Long and severe though the winter is there is no reports of want or privation I am glad to say. The only complaints we hear is from farmers whose stocks are getting low, and unless weather conditions soon change they will find themselves in a predicament. It is a sad state of affairs to see the coastal steamer Portia passing by our doors each trip, and not be able to avail of that greatest boon of civilization, steam communication,





From an Indian village on Queen harlotte Islands. away to the north of the Pacific Coast country, there was taken to Ottawa a few months ago very strange piece of native handiwork, to be set up in Canada's capital city as an historic souvenir. It wa a large, hand-carved totem pole, and one of the most remarkable pieces of freight that was ever carried across the continent. The designs are numberless, the ingenuity of the artist having been free from all restrictions in the way of form an lifelikeness. > genius. This curious statuary in poles of fir or cedar may be seen at many places along the coast, still standing upright or in some cases fallen to the ground. The Colliery Surface Men's Federation has notified the members of the Labour Party that, unless the Minimum Wage Bill provides also fixed minimum for surface men, the dispute must not be settled. An abnormal exodus of miners to America is taking place. Owners hope to obtain cargoes of American coal for the Mediterannean. Thomas, Labour M P. for Derby, and organizing secretary of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants, confirms the re port that the railway men intend to submit a new national programme in May, but would not commit himself as to whether the men would strike if their demands were not conceded Traffic receipts during the last week have declined \$2.855,000 compared with last year. After reaching the Grand Banks the ship ran into the ice which delayed her progress considerably; coal was beginning to run short, and yesterday Captain Clarke decided to bear up for St. John's to replenish the bunkers. Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Co. are the agents at whose premises she will coal. Mr. Tasker Cook is looking after the supplies.

The ship and her captain are well known here, as it was only in December last when the Kura was here having put in owing to stress weather with a cylinder broken.



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
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
