The Directors, in presenting their Report for the past year, would call the attention of the members to the position at present held by the society: The yield of grain of different kinds may be considered far below an average, caused principally by a very wet spring, retarding considerably the labors of the husbandman, and followed by an unusually dry summer. Consequently the crops are not what they would have been under more favorable circumstances. Hay has been a rather light crop, having been injured in the early part of the season by frost.—The turnip crop has been good in some localities in the township, while in others it has been very indifferent, having also suffered severely from the long-continued drought. Potatoes, although good in quality, may be considered below an average. Mangolds and carrots have been good, showing clearly, if what was exhibited at the Fall Show be taken as a criterion, that more attention has been paid to the cultivation of this kind of crop than formerly. The Fenian Excitement.

Arrest of Geo. Francis Train and several less Notable Fire-eaters.

'ASTOUNDING AUDACITY'S OF THE BROTHERHOOD.

ARREST OF THE MAN WHO FIRED THE FUSE AT CLERKENWELL,

BY ATLANTIC CABLE.

London, Jan. 19th—When the Cunard steamship Scotia, from New York for Liverpool, entered the port of Queenstown late last evening for the usual transfer of passengers and mails, a strong police force quietly went aboard and arrested George Francis Train, Grinnel, and Gee, who salled from New York. It is understood that these gentlemen were taken in custody on a charge of being active members of the American wing of the Fenian organization. These proceedings cause considerable excitement both here and elsewhere throughout the kingdom, and especially among the American residents. Paris, Jan. 18—Duke DePersigny, in a letter, objects to the bill recently proposed ed by the Government, in reference to the press of the country. He thinks the press will be allowed too much latitude, while he would favor a bill designed to give more freedom to the press. The obnoxious tendency of the provisions of the present one would be to leave journals free to assail public and private character.

Berlin, Jan. 18—The Diet has passed a Bill for a railway loan of forty million thalers.

Florence, Jan. 18—The party of the left has been defeated in the Italian Parliasment on the motion to adjourn the debate on the budget for this year.

Rome, Jan. 18th—Count Sartiges, the French ambassador at Rome, attended a fete of Francis II., ex-king of the two Sicillies. Pleasant speeches were made and there was much good feeling.

Cork, Jan. 19—A strict search of the person and baggage of George Francis Train disclosed no proof of complicity with the Fenian movement to justify his arrest by the British police on suspicion of being concerned in Fenian plottings. Mr Train asserts that he came over to Europe as correspondent from Ireland for the New York World. He has formally protested, through the U. States Consul, against his detention, and declares he was arrested upon no other ground than the finding of an Irish paper in his trunk.
