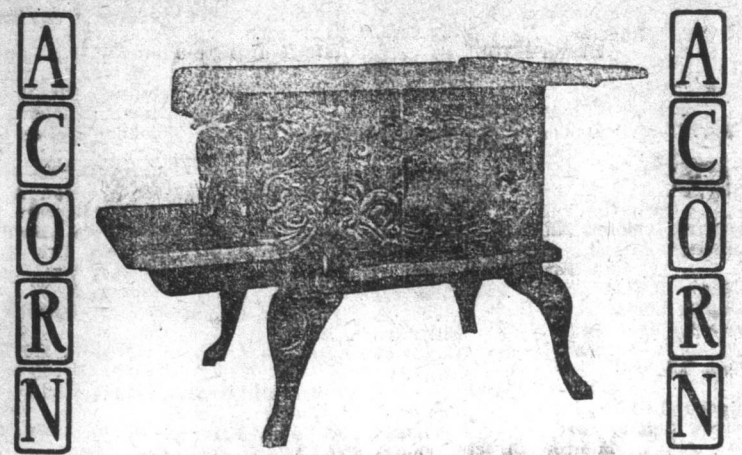

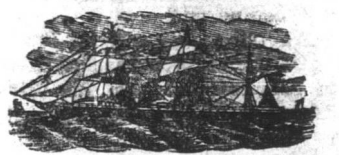

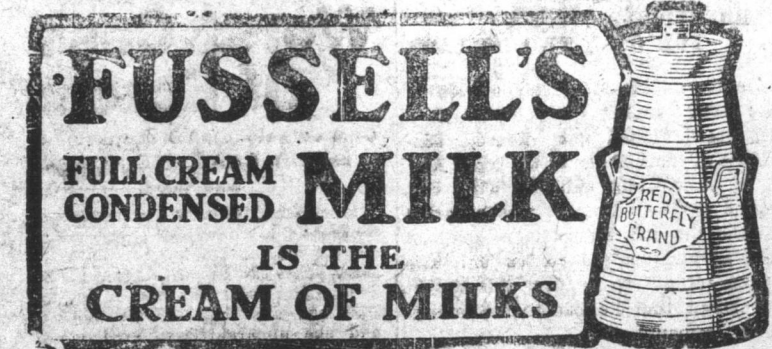

Down and Out.

Moran Sent Him Down Five Times in the 11th Round.

San Francisco, Nov. 26.—Batting Nelson, for the first time in his fighting career, was knocked out to-day. Owen Moran, from Birmingham, England, performed the feat in the presence of 8,000 people. He won in 11 rounds. But he was compelled to drop Nelson five times in this round, despite the force of the Britain's right hand punches on the point of the chin, the wonderful fighting spirit of the Dane was ever present.

Moran from the first tap of the gong proved himself complete master of the situation. There was not one round of the eleven that could be accredited to Nelson. The Dane was always the aggressor, his evident intention being to force Moran to fight close. In this he was accommodated, but the fight was scarcely two rounds old before Moran showed that he, too, could fight at the Britain's old game. Round after round Moran would step back, side-step and dance around the aggressive Nelson, all the while shooting in straight, forceful punches to the jaw and head. He seldom suffered a punch.

Nelson opened every round full of fight, and the 11th opened with neither fighter perceptibly in distress. Moran, who had apparently been biding his time for a finishing blow, got his chance when Nelson, with bowed head, rushed into close quarters. Moran flung his right forward, catching Nelson flush on the jaw, down the Dane tumbled to his haunches for the count of nine. It was the same kind of a blow which several months ago caught Tom McCarthy off his guard. He subsequently died as a result of the fight, and the ousting of the Johnson-Jeffries bout from California followed. Nelson tottered to his feet, bleeding and dazed. Moran stood back, waiting for him. Again the Britain's powerful right shot out and Nelson dropped to the mat once more.


