concurred in.

The ballot resulted in the election of the following directors: R. B. Angus, Hon. Sir George Drummond, K.C.M.G.; Edward B. Greenshields, Sir William C. Macdonald, Hon. Robert Mackay, Alexander T. Paterson, Robert G. Reid James Ross, The Right Hon. Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, G.C.M.G.

Lord Strathcona was re-elected president, and Sir George A. Drummond vice-president, at a subsequent meeting of the newly elected directors of the Bank of Montreal, on Tuesday afternoon.

THE EASTERN TOWNSHIPS BANK.

The forty-sixth annual meeting of the shareholders of the Eastern Townships Bank was held in the board room of the bank at Sherbrooke at 2 o'clock on Wednesday, December 7. There were present a good number of shareholders. The president took the chair, and the general manager acted as secretary. Mr. C. W. Cate and Mr. C. H. Mansur were appointed scrutineers of votes.

DIRECTORS' REPORT.

15th November, 1904.

The Directors beg to submit the forty-sixth Annual Report, with usual Balance Sheet and Statement showing results of operations for year ending fifteenth November past.

The net profit, after making provision for cost of management, interest to depositors, and current losses,—including \$7,970.20 by burglary at West Shefford Branch in October last—amounts to \$306,968.57, or exceeding 12 per cent., adding the premium from payment of new shares, and balance of profit brought forward in November last, gives a balance available of \$357.611.14. From this amount the Directors, in a revaluation of the assets have considered it expedient to take \$40,000 in reduction thereof; and they have applied \$40,000 in reduction of bank premises, safes, and furniture account. Payment of two semi-annual dividends in July last and January next, at the rate of eight per cent. per annum, were provided for and \$50,000 added to Reserve Fund, leaving a balance of \$30,217.74 to carry forward.

Business throughout the year at all the offices has been satisfactory, and the outlook for the future is very good.

During the year Branches have been established at Cookshire, Lake Megantic Lawrenceville, Mansonville, Roxton Falls, and Thetford Mines, also Sub-Agencies at Stanstead, Clarenceville, Valcourt, and Beloeil, being points in the Townships considered necessary by the management to retain the business we have been so many years in building up. This makes thirty-eight offices altogether now operated by the Bank.

Deposits have increased during the year by \$1,242,977, now standing at \$9,821,026, and Loans stand at nearly eleven million dollars. All the offices have been duly inspected during the year, as usual.

The burglary at West Shefford while not serious in amount, is regrettable, as it is the first since the Bank commenced business in 1859, and breaks the record.

In conclusion, the Directors desire to record their appreciation of the zealous and faithful manner in which all the officers of the Bank have performed their duties, and in recognition the Directors have granted them a bonus.

HARDWARE ASSOCIATION ELECTS OFFICERS.

The Montreal Metal and Hardware Association of the board of Trade held its annual meeting on Wednesday. The following were elected for the ensuing year: President, Mr. Geo. Caverhill; vice-president, Mr. G. A. Kohl; treasurer, Mr. A. Brown. Directors—Messrs. Fred. Bacon, H. J. Fuller, W. S. Leslie, and Thomas L. Paton. Mr. Caverhill was unanimously chosen for re-election to the council of the Board of Trade as the Association's representative.

BUSINESS DIFFICULTIES.

The wholesale millinery trade has been of a nature during recent years which, it would seem, should afford financial protection to those having their capital invested in it. The country has been generally prosperous, and good or bad times show more readily on the millinery trade than in many others. However, all do not appear to have prospered.

T. S. Beilby & Co. wholesale, millinery, Ottawa, have assigned. A meeting of creditors will be held on the 15th instant. Matters have not been running too smoothly of late and one or two judgments have been secured. The firm was criginally composed of Thos. S. Beilby Henry J. Sims, and Peter J. O'Donahoe, who each contributed \$2,500. Mr. Beilby was formerly for several years traveller for a Montreal wholesale millinery firm. O'Donahoe, a resident of New York, was a special partner of Sims' in the hat business.

