Editorial Jottings.

Hon. Frank Cochran, former Minister of Railways, died at Ottawa on Monday.

The National Conference on Moral Education in the Schools in Relation to Canada, is to be held at Winnipeg, Oct. 20, 21 and 22. Among the leaders of discussion at the conference will be Rev. Clarence McKinnon and Rev. Dean Lwydy, of Halifax.

A large measure of the remarkable success being achieved by the United States' Food Administration in its drive against the profiteers and price gougers is due to the 'pitiless publicity' which the Government is giving to the operations of every monopolist and hoarder who is detected.

To the present 336 profiteers have been convicted by the Stephen, G. B., food committee and have paid fines amounting to \$20,000, while four have served terms in prison. The newspapers insist that more prison sentences are needed to bring the high price traders to their senses.

The New Chief Assessor.

At a recent special meeting of the Council Mr. J. D. Chambers was appointed Chief Assessor for the town for the present year. This appointment is made about two months later than is provided by law, but it appears to be an instance of the application of the old proverb: Better late than never. Mr. Chambers should be a good man for the position. He is an old resident of Wolfville and is familiar with the most of the properties to be assessed. His business training should make him a good valuator of property and his experience as town Councillor and Mayor make him well versed in the requirements of the office. Mr. Chambers will find the task that he has reluctantly undertaken far from an easy one. The present assessment law is almost an impossibility so far as its requirements are concerned, and the facilities have been increased by many years of faulty operation. However citizens will show their appreciation of an honest effort to make an equitable assessment, and we bespeak for Mr. Chambers and his colleagues the full co-operation of all in their labors of providing an assessment roll that will be fair to all.

Wolfville's First School Fair

Last Friday was a gala day for the school children of the town. In the morning sports were held on the campus and all the events were keenly contested. The list of the prize winners will be found on page one. The attendance at the Exhibition in the rink both afternoon and evening was very good indeed. The exhibits, although not numerous, were all of good quality. We hope to publish a complete list of the prize winners in next week's paper. The exhibition was formally opened in the afternoon by Mayor Hales. Dr. Coit made a few remarks on the starting of the school exhibition and the plans for next year's fair. Prof. Blair, of the Experimental Station, Kentville, was present and gave an excellent address on the value of rural science teaching in the schools. In the evening a concert was given by the Scout band.

Cochran, who was for a time on the staff of the Wolfville Public School, has been appointed Rural Science teacher for Windsor under the Rural Science Department of the Provincial Normal College, Truro. Miss Cochran is a graduate of Macdonald Institute, Guelph, Ontario in Rural Science, and holds a diploma from the Rural Science School of Victoria, B. C. During July and part of August, she took the special course in Rural Science at the Summer School, Truro, so that she now holds a diploma for Nova Scotia. Miss Cochran's duties will be to give instructions in nature work, canning fruits and vegetables and in inspecting school gardens and assisting the teachers in arranging school exhibitions. Miss Cochran was in Wolfville last Friday attending the School Exhibition.

Much interest is being manifested in the proposed Memorial Hospital for Kings county. A more fitting monument in commemoration of our fallen heroes could hardly be devised. We can do nothing to add luster to their names, but can make their memory more fragrant by erecting the proposed memorial. The need of a well equipped up-to-date hospital, centrally located in Kings county, is evident to all. No one can deny the need for just such an institution, so it is a matter of thankfulness that we recognize the strength of the Executive Committee. The members are men accustomed to bring things to pass, so there is little doubt that the time and energy they are so fully giving, will soon find itself expressed in wood and stone. Chute: Resolved that steps be taken toward the erection of a Memorial Hospital in Kings county, that private subscriptions be asked, and that the Country Council be approached in the matter and that in the mean time, the Executive proceed to select site for the same and procure estimate for cost of the erection of the building, and that the amount to be asked for be determined after the estimates are submitted. Kings county is heartily glad this project is afoot, and will no doubt respond liberally when the time comes.