The performance was three more repeated. Moran each time reaching Nelson's unprotected jaw with his right. With the last knock down, the referee and the timekeeper counted the fateful ten. One second after referee Benjamin Selig shouted: "Your out, Moran wins." Nelson was on his feet with blood streaming from his mouth and nose loudly importuning that the referee permit him to continue.

Nelson declared that he had been counted out prematurely. He said: "I lacked but three seconds for the round to end, and I believe that I would have been as fresh as ever the next round. However, Moran deserves all the credit. He is a great little fighter, and will be able to hold his own against any of them."

Moran turned a handspring into the arms of his second and dashed from the ring without a mark to indicate that he had been in a fight. "I always knew I could turn the trick," and you bet I feel glad. I have been the first man to put Nelson out. Now I want Wolgast. The sooner the match can be made the better."

The receipts were \$18,000.



Household Notes.

If rice is cooked in water it will absorb about three times its measure. It is cooked in milk at least half as much more liquid will be necessary.

Do not rub fabrics roughly between the hands when cleaning them. It will be found sufficient to rub the cleaning fluid in gently with a fresh cloth.

Sponges are the great germ-collectors they should be thoroughly scalded frequently; and hot water bottles should be washed, inside and out, with strong suds.

Brasses should be rubbed with kerosene before they are polished. Then use oxalic acid or common vinegar and salt to remove the stains and dullness.

A fish that is to be broiled will be greatly improved in flavour if for an hour before cooking it is placed in a dish containing a little olive oil or melted butter.

If chicken is roasted or panned with the breast down instead of up it will be more juicy and tender. It should be turned over 10 minutes before it is done broiled.

If a vessel in which a fish has been cooked is first washed and scrubbed well with soap and vinegar, and then scoured with scalding vinegar, all odor will be removed.

When sharp knives are kept with other articles in kitchen drawers, each blade should be protected with a sheath which may easily be made from heavy wrapping paper.

It is wise before putting bread into pans to see that the latter are well larded. Then there is no danger of the crust being broken in taking the bread from the pan.

Stains on blankets and other woolen goods can often be removed by using a mixture of equal parts of glycerine and yolk of egg. Spread on, leave half an hour and wash.

A plain hard, varnish finish should be given the kitchen linoleum once a year. The varnish should be applied very thinly, and when dry wiped over with milk and water.

To cut hot bread use a sharp knife, the blade of which has been thoroughly heated in boiling water. The knife must be hot enough to dry with its own heat or the bread will not cut well.

To clean windows and mirrors, daub over thoroughly with waiting tied up in a piece of muslin and smooth with a damp rag. Follow with a later, rubbed on freely, and wipe off with muslin.

Gasoline will clean better if hot when used, but as this spirit is very explosive it must not be taken near

