

## ECONOMY OR—?

It doesn't mean parsimony; it doesn't mean meanness; above all things it doesn't mean a short-sighted and self-defeating policy of doing—without those things which can be most easily dispensed with, regardless of consequences.

A neighbour of mine has pretty hard work to make both ends meet. She has three young children in her household, and it is not possible for her to leave home for an afternoon without having someone to take her place. Once in a while when the errands which she cannot ask anyone and goes to town. She had just come else to do have accumulated, she hires a woman to stay with the children back from such a trip the other evening when I went over to call and found her stretched out on the couch, pale and evidently completely exhausted.

"Does it tire you so much to shop?" I asked.

"It isn't just the shopping," she said, "but I walked all over town. I had an errand at A's and one at R's. (naming two points over a mile apart), and walking tires me so."

"Why on earth didn't you take a

car?" I asked in wonder. I actually never thought of the economy (?) motive. It seemed too absurd.

"I thought it would be extravagant," she said. Think of it! She was paying a woman for the time she was using; she knows that if she overdraws her strength, as she often does, she will have to pay a woman to help her with the work; and yet she spent lavishly of both time and strength to save five cents.

Economy, economy, what extravagances are committed in thy name!

Another woman in our neighbourhood frequently boasts of the infinitesimal sum on which she contrives to feed her family. She is always criticising her next-door neighbour's bountiful board as being fearfully extravagant in view of her husband's modest salary.

Her neighbour on being acquainted with these charges retorted, "If she will add the doctor's bills she is always paying for those sickly, anaemic, under-fed children, to her household bills, I guess she will find that it costs her just as much to live as it does me, if not more."

Her neighbour was right. Nor do the doctor's bills alone represent all the cost of this woman's economy. She must also charge up against it the loss of efficiency which these children will probably suffer later from their under-fed childhood.

Under-economy is as common as poverty.

Real economy is as rare as brains. False economy is a thankless task. Real economy is a fine art.

## Household Notes.

A square piece of cotton, pasted at each corner of the table oilcloth before using it, will prevent the corners from wearing out as soon as they otherwise would.

If you wish the contents of a saucepan to boil quickly, do not allow a metal spoon to remain in the pan, because a spoon carries off a great deal of the heat.

The best effect in polishing floors is gained by having them finished to the point of a soft glow and not a shine. They will then harmonize with the furnishings.

Soak a common floor mop in coal oil, it will make a good dust absorber. Soak the mop thoroughly, then hang it out in the air for a few days. It will then be ready for use.

After making sandwiches, place them in an earthen vessel and cover tightly. Set the vessel in a pan of cold water and the sandwiches will keep moist for hours.

When you are cooking a chicken, try the wing to find out if it is properly done. If the fork finds the wing tender, you can be sure of the entire chicken being well cooked.

A muddy skirt can be washed easily and white, if you will take some sour milk, dilute it with water and soak the skirt in it over night. Then wash in the usual way.

Sometimes hamburger steak is dry and tasteless. Put two of three table-

spoons of fresh cream or milk and a few bread crumbs in with it. You will find it juicy and delicious.

Plaster casts can be cleaned without injuring their outline by brushing them with an application of dry powdered whiting, which will penetrate the creases of the design.

When a garment is to be dipped into gasoline, it is a good idea to mark grease spots by running a thread around them; after the article is wet, it is difficult to detect the spots.

A very useful thing to keep in the sewing basket is a pair of tweezers to pull out stubborn threads left in the basting, especially those that the sewing machine has gone over.

When burning table scraps containing grease or powder substance, the unpleasant cloud of smoke can be avoided by placing the scraps in a bag or piece of old newspaper.

The first necessity in keeping food of any kind sweet and fresh is clean, dry and airy cupboards and closets. The next greatest necessity is a good well-cared for refrigerator of ample capacity.

In closets or rooms where it is difficult to keep things dry, because the air does not move freely, bowls or unslacked lime should be kept on the shelves near the food. It will absorb the moisture.

It is a good idea to have a good sized bowl in the ice chest. This you can use as a receptacle for odd bits of meat, that you wish to keep for croquettes or hash. The bowl should be kept covered.

When preparing oranges, pour boiling water over them and let them stand for about five minutes. The peeling will then come off easily and the bitter white lining will come off with the peeling.

It is best not to allow the marrow to remain on the backbone of your mutton or lamb or the thin membrane on your steaks, as these are the parts which decay quickly and taint the rest of the meat.

Pieces of dry bread and toast should be kept in a covered jar until you are ready to use them. Dry bread and toast can be used for a score of things, and odd bits should never be thrown away.