Adelard Bergeron, grocer, Iberville, Que., has assigned. He commenced in August, 1890, as partner with a brother, under the style of J. & A. Bergeron, as dealers in groceries, crockery, hardware, etc. In March, 1902, a statement prepared showed assets of \$5 400 and liabilities of \$4,400. Present debts are not large.

At Yarmouth, N.S., C. R. Stoneman, dealer in pianos and sewing machines, has been forced to assign. Recently, finding his affairs not any too smooth he prepared a statement for his creditors, which soon showed them that what he said was so. On Nov. 19 last, he offered to pay 20 cents in the dollar by way of settlement. Liabilities are estimated at \$9,445, and assets \$1,700.

At Laurier, Que., Edward Martin, grocer, in a small way for less than a year, has assigned. He began with the experience of the logging camp and the amount able to be saved from such a vocation. Liabilities, \$1,000; assets \$800.

The assignee has possession of the affairs of the Wightman Storting Goods Co., Montreal. A. E. Wightman, sole owner since July, 1900, was at one time of the firm of Wightman, Ramsay & Co., who dissolved in 1890, when the present owner started on his own account. He failed in May, 1894, with liabilities of \$6,000 and assets of over \$4.000. His father-in-law bought the stock at auction at 32c in the dollar cash, and turned it over to Mrs. Wightman. The husband finally got possession again and now shows debts of about \$1,200.

MONTREAL INSTALMENT COMPANY GOES UNDER.

Myers Sanft and Bernard Finkelstein, began as partners a couple of years ago, under the above title. Instalment selling in dry goods, furniture, silverware, etc., has its attractions for many, who desire goods but haven't the price in their possession. At all events 'tis the owners who are now supposed to be wanting. They show liabilities of nearly \$20,000.—Dora Mendel, who carried on a hat and fur business in Montreal for some time has also assigned, with liabilities of about \$17,000.

FINANCIAL.

Montreal, Thursday, December 8, 1904.

The reports of the Bank of Montreal and the Eastern Townships Eank, occupy a considerable amount of our space this week, and will have widespread attention. They are each excellent as a bank statement both evidencing a large expansion of business and a satisfactory result in profits.

A flutter in political circles has been caused by reports of an effort having been made by a number of American capitalists to get control of the financing of the Grand Trunk Pacific much as was done, or tried to be done by Americans with the Canadian Pacific. There is too much reason to fear that there is far too close a connection usually existing between governments and contractors and the financiers who provide the capital for railways. The Americans who wanted to have a finger in the G.T.P. pie were well aware that if their scheme succeeded they would control the cook who put that pie together, and would see it well filled with very dainty morsels. It seems as though an American firm had obtained some portion of this business, which is a highly profitable one. It is open to question whether, when a large amount of bonds have to be floated in which the Government is interested, it would not be advisable for the Government to undertake the work of floating the bonds direct, for which work it is well equipped, and so save many scores of thousands of dollars that now go into the pockets of middlemen who are really not needed, and who earn their commission too easily.

A slump in copper stocks has disturbed the market all round in the most unreasonable manner. What has a boom and slump in copper stocks got to do with the value of the Canadian Pacific and other stocks dealt in on this market?

The season for lobsters will open on the 15th, supplies coming from the Maritime Provinces. During the past five months, dealers have had to procure their supplies from Portland and other U.S. markets. GROCERIES.—The decline of 5c in sugar (in barrels) noted in last issue has been sustained in this market despite higher cables on raw. Molasses steady at 28c in puncheons. Rice unchanged. Valencia raisins fine off stalk are worth to-day 4c to 5½c: selected, 5½c to 6½c; 4 cr., Valencia layers, 5 1-2c to 7½c. For Cal. muscatels the market is very firm, 2 cr. are worth 5¾c to 6c lb.; 3 cr., 6½c to 7c. No. 4 cr. on the market. Lemon peel is worth 8½c to 9½c lb.; citron peel, 12½c to 13½; and orange peel, 9c to 10c lb. Good trade in groceries. Collections are better than usual, but because there is more attention than usual paid to them. Very few failures.