Wednesday's Polling. Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 7. The standing of the parties at the close of the day's polling was as follows:—Government coalition, Liberals, 123; Nationalists, 38; Laborites, 22. Total 184. Unionists, 170. The Unionists secured 6 gains in to-day's pollings and suffered a loss on only two seats, they thus return to the position held previously to yesterday's voting. The Unionists total gain for the last four days are 18; the Liberals gain 11 and Laborites, 4. O'Brienites, Nationalists, hold 5 seats. The most notable Unionist victory was in Cardiff which has gone Unionist only once in a quarter of a century. This victory was largely due to the personal popularity of Lord Crichton Stuart who overcame a Liberal majority of 1,555, winning by 299, and the withdrawal from politics of the old member, D. A. Thomas, who was replaced in the Liberal interest by Sir C. Hyde. There was an even greater surprise, however, of a national character, of Plymouth, by Waldorf Astor and A. Shirley Benn, John Burns' old opponent, in Battersea, who took Sir M. Durden's place as the running mate of the young Anglo-American. They proved a good team and the work that Mr. Astor had done in the constituency was shown in his replacing C. Mallett, financial secretary to the War Office, who is the first minister to be defeated. The Unionists also captured the Melton Division of Leicestershire and three others, two gains from Labor, Dudley which was insistently Unionist until 1906, returned to the fold, and Viscount Wolmer re-captured Newton, in Lancashire, S. W., which Labor had held in two parliaments. Almost everywhere in the country the Labor and Liberal vote decreased and Unionists are more pleased with their gains here than anywhere else in the country. The Government gets some comfort from London, all the districts of which are now polled. To-day the Liberals won Stepney which was Unionist in the last election, and Labor gain Bow and Bromley. The success of William O'Brien, in Cork, and the possibility of his further increasing his following, somewhat complicates the situation. The Unionists are asking what the Government will do if it has to face a stronger Unionist opposition, and a strong fighting force of Irishmen on its flank. The fight between O'Brien and William Redmond, the strongest candidates of the respective factions of the Nationalist party, to represent Cork, resulted in a sweeping victory for O'Brien, who not only holds the poll with a majority of 628, but takes with him to the House of Commons Maurice Healey. Altogether 64 members were voted for to-day, but only 35 results were announced. Speaking at Wrexham this evening Mr. Balfour practically admitted defeat and implored the Government if it did not like the Reform Bill to reconsider the whole situation before the next Colonial Conference, and suggested that some other method of meeting the impending danger which was dependent upon the position of the Government and its obligation to "see the line." The situation was full of peril unless they shook themselves free from the Nationalists' domination. It was clear that the Nationalists cannot be treated as the Liberal Government, and he declared before long another appeal must be made to the country. To-day's election results follow:— St. George's, Hanover Square—Rt. Hon. A. Lyttleton, Unionist; majority, 320. No change. Sheffield, Hallam—Rt. Hon. C. B. Stuart Wortley, Unionist; majority, 195. Collins, Liberal; majority, 1,425. No change. Poplar—Rt. Hon. Sydney Buxton, member of the Cabinet, Liberal; majority, 1,829. No change. Galway City—S. L. Sweeney, Nationalist; majority, 559. No change. Plymouth (2 seats)—Waldorf Astor, Unionist, and A. Shirley Benn, Unionist; aggregate majority, 1,416. Two Unionist gains; Liberal majority last election, 311. The Veto Bill. Now that it is practically certain that the electorate at home will approve of the Government Veto Bill, it will be interesting, no doubt, to peruse the text of this famous measure. Just as the House of Lords readily submitted to the decision of the country last January, although it was pronounced in a somewhat uncertain voice in view of the "Nationalist vote" being doubtful on the Budget issue, there will be no room for doubt or hesitancy on the part of the House of Lords in the matter of submitting to the Veto issue. Theoretically, the House of Lords has adopted the Referendum doctrine, this election has been a referendum with the fate of the Government thrown in the balance. The scales have turned against the Lords and in favour of the coalition. There is nothing for the Lords to do but to submit, and to submit gracefully, without embroiling the King in politics by forcing Premier Asquith to obtain a guarantee from His Majesty that he will force submission by the creation of additional peers. Appended is Asquith's bill, which is being approved of. In our opinion intrinsically it is not as sound as Lansdowne's proposition, but that is neither here nor there. Asquith's bill meets with approval; Lansdowne's with disapproval, so far as the election returns go, and that is what counts in such a case. Whereas it is expedient that provision should be made for regulating the relations between the two Houses of Parliament: And whereas it is intended to substitute for the House of Lords as it at present exists a Second Chamber constituted on a popular instead of hereditary basis, but such a substitution cannot be immediately brought into operation: And whereas provision will require hereafter to be made by Parliament in a measure effecting such substitution for limiting and defining the powers of the new Second Chamber, but it is expedient to make such provision as in this Act appears for restricting the existing powers of the House of Lords: Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:— I.—(1) If a Money Bill, having been passed by the House of Commons, and sent up to the House of Lords at least one month before the end of the Session, is not passed by the House of Lords without amendment within one month after it is so sent up to that House, the Bill shall, unless the House of Commons direct to the contrary, be presented to His Majesty and become an Act of Parliament on the Royal Assent being signified, notwithstanding that the House of Lords have not consented to the Bill. (2) A Money Bill means a Bill