Try whipping the cream in the upper part of a double boiler, with fine ice or cold water placed in the lower part. The cream will not

**How It Affects The Homes.**  
 Editor Lawton in complaining of the lack on the part of the Government of any well defined agricultural policy declares: "What we need is a policy which can be brought into the homes of every family in the country."  
 This rule is an admirable one and can be used as a touchstone to try policies generally. For after all the value of a policy is its effect, directly or indirectly, on the life of a community, or in other words, Will it benefit the homes of the people generally?

For instance, it affords a means of testing the value of the policy pursued by the Tory Party during the period which has elapsed since Sir Edward Morris was called upon by Governor MacGregor to form an administration.

Those who had faith in Sir Edward's manifesto must have been grievously disappointed with the way his administration has carried out his pledges. For, be it remembered, he said: "Under the banner of the People's Party the whole of the industrial classes of the Colony—the Fishermen, the Farmers, the Mechanics, the Labourers, the Clerks, and all who work for a living will find a rallying point where all who wish to see their country advance may join together to work for the common good."

The Fisherman, the Farmer, the Mechanic, the Labourer, the Clerk and all who work for a living have had four years of it, and they and their wives know full well how the Morris policy is affecting their homes.

They hear of enormous sums being spent on railway building. They see extravagance everywhere. They read of new Government jobs being created, big contracts entered into, fat fees paid, picnics provided, willful waste is staring them in the face everywhere. Careful and economic expenditure is disappearing from the ken of public administration.

The homes of the people are suffering for it. It takes more to keep up the homes to-day than it ever did. The promise to reduce taxation and make the lives of the people easier has not been kept. There is a lot of talk of fighting consumption and yet the people find their own efforts handicapped by an extraordinary rise in the price of milk.

Sir Edward Morris promised to cheapen the price of coal, and to-day we have soft coal and hard coal at prices higher than have ever been known in the history of the Colony.

**Cable News.**  
 Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 27.  
 Stumbling blocks in the way of an agreement being reached between the envoys of Turkey and Bulgaria, who are now discussing peace terms near the Tchatalja lines, remain very real. The Turks appear to show little disposition to submit to preposterous terms. Negotiations are likely to continue for several days. The French assertion that Austro-Hungary is inciting the Ottoman Government to prolong the war is described in a semi-official communication, issued at Vienna, as a malicious invention, circulated with the object of injuring Austro-Hungary in the eyes of the Balkan people.

**Special Evening Telegram.** BERLIN, Nov. 27.  
 Provision against the possibility of an outbreak of war will be made by the German Government, according to the Socialist paper, *Neue Zeitung*. Discussing the new budget, it points out that an amount of \$1,500,000, entered as for general financial administration is really intended to pay for the enormous reserve stocks of clothing and provisions for men and beast, which the Army and Navy have accumulated against a possible outbreak. If this conclusion is correct, it increases the war budget to \$45,750,000, instead of \$14,250,000, as previously announced.

**Special Evening Telegram.** MUSTAPHA PASHA, Nov. 27.  
 Fire, famine, and flood afflict the beleaguered forces at Adrianople, according to reports brought here by fugitives from that city. Those who have managed to escape through the lines of investment, which are being drawn closer every day, declare that the buildings in the vicinity of the Selim Mosque are on fire. In other districts the city is deeply inundated with water, by the rivers Maritza, Tunga and Arda, which have overflowed their banks. The civilian population is declared to be short of food, and among some classes a state approaching anarchy exists.

**Special Evening Telegram.** FRANKFORT-ON-THAINE, Nov. 27.  
 Austro-Hungarian subjects residing here, who belong to the Army Reserve, have all received orders to report to their regiments. Money has been sent to pay their railroad fares to the frontier. Similar orders have been received in the mining districts of the twin-Kingdom.

**Special Evening Telegram.** LONDON, Nov. 27.  
 The report is again circulating in Sofia, that Turkey desires to enter into the Balkan Federation. It is asserted that she has already made advances in this direction, in the way of proposals to the allied Balkan states.

 The s.s. Durango is due here the latter part of the week from London. The schr. Anna Belle cleared from brigus yesterday for Gloucester with 538 qtls. of fish.