HARDWARE AND METALS—Bar iron is slightly higher at \$1.80 per 100 lbs. Trade is quiet as usual at closing of the year. New York pig iron certificates were quoted Wednesday at:

New York reports: Oak and Butts—There is a continued good movement of oak backs on contracts and for prompt delivery, and the market is firm, but without quotable change, firsts being held at 36c. Texas sides are firmer with sales at 30c for X and 29c for A. Belting butts are in good demand and firm on the former basis of 29c to 30c for No. 1 light.

O.LS. CHEMICALS, ETC.—Turpentine is 1c lower at 77c. Lin-eed oils unchanged at 43c to 48c, as to kind and quantity. Stock-taking is now in order and with travellers off the road little movement is expected. White lead unchanged.

PROVISIONS.-Fresh killed hogs have advanced in price since last report, but cured meats show little, if any, change. Trade is inclined to be quiet. Abattoir dressed hogs sell at \$7 to \$7.25 per 100 lbs. and country killed at \$6 to \$8.75. 





THE SALESMAN.

On this timely subject the well known miller, F. A. Voigt, of Grand Rapids, Mich., distilled some thoughts out of his milling experience and presented them in a paper at the recent meeting of the Michigan State Millers' Association in part as follows: To-day there are many thousands of travelling salesmen in the United States. And these salesmen make their regular trips, calling at a certain time on a certain day in the week. Formerly it was necessary for the salesman to familiarize himself with the clerks, to extol his wares as high as possible regardless of the truth-any way to sell the goods. Now this certainly was not the ideal salesman. Another kind of man on the road thought it was necessarv to be congenial in the way of treating his customers to liquids. Frequently he would run across a teetotaler or a strong temperance man, and his usefulness as to selling that man would be over. Neither was he an ideal. Again, some salesmen who were fair, would have a tendency to get off worn-out jokes and a dealer soon tires of them. Then some have the faculty of selling

or forcing goods on customers; that is done once, possibly twice. I can talk from experience. I had a voung man who was a good salesman, but he did not wear. At first he sold goods very satisfactorily; but his sales began to drop off. I made quiet inquiries and found he urged the dealers to give orders altogther beyond their requirements, which made them very shy of him. Later his yarns got stale and he came in and reported sales very dull; no one wanted goods. As it was a time when our goods needed moving I thought a change would be advantageous; I accordingly let another gentleman take a trip, a man who had never been on the road and did not pass himself off as a salesman but was of good address and a fluent talker. To my great surprise he sent orders for over 1,500 barrels the first week, and besides this there were no charges for entertaining the trade; this he cut out entirely. I asked him how he did it, and he said, I don't drink or smoke and there is no necessity for that kind of work. Here was where the ideal salesman came in. It is not necessary to state I employed him and the former was out of a job.

However, these matters are all changed to-day; dealers are all acquainted with their wants and know what they want. They don't want a salesman to come along and talk any nonsense, such as horse-racing, baseball or politics. Politics should be avoided in a salesman's business career unless he is sure of his ground; that is, a republican should not try to talk politics to a democrat or vice versa, as it will egenerally end very unsatisfactorily. I think politics should be entirely eliminated in a salesman's

The ideal salesman, first of all, should be a gentleman in every respect, use good language, and know enough not to be too lavish with some and too formal with others. He must study human nature, for what will please one will tire and vex another. He must not extol his goods beyond what they are actually worth. If he has a good article, the customer is quick to find it out and he will have no trouble in selling him again and keep him a steady customer. dealer will wait for him to come around,

We must state one thing right here and that is this: the firm he represents must also do their part, in giving the customers the right goods and prompt delivery; in fact, help him to keep trade. Or the customer will say, "Mr. Jones is all right, a very nice man and a good salesman but the firm he is traveling for is not what he is, and much as I hate to pass him I will have to unless I can get better goods, and more prompt delivery from his house."

