**THE DEATH KNELL OF THE LAND LEAGUE.**

Archbishop McCreary's Pastoral.

The following is an extract from Archbishop McCreary's pastoral referring to the present crisis in Ireland, and which is looked upon as the death knell of the Land League.

"The condition of our dear country for our bitterest tears. Only a little while ago our city presented scenes of lawlessness which might disgrace an un-Christian rabble. It is true the evil-doers were but a handful of misguided youth, but it is no marvel that evil-doers are in our midst, and that the youthful culprit of today may become the hardened profligate of another day, if society fails in its duty towards the rising generation. We feel ourselves, very reverend fathers, imperatively called on to enter our most fervent protest against another indignity which has been offered to the honor of our people in this city, the centre of Catholic Ireland. Only a few days ago, ever considering men were started from their dreams of security by the publication of a manifesto which at once assailed the moral law of good and struck at the foundation of the social order, as if all other cases which in these times are so threatened, let us confine ourselves to one particular class of the community. There are some who, in the industrial men among us who, trusting to their faith in the public conscience, and calculating on the security which a fairly constituted jury would afford, have given, have invested the fruits of their years of toil and sacrifice in property from which they hoped they and their kindred might draw the means of their subsistence. But all this must be swept away by the breath of a handful of men, the bulk of whom have neither stake nor interest in the country. We disapprove the warning which cautioned us against the danger that lurked in the specious programms pretending to aid us in redressing the wrongs of an oppressed people. But now God's providence has forced from the lips of the unsafe guides an avowal of their aims. And if the notice to pay no rents be not the teachings of Communism, Communism is yet to be defined. Let no one suppose, very reverend fathers, that we have a word to say in the defence of the oppression of the poor. We will feel as keenly as the most outspoken of our brethren inspired by the ministrations of cruel injuries worked by law, and the teachings of tenants of Ireland, but we must not allow our abhorrence of injustice to betray us into repudiation of the claims of justice. If today the landlord's claim to his just rent be questioned, who will guarantee the tenant's right to his day of money and toil? To morrow injustice will require redress, and on the day of retribution the wrong doer will be laughed at when he seeks for sympathy in his troubles. The issue is now mainly put to our people which of two paths they will follow: whether they will follow the men who have marked out that road that must lead to anger with God, and disgrace before the Christian world, or the bishops of Ireland, who, through a glorious and unbroken succession of fourteen centuries, and the leaders of those centuries encountered poverty and exile and death in his most terrible form, for the people with whom their lives are irretrievably bound up."

**CANADA PACIFIC RAILWAY.**

Report of the Progress of the Work—Regular Freight Service to be Commenced in December—Large and Improving Business.

A very satisfactory report of the progress of the Canadian Pacific railway is given in the *Enquirer International*. From that paper it appears that the Canada Pacific is doing considerable work in Winnipeg. One hundred and seven acres of land decided it by the Government is being ballasted. A round house and large buildings for stores are already in course of construction, and extensive shops for the western division of the road will be erected there in the spring. A large temporary depot, formerly used for the Point Douglas, is to be occupied until next season, when a \$70,000 building is to be erected at the point where the track crosses Main street. The construction is progressing vigorously. The seventy odd miles of new track between Portage la Prairie and Brandon have been open to traffic about 20 miles, and the remaining 50 miles are being graded. The grading will be done at least 75 miles farther. On the new line from Winnipeg to Portage la Prairie, which shortens the distance from 72 to 55 miles, grading will be finished this week. Track laying is going on from both ends, and the line will be ready for the running of trains by the end of the month, when the old line will be abandoned between Stoneville and Portage la Prairie, the 22 miles from Winnipeg being left as a short local line.