 The danger of re-opening hostilities however, is still serious. Apparently only an informal armistice of forty eight hours has been agreed on. It is reported the Bulgarian forces are already moving closer to the Tchatalja lines and are entrenching themselves in readiness. The Turks have an army of more than 100,000 and soon will have 130,000 for the most part fresh picked troops behind the lines. It is certain they will give a good account of themselves, if fighting is resumed. Under these circumstances with Adrianople and Scutari still holding out, Turkey is likely to show a very unyielding attitude in peace negotiations. The report that the Servians have reached Durazzo appears to be premature. A wireless dispatch brings the interesting news that Albanian independence has been proclaimed there. The Turkish Governor is preparing to leave that town, accepting without opposition the new regime. To an autonomous Albanian the greatest weight will be attached by the diplomatic world. Britain and Germany are now acting in cordial co-operation on the basis of postponing all side issues until after the war settlement. A reassuring statement also comes from St. Petersburg that Russia and Austria do not desire to fight over a port in the Adriatic.



## Two National Games.

Players of games, especially, we may claim, English players of games, are continually doing what seems impossible to most of us," says the Mail. "Taylor won the German golf championship by doing nine holes in twenty-eight strokes, an average of just over three a hole."

In some games, such as billiards and croquet, and now, it is rumoured, in lawn tennis, skill so increases as to force alteration of the rules. But, in spite of miracles of skill, golf remains a game so honorable and ancient as to be beyond the need of restrictive legislation."

### A Profound Frivolity.

"The games which were played when we won India and Canada would seem very haphazard and half-hearted to the players or spectators of to-day," says the Times. "It was only the gamblers and fribbles of the eighteenth century who made a business of pleasure, and nobody admired them much for it. The danger of our present manner of playing games is that it provides an object in life for people who are by nature serious, but not very discriminating. They can go to a golf course day by day just as solemnly and with a sense of duty just as well satisfied as if they were going to work in an office; for they live in a world in which golf has become a business and in which a golf course seems a great work of utility, to which one would rightly sacrifice any antiquities or natural beauties. There is no Roman thoroughness in this state of mind, but rather a frivolity so profound that it has ceased to see the difference between pleasure and business indeed, the same kind of frivolity, though more innocent, as that which in Rome produced the Coliseum for the wonder and disgust of posterity."

"England has won the Triangular Cricket contest," says the Pall Mall; "and nobody who had seen the previous Test matches, or has even studied week by week the tabulated averages of the English, Australian, and South African players, can have been surprised at the result. Greater English elevens have gone into the field than that which won; just as far greater Australian teams have visited us than that so gallantly captained by Mr. Gregory this summer. Mr. Fry, however, had rare powers at his disposal in every branch of the game." The Times says of Mr. Fry's innings that "it was as near perfection as can be imagined. It was a great feat."

### The National Game.

"The concluding match was attended by about fifty thousand spectators—a sufficient comment on another piece of latter day nonsense, to wit, that cricket was losing its hold on the affections of the English public," adds the Pall Mall. "Indeed, if this summer—this grim, forbidding summer—has proved anything, it has proved that cricket is as popular as ever. Otherwise, under the conditions that have prevailed there would have been no appreciable 'gates' at all. As a matter of fact, all the counties that have played a masterful game have drawn crowds as 'keen and very nearly as large as in any average summer. It is only inept and stupid cricket that fails to attract, and what else could be expected of it?"

"The game that can show us such batting as that of Mr. Fry, Mr. Douglas, Hobbs, Woolley, and Rhodes, such bowling as that of Mr. Hazlett and Woolley, and so delightful a little spell of plucky play as Messrs. Macarney and Jennings gave in Australia's second innings yesterday, is utterly incapable of losing the love of a people who can appreciate manly courage and skill. Cricket is still the National Game," concludes the Pall Mall, "and long may it continue so!"

## German Postoffices.

**A Sure-fire Water Freez-er—Mind About Their Method.**

The postoffices in Germany are peculiar institutions, says F. Horis Deans in the Wide World Magazine. They are a farsighted people, the Germans and they allow for expansion. If there are any postoffices in the country of less than three stories I must have overlooked them. Every floor is divided into about four departments, and every department has about a dozen offices.

In some of the smaller towns where business is not very brisk the staff consists of one official. You have to make an appointment with him if you want to be served. Entering on the ground floor you run round and tap with your money at every pigeonhole until he answers. You then ask him for a stamp, whereupon he orders you to go to No. 1 pigeonhole and wait there till he comes. You wait patiently for about five minutes and then he pops his head out of No. 3 and wants to know if you've gone to sleep. When you ask for a five cent stamp he says, "Oh, I thought it was a penny one you wanted," and instructs you to try at No. 7. He probably discovers he has run out of five cent stamps and you have to go to windows No 3 and No. 11 and get two two cent ones and a one cent.

By this time you are getting quite friendly, and when you ask him where the telegraph office is he will probably get out his guidebook and hunt the place out for you. He may even offer to take you there himself, as he's the telegraph clerk as well and has got to get there anyhow in order to attend to you.