Acadia University Fall Camp. GRAND CONCERT ON MONDAY EVENING.

This novel experiment, here tried for the first time in Canada, is being introduced with the object of giving the college year a proper "kick off," and will henceforth become a permanent feature of the University.

The actual running of the camp is in the hands of the students working under the auspices of the college Y. M. C. A., and here every male college student will, as the guest of that society, be given four days' opportunity to get his wits straightened out after his summer's work, and a chance to "try" new men to line up his college work before the opening of the college year and to become thoroughly familiar with all the tricks of the trade.

The football captain and coach will be on hand, and everything done to get the team in shape. Also the various societies will get under way, courses lined out and the whole student body be ready to start off with a bump at the proper moment.

In view of the exceptionally heavy enrollment at college this year it is felt that this will be an excellent way to minimize the difficulties of opening.

On Monday evening, the 20th, a concert of college and outside talent will be put on in the pavilion at the beach which has a seating capacity of three hundred. Captain Donaldson Home Again.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. John Donaldson, Port Williams, New York Light Opera Singers was the scene of much rejoicing on Monday morning, 16th inst., when their only child, Capt. Ralph W. Donaldson (M. C.), arrived from his long and splendid service overseas. Returning on S.S. "Minnehaha," he was met at his home station by many friends and given a warm and hearty welcome.

Capt. Donaldson left home in Oct., 1914, for Guelph College, Ont., to complete his last year's work for the degree of B. S. A. Having obtained this, he willingly answered the call to service, enlisting as a private in the Princess Pat's (Infantry) 1st Reinforcements, in May, 1916, arriving in France in July of the same year.

In May, 1916, he was wounded in the right arm at Ypres Salient. Upon his recovery in England, he was given his commission, returning to active service in France on Dec. 1st, 1916, as 1st Lieut., 52nd Bait. (Western Canadian), 1st April, 1917, at Vimy Ridge he was mentioned in special despatch and awarded the M. C., the official text being "He made a daring reconnaissance of the enemy's position and brought in valuable information," and invested with the coveted decoration at Buckingham Palace by the King. He was then appointed to the Poison Gas Services in France, later promoted as Gas Officer on the Canadian general staff, later receiving the rank of Captain.

Since his return from Germany with the army of occupation, he has been "carrying on" with the work of demobilization in France and England. During these years he was never once laid aside for illness and thoroughly enjoyed the experience and education gained, though glad now to be home again and ready for active service in his native land.

Now I trust your readers will not regard this criticism as offered without the very best intention, and that my suggestion may at least have some consideration by those controlling the church services of our town.

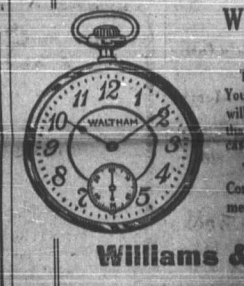

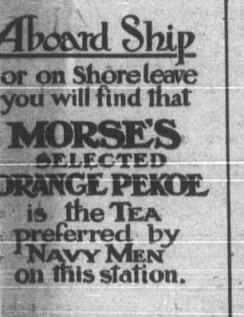

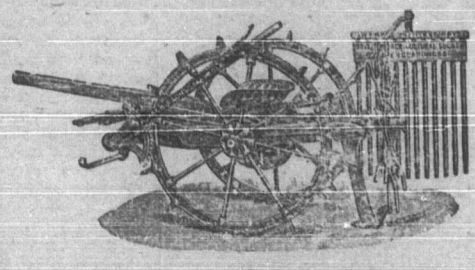

W. C. T. U. Notes.

The Annual Meeting of The National W. C. T. U. In Japan.

The annual meeting of the National W. C. T. U. was held in the Woman's College in Kobe, April 1-4. The convention was one of outstanding merit, business of much importance being transacted, and the sessions conducted with great skill and dignity.

Some 87 delegates answered the roll call. These represented 40 local W. C. T. U. with a membership of 3,000; 16 Y. W. C. T. U. units, membership, 500; and 48 Loyals Temperance Legions with 9,000 members.

