WORLDINGS.
Patti goes to the circus in New York and laughs heartily.
—At St. Petersburg there are 90,000 more males than females.
—The premiership of Egypt has been set aside for Areby Bey, it is rumored.
—A Hebrew has been arrested in Paterson, N. J., on a charge of blaspheming the Christian religion.
—Conway, Ark., will not permit even express companies to deliver liquor to the citizens of that town.
—Queen Victoria needs rest as well as her washerwoman. She finds it quite as hard to obtain sometimes.
—Thomas J. Capel, the distinguished Roman Catholic theologian of England, will soon visit the United States.
—The increased activity of China in military and naval preparations are very marked. Steel torpedo boats are being built.
—Minister Lowell has immortalized his red doctor's gown by sitting in it for a portrait, by Mrs. Anna Lea Merritt, the American artist.
—The Chinese say that almost all the Japanese who resided in various parts of Peking have left, so that only two or three remain in the Japanese legation.
—The London Lancet says that medical men, however they may differ on the drink question, were unanimous in the opinion that spirits, wine or beer should only be used with food.
—A Detroit jury has estimated the value of a husband at \$11,875. They awarded this sum to Mrs. Elizabeth Moran, whose husband was crushed between two cars of the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern railroad.
—Circumstantial evidence suffices to send a man to the gallows in England. Dr. Lamson has been found guilty of murder and sentenced to death in England. Juries do things quicker and better in London than they do in New York.
—The international monetary conference, which last year was unable to arrive at any practical result, is to reassemble at Paris on April 12 next. The Parisian predicts that the council will be of little avail, although the diplomats have done all they can to facilitate its labor.
—General Ignatieff, when recently interviewed by an English nobleman with regard to the condition of the Jews in Russia, talked about the condition of Ireland, and offered to take the Irish families in Russia for every Jewish family there which should go to Great Britain.
—In Edinburgh the power of Moody's preaching has been felt by a gentleman who has a large and well-filled wine cellar. This gentleman proposes to sell the stimulants in the cellar to a medical mission and hand the proceeds to Mr. Moody toward a \$50,000 fund, which Moody is raising for the charities and reformatories of Edinburgh.
—As a result of the first year of the new French system of paying bounties on ocean shipping, it is estimated that the gross receipts from the French system of bounties on shipping and clearances of French ships from and to French colonies and countries out of Europe increased 135,000 tons. The purpose was to give Frenchmen a larger share of whatever trade there might be, and this it has done.
—Mr. Spurgeon, while lately addressing his students on the second advent of Christ, said: "The best way to secure the gospel's approach is to preach the gospel." "If I expect I begin to prophesy upon the subject, I expect it will be about the year 2500, and I shall take care to prophesy a couple of thousand years ahead—in case I am wrong."
—Allagawhate Amomahana Chanat has joined the Roman Catholic church at Morawatts, a few miles from Colombo. He was a Buddhist priest. On being baptized and received into the church, he took the much more convenient name of Clement Felix. He is an accomplished scholar and intends to write a book setting forth the fallacies of the Buddhist religion.
—A thoughtful person was discussing with his pastor some of the wonders of modern science. The pastor—"Look at astronomy now. Men have learned the distance to the stars, and with the spectroscopic they have even found the names of the stars. They are made of iron, and they are made of iron." "But stranger of all to me is how they have found out all their names."
—Fifteen special policemen from the Albany fire works, marshalled by Sergeant Hurlbut and accompanied by clerks Norman, Shaver and Smith, formed a procession one day last week, carrying blue gold on their shoulders through Albany streets. The money was the wages of employees at the iron works in Troy, and was taken from the Albany fire works bank, of which Ernest Corning is president. The gold bearers, who had \$90,000 in their care, attracted much attention in their parade, and their march was a triumph.
—The Jesuit church, which has acquired an interesting relic of Holyrood palace. It is a statuette in oak of the Virgin Mary represented as holding the child Jesus in her left arm, and in a crescent moon with one foot crushing a serpent. The child holds a globe in his left hand, and has the right uplifted as if in teaching. Its antiquity is not questioned. Some years ago it was discovered at the palace, and afterwards found its way into the hands of the late Lord Aberdeen, as the sale of whose effects it was purchased by Mr. Waterston, who gave it to the Jesuit fathers for erection in a niche of the church, where it now stands, bearing the inscription: "Our lady of Holyrood, pray for us."
—A territory of about 90,000 square miles, including the whole of Iowa, the north third of Illinois and the south quarter of Wisconsin is, we are told, to be the great dairy region of the world. The average, only about fifty per cent of the value of their grain, the rest going for transportation; but when the corn is turned into milk, it is worth more than its value in grain. In 1870 there was but little milk made in Illinois or the west, and that little was almost entirely of poor quality. Now there is an immense production there, and western butter and cheese command the highest prices. In 1881 more than 1,000,000 boxes of cheese and a proportionate quantity of butter were sold in Chicago.
—What to study.—Pope, the poetical philosopher said: "The proper study of mankind is man." and yet, how little is man the real science of man studied.
