Fishery Report.

A late report to the Board of Trade gives the catch of codfish between Channel and Grand Bay to-date as 9,043 qtls., with 100 qtls. and 4,000 6 lbs. of halibut for last week. Prospects at present are not very good, hait being scarce and the weather on the whole cold and backward. Operations now are almost suspended as the winter fishing is about over.

Holding the Cables.

Among the minor questions, but nevertheless a very important one, which the Peace Conference at Paris seeds. has had to settle, is the disposition of the former German cables. The fuure ownership of the lines of ocean cables, belonging to Germany, which were either cut by or passed into the hands of the Allies during the war has been the subject of much discussion. It involved an interesting Port au Port, per Magistrate point of international law, as related to the sea. The point raised was of an unusual nature, namely, whether the cutting of an enemy cable and the displacement of it could be regarded as analogous to the capture of an encmy ship at sea.

The interpretation placed upon this clause by the Paris correspondent is that it does not apply to the cables named above, which will not be restored to their

former German owners. Two of these cables cross the Atlantic from Emden to the Azores, and as we pointed out some time ago one of these cables which had been cut in the early stages of the war picked up and carried on into Halifax, where it has been operated in connection with the Pacific Cable Board. It is not indicated what arrangement is to be made as to the future operation of these cables, but as we contended in a previous article, it may properly be urged that this particular cable should be allocated to Canada and maintained as a portion of the All-Red Route, making a complete all-British line from the United Kingdom to Australia.-Morn-

Diving Dangers.

Owing to the extension of salvage perations, divers have been in great demand during the war. It is risky pressure and its effects, with dangers to his airpipe, which, though very stout and strong, can be sawn through without his perceiving that it is rubbing against, say, a jagged plate or other rough surface.

There is also the danger of coming up too quickly in case of emergency. On any accident to the airpipe the diver has to get to the surface inside two minutes. This means that the change of pressure is very rapid and the effect on the blood very dangerous. 

The Rhodes Scholarships.

The Rhodes Trustees announce that the election of scholars will be resumed this year, when there will be an election for two candidates to fill up the scholarships for 1918 and 1919.

Next year the Trust again proposes to choose two candidates for 1920 and 1921, after which the annual elections will resume their normal course.

Candidates must be British subjects and unmarried. They must have passed their nineteenth birthday but must not have passed their 25th birthday, on the first of October of the year for which they are

Candidates must have had two years of training at some degree-granting University or College, or a course of study accepted by the Trustees as an equiva-

The Trust is very anxious, other things being equal, to give first consideration to men who have showed their patriotism by going on active service.

Amongst those applying there may be some who have not been able, on account of service, to get the two years of university life required by the regulations. Oxford has arranged to excuse such men from Responsions, and the Trust thinks that they should be allowed to compete.

On the other hand the local committee has been strongly urged not to select anyone who by the want of preparatory training is not fairly prepared to get good results from a course at Oxford

Men who have not been on service will be expected to meet the University requirements. The Scholar elected for 1918 will be expected to go into residence not later than January 1920. The one elected for 1919 will take up work in Oxford in Octo-

Applications for the 1918 scholarship to be accompanied by ten copies of certificates and testimonials should be made to the undersigned not later than

July 1st of this year. The candidate for 1918 will be eligible if he were not more than 25 years of age on October 1st, 1917. The date for receiving applications for the 1919 scholarship will be announced later.


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