The honored, aged president of the society, Madame Yajima, 87 years of age, gave the opening address. Dr. (Mrs.) Fujii being in the chair. The president referred to the opening of the work in Meiji 19 (A. D. 1887) when a few women organized themselves into a society in the Nihon Bashi Church, a very suitable place for the beginning of this important work, Nihon Bashi being the centre of a small Japan.

Madam Yajima felt that in the opening up of Japan there was a work for women to do in reform to make Japan more worthy of her place in the world. The National Society was organized 27 years ago, and affiliated with the World W. C. T. U. Now with the end of the war and peace in sight, there were many problems to be faced. The women of the Orient must be broad in vision and strong in heart. They must set to work to produce the real, not the artificial, which can never really take the place of the real. The president felt that she had lacked in the educational advantages of the girls of today, yet she was grateful that she had been able to accomplish a little, because she had the desire in her heart to help others.

One of the officers of the society stated that she had felt a desire to help the womanhood of her country, so although she had a family, she had studied and secured a diploma in medicine when about 46 years of age. She had many patients and she wanted to make her life and work tell in Christian helpfulness for others.

Great interest was aroused by the report of the Jialkwan (rescue home) in Okubo, Tokyo. Last year there were 24 placed as servants, and some fifteen were baptized. A new bakery had been established and the laundry was prosperous. A gentleman from England, en route to Australia, has taken great interest in the work of the Jialkwan and had collected much money for it. There was now enough in hand to build a hospital; but in addition, a rescue home in Osaka, and an evangelistic building in Asakusa, Tokyo, were most earnestly desired.

There are about 80 girls at present in the home. Knitting, sewing, baking, laundering are taught.

Pocket money is given to those who work. In the laundry, the girls work for about an hour at a time and they consider it fine exercise. They also learn to iron. The treasurer's report showed receipt of yen 3,487 and an outlay of yen 2,734. The Fujin Shimojo and the Shonen Shimojo, the two publications of the society, have a circulation respectively of 2,500 and 8,100.

The 1919 Victory Loan.

Halifax, September—There was no lack of enthusiasm and optimism on the part of the provincial executive and county organizers of the 1919 Victory Loan for Nova Scotia, when they met to consider 'ways and means'. All the counties were represented. Dr. G. S. Campbell, presided, and reviewed the methods to be employed in the campaign which opens October 28. He noted the allotment for Nova Scotia as \$17,145,000, and called for responses from the county chairmen and organizers as to the likelihood of the county allotments being raised. In every case the organizers stated that while conditions were not as satisfactory as in the case of the 1918 Victory Loan, they were prepared to go ahead and do their best to reach the objectives.

The chairman made a point of emphasizing the fact that there was more money in the province than at the time of the previous campaign, and that despite some changed conditions which might make it more difficult to reach the objective, such as the necessity of getting small investors to buy more bonds than they did last year, energy well directed would gain the end. All present pledged themselves in the coming campaign.

At the luncheon, D. Macgillivray, superintendent of the Bank of Commerce, and chairman of the Victory Loan Bankers' committee, explained the necessity of the loan, and emphasized the fact that there was more money in the country by \$300,000,000 than there was at the time of the last Victory Loan. He had no doubt that the Nova Scotia objective could be reached if all would work together with the same energy as in the case of the 1918 loan.

Some time ago the Belgian Government presented Canada with a splendid site at the Menin Gate, Ypres, for the erection of a Canadian Hall of Record as a memorial of Canadians fighting in the Ypres salient. The French Government offered several acres of Vimy Ridge for the same purpose.

It is learned that the Mayor of Vimy has written intimating that while he has been instructed to locate a site for this purpose, he has not yet heard whether the Canadian Government intend to accept the gift of the Belgian Government and is also unaware whether the French offer will be accepted. Unless something is done without delay, these sites may pass under the control of the British Imperial authorities.

