It is believed that the Swedish bark Tropic, Capt. Bruce, has met disaster on the coast of Australia. A telegram from London received at the San Francisco on Merchants' Exchange recently, reported that a life buoy and boat marked Tropic, Stockholm, was washed ashore at Port Stephens, Australia. Until further particulars are at hand, however, the feeling will prevail that nothing more serious than the washing of the buoy and boat from the Tropic in a storm has taken place, though the telegram bodes ill for the bark. The Tropic left San Francisco on March 17 last for Melbourne with 51,102 centals of wheat valued at \$72,852 and a general cargo worth \$6,105. The Tropic is a fine steel bark of 1,460 net tons register and was built in 1892 at Greenock. Eighty days have passed since she left the Golden Gate, and she should have reached Melbourne by this time.

The United States government and Great Britain are at sixes and sevens regarding a revision of the sealing regulations, which the former government is industriously endeavoring to secure. The State Department has taken up for consideration the question as to whether a special commission will be appointed to revise the sealing regulations under the terms of the Act appropriating \$20,000 for the purpose which was passed by congress in the closing days of the last session. Not having recommended this appropriation, the State Department is in the peculiar position of possessing a fund to be expended under the authority of a statute which supplies absolutely no details as to the manner of the expenditure.

Two important questions are being carefully canvassed in connection with this commission; first, as to whether the law is mandatory and requires the appointment of a commission, whether one is deemed necessary or not; and, second, whether such commission should have an international character and be made up of representatives of Great Britain and the United States, the members being equally divided. On some accounts the Department is disposed to take the view of the latter alternative is the correct one, and the representatives of the British Foreign Office are being sounded to determine whether Great Britain will unite with the United States in the appointment of a commission, the chief function of which would be to revise the regulations.