The Germans themselves when they go to buy a stamp make a day of it and take their lunch with them. It is quite a pretty sight to see the mother and a group of children sitting on the stairs, eating their bread and sausage and wondering whether father will remember them when he comes back with the stamp.

Vancouver, Nov. 24.—Robert Louis Stevenson's famous schooner yacht Gasco, weather-beaten, scarred and mistreated, has been brought to Vancouver to be refitted as a pleasure yacht. The staunch old craft was slated for a season of halibut fishing, but G. Sidney Smith removed the danger of this arduous chapter in an honored ship's varied career by purchasing her for his own use. The Gasco will be thoroughly overhauled in Vancouver, and there will be restored to something of the elegance which distinguished it when R. L. S. wrote many of his south sea stories

in its cabin. "Treasure Island" is one of the Stevenson tales which was brought to light in the Gasco, which has been north with a sealing fleet for seven years.

**Lost His Life**

Amherst, N.S., Nov. 21.—A drowning occurred in Maccan this morning. Frank Cormier, late of Abrams Village (P. E. I.), being the victim. Cormier was crossing the railroad bridge on his way to Kelly's Woods, where he was working, when his suit case, which he was carrying over his shoulder slipped and fell into the river beneath, and floated over along the west bank. Cormier immediately set out after it, and waded into the

river, but in reaching for his case he sank into a deep hole and was swung out from the shore by the current of the river, which was then at high water. He hung on to his clothes until his friends who had arrived on the bank to aid him said: "Let them go." He did so and struck out for the shore. He was only a few yards from shallow water when he suddenly sank.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Cormier, about twenty-one years of age, and was well known in Maccan and vicinity, being a sober and steady worker. Men are still grappling for the body, and as yet it has not been found. His uncle, Philis Cormier, was an eye witness of the drowning.

## A Priest in Airship Flies

To Man's Death Bed to Administer Last Sacrament.

Paris, Nov. 19.—A remarkable account by a witness of a priest's unprecedented action of carrying the viaticum through the air on a monoplane to a dying man in the midst of the Sahara Desert has just reached here.

A fierce skirmish between 500 sharpshooting Spahis and 2,000 Touaregs, resulting in the rout of the latter, took place at Chebka, one of the most desolate solitudes in the desert, a two days' march from Laghouat.

In consequence of this conflict one of the French officers, Commandant Larget, was mortally wounded by a bullet in the chest. On being informed he had only three or four hours to live the dying man murmured:

"To die is nothing, but to die without a priest or the consolation of religion is hard."

These words were overheard by a brother officer, a lieutenant, who as a skilled aviator, had accompanied the column with a monoplane. Exclaiming, "I will find you a priest," he dashed to his machine and in a moment started the motor, rose, and disappeared in the north.

Two hours later he reached Laghouat. Landing and jumping to the ground he ran to the hospital, and in a few words explained his mission to the priest in charge.

"I am at your disposition," at once replied the latter, "only give me time to get my surplice, the holy oils and the viaticum."

Five minutes later he was in the air with the lieutenant, praying and holding to his breast the little silver box containing the consecrated host.

Alighting at the camp, the priest hastened to the tent of the dying man, who, buoyed up by hope, had been struggling against death for four hours.

"I thank thee, O God," he cried faintly, the priest, after hearing his confession, placed the sacred wafer on his lips. A few moments afterward the officer died peacefully.

## How To Grow Tall.

A man's organs and those of his bones which are not subjected to pressure grow continuously until he is forty years old; that is to say, the heart should become stronger, the capacity of the lungs increase, and the brain should develop steadily until the fourth decade of life. Also one should wear a larger hat at the age of forty than at thirty.

A man ceases to grow tall, however, at the beginning of the third decade, because after that time the downward pressure exerted by the weight of the body while in the erect position compresses the vertebrae or small bones in the spine, the discs of cartilage between them, the pelvis, and the thigh bones, natural elasticity of the discs and the growth of these bones. However, a British scientist contends that were man a quadruped, and therefore freed from the downward pressure produced by his weight upon his spinal column, he would continue to grow in height for ten years longer than he does at present, since it has been found that bones not subjected to compression increase up to the fourth decade.

Moncton, Nov. 20.—Sam Anderson, middleweight wrestling champion, defeated John Kilonis here to-night. Kilonis won the first fall in one hour and fourteen minutes, and Anderson the next two in 25 and 30 minutes. The bout was the best ever seen here, but was very rough. Twelve hundred people were present. It is estimated that \$2,000 were wagered. Montana, who recently defeated Kilonis, has challenged the winner.


