NOTE AND COMMENT

Meaford Mirror: Who do you love most in the world? Your wife! We thought so. Well, do you agree with everything she says? No! Then how in thunder do you expect the Mirror to please you in every utterance?

Geography may soon be taught to children all over Canada from the same text book. Less than a year ago a new geography and atlas were published by Prof. Geo. O. Cornish, of the University of Toronto, and already it has been authorized in six of the nine Provinces.

Britain is building a submarine more powerful even on the surface than most surface warcraft. Other nations cannot complain. Britain offered to abolish submarine warfare entirely, but the other countries re-presented at the Washington Conference would not concur.

After a seven-year trial the province of Manitoba discarded the pro-hibition law Thursday and by a large majority adopted the Moderation League liquor bill which places the sale of liquor under government con-trol. There was a very large vote polled and in Winnipeg only six polls gave dry majorities.

Any person who has taken an active part in a political campaign often wonders at the indifference displayed by many voters as to the issues before the electorate. Many of them have to be dragged to the polls like sheep to the slaughter. It will be well for this, or any country, when the time comes, if ever, that every voter will take such an interest in the franchise entrusted to his keeping as to deem it his duty and sacred ing as to deem it his duty and sacred privilege to discharge it.

Traffic officers have been instructed by departmental heads to be especially vigilant this year and appre-hend all reckless drivers. It is pointed out that speeding is not the most serious danger feature, but drivers will dodge in front of other cars and make dangerously sharp turns, thus imperilling not only their own lives but also of others on the highway. Young men, accompanied by young women, are declared to be the greatest offenders along this line. "We are out to get the dangerous drivers and thus make the provincial highways safe for the travelling public" is a statement made.

Kingsville Reporter.—We do not believe in too much corporal punishment, but there are times and occa-sions when it seems to be quite proper—in fact an absolute necessity. Submarine X-1, the largest and most powerful underwater craft in the world, was launched at Chatham, England, on the 16th inst. The "mystery ship," as she has been called, displaces 2,780 tons on the surface and 3,600 tons submerged, which is greater by more than a thousand tons than any similar craft now afloat. The X-1 will mount a 12-inch gun and with her great speed will be a match for any surface war craft.

Senator Copeland, of New York, says that it takes 63 dozen eggs to pay a New York plasterer's wage for eight hours' work, that 17 bushels of corn are required for a bricklayer's day. The painter gets the equivalent of 23 chickens, the plumber gets the equivalent of 42 pounds of butter, or the output of 14 cows. After eight months of feeding a hog will pay a corporar one day's wage. These carpenter one day's wage. These comparisons show that something is wrong in the constitution of industry and agriculture.

The Bank of Montreal crop report dated June 21st says that in the Province of Ontario good growing weather and general conditions have more than made up for the backward spring. The early June rains have made growth rapid. Although more rain is needed now, conditions on the whole are most favorable. Fall wheat heading out and growing fast, a good average crop assured. Spring wheat crop late, acreage slightly below average due to late spring. doing well. Rye a small crop. Barley a little backward. Hay, all varieties, above average. Fruits show promise. Strawberries reported good. Pastures in excellent condition.

Persons who stick postage stamps on cheques and other documents subject to the stamp tax after October 1st will have to step out and do it all over again, using inland revenue stamps. Other changes in the stamp tax act, which go into effect August 1st, include an amendment which makes it necessary to affix a two-cent stamp on post card and form letter receipts. A former ruling had held these exempt, and many had held these exempt, and many ingenious forms of specially folded letters and post cards were devised to take advantage of the ruling and dodge the payment of the tax. On and after August 1st the maximum tax on cheques, bills of exchange payable at sight or after three days and receipts given bank denositors. and receipts given bank depositors who withdraw moneys from their ac-counts will be \$1. For promisory notes and time bills of exchange, the tax remains as at present, two cents for each \$50, and no maximum fixed.


