Halifax Happenings.

LICENSING BOARD—CENSUS COMMISSIONER—NAVAL ESTABLISHMENT.

Temperance reform has, during the past week or two, had first call in this city. Besides the annual gathering of the N. S. Temperance Alliance and the interviewing of members of the Local Government by representatives of this organization, looking to further amendment of the Liquor laws, the newly constituted License Commission for Halifax City has had to pass judgment upon the License applications presented by the Liquor dealers of the city.

Our Provincial Government seems to it that the more influential schoolmasters suffer no sudden jolt, by obnoxious legislation. However, a few more county victories by the Alliance may cause the ship of state to be put on another tack.

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Canada's Open Door.

This is the second of the series of articles on Reciprocity published from the Canadian Century to which reference was made in our issue of last week.

Canadian Fruit Farmers in Great Peril.

The largest deputation of farmers that ever waited on any Canadian Government was that of the fruit growers of Western Ontario, who went to Ottawa on February 10th to protest against the Reciprocity Agreement.

The case they presented to the Government was a striking one. They showed that if the Reciprocity Agreement was endorsed by the Canadian Parliament and the United States Congress it would reduce the value of every orchard in Ontario and ruin thousands of small fruit farmers.

Why should Canadian farmers lose every vestige of protection for their products while the tariff on manufactured goods remains almost unaltered?

When the farmers of the United States learn that the same Reciprocity Compact that gives their free entrance to the Canadian market gives exactly the same privilege to almost every food-exporting country in the world they will be enraged.

The amount of customs tariff on the various fruits is specifically stated in these pamphlets and literature, and in order that this particular advantage to the Canadian grower may be clearly understood by the British public it is not only set forth in the pamphlets but also set forth in the coins of Great Britain.

Four days after these Ontario fruit growers presented their case to the Government Mr. Martin Burrell, member of Parliament for Vale Caribou, gave the House of Commons a remarkably clear and comprehensive statement of the position of the fruit growers in all the provinces of Canada.

The grain growers of the prairie get his big fat at low cost, sometimes as a free grant; the land is ready for cultivation; the Government subsidizes a railway to take the grain to market.

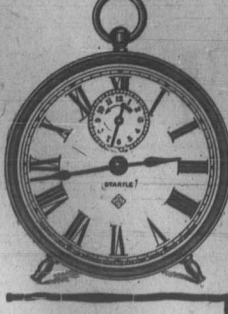

Reciprocity.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN.
Sir,—The great prosperity Canada has enjoyed for the past twenty years is largely the fruit of Sir John A. Macdonald's statesmanship. No other country in the world has prospered as Canada is prospering. The Fielding-Taft reciprocity agreement would place Canada in the position of a dumping market for all surplus farm produce the Americans have to sell; and in a very short time it would place Canada in the same position as she was in at the end of the late Alexander Mackenzie's government, when men, and good men at that, were glad to get fifty and seventy-five cents for a day's work; when, indeed, a great many could get no work at all, and had to pay fifty cents per gallon for coal oil and one dollar for eight and nine pounds of granulated sugar, and five and five cents a pound for tea. The farmers sold their eggs for eight and ten cents per dozen and their butter for ten and twelve cents per pound. Do our farmers want to sell their butter and eggs for that price today? and would our wage-earners like to work for those wages? Compare the prices of farm produce and wages of the present time with the prices under the Macdonald regime.
The United States argument is that the treaty would mean lowering the cost of living. How could it also mean better prices for the farmer? The two arguments don't fit. The fruit-growers are bound to beat hard, even in the Annapolis Valley.
The tariff has not been the cause of our preferring the English to the American market. Ask the largest single shipper of fruit in Nova Scotia how he views the effect of this treaty upon the apple industry, and although he is a Liberal and a firm supporter of the Laurier government, he will tell you, as do the larger majority of the wealthy business men of the Liberal party, that it spells ruin. If the Americans want our apples and potatoes in order to supply their own citizens at a reduced cost to the consumer, why do they not reduce their tariff walls?
The Republicans have had things pretty much their own way in the money-making line ever since their civil war, and are disposed to take full advantage of their power to control the wealth of their nation; and no wise Canadian statesman would ever consent to permit his people to become hewers of wood and drawers of water to these dictating and domineering, selfish millionaires.
A nation of 90,000,000 people, with all modern improvements in machinery, can manufacture many times quicker than our young nation of 5,000,000, therefore, how can we profit when our farm produce is shipped south over American channels, and thus making our own lines practically obsolete, American manufactured goods dumped into our markets, smothering our industries and putting Canadian workmen out of employment.
To aid the development of our own industries and natural resources, we have spent enormous sums of money, supplied almost entirely by the mother country, in building our trade routes, canals, ocean ports, elevators, wharves, besides spending freely in bonusing railways.
The Canadian Pacific Railway is the wonder and admiration of the whole world, and another railway is just approaching completion and we stand committed to an expenditure of twenty five millions for this National Transcontinental.
This has all been for the development and maintenance of our trade east and west and to put the product of our Canadian farms into direct touch with the markets of Liverpool, Bristol and Glasgow. Our Yankee cousins know all this and they feel the present reciprocity movement is the advance of the United States upon our resources.
American cities, American industry, American manufactures, would overshadow our vigorous but younger growth. It means the march of 90,000,000 people against eight, the first stage of economic conquest. The Americans have discovered at last the enormous potential wealth of the Dominion.
We still hope that Sir Wilfrid will in some way stop the deal and save the country. When he learns that the local government at New Scotland, after thirty years of power, has become in great disfavour, and that his Finance Minister made the Washington treaty purely and solely in order to have an election early in the early local election, he will be disposed to call a halt. Fielding is cuter than a cat, and his sole political endeavor now is to save the Murray administration by any possible means, and when that is accomplished he trusts to his cunning to produce an excuse for his cowardly betrayal of the Dominion.
