

A plain hard, varnish finish should be given the kitchen linoleum once a year. The varnish should be applied very thinly, and when dry wiped over with milk and water.'

To cut hot bread use a sharp knife, the blade of which has been thoroughheated in boiling water. The knife must be hot enough to dry with its own heat or the bread will not cut well.

To clean windows and mirrors, daub over thoroughly with whiting tied up in a piece of muslin and smooth with a damp rag. Follow with a lather. rubbed on freely, and wipe off with muslin.




