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THE HALIFAX CONFERENCE.

A MOST INTERESTING REPORT BROUGHT DOWN.

To Delimit a Correct Boundary - Mr. Bond's Statement Regarding Newfoundland's Overtures to the United States - A British Consul for St. Pierre - Confederation Branches, St. Aspid.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8. - Immediately on the heels of the report from the Halifax Conference last night, the minutes of the Halifax Conference last December between delegates from Canada and Newfoundland.

The minutes are made in the form of a very carefully prepared and apparently well done report by Mr. Douglas Stewart, secretary of the Commission. They make 40 printed pages, and it is to be regretted that the state of the finances did not justify the Government in having more than one copy brought to Ottawa. The report is a most interesting document, and it is impossible to digest the report as thoroughly as they would otherwise have done could each pressman have got a copy.

The delegates, it appears, discussed several questions besides those mentioned in the references. The Canadian delegates at the first meeting brought up the complaint that Canadian goods had been charged duty by Newfoundland customs officers in Labrador, although destined for Canadian territory.

The Newfoundland delegates declared they had never heard of such practices and pronounced them illegal, and the upshot of the matter was that it was agreed to appoint officers of both Governments to delimit a correct boundary.

The Bond-Blaine Treaty. Sir John Thompson at the suggestion of Sir William Whiteway explained why Canada had objected to the ratification of the Bond-Blaine treaty, and Sir William asked if Canada failed to secure a treaty herself with the United States would she still object to the Bond-Blaine treaty.

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BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL.

MANY IMPORTANT SUBJECTS UNDER DISCUSSION.

The new Council of the Board of Trade held its inaugural meeting in the board room yesterday. In response to the resolution passed at the last general meeting of the board, the following resolutions were adopted: That the matter of a fast Atlantic steamship service letters were read from Hamilton, London, Quebec and Goderich strongly endorsing the resolution.

On Jan. 17 a committee of Americans proclaimed the monarchy abolished, and appointed a provisional government, "to control and manage public affairs until terms of union with the United States have been negotiated and agreed upon."

The press of the United States is somewhat at a loss what to say about this proposal to seize territory to which it has no historical, political, or moral claim.

The strangest feature in this proposal, to seize an independent kingdom is that the Government and the people of the Republic do not recognize as now binding the old time policy of the States to keep free from foreign entanglements.

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The steps of the City Hall will, we trust, rouse the authorities to enforcing the by-law relating to slippery sidewalks. One of the most aggravating sights in this city is to watch our policemen trading gingerly over pavements that only an acrobat can traverse without imminent risk.

The non-removal of snow is a nuisance doubtless, but it is not a risk to limbs or to internal arrangements, such as ribs. But the breach of the by-law relating to slippery sidewalks involves a serious danger, and it has cost the city thousands of dollars in damages.

It seems only too likely that much of what Mr. Goldwin Smith really has done is a change of being lost sight of in the multitude of false accusations made against the man. He is heart-centre of the Annexation Society of Toronto, and as such he may be judged, quite irrespective of what he may think fit to do to show his constituents a warrant for his appointment. It is to be presumed he is not at the head of a movement which he is not willing to promote.

He cannot, therefore, find much fault with the American reporters who represent him as taking active steps to follow a course of action which he openly advocates. Where is the difference? It is only one of degrees. If he is neither the head nor tail of an annexation, it is difficult to treat seriously a clever man gone silly.

CLYDESDALE HORSE BREEDERS.

A Deputation Will Endeavor to Induce the United States to Recognize the Clydesdale Stud Book.

The seventh annual meeting of the Clydesdale Horse Association of Canada was held yesterday afternoon at the Albion Hotel, President William Smith, Columbus, in the chair.

Secretary Wade reported that 213 horses and 282 mares had been recorded for the seventh volume of the stud book. Of these, 61 stallions and 59 mares had been imported from Britain, leaving 245 bred in Canada.

Mr. Buchanan of the Live Stock Department, however, took a broader view of the matter and considered the association's certificates sufficient guarantee to exhibit horses at the World's Fair.

MR. MCCONNELL ASSIGNS.

The Well-Known Wine Merchant in Temporary Financial Difficulties—Too Much Real Estate the Cause.

Mr. Michael McConnell, the Colborne-street wine merchant, assigned to E. R. C. Clarkson at 4.45 yesterday afternoon. His liabilities are \$20,000 through business as a speculation.

A writ was issued yesterday on behalf of F. X. Cousineau suing on behalf of himself and other creditors of Michael McConnell against McConnell and Eddie Sullivan to recover \$4208.48.

The master in chambers yesterday made an order allowing the defendants in the action of the Queen Victoria Niagara Falls Park Commissioners v. Howard to pay \$400 into court as security for their appeal to the Court of Appeal.

Mr. Justice Meredith heard an appeal from the order of the master in ordinary discharging Liquidator Lye of the Central Bank.

The same learned judge on the petition of Coulter & Campbell, brass finishers, of Toronto, made an order winding up the Polson Iron Works Company (limited) and appointing E. E. G. Clarkson liquidator.
