

LAW TO LESSON EVIL OF CIGAR-ETTE SMOKING AMONG POYS OF CANADA.

Ottawa, May 20.-The government will take action this session to les sen the evils of cigarette smoking among the youth of Canada. Hon. A. B. Aylesworth has given notice of a government measure providing for an amendment to the criminal code so as to make it an indictable offense punishable by a substantial fine, for any one to sell cigarettes to juveniles under sixteen years of age for their own consumption. It is further provided that any officer of the peace may confiscate cigarettes found in

the possession of boys under sixteen and the Lovs themselves may be fined to amounts ranging from \$1 to \$5. Furthermore, any dealer selling to youths under sixteen will have his icense cancelled. 
