Route of the Canadian Western

New Railway To Run From
Calgary Through Cardston
to Butte

Pincher Creek, July 30.—Engineers locating the line of the Calgary to Butte railway for the Canadian Western railway were in town yesterday looking over the ground for the best route into Pincher Creek. The surveying party is camped about twenty-five miles northwest of town on the Walrond ranch.

The engineers were very reticent in regard to the route, but it is learned on good authority that it will most likely be from Calgary south a few miles west of the C. & E. to De Winton, then veer west, cross High River about twenty-five miles west of that town at the Bar-U ranch. Then through the pass at the head of Willow Creek south through the Walrond ranch in the valley between the Porcupine and Livingstone ranges, crossing the north fork of the Old Man river and the Crow's Nest railway near Cowley and south-east to Pincher Creek. From here the new road will pass through Yarow and Twin Butte Valleys to Cardston, afterwards crossing the international boundary at Whiskey Pass. From Walrond ranch a spur will be built to the coal mines in the Livingstone range and extended to Michel and Elk river. It is believed that the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway company will finance the undertaking for the promoters as they are already heading this way.

Lumber Company Changes Hands

The Stacy Lumber Company of Lethbridge, have purchased the yards, buildings, etc. belonging to the Rogers-Cunningham Lumber Co. the transaction taking place the first of the week. The new firm will continue the business, and will carry a full and complete stock of building materials.

OUR CITY FATHERS

It should be and doubtless is, with a great many of our citizens, a matter of public pride, that we have such an efficient and earnest set of workers in our Mayor and Town Council. With the handicap they are under, hardly one man in ten would make an effort for the progress of our town in the way of public improvements; but, with a bonded indebtedness of over 50,000.00, upon which they are obliged to pay a part of the principal, as well as the interest, and with a water system upon their hands that was so poorly installed as to be a constant expense, they are still pushing our Town to the front.

The surplus they have in hand to work with is being wisely expended to make the best of a bad bargain by putting in good order the tank and the water mains about town and extending the mains so as to accommodate more water-takers and thus produce more revenue.

They have now before them, moreover, two petitions from our most enterprising townsmen asking for a cement sidewalk from Lyman to Taylor Streets along Main Street, and from there to the railway station. This will no doubt be completed before winter, and that without laying any additional burden upon the Municipality at large.

It will be worth the while of any of our citizens who have the progress of the Town at heart to attend a session of the Council and see how the interests of our finances and growth are manipulated. Success to our "City Dads"