Further, the house which has a good man should encourage him. It sometimes happens a man will send in a large order, perhaps double what he usually sells, on Thursday, and on Friday he closes in different odds and ends in the town and sees that everyone is well satisfied. He then receives a letter that his orders for Thursday were very satisfactory but on Friday they were away below. You should work on Friday as well as on Thursday. You must remember that he worked just as diligently on Friday as he did on Thursday. That kind of a letter will discourage most men and they will be looking around for another situation where their work is appreciated. It is well for a house to encourage its men and show that their work is appreciated. They will also inform the house of any shortcomings they have noticed and if they have their employer's interests at heart they will listen to its suggestions. The ideal salesman watches the credit side of his trade; if he finds a customer who is not keeping up his stock well, is keeping irregular hours, or has gone to gaming, the house should be apprized of it at once, so they will know how things stand and shape their business accordingly with that customer.

FIRE INSURANCE DECISIONS.

An insurer which by payment of a loss has become subrogated to a right of action of the insured against a third party must recover thereon, if at all, in the right of the insured alone, and its own declarations or admissions are not admissible against such right. H. C. Judd & Root vs. New York & T. S. S. Co.

Where a policy of insurance is made and accepted upon the express condition that the "entire policy shall be void " " " " if the premium, or any note given therefor, shall have been due and unpaid for thirty days at the time any

loss or damage shall happen to the property insured," there being no waiver of the condition, such policy will immediately be void if the premium or any note given therefor shall not be paid within thirty days after payment thereof is due; and neither demand of payment nor notice of intention to insist on the forfeiture is necessary on the part of the insurer. Insurance Co. vs. French, 30 Ohio 8t. 240, distinguished. Ohio Farmers' Ins. Co. vs. Wilson.

Provisions published as defendant's bylaws on a policy issued by it to plaintiff will, in an action by him on the policy, be considered its by-laws till impeached. Wilson vs. Union Mut. Fire Ins. Co.

A member of a mutual company is presumed to know its by-laws, and is bound by them, they being on the same sheet as a policy issued by it to him, and atbody of the contract. Wilson vs. Union tention being directed to them in the Mut. Fire Ins. Co.



One of the several policies insuring plaintiff's merchandise to the extent of actual loss provided that in case of disagreement as to the amount of loss the same should be ascertained by an appraisement, and that the loss should not be payable, or an action maintained to recover the same, until 60 days after due notice, ascertainment, estimate, and satisfactory proof of loss had been received by the company in accordance with the terms of the policy; that the insured, as often as required, should exhibit to any person designated by the company all that remained of any property described in the policy, and should submit to examinations under oath and produce books of account, etc., and that it should be optional with the company to take all or any part of the articles at such ascertained or appraised value, and to replace the property lost or damaged with other of like kind or quality, at any reasonable time within thirty days after the receipt of proofs of loss or the giving notice of his intention to do so. After loss the property was separated as required, and, the parties failing to agree, insured, after filing, but before receipt of proofs of loss by the insurers, and over their protest, advertised and



SHALL THE MANUFACTURER SELL DIRECT?

Among the more thoughtful observers of the present and prospective condition of the color trade the important question whether the policy of the manufacturer supplying the consumer direct rather than through the intervention of the dealer or factor is or is not a wise one is engaging attention, says the Oil and Colourman's Journal. The question is one that cannot fail to interest many, and it is so many-sided that a hasty generalization is to be deprecated and yet the conditions of the trade as a whole have changed so enormously during the last dozen years, and a little inquiry into the problem may be wise. At one time, the big wholesale manufacturing houses transacted nearly all their business with factors, who were either wholesale dealers or retail dealers, and these latter dealt in turn with the consumer. By degrees the consumer, and especially the large consumer, as exemplified by some of the large firms of decorators and contractors, came to deal direct with the manufacturer. This was brought out by the idea on the part of the consumer that he could obtain better value or better terms by procuring his goods at first hand direct from the maker, and there is no doubt that many manufacturers did not hesitate to foster this view on account of the better prices they could obtain from a consumer than from a dealer.

At first sight the plan appeared to be in favor of the manufacturer, but incidental considerations arose that tended to modify its success. In the first place, it most certainly aroused the opposition of many wholesale dealers who held, not unreasonably, that by acting thus manufacturers were trying to "run with the hare and hunt with the hounds." Then the question of credit had to be taken into consideration. Consumers often wanted long credit, and this fact, along with the multiplying of comparatively small accounts, made the practical results much less remunerative than might have been Commercial expected.