which in the opinion of the Speaker of the House of Commons contains only provisions dealing with all or any of the following subjects, namely, the imposition, repeal, remission, alteration, or regulation of taxation; charges on the Consolidated Fund or the provision of money by Parliament; the appropriation, control, or regulation of public money; the raising or guarantee of any loan or the repayment thereof; or matters incidental to those subjects or any of them. (3) When a Bill to which the House of Lords has not consented is presented to His Majesty for assent as a Money Bill, the Bill shall be accompanied by a certificate of the Speaker of the House of Commons that it is a Money Bill. (4) No amendment shall be allowed to a Money Bill which, in the opinion of the Speaker of the House of Commons, is such as to prevent the Bill retaining the character of a Money Bill. II.—(1) If any Bill other than a Money Bill is passed by the House of Commons in three successive Sessions (whether of the same Parliament or not), and, having been sent up to the House of Lords at least one month before the end of the Session is rejected by the House of Lords in each of those Sessions, that Bill shall on its rejection for the third time by the House of Lords, unless the House of Commons direct to the contrary, be presented to His Majesty and become an Act of Parliament on the Royal Assent being signified thereto, notwithstanding that the House of Lords has not consented to the Bill: Provided that this provision shall not take effect unless two years have elapsed between the date of the first introduction of the Bill in the House of Commons and the date on which it passes the House of Commons for the third time. (2) A Bill shall be deemed to be rejected by the House of Lords if it is not passed by the House of Lords either without amendment or with such amendments only as may be agreed to by both Houses. (3) A Bill shall be deemed to be the same Bill as a former Bill sent up to the House of Lords in the preceding Session if, when it is sent up to the House of Lords, it is identical with the former Bill or contains only such alterations as are certified by the Speaker of the House of Commons to be necessary owing to the time which has elapsed since the date of the former Bill, or to represent amendments which have been made by the House of Lords in the former Bill in the preceding Session. Provided that the House of Commons may, if they think fit, on the passage of such a Bill through the House in the second or third Session, suggest any further amendments without inserting the amendments in the Bill, and any such suggested amendments shall be considered by the House of Lords, and if agreed to by that House, shall be treated as amendments made by the House of Lords and agreed to by the House of Commons; but the exercise of this power by the House of Commons shall not affect the operation of this section in the event of the Bill being rejected by the House of Lords. III.—Any certificate of the Speaker of the House of Commons given under this Act shall be conclusive for all purposes, and shall not be questioned in any Court of law. IV.—Nothing in this Act shall di-

Death of 'Now, Then, Smith.'

London, November 26.—'Now then, Smith,' the seaman hero of the Messina earthquake, has been drowned at Bunbury, West Australia, says the London Evening News. He was walking close to the jetty on his way to rejoin his ship, the Redbridge, when he disappeared.

At the time of the Messina earthquake in 1908, Smith was on board the steamer Atonwen, which was lying in the port, and went ashore with others of the crew to help in the work of rescue. The party came to a tottering building, where a fire in the lower floors imprisoned the occupants above. The sailors threw a rope which was made fast to the top of the building. The captain cried, "Now then, Smith," and Smith climbed up, bringing down one member of the family after the other until all were safe.

London, November 26.—A raid which represents the last word in scientific burglary has been committed at the residence of Mr. Milne, in Alderbrook road, Clapham Common.

The thieves, after scaling a wall broke a kitchen window, climbed through, and minutely inspected practically every article of value in the ground floor rooms. They selected only the silver articles. A tea-tray had been laid over night, and from this a silver strainer was taken, but two spoons which were not silver were thrown aside. Silver mountings were torn from photograph frames, and the silver parts of a flower-stand were wrenched away.

Yet the thieves made absolutely no noise and the raid was not discovered until the family awoke in the morning. Mr. Milne's house has been ransacked twice before in the past four years.

England Builds Japan's Dreadnoughts.

London, November 26.—Japan's newest Dreadnought will be built at Barrow-in-Furness by Messrs. Vickers, Sons & Maxims. The contract, which has just been signed, provides that every portion of the warship, including the armor plate and gun mountings, shall be constructed by the same firm, which will not be allowed to sublet any part of the work.

