UNITED STATES. New York, May 27.—Gen. Butler made a strong argument against the ratification of the Treaty of Washington to-day before a committee of the Massachusetts Legislature.

Washington, 27.—The prospect is to-day favorable for the ratification of the Treaty of Washington by next Tuesday or Wednesday, in its present shape, without any modification whatever.

Gen. Butler has published a letter in which he takes strong ground against the treaty. He says the Canadians will manage to cut out the American fishermen in American waters.