Canada's Next Governor General.

It was generally understood that the Earl was to have succeeded H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, but the outbreak of the war prevented this, the Earl going on active service. He married in 1904 Princess Alice of Albany, and has one son and one daughter. His elder brother, formerly the Duke of Teck, is now the Marquis of Cambridge.

What probably was the first use of the aeroplane in the detection and apprehension of criminals has just been reported from Capri, Italy. An Englishman named Green was suspected of running a villa as a baccarat gambling den. After spying round the place, a Naples police inspector secured a hydroplane and made a night flight to the grounds of the villa, where he captured a aristocratic party at play.

C.P.R.'S NEW RECORD

The re-employment of returned soldiers has been carried out by the C.P.R. so quickly that according to the official records up to the end of August, actually more returned soldiers have been given employment than left the Company for service overseas. The exact figures are as follows:

Total reported as joining the Army	10,579
Dead	1,000
Wounded	1,000
Re-employed in the service	2,000
Other soldiers given employment	5,579
Total soldiers given employment to date	10,659

In finding employment for returned soldiers, the C.P.R. has found by experience that in most cases it is advisable to restate them in the same department as in that in which they worked previous to enlistment. The freight handler who has ambitions to become a dining car waiter is not encouraged to change his vocation unless he can prove that he learned something about waiting, for instance, at an Officers' mess during his military life—his military experience has probably made him a better man than before for handling freight but has not qualified him for the skilled trade of a dining car waiter. Passage men who have served in the Army come back as a rule all the better for their experience, but the Army training has not qualified them in being sleeping car conductors or ticket clerks, and if they prove to be misfits at a new job the only result is friction and discontent. The general experience, however, is that the normal returned man who goes back to his old or a similar job is all right, indeed is often improved by the discipline and teamwork which he has learned in the Army.

The policy of the C.P.R. has been to find a position at least as good as the position given up, and this policy has been carried out in the higher ranks of the service as well as in the lower ranks. Thus:

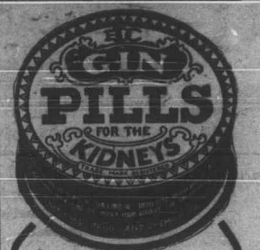

Mr. G. H. Kirkpatrick, who was District Freight Agent at Port Williams, enlisted in June 1915, and returned to duty on March 15th, 1919, as District Freight Agent, at Cleveland.
Mr. W. M. Kirkpatrick, who was Assistant Freight Traffic Manager, at Montreal, and enlisted in September 1915, resumed duty on February 1st, 1919, as Assistant Freight Traffic Manager at Winnipeg.
Mr. T. M. Leask, who was Chief Surgeon at Moose Jaw, enlisted in February 1916, and resumed duty as Chief Medical Officer at Moose Jaw on June 1st, 1919.
Mr. B. H. Macdonald, who was Division Engineer in the Natural Resources Department at Calgary, enlisted in April 1916, and resumed duty as Division Engineer on March 17th, 1919.
Mr. G. G. Ommannsky, who was Special Assistant Engineer at Montreal, enlisted in August 1915, and resumed duty in July 1919, as Assistant Engineer in the Chief Engineer's Department at Montreal.
Mr. L. C. Ord, who was Assistant Works Manager at Anrus Shops, Montreal, enlisted in September 1915, and resumed duty in the same capacity in May 1919.
Mr. C. W. P. Ramsey, who was Engineer of Construction, Montreal, and who took command of the Canadian Overseas Railway Construction Corps in February 1915, resumed duty as Relieving Superintendent on Eastern Lines in March 1919.
Mr. W. J. Robertson, who was Assistant to the Manager of the C.P.R. Real Estate Department, Montreal, enlisted in June 1916, and returned to duty in his former position in March 1919.
Mr. B. W. Yerville, who was Purchasing Agent in the C.P.R. Right of Way Department at Winnipeg, enlisted in November 1914, and resumed his former position in June 1919.