The new vessel will have a displacement of between 27,000 and 28,000 tons and will cost, complete with armament and ammunition, nearly £2,500,000. Thirty months from the signing of the contract the vessel should be ready for sea.

Both Japan and Great Britain have reason to be pleased with the placing of this important contract in this country. Japan has always admired British warship construction, and can never forget that the Mikasa, Admiral Togo's flagship, was built by the firm which has now been commissioned to build the new Dreadnought. The Imperial Japanese Government in placing the contract has also wished to give practical expression to the sincere regard it has for the alliance with Great Britain.

In this connection it is curious to remember that months ago the United States press announced that this vessel would be built by an American firm.

The Crown Jewels.

New Precautions For Their Safety.

The Jewel House will be re-opened and the Regalia will be on view on and after Monday next, 7th ult., under the usual regulations.

Spencer, Lord Chamberlain. It is with this notice, printed in large black letters on a white card affixed to the gates of the Tower of London, that the authorities intimate that the Crown Jewels are once again in the Wakefield Tower, after an absence of several months, during which time their whereabouts have been kept a profound secret. They will be on view from ten o'clock in the morning for the first time since their return to the Tower.

Since the Jewel Room was last open to the public great changes have been made in its structure and fittings. It has become a strong room, containing many ingenious devices, which are calculated to be sufficient to resist the attacks of the most scientific burglars the world has yet known.

A new stone flooring has been set, and the great stone walls have been strengthened. A grill made of the finest tempered steel, with bars placed closer together than was the case with the old cage, guards the plate glass regalia show case. Automatic steel cases, which at the pressure of a button will close over the jewels, have been fitted. The slightest pressure upon any part of the grill will cause great gongs to ring in various parts of the Tower, while the touch of a button will cause the great iron doors of the Jewel Room to close automatically.—Daily Mail.

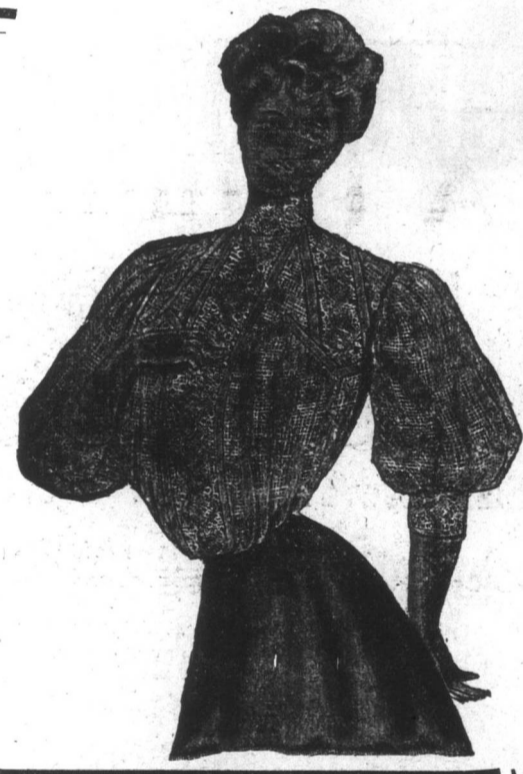

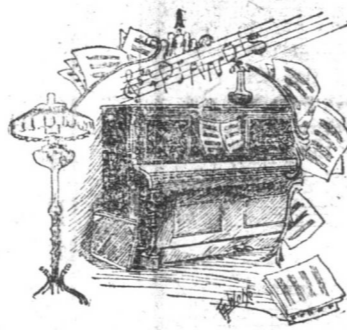

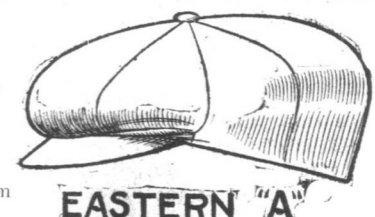
