



Not since the sailing of Henry Ford's Peace ship has there been such an embarkation of pilgrims as those who took their compulsory departure for an unstated Baltic port on the U. S. transport Buford. 

#### Many Ships After Coal.

#### Turks Now to Slay All.

New York, Dec. 30-Death to any person, whether a Moslem or of any other religious belief, if he assists in the partition of the Turkish domain was vowed in a proclamation recently issued by Kemal Pasha, leader of the Turkish Nationalists, according to Dr. G. L. Richards, of Fall River, Mass., who arrived here with his wife yesterday on the steamer Black Arroy from Constantinople. Dr. and Mrs. Richards have been abroad in the interest of the Near East relief and through Armenia in a box car.

"The Entente powers must renounce once and for all time their idea of partitioning the country, which beongs to us both by superiority of Turkish civilization and because the great majority of inhabitants are Moslem," is the Turkish position Dr Richards said.
